Wilkes attends state 4-H breakfast

Texas legislators were briefed on how the 4-H program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is addressing youth problems and concerns during a breakfast program in Austin March 21 hosted by 4-H volunteer leaders from across the state.

The "bottom line" of the briefing was that investing in youth programs is critical today if Texas is to have a sound economic future.

Debbie Wilkes of Coke County was among the 66 4-H leaders attending the breakfast at the Radisson Hotel.

The breakfast program featured remarks by Bob Gill of Dallas, executive vice-president of the J. C. Penny Co.; Jim Morris of Austin, executive vice-president of the Texas Electric Cooperatives; and Rudy Ritz, a 4-H member from Meadow in Lubbock.

Also attending were two former 4-H members who are now officials of the Texas A&M University System: Dr. Perry Adkisson, chancellor, and former state representative Bill Presnal, vice chancellor for state affairs.

Legislators were appraised of the role of 4-H, which focuses on helping youth from the third grade through age 19 develop into productive citizens and tomorrow's leaders.

The 4-H program uses a wide range of subject matter information to provide opportunities for youth to learn decision making, goal setting, risk taking, communications and public speaking skills, democratic practices, leadership and citizenship, said

Wilkes. Debbie added that 4-H focuses on developing life skills and a positive self-concept in youths and that these are effective methods for helping youth cope with the pressures of today's society.

Youths active in organizations such as 4-H are less likely to become involved in drug abuse, teen pregnancies and related problems.

As adults, these same youths are more involved in community activities, continued education and voting. In other words, they take their leadership and citizenship responsibilities much more seriously, and they become productive members of our society. They become taxpayers and assets to society rather than liabilities, Wilkes added.

During the breakfast program, Gill made the point that business and industry wants prospective employees to have certain basic skills before employment.

With the high school dropout rate among many of the state's youths as high as 40 percent, jobs may go begging in the future, Gill said. That's where programs such as 4-H can play a key role--in providing youths with some of the basic skills needed for employment, he pointed out.

He added that youth programs such as 4-H provide preventative education which is much less costly than programs to rehabilitate individuals after they "have gone wrong." Every dollar spent on preventative education saves taxpayers \$4.75 on rehabilitation programs, Gill said.

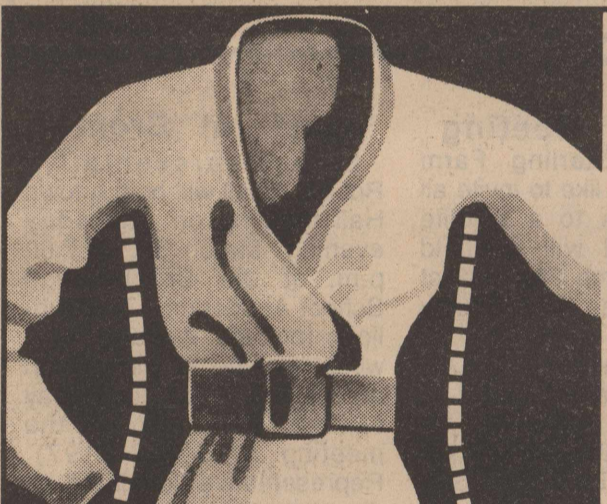
He called attention to an astounding finding by the Hogg Foundation for Mental Health in a 1988 report. The cost of providing one child with a continuum of preventive services, beginning with prenatal and preventive health care and continuing with Head Start, Chapter I Compensatory Education, summer jobs for high school students, and four years of college paid at public expense is \$39,000. In contrast, the cost per year to keep one juvenile delinquent in a Texas training school is \$25,000. What better investment can the state make than in youth education?, Gill asked.

The 4-H program has had a positive influence on hundreds of thousands of youths for more than 80 years, and it will continue to lay a solid foundation for those who avail themselves of its benefits. Our youths are the most precious resource we have; they are our future, Gill said. To assure a prosperous future for Texas, we must invest in our youth programs.

The 4-H volunteer leaders that attend the legislative breakfast represented some 26,000 volunteer leaders and more than 380,000 4-H members throughout Texas.

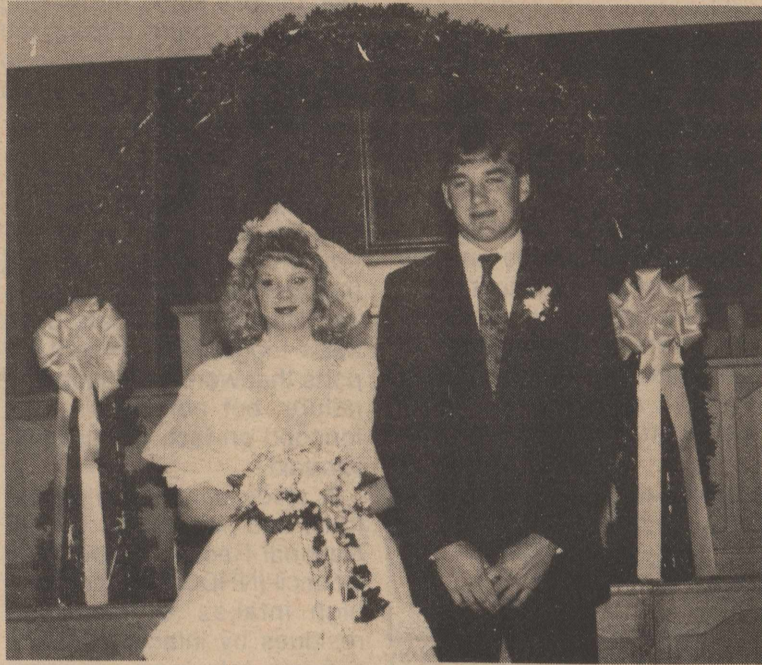
Mrs. Lee graduated from Bronte High School in 1988 and is presently employed at Eye Masters in San Angelo.

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Apples deemed safe to eat

Apple products are safe to eat, despite some misleading information that is making the national rounds, according to two experts with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dr. Alfred B. Wagner, Extension food technologist, and Dr. Calvin G. Lyons, Extension horticulturist, agreed that apple products are safe to eat. Unnecessary fears have been triggered by recent reports that were sensational in nature, but not necessarily founded on fact, the specialists said.

A study concentrating on fruits and vegetables by the National Resources Defense Council (NRDC) first indicated high intakes of pesticide residues by infants. Later, a network television program was aired on the same subject.

The reports have caused unnecessary public fear, yet present data indicate the product targeted by the study, daminozide (trade name Alar) is not a carcinogen, the specialists said.

Wagner said the so-called one-in-4,000 risk is misleading and would not result from exposure to a single residue, but rather would require a combination of all pesticides at maximum levels that could be legally applied to apples.

Wagner said growers simply could not manage an uneconomic practice of this type, nor would they want to do so.

Lyons said he believes that no Texas apple growers use the specific product targeted by the study. Nationally, only about 4 percent of the apple crop is treated with the com-

pound, he said.

Lyons said the compound helps the apples maintain a firmness or crispness in storage, but is in very limited use now. He believes that no health risk exists from use of apple products.

"While we encourage our people to consume Texas-grown products when available, I feel that those apples from major producing states also are entirely safe," Lyons said.

Lyons said that everyone in agriculture is concerned about the safety of items in the food chain.

"Nevertheless, no product can be made 100 percent safe because every naturally-occurring food product poses potential health risks to some people, in the form of food allergies or other problems," Lyons said. This occurs without the use of any compounds, he said.

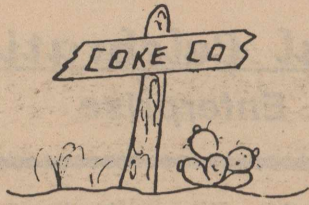

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COUNTRY AGENTS NEWS

A successful flea control program is almost invariably composed of three separate operations. The first is sanitation. This phase includes the following:

1. Thorough cleaning of the home, including vacuuming all carpeting, furniture and drapes. It is especially important to clean thoroughly in areas where the pet rests, under furniture, and in cracks and crevices along baseboards. Don't forget the closets, either. After vacuuming, remove the vacuum bag, place it inside an airtight plastic bag and dispose of it outside in the garbage can.

2. Take all pet bedding and either wash it thoroughly in hot water or throw it into an outside garbage can.

The next step includes chemical treatments. Included in this phase are the following: 1. Treat all pets. You may do this yourself or take the pets to a veterinarian. Dips, sprays, shampoos or dusting may be used, but dips usually provide the best coverage.

Examples of approved dips which are effective include: Zodiac Pro-Dip II for dogs or cats, Starbar Flea and Tick Dip for dogs, Vet-Kem Paramite Sponge or Dip for dogs and cats, Hill's Holiday Odor-Free Flea and Tick Concentrate for dogs and cats. Your veterinarian or chemical supplier may have other effective products.

2. Treat inside the home including all carpeting, furniture in infested rooms, bottoms of drapes, rugs, wood and tile flooring and baseboards. Many approved products are available to the homeowner in ready-to-use sprays. Products containing dursban, diazinon or resmethrin are effective. Examples include Ortho Home Insect Control with Dursban, Kenco Rid-a-Bug, Rid-a-Flea, and Greenlight Indoor Flea and Tick Spray.

If the flea problem is especially severe and immediate relief is needed, a total release aerosol bomb is useful. Be certain to read and follow all label directions. Most of the aerosol bombs available should be used in combination with a residual spray as outlined above. Some aerosol bombs also contain methoprene which keeps young larval fleas from developing into adults. Examples include IGR-

75, Flea Stop, and Strike. These should also be used in combination with a residual insecticide for maximum effectiveness.

3. Treat outside areas thoroughly including the lawn, areas under shrubs and crawl spaces of the house or other areas where pets may spend time. Effective products include dursban and diazinon.

All of the above needs to be accomplished within one day of each other in order not to reinfest areas that have been treated. Be sure to follow label directions on all insecticide products used.

The third step includes repeating all of the above steps at intervals of 7-14 days until the problem is solved. This normally takes 2-3 applications.

Diabetes symptoms told

It is estimated that five million Americans who have diabetes don't know they have it. To help everyone know what to look for, Marilyn Bentley, R.N., of Methodist Hospital, presents the following helpful information along with symptoms to look for.

TYPE I DIABETES (Insulin-Dependent Diabetes)

Type I Diabetes generally appears suddenly in children and young adults, and progresses rapidly. Because the pancreas produces little or no insulin, people with Type I Diabetes must take daily injections of insulin and strictly monitor their diets and exercise.

The exact cause of Type I Diabetes is not known but it afflicts one million Americans.

The symptoms associated with Type I Diabetes include:

- Frequent urination/bedwetting in children who have been trained
- Excessive thirst
- Extreme hunger
- Sudden weight loss
- Weakness and fatigue
- Irritability
- Nausea, vomiting

TYPE II DIABETES (Non-Insulin Dependent Diabetes)

Type II Diabetes, which usually occurs in overweight adults over 40, develops over several years and often goes undetected. Meal planning and exercise, sometimes oral medications and insulin injections, are used to control this

type of diabetes.

Many cases of Type II Diabetes can be prevented by maintaining an ideal weight, and getting regular aerobic exercise (e.g. brisk walking, jogging, swimming, cycling).

The symptoms associated with Type II Diabetes include:

- Any of the Type I Diabetes symptoms
- Blurred vision, or any change in sight
- Tingling or numbness in legs, feet, or fingers
- Slow healing of cuts, especially on the feet
- Frequent skin infections, or itchy skin
- Drowsiness

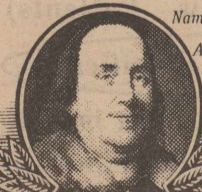

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PUBLIC NOTICE

Pursuant to Section 52.151 of the Texas Water Code, the Coke County Underground Water Conservation District gives public notice of the promulgation of Rules and Regulations relevant to the District. A brief resume of the rules are as follows:

- RULE 1-DEFINITION-Provides no definition of terms within the rules.
 - RULE 2-WASTE-Provides that no person shall commit waste nor shall they pollute or harmfully alter the underground water.
 - RULE 3-PERMIT REQUIRED-Provides that a permit is required for wells in excess of 25,000 gallons of water per day.
 - RULE 4-DEPOSITS-Provides that each application for a permit to drill a well shall be accompanied by a \$50.00 deposit to be returned when a well log is received by the District.
 - RULE 5-ISSUANCE OF PERMITS-Provides for developing an application form for permits.
 - RULE 6-REQUIREMENT OF DRILLER'S LOG, CASING AND PUMP DATA-Provides that logs, casing and pump data be delivered to the district within 60 days of completion.
 - RULE 7-MINIMUM SPACING OF WELLS-Provides that no well shall be located nearer than 300 feet from the nearest property line, and no more than 16 wells per section.
 - RULE 8-EXCEPTION TO SPACING RULE-Provides that the Board may grant an exception to the above spacing regulations.
 - RULE 9-PLACE OF DRILLING A WELL-Provides that a well must be drilled within 10 yards of the location specified in the permit.
 - RULE 10-REWORKING OR REPLACING A WELL-Provides that no person shall rework, redrill or re-equip a well without first making application to the Board.
 - RULE 11-TIME DURING WHICH A PERMIT SHALL REMAIN VALID-Provides that permits shall be valid if the work has been completed within 4 months from the filing date of the application.
 - RULE 12-CHANGED CONDITIONS-Provides that decisions made by the Board may be reconsidered upon its own motion or motion showing changed conditions.
 - RULE 13-RIGHT TO INSPECT AND TEST WELLS-Provides that any representative of the District shall have the right to enter upon the lands for the purpose of inspecting and testing wells.
 - RULE 14-OPEN WELLS TO BE CAPPED-Provides that the owner or operator shall be required to close or cap the well permanently, except when said well is in actual use.
 - RULE 15-FINAL ORDERS OF THE BOARD-Provides that orders of the Board in noncontested proceedings shall become final on the day the order is entered by the Board.
 - RULE 16-REHEARING-Provides any person whose application is denied, or who is not granted relief, may file a motion for rehearing within 15 days from the Board's decision.
 - RULE 17-RULES GOVERNING PROTESTS-Provides that any person who wishes to protest or oppose any pending matter shall make written notice to the Board before the date the matter is set for hearing.
 - RULE 18-GENERAL RULES OF PROCEDURE FOR HEARING-Provides that hearing shall be conducted in such a manner as the Board deems suitable, and technical rules of legal and court procedure need not be applied.
 - RULE 19-GENERAL RULES-Provides for computing time, time limit, and show cause orders and complaints as covered by this rule.
 - RULE 20-WELL VALIDATION-Provides a method of well validation on existing wells when location and wellhead equipment is determined by district personnel.
 - RULE 21-TRANSPORTATION OF WATER FROM THE DISTRICT-Establishes a procedure for transportation of water from the district.
 - RULE 22-WELL DRILLING, COMPLETION, CAPPING AND PLUGGING-Provides for standards of completion and location of domestic, industrial, injection and irrigation wells, and provides standards for completion and production of undesirable water.
 - RULE 23-REPORTING UNDESIRABLE WATER-Requires reporting undesirable water encountered while drilling or deepening of wells.
 - RULE 24-DISPOSAL AND STORAGE OF WASTES-Requires a permit for disposal and storage of wastes and provides for exceptions.
- Complete copies of the proposed Rules and Regulations can be obtained and inspected at the Coke County Underground Water Conservation District office in Robert Lee, Texas.
A Public Hearing will be held on March 27 at 7:00 P.M. at the Coke County Courthouse to review and discuss the proposed Rules and Regulations of the Coke County Underground Water Conservation District.



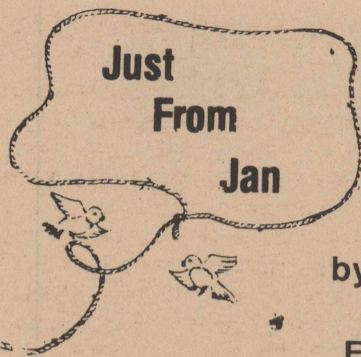

Low-Impact aerobics

Low-impact aerobics could be the answer to the "I don't want to be seen in my swimming suit" blues.

Aerobic activity is the most efficient way to burn calories. It's vital for any weight control or conditioning program.

Low-impact aerobics provide a good workout with minimum stress to the joints,

especially ankles and knees. Low-impact workouts may include such things as brisk walking, vigorous arm movements, and exaggerated marching.

Low-impact aerobics applies the same conditioning principles as other types of aerobics. These exercises help you reach and maintain your exercise heart rate, increase cardiovascular fitness, and can help tone muscles.

Low-impact aerobics also reduce the number of injuries by excluding running, bouncing and other high impact movement. The exercises are geared toward keeping one foot on the ground at all times. This removes most of the stress on impact, and reduces injury.

Low-impact aerobics should not be used to attempt spot reduction. You can't burn energy from one particular area of the body. However, targeted exercise will build or tone the muscle group being worked.

Low-impact aerobics have become quiet popular within the last few years. Their success is due to their wide range appeal. Not only are they an alternative for the injured, low-impact aerobics are great for people just beginning a fitness program, those who feel threatened by other types of aerobics, and those who want something with less stress to their body.

VA Clinics set for Dyess AFB

Veterans are reminded that the only days they may gain access to the Base for refill of medications are on regularly scheduled clinic days. Q&A

Q: Does it make more money-sense to keep renting a carpet cleaner or to buy one?

The Texas Education Agency and National Computer Systems will not be responsible for registration forms that are delayed or lost in the mail. It is suggested that

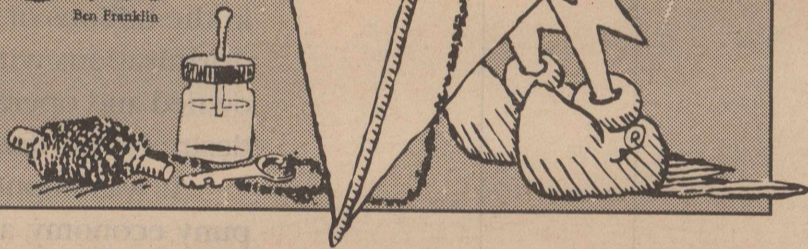

\$1 million plus spent

The state spent a total of \$1,043,533 last year for major welfare programs in Coke County, according to Ray L. Dunavant, regional administrator for the Texas Department of Human Services.

"Medical assistance had the biggest impact, with \$891,600 spent for aged and disabled residents of the county and \$37,309 for families and children in the county," Dunavant said.

Food stamps worth \$91,955 were issued for the fiscal year which ended Aug. 31, while Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) totaled \$22,669. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government, while the department determines eligibility of applicants and issues the food coupons.

The state and federal governments share in the cost of AFDC to families where needy children are deprived of support because of the absence

or disability of one or both parents.

In addition to services and assistance to low-income residents of the county, the department extended protective services to 17 abused and neglected children and their parents or caretakers. These services, furnished without regard to family income, were designed to reduce or eliminate danger to children.

VA Questions and Answers

Following are representative of questions answered daily by VA counselors. Full information is available at any VA office.

Q - I am the widow of a Vietnam veteran who died as a result of a service-connected disability. My late husband never used his VA home loan entitlement. Am I eligible for this benefit?

A - Yes, if you are not currently married. The widow of a veteran of World War II or later period who died as a result of service-connected causes is eligible for the home loan benefit.

Q - I am a former prisoner of war, but have not been rated as service-connected disabled by the VA. Am I entitled to VA dental care?

A - Yes. If your POW internment lasted 90 days or more, you are eligible for all needed dental care.

Q - My brother is incompetent and draws compensation benefits. He is not married and has no dependent children. When he was hospitalized recently his benefits were terminated. Is this correct procedure?

A - If your brother's estate was in excess of \$1,500, the law requires that his benefits be terminated while he was hospitalized since he is incompetent and has no dependents.

Extension plans estate seminars

Estate taxes can take a big bite out of any business, including farm and ranch operations. To provide timely information on the subject, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is conducting four seminars in different areas of the state during the coming weeks, says Dr. Wayne Hayenga, Extension Service attorney and economist.
