Tornado damages Robert Lee residences

Robert Lee residents were rudely reminded again Thursday night of the destructive forces of our West Texas weather. At about 10:00 pm a thunderstorm traveling in a southeasterly direction hit the city carrying with it marble-sized hail, high winds, and at least one tornado. Most of the structural damage from the storm was confined to the south part of town, with the hardest hit being between 1st and 4th Streets.

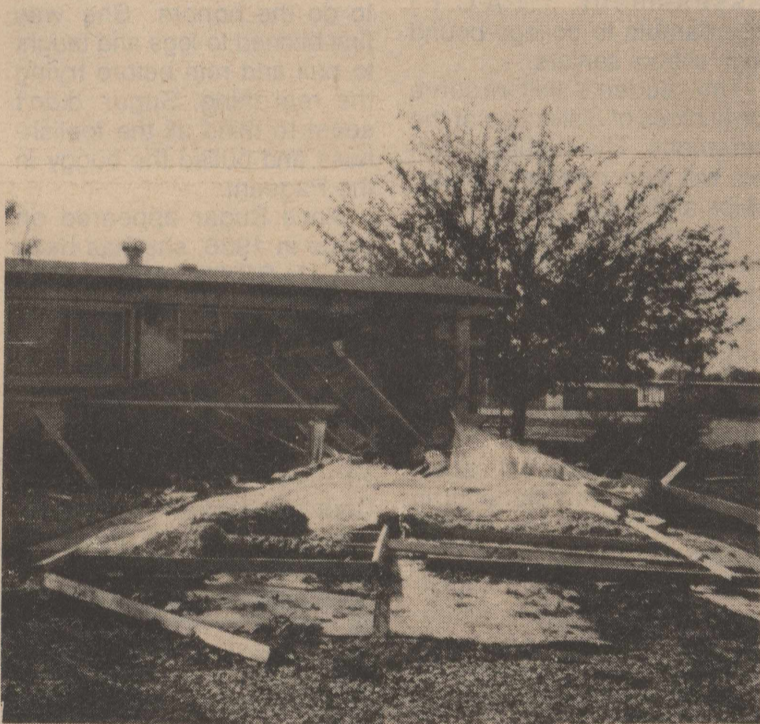
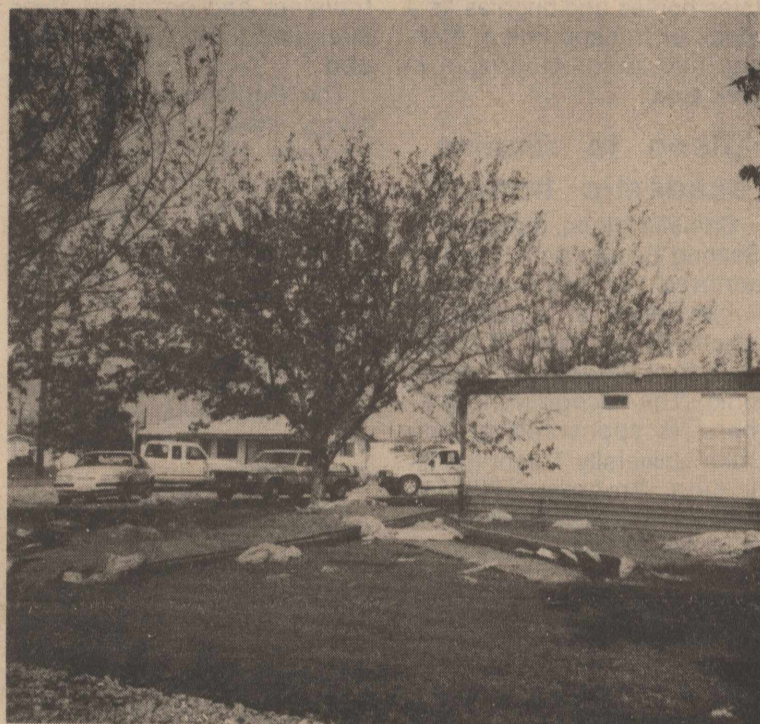
According to Coke County Sheriff's Deputy Jeff Barnes, witnesses reported seeing a funnel and winds were esti-

mated at 70 mph. At least 10 mobile homes, which bore the blunt of the storm, were damaged beyond use. Roofs were ripped away and walls collapsed on many trailers while next-door neighbors' homes went untouched. Uprooted and torn trees, metal roofing, siding, lumber, small storage buildings, and canopies littered the storm area. Wind-driven rain measurements varied from 2 to 4 inches.

The county equipment was utilized by county employees in aiding with the cleanup.

Friends and neighbors came to the aid of the storm victims and moving and clean-up continues. On the plus side is the miracle that no one was hurt during the turbulent weather.

Several surrounding farmers lost oats and wheat not yet harvested. Some small cotton and maize were wiped out. Gardens, already damaged by a late frost, suffered from an earlier hail, in addition to Thursday's storm. Corn is trying to stand back up but squash, tomatoes, peppers, and cucumbers may be in short supply locally.

As if the storm was not content with removing the roof, the bottom photo shows where most of the rest of the roof destroyed a patio belonging to Joe's father, Noah, who lives next door.

Funeral services were held in the Robert Lee Baptist Church Thursday for Mrs. Mattie Eckert Tinkler. Burial followed in the Mereta Cemetery directed by Shaffer Funeral Home. The Rev. Roy Epperson officiated the services. Grandsons served as pallbearers.

Mrs. Tinkler, 99, died Tuesday afternoon in West Coke County Nursing Home where she had been a resident only a few days.

She was born Nov. 5, 1889 in Bastrop to Frank and Lula Lane Eckert. She moved to Paint Rock with her family at an early age. Married to H. S. Glenn to receive academic honors

Danielle Glenn, a student at Second Baptist School will be honored for her academic achievement at a statewide ceremony on June 16, 1989 at Trinity University in San Antonio. The recognition ceremony is sponsored by the Duke University Talent Identification Program (TIP) to salute the seventh-graders from Texas who qualified in TIP's ninth annual Talent Search. All students invited to the ceremony have earned scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) or the American College Testing Assessment (ACT) comparable to college-bound high school seniors.

The students will receive certificates of distinction at the ceremony. The highest scorers will also receive scholarships and books.

TIP conducts recognition ceremonies in each of the 16 states it serves in the Southeast, Midwest and Southwest. Over 50,000 mathematically and verbally gifted seventh graders are identified by this program each year. TIP offers additional educational opportunities for gifted students in seventh through tenth grades.

TIP is a non-profit educational organization established in 1980 with a five year grant from The Duke Endowment. The program receives continuing support from student fees, individuals, corporations and foundations.

"Amish communities and their way of life have become a lucrative tourist venture there," Mrs. Pentecost said. "The people seem to harbor no resentment to the curious travelers and go about their everyday lives," she continued.

The Pentecosts' bought a buggy there, complete with harness, then wondered "how do you get a buggy to Coke County?" They finally struck up a deal with a candy truck, coming to Houston later, to come west with the buggy.

The buggy itself is hand-made, all of wood, and is patterned after most one-horse buggies seen around the turn of the century.

Another problem arising after the buggy was delivered--- a horse to pull it. Horses nowadays have never seen a buggy, much less broke to pull one. The Pentecosts' selected a gentle saddle mare named Sugar who was about 15 years old from their ranch to do the honors. She was first hitched to logs and taught to pull and rein before trying the real thing. Sugar didn't seem to mind all the foolishness and pulled the buggy in the Pageant.

Since Sugar appeared on stage in 1986, she has been given to BOY'S RANCH, and a younger Appaloosa is being trained to pull the buggy.

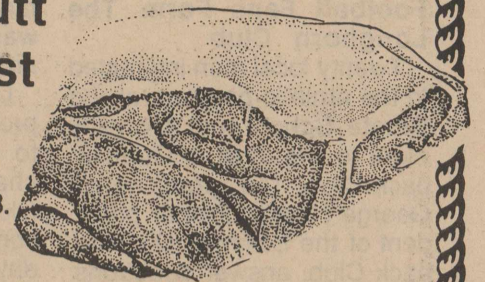

Avoiding heat exhaustion

When temperatures begin to rise, many sports enthusiasts like to get outdoors and enjoy the sunshine. However, over-doing it in hot weather could cause a potentially dangerous condition known as heat exhaustion. Heat exhaustion occurs when the body loses essential fluids faster than it is able to replenish them.

Rick Hartwig, director of the Cardiac Rehabilitation Center at Methodist Hospital, offers the following tips on how to avoid heat exhaustion. First, drink plenty of fluids while exercising outdoors. If you are sweating profusely, you should drink a mixture of equal parts of tomato juice and water. This combination not only replaces water that the body needs, but also re-

plenishes salt and other fluids the body requires to function properly.

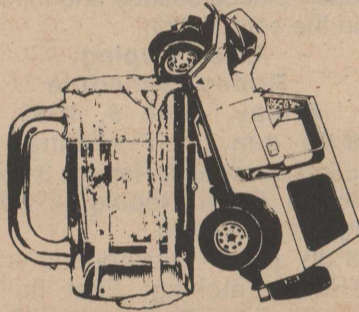
In addition, Hartwig advises wearing clothing which allows the body to "breathe," such as cool cottons.

Symptoms of heat exhaustion include:

- * a throbbing headache
- * nausea
- * pale skin color
- * chills
- * unsteadiness
- * fatigue
- * "clammy" feeling skin
- * profuse perspiration
- * hair erection on chest and upper arms

If any of these symptoms develop during or after physical exercise, you should seek medical attention, Hartwig said.

Temperatures are beginning to rise toward their summer peak, and without some energy-saving steps your utility bills will rise right along with them.

No matter what kind of system you have, carefully setting thermostats can hold down utility bills.

Many of us are in the habit of over-cooling our homes. In the winter we set the thermostat at 78 degrees to stay comfortably warm and then in summer put them all the way down to 68 degrees.

For every degree below 75 degrees that you set your thermostat, your operating cost goes up six to ten percent. So in a 1600 square foot home setting the thermostat at 76 degrees rather than 72 degrees will save about \$220.00 during a cooling season.

When you are going to be gone during the day, turn the thermostat up to 83 degrees. You can save about 25 percent of your energy by cooling the house once you get home, instead of keeping it cool all day.

The air conditioner should be turned entirely off when you are gone for more than 24 hours.

Thermostat control won't have much impact on your utility bills unless you also clean or replace the air conditioner filter regularly.

A clogged air filter causing a 10 percent reduction in air flow will increase your operating costs by 11 percent. The air conditioner has to work harder to reach the thermostat setting, so you are paying for energy that doesn't make the house feel any cooler.

Also check the duckwork in the attic for air leaks. Use duct tape to seal any leaking joints so you are not paying to cool the attic.

A fireplace can pull cool air out of the house and increase cooling cost by up to 20 percent. A tight-fitting damper will reduce any cool air loss.

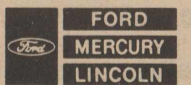

The Brontes. By Rebecca Fraser. Crown. 543 Pages. \$25.

"Jane Eyre" is the quintessential 19th-century novel, a book, according to author Rebecca Fraser, "which would shake Victorian England."

Although the book jacket read "By Currer Bell," the author was in fact a woman, Charlotte Bronte. Through its title character, "Jane Eyre" struck a blow for women's rights with far more force than did the suffragettes several decades later.

Bronte was a shy, almost reclusive woman who lived for most of her life in Yorkshire. Frustrated by a traditional attitude toward women, she directed her emotions in creating powerful, multifaceted women characters, such as Lucy Snowe in "Villette" and Jane Eyre. Her literary genius was shared by two younger

sisters, Emily and Anne, the authors of "Wuthering Heights" and "Agness Grey."

Fraser shows compassion and scholarly appreciation for her subjects in "The Brontes," the first comprehensive biography of the Bronte family.

The book is a well-researched, readable biography that evokes the spirit of the Brontes, from their early days growing up on the Yorkshire moors, watching their mother and older sister, Maria, die of consumption, through early publishing failures and to eventual success (even though the authors were disguised by male noms de plume).

Both Anne and Emily also succumbed to tuberculosis, but Charlotte, at age 38, finally married. She drew up a prenuptial agreement by which her husband could not touch her money. But only eight months later, Charlotte died, presumably the result of tuberculosis aggravated by pregnancy.

The Bronte sisters were not wealthy. They worked as teachers or governesses to support themselves. But the circumstances of their almost tragic lives would provide the backdrop for their novels, which remain in print more than 100 years later.

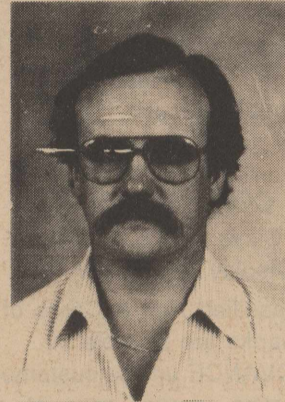
