Glasses fresh out of the dishwasher may be clean, but look cloudy. Part of the reason may be the water.

The key to dealing with cloudy glasses is determining the cause.

There are two main types of cloudiness: a build-up or a film of matter on the glass or etching or leaching out of metal ions from the glass.

To determine what problem you have, try scratching the surface of the glassware with a pin or other sharp object. If some of the cloudiness scratches off, the problem is filming.

Another method of identification is dropping some vinegar on the surface in a cloudy area and rub with your finger. If the surface of the glass is clear when it dries, the type of cloudiness is a film.

If, after scratching the glass, the surface seems pitted or if vinegar does not remove the cloudiness, the problem is etching.

Filming is most commonly caused by water hardness. The calcium and magnesium in hard water drops left on glassware at the end of the washing cycle will dry in place.

Food films result when the protein residue of milk, soft cooked eggs or rare meat combine with the calcium and magnesium in hard water.

Treating the film with an acidic material such as white vinegar or citric acid should remove the buildup. Commercial products also are available, but care should be exercised when using these products. Rinse additives that cause the water to "sheet" off the dishes also may help.

Etching is an unusual combination of soft water (especially chemically softened), alkaline dishwasher detergents, the chemical composition of the glassware and excessive water

temperature.

The quality of the glassware has nothing to do with etching. The true cause appears to be very soft water and/or the overuse of detergent since the largest component of the detergent is a water softener.

When etching is identified as a probable cause, try using only one tablespoon of dishwashing detergent in each detergent cup or holder in your dishwasher.

Whether filming or etching is the problem, hand washing helps eliminate the film and can prevent the etching.

Ban Assault Guns?

Barbara Fass has served as mayor of Stockton, Calif., for the past four years. She was elected to the Stockton City Council in 1979. She also is involved in private law practice.

Should government ban assault guns?

As the mayor of Stockton, Calif., where 31 people were physically injured, five children killed and a community emotionally damaged by an AK-47, I am dedicated to banning antipersonnel assault weapons. Their rapidity—capable of firing 106 rounds in 90 seconds—and devastating harm far exceed what is needed to protect home and property. These weapons were not designed for sportsmen or hunters.

Government must now step in to impose reasonable limits on these dangerous guns. The U.S. Constitution is a living document, flexible in adapting to a changing world, with a Supreme Court designed to interpret it as need be. We know that free speech does not give one the right to call "fire" in a crowded theater, drive a tank down the street, own a military submarine or possess a mininuclear bomb. It is now time to define the limits of the weapons we may bear.

Are there effective ways to safeguard the public without banning these weapons?

The arguments that "people kill people, guns don't," and that we can "compromise" by requiring registration and waiting periods are ludicrous. "Legal guns" fall into the hands of criminals. A friend or relative can easily purchase a gun for your use. Yes, people kill people, but the randomness and volume are reduced if automatic and semiautomatic weapons are removed from our cities. We need tougher sentencing of criminals and help for the mentally ill, but we must have control of weapons, too.

How can law enforcement agents effectively arm themselves against these weapons?

They can't; nor do they wish to. One bullet at Cleveland School was traced through two cinderblock walls, a metal cabinet and into a shelf. The police, sheriffs and all law enforcement agents in California are united in seeing automatic and semiautomatic anti-personnel assault weapons banned.

Should government ban assault guns?

"Assault guns" are by federal regulations defined as fully automatic firearms, i.e., "machine guns." They generally are prohibited in civilian hands except under special permit. The so-called assault gun, which is a semiautomatic rifle or pistol, is in every function identical to legitimate hunting rifles and target pistols. In many models, the hunting rifle is far more powerful and just as fast, if not faster. To really accomplish any true protection, all semiautomatic firearms would have to be banned, and this is not proper. We must punish the criminal illegally using any firearm, semiautomatic or otherwise, not make a criminal out of otherwise law-abiding citizens simply for possessing certain firearms. Remember, the criminal will never obey any firearm ban.

Are there effective ways to safeguard the public without banning these weapons?

Put any criminal using an assault firearm in jail—no plea bargaining, no probation, no parole. If every time someone who committed a crime with an assault weapon was sure to spend 10 or more years in jail for such use, it wouldn't take long to see assault guns no longer used.

How can law enforcement agents effectively arm themselves against these weapons?

Only by arming themselves with the same weapons can they have equal effect, but this is totally unacceptable except in the rarest of situations, such as those involving SWAT teams. We cannot have open warfare in our streets.

What we can have is swift, sure and exact enforcement of the more than 20,000 laws regulating crime already on the books. Our streets can become safe again. We must make the funds available to provide more police, more prosecuting attorneys and judges and more jails. But what a small price to pay to stop the killing of innocent persons and the police trying to protect them.

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

Permits needed for diesel

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday reminded Texans buying diesel fuel tax-free that state fuels tax permits are needed to comply with the

Bullock said that some customers can buy diesel fuel taxfree in Texas by signing a statement saying that they don't own or operate any diesel-powered vehicles driven on Texas roads. The Comptroller's office provides the printed statements.

Purchases made in this way are restricted to 2,000 gallons or less at any one time with a monthly limit of 10,000 gallons or less.

The statement becomes invalid if the customer buys or uses any vehicles powered by diesel fuel on Texas highways but taxpayers have a couple of options if that happens, Bullock said.

First, they could pay the fuels tax of 15 cents a gallon and file for a refund with the Comptroller's office. Refunds are given for tax paid on any diesel fuel that wasn't used on Texas roads.

Or, they could prepay the tax to the Comptroller's office for vehicles weighing 10,000 pounds or less. The cost is based on the vehicle's weight.

To buy diesel tax-free for vehicles that weigh more than 10,000 pounds, owners need a bonded user's permit. For this they must maintain records and file quarterly reports with the Comptroller's office. They may also need to post a bond with the Comptroller's office.

Bullock cautioned fuel suppliers to keep a copy of an upto-date permit or a signed statement from each customer before selling any diesel fuel tax-free.
