County hosts large number of hunters

Opening weekend of the 1989-90 gun hunting season on deer, turkey, and quail began on a good note, with lots of hunters in the county. The weather was on the warm side but didn't seem to slow up the harvest. Some of the deer storage units reported numbers down by a third but lots of deer were reported killed. Every kill was marked by layers of fat on carcasses.

Game biologists examining kills reported the deer were in unusually good shape but with under-average to average antler devolpment. Hunters volunteered information that around Robert Lee, the rut among whitetail deer is already underway and should bring out the bigger bucks.

Opening weekend of the 889-90 gun hunting season a deer, turkey, and quail bean on a good note, with lots hunters in the county. The eather was on the warm side Most said they could have taken smaller-racked bucks but are waiting for a better one, and "per usual" for this area, don't want does till they get that big buck.

Coke County game warden Sparks Burdett stated that he had seen several good bucks taken in the area, including a 21 point buck on the McShan Ranch by a Midland man. His antlers went almost 23 inches, inside measurement. The ranch extends into Runnels County. He said a biologist weighed one big-bodied buck at the Silver Peak Grocery that topped 131 lbs.

Turkey and quail hunting is reported as spotty, and quail especially, are not plentiful.

Voter turnout light for amendments

The proposed 21 constitutional amendments on the special election ballot Tuesday fell on hard times across the state when a light voter turnout turned down #1 (legislators' raise) by a resounding margin, #3, #11 and

#18.

Coke County showed a very poor voter total; only 385 out of 2,195 eligible registered voters went to the polls. County voters locally defeated #1, #3, #11, #12, #15, #17, #18 and #19. No. 1 was

turned down 74-304.

County Clerk Ettie Hubbard said the theory that absentee balloting is a voter indicator proved once again to be true.

Only 23 Coke County voters cast absentee ballots.

600 attend hunter bbq

West Coke County Development completed a monumental project last Saturday when the organization fed over 600 people at the Hunters Appreciation BBQ. The development group, realizing the impact that hunting has on the economy, set out to show the community's appreciation. The committee, chaired by Bob Wrinkle, tackled the job under tough circumstances -- not knowing what to buy, how many would eat, or how to pay for the dinner. He and his committee made it all work, due to the generosity of local merchants, ranchers, and other individuals. Hunters registered from all over Texas, and from as far away as Oklahoma, New Mexico, Kansas, and California. Although all of those who attended could not be seated at once and were lined up back into the park, they goodnaturedly took their turn, while everyone present enjoyed the music of local musician Billy Newman.

The WCCCD board made plans to sponsor the BBQ as an annual event. More individual participation is needed in the organization. 
Cable provides video to school





Potassium-Rich Foods Important In Diet

While many people are aware that too much sodium can intensify high blood pressure, few may know much about its counterpart, potassium.

While Sodium can increase blood pressure in some people, and indirectly contribute to heart disease or stroke, potassium can help controll blood pressure and regulate heart rhythm.

Many experts agree that just as there are good reasons to avoid too much sodium, an ingredient of salt and other food additives, there are reasons to eat foods that contain plenty of potassium.

According to a recent Tufts University "Diet and Nutrition Letter," there is evidence that if a diet is rich in potassium, the likelihood of falling victim to high blood pressure of hypertension lessens.

An article in the New England Journal of Medicine also said one extra serving per day

of potassium-rich food can cut the risk of death from strokes as much as 40 percent. You're more likely to have a healthier diet by eating potassium-rich foods because usually these foods contain other ingredients.

Lean cuts of fish, beef and poultry are good examples of foods that contribute large amounts of potassium (in relation to sodium content) while offering plenty of vitamins and minerals such as iron.

Fruits and vegetables also provide potassium, but this changes if the foods are heavily processed. The less a food is tampered with, the better chance of eating a high-potassium, low-sodium item.

The "Diet and Nutrition Letter" stated that one baked potato with the skin, which has just five milligrams of sodium and only a tenth of a gram of fat, contains several hundred milligrams of potas-

Other good sources of potassium are bananas, cantelopes, broccoli, honeydew melons, oranges, tomatoes, peas and dried beans.

Potassium can only be stored in the body in small amounts, so it is necessary to replenish your supply daily.


