New bridge funding told

Coke County residents traveling County Road 149 east of US 277 will have a new bridge over Kickapoo Creek in coming years. At its January meeting, the highway commission agreed to fund the project through a federal pro-

"The existing bridge has a truss design and was built in 1930. It is very narrow and is inadequate for current traffic demands," said Engineer-Director Arnold Oliver. "We will preserve the old bridge because of its possible historic value. The new bridge will be built nearby. This will also avoid interrupting access to the golf course and park."

Oliver said the off-system dollars serve Texas.
"Although this bridge is not on our state-maintained system, it is definitely part of the

area's overall mobility network. Coke County officials have said they are interested in providing the 20 percent of local funds needed to do the work. The state will use about \$80,000 from the federal program to build the bridge."

"Authorization for all federal highway programs expire in said Oliver. "Transportation leaders from across the nation have proposed a program for the next 30 years that gives states a bigger voice in addressing local needs -- one that allows us more flexibility to plan projects like this one at Kickapoo

Oliver said the highway debridge program is one of sev- partment will submit a plan for eral ways federal highway the bridge project to county officials for their approval. Plans for design and construction of the project could begin in a year.

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

State expenditures noted

The state spent a total of \$1,000,907 last year for major welfare programs in Coke County, according to Ray L. Dunavent, Regional Administrator for the Texas Department of Human Services.

"Medical assistance had the biggest impact, with \$809,391 spent for aged and disabled residents of the county and \$42,688 for families and children in the county," Dunavant said.

Food stamps worth \$124,147 were issued for the fiscal year which ended August 31, while Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) totaled \$24,681. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government, while the department determines eligibility of applicants and issues the food coupons.

The state and federal governments share in the cost of AFDC to families where needy children are deprived of support because of the absence or disability of one or both

In addition to services and

assistance to low-income residents of the county, the department extended protective services to 26 abused and neglected children and their parents or caretakers. These services, furnished without regard to family income, were designed to reduce or eliminate danger



Jesse Eads retires from water district

[Editor's note: The following article was "borrowed" from CRMWD's paper, "Windmill", for use in the local paper.]

Jesse Eads, our utility man at Lake Spence, has decided on retirement while he and Willie Faye can still enjoy it.

In terminating his 21-year career with the District, he is settling down almost where it all began for him. His parents, W. J. and Ellen Eads settled on a ranch about four miles from historic Fort Chadbourne, established in 1852, in northeastern Coke County. Most of his life has been spent in that area.

Jesse started with the District on short notice. He had been working as roustabout in a construction maintenance gang at Sun's Silver gas plant and he sensed the situation was a little shaky. He put in his application with CRMWD, little thinking he soon would get a phone call to visit with O. H. Ivie, general manager. After the interview he asked "when do you want me to start?"

"How about in the morning?" And that's how it started. His first assignment was working with Maurice Wright and Keith Hood and others on the brush-clearing gang for Lake Spence. He piloted an Allis Chalmers crawler tractor, which gave rise to one of his hairiest experiences. Working on a high, steep slope of the river, he felt the tractor give a lunge as a big tree gave way, and there he was balanced atop several tons of steel on the edge, wildly hunting for reverse. Desperation dictated results; luckily he hit the reverse.

For 35 years Jesse leased a small ranch spread and engaged in horse breeding, but recently he lost the lease. It is just as well in view of his retirement and desire to pinch back.

"I've always loved horses," he said, but none more than his Coke Time, who died at age 28, the last of the famous Band Time line. Currently, his sire is Mr. K-Bar Jet. Jesse doesn't plan to have but one or two, nothing like the dozen or more he once kept.

He and the former Willie Faye Gaines, whom he married December 4, 1958, have a little place on the Colorado River just below Robert Lee.
