

WCCCD hosts "meet the candidates" night

West Coke County Community Development hosted a "Meet the Candidates Night" in conjunction with its monthly meeting Monday evening. A number of Bronte residents attended the gathering which drew a good crowd as the four candidates for county judge spoke in turn. Bob Cox, Kenneth Green, Jeffie Harmon Roberts, and Royce Lee each gave a short summary of their backgrounds and their views on qualifications and duties of that office.

Other candidates present and introduced were Ettie Hubbard, incumbent county and district clerk; incumbent county treasurer Phelan Wrinkle; and Joan Davis, a candidate for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, all of whom are unopposed; and Jerry Parker, candidate for county commissioner, Precinct 4.

Patti Ivey, county Democratic chairman, was present and, in showing a sample bal-

lot, said that when no write-in box is provided on a ballot, a voter cannot write in a candidate. No boxes of this nature will be on the March 13 primary ballot except for county chairman and the various election judges. To mark where no box is provided could cause your ballot to be dis-allowed. In the November 6 general election, write-in boxes will be printed.

As Democratic chairman, she also informed the group that on the Democratic ballot in the U. S. Senate race in the primary on March 13 will be Harley Schlanger, an avowed follower of Lyndon LaRouche who is serving 15 years in prison for conspiracy to commit mail fraud.

Schlanger was quoted in the Fort Worth Star Telegram as saying that LaRouche is in the federal penitentiary because he is a victim of the "secret government".

At their January 13, 1990 meeting, the State Democratic Executive Committee passed a resolution urging that these LaRouche candidates ".....not be supported when any other Democrat is on the ballot for the same office". It is most important that true Democrats be aware of this situation before entering the polling place.

President Robert Wink called the business meeting to order and thanked the candidates for being present. He expressed a sincere need for new members for WCCCD. He announced that board members are in the process of a revision of the organization's by-laws and methods of electing officers and board members before the end of the fiscal year in July.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:40, in keeping with a commitment to shorter meetings to encourage attendance.

Horns on their way to regional playoffs

The Bronte Longhorns traveled to Sweetwater Tuesday night to take on the Ira Bulldogs in a key Area Playoff basketball game.

Coach Rocky Rawls' Longhorns, playing a run and gun style offense, were determined not to let anything stand in their way of a trip to the Regional Tournament. Quick hands, quick feet, and a swarming defense saw the Horns roll past the Bulldogs 63-49. If you did not witness the game and only saw the score, you might think they had little trouble with the Bul-

dogs - Not True!! The first quarter was evenly matched with Ira taking a quick lead on the Longhorns. Bronte pulled even midway through the first quarter and then gained a one point advantage at the end of the quarter, 13-12. Bronte took possession of the ball to open the second quarter, but things seemed to have turned against the Longhorns, as they went on a dry run for nearly five minutes of the quarter. The basketball just would not fall for them as it just rolled in, around and then out and Ira took a 10 point

lead, 23-13. After a time-out, the Horns came out with that Longhorn determination they have shown all year. Pecking and bombing away at the basket, Bronte's Daryl Lucas hit a key 3 pointer from the corner to start the Horn's comeback. With the score 27-22 in favor of Ira, Bill Windham canned a 3 pointer from the top of the key as the buzzer sounded to end the half at Ira 27 - Bronte 25.

The second half opened with the fire still burning and it got hotter and hotter as the game went on. Phillips and Windham had the hottest hands as Phillips scored 10 of his 12 points and Windham 14 of his 20 in the second half. These two were not the only ones to fuel the comeback as James Badgett pulled down numerous rebounds, blocked shots, and had sev-

Absentee voting extended until March 9

The extended absentee balloting period is under way for those registered to vote in the March 13 primaries, Texas Secretary of State George Bayoud said.

Registered voters will have until Friday, March 9 to appear in person at county courthouses and polling places across Texas to cast absentee ballots in next month's Democratic and Republican party primary elections, said Bayoud, the state's chief elections officer. The deadline to register to vote in the March 13 primaries was February 11.

Under a 1987 state law that relaxed absentee balloting requirements, registered voters need not give a specific reason for casting in-person, absentee ballots during the extended period.

A separate period still exists for those who cast absentee ballots by mail. That period began January 27. Those who vote absentee by mail must give a reason for not being able to cast their ballot on Election Day.

"This 'no excuse' voting period literally leaves Texans no excuse to stand on the sidelines and watch others decide who to nominate for governor and the many other statewide and local offices that are on the ballot," Bayoud said. "Those old excuses about being turned off by having to stand in long lines, or taking time off from work on a weekday are no longer valid."

On March 13, Texans will head to the polls to nominate candidates for the U. S. senate, governor, lieutenant governor and hundreds of other statewide and local offices.

In recent Texas gubernatorial election years, voter turnout in the primaries has been low, said Bayoud. In 1986, for example, the total turnout in the Democratic and Republican party primaries was 21 percent, while in 1982 the combined turnout for both political parties was 26 percent.

"I am hopeful that promotion

of the extended voting period combined with the aggressive, statewide voter registration/education campaign conducted by my office and the 'get out the vote' efforts undertaken by the political parties and their candidates will make a difference in

1990," Bayoud said. "Hundreds of important decisions on representation at all levels of government will be made in the upcoming primaries," Bayoud said. "It's imperative that everyone who is registered, votes, - either absentee or on Election Day."



Using your food money wisely means more than cutting your food bill. It also means making sure you get good nutrition and eating pleasure for the money you spend on food. Wise use of food dollars is a challenge, requiring planning and the use of basic tools to make sound cost comparisons. Here are some tips to help you sharpen your food money management skills:

- Plan meals first, then make a shopping list. Use your list to save trips to the supermarket and help you avoid buying items you don't really need.
- Shop at a store that gives you the best price and quality for products you typically buy. Make sure the cost savings from shopping at several stores justifies the extra time and transportation cost.
- Try to avoid shopping when you're tired, hungry, or rushed.
- Use unit pricing to find best buys. Large packages, store brands, and sale items are often, but not always, cheaper than other brands or container sizes.
- Use itemized receipts from computer-assisted checkout

systems to help track food costs. This is especially helpful when prices aren't marked on products.

- Make substitutions for items on your shopping list if you can save money or get a higher quality product, and if the item will fit into your meal plans.
- Use coupons for products you usually buy. Stock up on store specials in reasonable amounts.
- Buy store brands and generic items when their taste and quality suit your needs.
- Salad bars can be costly -- buy only items you need in small quantities. Pick up basic ingredients -- lettuce, cabbage, celery, carrots, cucumbers, onions -- elsewhere in the store.
- Buy bulk foods (when available) for high quality, a lower, and the exact amount you want.
- Make sure convenience foods are worthwhile buys. Some (packaged mixes, canned vegetables, frozen juice concentrates) are good buys, while others (frozen dinners) cost much more than home-prepared versions.
- Avoid overbuying (particularly perishables) to minimize food waste.
- To protect food quality while you shop:
 - * Pick up perishables (salad bar ingredients, frozen vegetables, meats, dairy products) last.
 - * Pack frozen foods and meats in insulated bags. Keep cold items together.
 - * Minimize time foods are in the car. Keep perishables out of direct sunlight.
 - * Put foods away promptly.

COUNTRY AGENTS NEWS

Starting in January 1990, employers are required to withhold income tax from their employees, regardless of the number of employees. Prior to 1990, agricultural producers didn't have to withhold federal income taxes out of the employees' paychecks. All employers, including farmers, were required to withhold Social Security contributions. As a result, income taxes were not withheld from many workers' pay under the old rules. This change will require employees to complete a W-4 form, "Employee's Withholding Allowance Certificate." Next January, employees should receive a W-2 form, "Wage and Tax Statement 1990," from their employer showing the amount of income tax withheld.

The amounts withheld are paid to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) through an authorized bank by employers on a periodic schedule. Employees will have to use the W-2 form as a basis to file an income tax return at the end of the year. They will then determine if they owe more taxes or if they are entitled to receive back all or part of the taxes withheld.

This new change means that employees of farmers who were not withholding income taxes under the old

rules will probably receive reduced paychecks starting in January 1990. As an example, a single worker receiving \$3.50 per hour in wages would be entitled to \$140 for a 40 hour weekly salary. With one exemption listed on his W-4, his employer will be required to withhold \$12 in income taxes. The employee would be entitled to receive the remaining \$128.

Employees should keep in mind that Social Security taxes would also be deducted from the paycheck. The Social Security tax rate is 7.65%

of the first \$51,300 of annual salary. This means that the \$128 in this example would be further reduced by \$10.71 (140 x 7.65%) and the employee would receive \$117.29.

Readers should keep in mind that the amount of income tax withheld is heavily dependent on the size of the paycheck, marital status and the number of exemptions. If, for example, the employee had declared 4 exemptions on his W-4 form, no federal income taxes would be withheld, but the \$10.71 Social Security taxes would have to be paid.

While this method of determining withholding amounts is typical and common, IRS allows several other methods. Concerned employees should check with their employers as to the method used to determine their income tax withholding.

Agricultural workers may be exempt from income tax withholding requirements if they meet all of the following tests: had no income tax liability in 1989 (received a total refund); do not expect to have a tax liability in 1990 (would receive a total refund); are not a dependent on anyone else's tax return and, if claimed by someone else, total wage and non-wage income is less than \$500.

However, all employees, including agricultural workers, are not exempt from Social Security payments.



NOTICE OF TARIFF CHANGE TO CENTRANET® SERVICE

The Public Utility Commission of Texas approved a generic tariff for CentraNet® service up to 100 lines in Docket No. 7652. The proposed tariff revision would establish specific rates for CentraNet® service involving 101 to 400 lines. Other proposed revisions involve the rate applicable to changes, additions, or deletions to the data bases and a new rate is proposed for additional trunks.

The names of the three CentraNet® packages have changed from Standard, Premium, and Deluxe to CentraNet® 1000, CentraNet® 2000, and CentraNet® 3000, respectively. Direct Call Pickup has been added to the three CentraNet® packages while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet® 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to CentraNet® 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

The proposed rates are on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are available for public inspection at the offices of GTE Southwest Incorporated. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission. The deadline to intervene in this docket is 3:00 p.m., March 19, 1990.





BIG SPRING, TEXAS 79721 applicant, seeks to amend Certificate of Adjudication No. 14-1008, as amended pursuant to §11.122, Texas Water Code, and Texas Water Commission Rules 31 TAC §§295.1, et seq.

Certificate No. 14-1008, as amended, includes authorization to maintain E. V. Spence Dam and Reservoir on the Colorado River in Coke County and to divert water from the reservoir for municipal, industrial and mining purposes. The certificate, as amended, also authorizes operation of a water quality enhancement diversion system upstream from E. V. Spence Reservoir on the Colorado River and on Beals Creek, tributary of the Colorado River. The water quality enhancement facilities include diversion of a part of the highly mineralized low flows of the Colorado River from a point in Mitchell County into an off-channel storage reservoir known as Barber Reservoir in Mitchell County and from a small reservoir in Howard County on Beals Creek into Red Draw Reservoir in Howard County on Red Draw, tributary of Beals Creek. The diverted water is used for mining and industrial purposes. The certificate, as amended, includes diversion points on Lake E. V. Spence, the Colorado River, the reservoir on Beals Creek and Red Draw Reservoir.

The amended certificate also authorizes a total impoundment in E. V. Spence Reservoir, Red Draw Reservoir and the reservoir on Beals Creek of 488,760 acre-feet.

The certificate, as amended, currently authorizes use as follows:

a. Not to exceed 40,000 acre-feet of water per annum from

Lake E. V. Spence for municipal purposes;

b. Not to exceed 2000 acre-feet of water per annum from Lake E. V. Spence for industrial purposes; however, owner may divert annually any portion of this authorized amount into either Barber Reservoir or Red Draw Reservoir and use the same for industrial purposes; and

c. Not to exceed 8000 acre-feet of water per annum from Lake E. V. Spence for mining purposes; however, of this authorized amount, owner may divert annually into either Barber Reservoir or Red Draw Reservoir any portion of a total of not to exceed 6000 acre-feet and use the same for mining purposes, provided that the amount of water diverted annually into Barber Reservoir and used for both industrial and mining purposes shall not exceed 6000 acre-feet.

This certificate, as amended, also includes the following Special Conditions:

a. The maximum combined diversion and use under Certificate of Adjudication Nos. 14-1008 and 14-1002 (the District's water right for Lake J. B. Thomas) shall not exceed 73,000 acre-feet of water per annum of which not more than 20,000 acre-feet per annum shall be used for mining and industrial purposes.

b. Diversion from the Colorado River to the off-channel reservoir (Barber Reservoir) can only take place when the chloride content equals or exceeds 500 ppm.

c. The owner shall store only public waters of the Colorado River and its tributaries, subject to all rights of holders of superior and senior water rights. Whenever the Texas Water Commission finds that owner is storing any water to which holders of superior and senior water rights are entitled, the owner shall release the same to said holders on order of the Commission. Upon order of the Commission, the owner specifically shall allow the downstream passage of flows entering the reservoir on Beals Creek in such quantities as may be necessary to satisfy existing rights, including but not limited to the rights of downstream domestic and livestock users and those rights represented by Certificate of Adjudication No. 14-1017, issued to John L. Whitmire (40 acre-feet per annum for irrigation purposes); Certificate of Adjudication No. 1019A, issued to W. F. Company, Ltd. (800 acre-feet per annum for secondary oil recovery purposes) and Permit No. 3291, issued to Price Construction, Inc. (12 acre-feet per annum for mining purposes).

d. Owner shall at all times operate its system so as to take as much of its water requirements from the reservoir under Certificate No. 14-1002 (Lake J. B. Thomas) as is feasible and consistent with reasonable operating requirements. To this end, owner shall take not less than 24,000 acre-feet of water required to supply its users during each calendar year from Lake J. B. Thomas; provided that the total storage in such reservoir is not less than 100,000 acre-feet at any time

during such year.

e. Owner shall on or before January 31st of each year, file a sworn report with the Commission stating the amount of water that has been diverted under Certificate of Adjudication No. 14-1002 and under this certificate and supplied to users during the preceding 3 calendar years, and 1/3 of such amount (rounded off to the nearest 1,000) shall be the "Annual Use of Current Year" for the purposes of the impounding schedule set forth below. To provide such "Annual Use for Current Calendar Year" there is a "Maximum Storage Authorized in E. V. Spence Reservoir, Red Draw Reservoir, and Beals Creek Sump Pump Reservoir" set out below. When at any time during such calendar year the combined amount of water in E. V. Spence Reservoir, Red Draw Reservoir, and the Beals Creek Reservoir exceeds the Maximum Storage Authorized

for that year, then owner shall, upon receiving written request from the operator at that time of Lake Buchanan and Lake Travis, release water from E. V.
