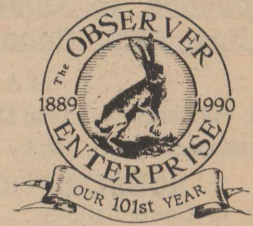

Primary runoff election set for Tuesday

Texans return to the polls Tuesday, April 10 for round two of the 1990 election year nominating process that will culminate in the November 6 general election. A number of important decisions will be made in all levels of government in the primary runoff election Tuesday. Interest is high in Coke County where county judge candidates Kenneth Green and Royce Lee are challenging for the Democratic nomination. The winner will appear on the election ballot in November along with other Democratic county office nominees.

Absentee voting continues through Friday, April 10. At presstime Wednesday, 48 votes had been cast through County and District Clerk Ettie Hubbard's office.

If you are registered to vote, but did not vote March 13 you

can still cast your ballot in the runoff election April 10.

Tuesday's election ballot will lead off with the Governor's Race: Jim Mattox, Ann Richards; State Treasurer: Nikki Van Hightower, Tom Bowden; Justice Supreme Court, Place 2: Ross Sears, Bob Gammage; Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1: Morris L. Overstreet, Frank Maloney; and Coke County Judge: Kenneth C. Green,

Royce Lee.

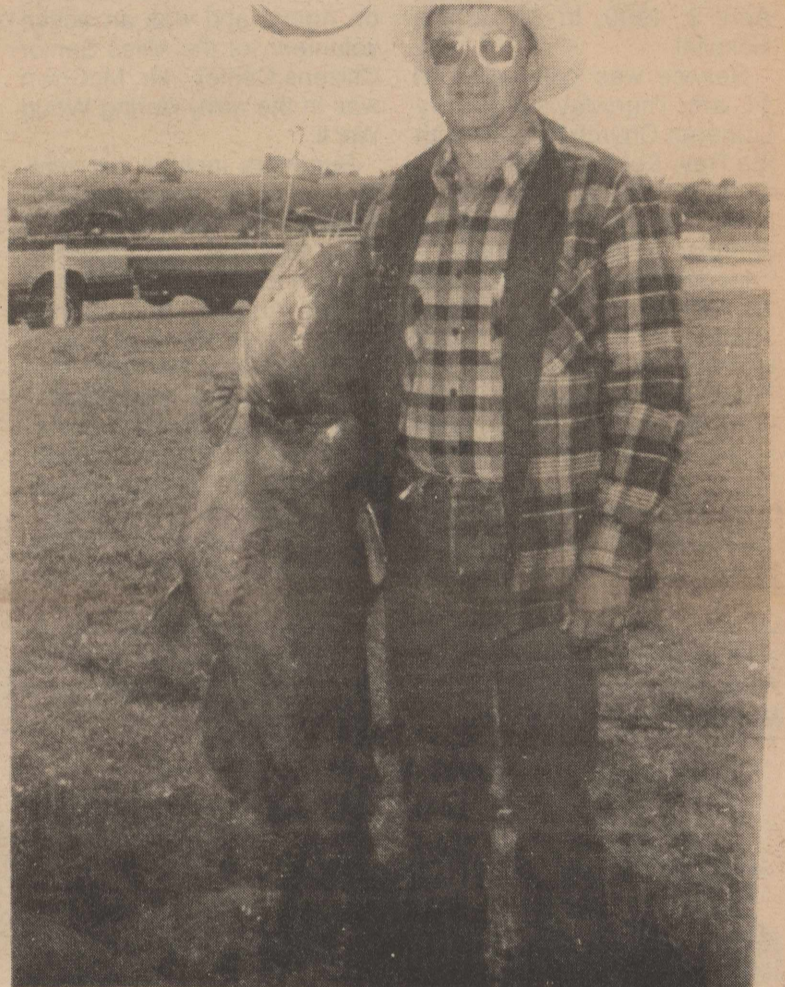
Polling locations in Coke County include Precinct 1 - the Senior Citizen Building; Precinct 3 - the courthouse, and Precinct 9 - the Pecan Baptist Church, all Robert Lee voting boxes, and Precinct 2 - City Hall, Precinct 4 - Community Building, Tennyson; and Precinct 5 - Old Depot, all in Bronte. All polling places listed are Democratic voting boxes and will remain open 7 am - 7 pm.

RL sets salary for mayor

At a special meeting April 2, the Robert Lee City Council set a salary for the Mayor of the City of Robert Lee. The first consideration in the discussion was the increase in the time required to fulfill the duties of mayor. This seemed

to be the primary reason for failure of anyone to file for the next term as mayor of the city.

The Council set a salary of \$300.00 per month to begin with the term of office after the May 5 election.

Obituaries

McCown

Wilson A. McCown, 71, of Miles died at 4 am Tuesday, April 3, 1990, in St. John's Hospital.

Service was conducted at 11 am Thursday at Trinity Lutheran Church in Miles with the Rev. Eckhard Grimm officiating. Burial followed in Miles Cemetery directed by Johnson's Funeral Home.

Mr. McCown was born June 22, 1918, in Parker County, Texas. He married Viola Helmers on May 2, 1942, in Paso Robles, California. The Lord blessed this union with four children and their families.

He had lived in Miles since 1948 and was a dairyman and farmer. He served as an elder in the Lutheran Church, and was a member of the Trinity Lutheran Church in Miles.

Mr. McCown served on the Miles City Council, the board

of trustees of Miles ISD, director of Willow Creek Water Control District, director on West Central Texas Council of Government for the Council on Aging, and was an active volunteer for the Miles Senior Citizens Center. Mr. McCown was in the army during World War II.

Survivors include his wife, Viola of Miles; three sons and daughters-in-law, Chester and Ollie McCown of Victoria, Clayton and Carolyn McCown of San Angelo, and Sidney and Kathy McCown of Robert Lee; one daughter and son-in-law, Brenda and Quinn Conley of Baird; three brothers, Fred McCown of Archer City, J. W. McCown of Grover City, California, and Sanders McCown of Miles; one sister, Lila Deaton of Mineral Wells; and 10 grandchildren.

The family requests memorials to Memorial Fund, Trinity Lutheran Church in Miles, or a favorite charity.

Homestead tax exemptions available

Homeowners can reduce their property tax bills in 1990 by taking advantage of partial exemptions for residence homesteads. Property owners who have never received residence homestead exemptions on the homes in which they were living on January 1, 1990, and those who became 65 or disabled during 1989 must apply this year to receive exemptions for 1990.

A homeowner's principal residence and yard are considered the residence homestead. It can include up to 20 acres of land and improvements that have been made, such as a swimming pool, greenhouse or spa, as long as the owner uses them for residential purposes.

Patsy Dunn, Chief Appraiser, said that a property must meet four tests set by law in order to qualify for the exemption. The person or persons claiming it must own the property on January 1; it must be designed or adapted for human residence; it must actually be used as a residence; and it must be the principal residence of an owner who qualifies for the exemption.

A mobile home, even on leased land, can qualify for a residence homestead exemption if it meets the four tests.

Texas law provides several types of homestead exemptions for homeowners, including two for school districts. The law provides a \$5,000 general school home-stead exemption to all homeowners and an additional \$10,000 school exemption to those 65 or older or disabled.

The over-65 school exemption provides a special property tax "ceiling" for taxes. While the market value of an elderly person's homestead may fluctuate with the market, the taxes due to the school district cannot increase from the amount levied the first year that person qualified for the over-65 exemption.

The ceiling is raised, however, if the owner adds an improvement other than normal maintenance or repair. When that happens, the new improvement is taxed at its current market value and the

school's current tax rate, and the taxes due are added to the previous tax ceiling to create a new ceiling.

If the over-65 homeowner later dies, the surviving spouse may apply to retain the school tax ceiling provided the spouse was at least 55 years of age when the older spouse died.

Counties must offer a \$3,000 general homestead exemption to all taxpayers, given only on the portion of the county tax levied for farm-to-market roads or flood control.

East Coke County Hospital District gives and additional, optional exemption on the homesteads of disabled and over-65 residents. Only school district taxes establish a ceiling on taxes, however.

Taxing units may also take official action to offer a local-option homestead exemption based on a percentage of a home's appraised value. In 1990, Coke County, Robert Lee ISD, and Bronte ISD exempts 20% of the value of each qualified homestead in the units. The dollar amount for any homestead exemption must be at least \$5,000.

Texans aged 65 or older can postpone paying delinquent and current property taxes on their homesteads by taking advantage of a tax option called over-65 deferral. The elderly homeowner simply signs a deferral affidavit at the appraisal district office. This special form of tax relief can also halt a lawsuit already filed to collect delinquent property taxes on an older Texan's homestead.

Mrs. Dunn stressed, though, that tax deferral for

the elderly only postpones paying delinquent taxes on the homestead; it does not cancel them. During the deferral period, taxes and delinquent interest continue to add up. When the elderly taxpayer no longer owns or lives in the home, those accrued amounts become due. Taxing units can then sue to collect all the deferred tax and interest. And, an additional penalty associated with referring the account to a delinquent tax attorney may be charged if taxes remain delinquent more than 90 days after the deferral ends.

Forms for filing homestead exemptions and tax deferrals are available at the Coke County Appraisal District office at 710 Austin Street in Robert Lee. For more information, taxpayers may call 453-2274.

The Tharp home is the one home out of the four that was not built in the early 1900s.

The historic Lett home built in 1890 was the home place where two Robert Lee residents were born. Opal Lett Baker and Joyce Lett Dodson were born in the home which now belongs to their nephew, Richard Lett.

Prescribed burning for pricklypear

Another phase of Extension Service prescribed burning was carried out in March on the Butterfield Peak Ranch south of Robert Lee. This is the third year that burning has been used to bring pricklypear under control. Burns in 1988 and 1989 followed by picloran (Grazon PC) gave excellent kill of pricklypear aided, in part, by the extreme cold of December. "Pricklypear looked sick last fall", said Frank Price, "but it wasn't till this month that it really looked dead." About 3000 acres have been burned in the last 3 years on the Butterfield Peak Ranch. More was scheduled to be burned, but it turned green before the weather was right to burn.

Eating alone isn't unusual.
 Teenagers do it after school,
 employees do it when they're
 staying late at work and sin-
 gles of all ages do it almost
 every day.

Eating alone and eating nu-
 tritiously doesn't have to be
 two separate things. With a
 little planning - even if that
 planning only goes on in your
 head -- you can make sure
 you're getting a balanced diet.

Here are some ideas to
 make "meals for one" more
 convenient, enjoyable and
 nutritious: Take advantage of
 the single serving frozen en-
 trees, soups, cereals and
 other products on the market.
 They may be more expensive,
 but can save money if you are
 not good at eating leftovers
 and therefore waste food.
 Items that work especially well
 for single servings include
 chicken and turkey cutlets,
 chops, steaks and fish and
 seafood that can be pur-
 chased in small quantities.

These foods are a major
 source of protein and can be
 prepared quickly and easily in
 single-serving sizes by broil-
 ing the meats or poaching the
 fish. Set aside an evening or
 afternoon to do quantity
 cooking for future meals.

Package, label and freeze in
 single servings. If a recipe
 serves two or more, one
 serving should go on the
 plate and the rest should be
 put in the refrigerator or
 freezer immediately. This will
 help you avoid overeating.
 Heat-sealed freezing/cooking
 pouches are good for storing
 leftovers. They are reheated
 in boiling water or a mi-
 crowave, which saves time
 and cleanup. If you have a
 good cafeteria available at
 work or school, or you go to
 business lunches, eat your
 big meal at noon. Then you
 can have a lighter meal that
 requires little preparation at
 home.

An increased level of cholesterol, a soft fat-like substance found in the bloodstream, is a major risk factor for developing diseases of the heart and blood vessels. Some studies suggest that children with high blood cholesterol levels continue to have high levels into adulthood unless steps are taken to lower those levels through diet.

Cholesterol is found among the fats in the bloodstream. As cholesterol builds up on the inner lining of blood vessels, those vessels can narrow and even close, keeping oxygen-carrying blood from getting to the heart. The result can be severe chest pain and eventually heart attack.

According to the American Heart Association, atherosclerosis, or narrowing of the arteries, may begin in childhood and progress throughout young adulthood.

How do you know if your child is at risk for developing heart disease?

First, look at your family's history of heart disease. If you, your spouse or your child's grandparents have heart disease or high cholesterol levels, chances are your child will as well.

If your family has a history of heart disease, have your child's cholesterol level checked by a doctor. However, according to the AHA, routine screenings for cholesterol levels are not recommended for all children - only those with a family history of heart disease. The

AHA urges that all American adults have regular screenings for cholesterol levels and other risk factors beginning at age 20.

According to the American Heart Association, about five percent of 5- to 18-year-old American children have cholesterol levels exceeding 200 mg/dl. The AHA recommends that all American children gradually decrease their intake of cholesterol and saturated fat.

In 1978 the American Heart Association first advised physicians that children from high-risk families should be placed on a low-fat diet if they have excessive cholesterol or fat in their blood.

In reducing cholesterol and maintaining a healthful lifestyle in children over the age of two, the AHA recommends: maintaining a diet consisting of a variety of foods; maintaining a desirable body weight; limiting daily total fat intake to approximately 30 percent of calories; limiting daily cholesterol intake to approximately 100 mgs. per 1,000 calories, not to exceed 300 mgs; maintaining protein intake at about 15 percent of calories, derived from varied sources; limiting total carbohydrate intake to 55 percent of calories; limiting sodium intake by cutting down on processed foods and condiments and taking the salt

shaker off the table; not smoking cigarettes; and maintaining a regular exercise program.

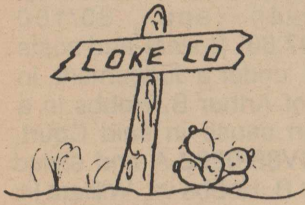

NEWS

Persons who will use or supervise the use of restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticides for the purpose of producing an agricultural commodity are required to obtain a license as of January 1, 1990, said Robert De Anda III, Extension agent-pesticide safety with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Those who are currently Certified Private Applicators are still able to use restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticides, but are not allowed to supervise the use of these products, De Anda said.

The Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) has basically divided the private applicator category into three groups. The first group are Certified Private Applicators who received their certification prior to January 19, 1989. This certification does not expire except under special ruling, and those holding such certification require continued education units (CEU's) by October 1995 to recertify.

The second group are certified private applicators who received their certification after January 10, 1989. This certification expires in five years, therefore, this group must attend an Extension Service training, be test-

ed and apply for a license by 1994.

The third group is licensed private applicators who must attend an Extension Service training, be tested and apply for license with a \$50 licensing fee. This license expires in five years and 15 CEU's are required for renewal.

"Currently, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is offering trainings for private applicator licensing. The applicator has two options. First, he or she may go to the local Extension office to view the slide program, receive a signed form from the County Extension Agent, and travel to the TDA District office for testing. The second option is for the applicator to attend a formal training where, if possible, a TDA representative is available for testing on-site after the training," said De Anda.

De Anda added that the applicator should contact the local County Extension Agent for more information.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic levels, race, color, sex, religion, handicap, or national origin.
