One of these games is the Childress Rotary Greenbelt Bowl All Star Classic. This all star game has been played in Childress on the second Saturday of June for the past 60 years. Tyler "Twig" Rodriguez from Haskell will be one of the many athletes playing in the 61st All Star Classic.

This is a tri-state event, which includes senior players from Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma. Schools represented, range from six man up through 5A. The purpose of this particular all star game is to allow non scholarship players the opportunity to try out to receive football scholarships or funds to be used to further their education.

The two teams, North and South, will be coached by college coaches and their staff from New Mexico and

Kansas. To be eligible to play, an athlete must be nominated by a coach or someone on the coaching staff, and then be accepted by the organizers of the event. College coaches from all over are invited to attend the game and watch the athletes, hopefully finding talent to add to their athletic programs.

Rodriguez was a running back for the Class A state semi-final qualifying Haskell Indians. In addition he plays varsity baseball and runs track.

He was rewarded for his efforts, by twice being named Big Country Player of the week, Big Country All-Area honorable mention running back, All-State honorable mention running back and was named All-State honorable mention by the Texas Sports Writers Association. Rodriguez accumulated more than 1400 yards rushing for the season.

He has excelled in track also. Rodriguez qualified last year for the Class A State Track and Field Meet in Austin. He finished fourth in the 800 meter run, and anchored the mile relay, which also finished fourth. The 800 meter relay, which he also anchored, placed third at the regional meet.

Haskell CISD School Board election set

The Haskell CISD school board election is the only election scheduled for May 8 in Haskell County.

All other prospective city and school board races for the county, drew no opponents, thereby making it unnecessary for those elections to be held.

Two single member districts for the Haskell school board will be open. Felix Rodriguez, currently serving single member district 1, is being challenged by Joel Torres III. Incumbent Joey Kimbrough, who serves single member district 6, will face Tyke Meinzer in the election.

Early voting by personal appearance will take place at the administration office from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m., April 26 through May 4.

Registered voters living in either of these single member districts, may request a ballot to be voted by mail, beginning March 9 through April 30. You may call or come to the school administration office to pick up a request form to vote by mail.

Voting on election day, May 8, will be at City Hall from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m.

You must live in single member districts 1 or 6 to be eligible to vote in this election. Information as to your school voting district can be found on your individual voter registration card. Additional information for voters and their corresponding single member districts is available at the school administration office.

Voters are reminded to bring their voter registration card or some other type of photo identification with them when they come to vote.

On March 15, 2010, Atmos Energy Corporation, Mid-Tex Division ("Atmos Energy" or "the Company"), filed a Rate Review Mechanism ("RRM") filing to increase its gas rates and implement a new schedule of rates and riders. This filing is applicable to all customers within all incorporated cities served by the Mid-Tex Division, with the exception of the City of Dallas. The proposed effective date of the requested rate changes is August 1, 2010. If approved, the proposed changes will affect approximately 1,190,843 residential, 97,756 commercial, and 735 industrial and transportation customers.

If approved, the proposed rates will increase the Company's annual revenues for the affected incorporated areas of its Mid-Tex Division by \$56,826,830, or 6.04% percent, including gas costs, or 14.82% percent, excluding gas cost. The proposed change in rates constitutes a "major change" as that term is defined by Section 104.101 of the Texas Utilities Code.

Based on the proposed rate design, the typical monthly bill for each customer class within the affected incorporated areas of the Mid-Tex Division will increase by the amount and percentage shown in the table below:

In accordance with the provisions of the Texas Agriculture Code, Chapter 74, Subchapter D, and 4 Tex. Admin. Code, Chapter 3, Subchapter A, the Texas Department of Agriculture (the Department) will conduct a board election in the Rolling Plains Central Boll Weevil Eradication Zone, in order to select a representative of the above-referenced zone to serve on the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board of Directors. The board is charged with administering the boll weevil eradication program in Texas.

The Rolling Plains Central Boll Weevil Eradication Zone includes all of Knox, Baylor, Stonewall, Haskell, Throckmorton, Young, Scurry, Fisher, Jones, Shackelford, Stephens, Palo Pinto, Mitchell, Nolan, Callahan, Eastland, Brown, Comanche, and Erath counties and portions of Taylor, Borden, and Archer counties.

The board election will be held by mail balloting. Ballots will be mailed to cotton growers by April 27, 2010. All ballots cast by mail must be postmarked no later than May 12, 2010, in order to be valid. Any cotton grower having planted cotton in the year 2009 within the zone defined above is eligible to vote, and, if he or she resides in the Rolling Plains Central Zone and has at least seven years experience as a cotton grower, can have his or her name placed on the ballot as a candidate in the board member election. A cotton grower is defined as a person who grows cotton intended to be commercial cotton. The term includes an individual who, as owner, landlord, tenant or sharecropper, is entitled to share in the cotton grown and available for marketing from the farm, or share in the proceeds from the sale of the cotton from the farm or from an indemnity or other payment received from or related to the planting, growing, or failure of the cotton.

Any person eligible to vote in the board member election that resides in the Rolling Plains Central Zone and meets the seven-year experience requirement may place their name in nomination for election to the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board by written application to the Department at the address provided below. Nomination forms are provided by the Department and must be signed by the nominee and at least ten other eligible voters. The nomination form must be received by the Department at its office located in Austin by April 12, 2010, and must provide the legal residence of the applicant. A nomination form may be obtained by contacting the Department office or any county agent located in the voting area.

Hamlin, Haskell, Merkel, Moran, Stamford and Winters.

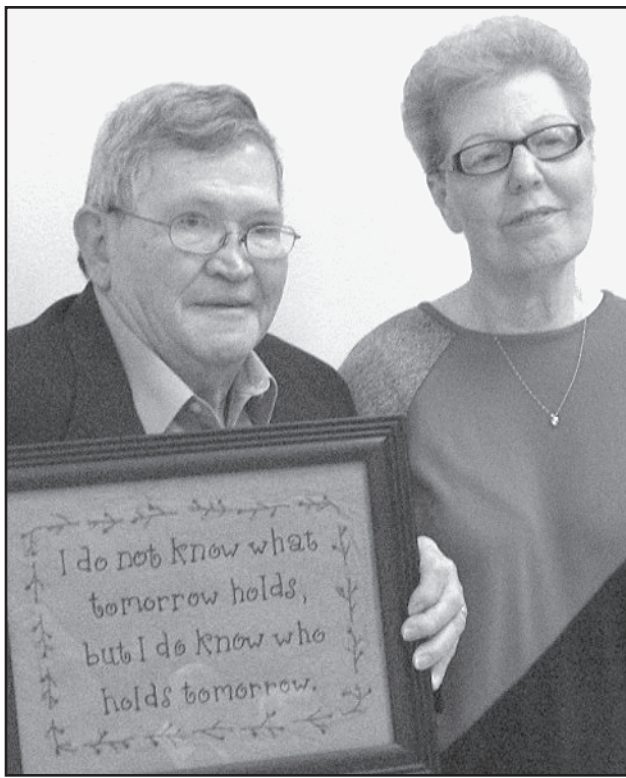
Program application assistance to be offered Wednesday, April 28

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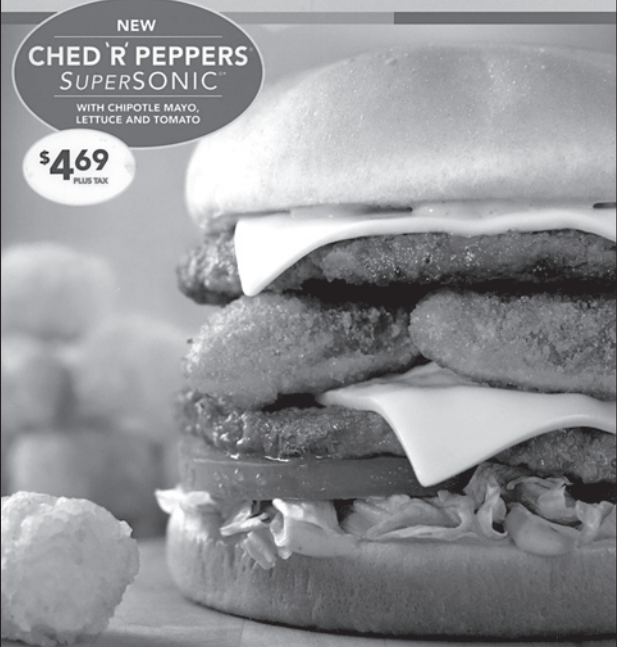

Officials foresee funding increases to meet growth in health care

AUSTIN—The federal government's passage of health care reform legislation in late March will have a big impact on Texas, as an estimated 6 million Texans have been going without health care insurance.

Reforms are expected to return billions of dollars to Texas through health insurance tax credits for middle class and low-income Texans and Medicaid coverage for the poorest citizens.

"Medicaid expansion to cover working poor parents of children on Texas Medicaid today will be 100 percent federally funded for three years, with the state getting nine federal dollars for each state dollar from 2020 on forward," said Anne Dunkelberg of the Center for Public Policy Priorities, a non-partisan, Austin-based research and advocacy group.

"Twice as many now-uninsured Texans will gain coverage by purchasing affordable private insurance through the new Health Insurance Exchange as will gain Medicaid, bringing even more federal dollars to Texas with no state matching dollars required."

The reform keeps in place Texas' private insurance and health care delivery sector, while filling the gaps that have left too many Texans lacking care or overwhelmed by debt, she added.

Meanwhile, the Senate State Affairs Committee had a March 31 interim meeting, taking testimony from officials on the impact of health care reform here in Texas.

Insurance Commissioner Mike Geeslin suggested the fiscal impact on his agency would be large but uncertain, as there has not been such a large policy undertaking in decades. He said the Department of Insurance will prepare for a range of scenarios and develop a consumer education effort.

Health and Human Services Commissioner Tom Suesh said expansions required by health care reform increase Medicaid eligibility up to 130 percent of the federal poverty level, potentially adding more than 2 million Texans to the Medicaid rolls.

H1N1 shots still recommended

Overall, flu activity in Texas is classified as sporadic but the state health department is continuing to encourage people to get the H1N1 flu vaccination now to protect themselves.

More than 50 hospitalizations and at least three deaths related to H1N1 influenza were reported in the month of March in Texas.

Health Commissioner Dr. David Lakey on March 31 said,

"There is plenty of vaccine to go around. People who have not been vaccinated should do so now."

Hutchison to finish Senate term

U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison announced March 31 that she will complete her term in the Senate, which expires in 2012.

In her announcement delivered at San Antonio airport, Hutchison said, "For family reasons, I had planned to begin making a transition home to Texas this spring, but it is clear to me that the stakes in our nation's Capitol have never been higher. President Obama's victory on health care legislation has emboldened those who want an even bigger and more intrusive federal government."

Hutchison, the ranking member of two powerful committees, had planned to resign from the Senate whether she won or lost in her bid to be the Republican nominee for governor of Texas.

Incumbent Gov. Rick Perry, who won the GOP nomination for governor, praised Hutchison's decision to remain in the Senate.

Judge denies request to intervene

A Travis County state district judge on March 31 denied Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott's request to intervene in the county's first same-sex divorce case.

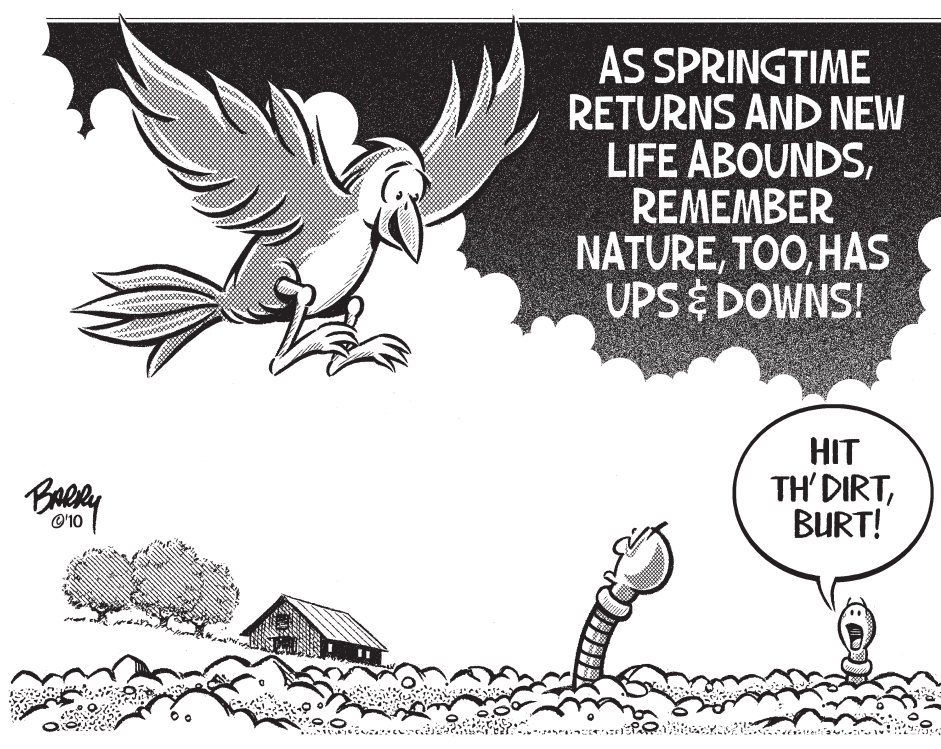
Abbott's deputies had filed court papers arguing that the two women, who had legally married in Massachusetts, could not legally be granted a divorce in Texas.

Judge Scott Jenkins, who granted the divorce in February, said a Dallas divorce case currently under appeal could provide precedent on the legality of same-sex divorce. In that case, which involves two men, the Dallas County state district judge rejected Abbott's attempt to intervene. The Texas 5th District Court of Appeals in Dallas is scheduled to hear arguments in that case on April 21.

In 2005, Texas voters passed a constitutional amendment defining marriage as between one man and one woman.

Agricultural cash rents highlights

Nationally, cash rents per acre paid to landlords for cropland rose \$4.50 (5.3 percent), while pasture rents remained unchanged for the 2009 crop and grazing year. Cropland cash rents paid in 2009 averaged \$90.00 per acre, compared with \$85.50 per acre for 2008. Pasture cash rents averaged \$10.50 per acre, consistent with the 2008 price but above the 2007 price of \$10.00. The increase in cropland rental rates are the result of producers receiving strong commodity prices, while pasture cash rent is affected less by commodity prices and more by land values.

Pasture rents for the State averaged \$6.20 per acre, a decrease of 30 cents per acre 2008, but equal to the 2007 average per acre. In 2009, the average cash rent paid per acre for pasture ranged from \$1.90 per acre in the Trans-Pecos to \$12.00 per acre in the Blacklands district.

Haskell County pasture rents averaged \$6.30 per acre.

Irrigated cropland rents, averaging \$77.00 per acre for Texas in 2009, were 4 percent lower at the State level than in 2008. The average rent for irrigated cropland increased in the Southern High Plains by 24 percent from 2008, were up

3 percent in the Edwards Plateau, and increased 5 percent in the Lower Valley region. Irrigated cropland rents were lower by 3 to 7 percent in other districts from 2008. Average rent per acre for irrigated cropland ranged from \$53.00 in the Southern Low Plains to \$94.50 in the Southern High Plains district.

Haskell County irrigated cropland rents averaged \$40.00 per acre.

Non-irrigated cropland rents averaged \$25.00 per acre for the state in 2009, up from \$24.00 per acre in 2008. Average rent per acre for non-irrigated cropland increased by 2 percent in the Southern High Plains and Upper Coast Districts, and by 21 percent in the South Central district from 2008.

The average rent per acre for non-irrigated land in the Edwards Plateau decreased by 7 percent from 2008. Average cash rent per acre for non-irrigated cropland ranged from \$17.50 in the Cross Timbers to \$50.00 per acre in the Coastal Bend district.

Haskell County non-irrigated cropland rents averaged \$22.50 per acre.

Cash Rents are based on land that is rented on a per acre basis for cash only. This

excludes land rented for a share of the crop or livestock; on a fee per head, per pound of gain, or AUM basis; on a "Whole Farm" basis; land rented free of charge; or land rented that includes buildings such as greenhouses or dairy barns.

Return your Census form

People can still complete and mail back their 2010 Census forms after April 1 to ensure that their questionnaires will be received soon enough to avoid a visit by a census taker to gather the information in person.

All 2010 Census forms ask households to list living in their homes, apartments or mobile homes as of April 1, 2010. The date is not a deadline but the point in time at which everyone is to be counted where they live and slept most of the time.

"The April 1 date is when a statistical 'snapshot' of America is taken," Gabriel Sanchez, director of the Dallas Regional Census Center. "Information reflected on April 1 will help draw a complete portrait of America."

By law, the Census Bureau must collect and compile a nationwide tally and present it to the president by Dec. 31.

If the Census Bureau doesn't receive questionnaires from households by early to mid April, however, census takers will go door-to-door to collect information the Census Bureau is obliged to collect. The process is more expensive—costing an average of \$57 per household, compared to the 44 cents required to mail it back.

As of March 31, only about 52 percent of all U.S. households had mailed back their census forms. Across the Dallas census region, in Texas, the participation rate was 46 percent; in Louisiana, the rate was 45 percent; the rate was 47 percent in Mississippi.

"If you don't want someone knocking on your door in May, complete and mail back your Census questionnaire today," Sanchez said. "It takes about 10 minutes to complete and will affect the next 10 years of your community's life."

The purpose is to apportion seats in the U.S. House of Representatives among the states. Census figures are also used for a host of other planning and funding purposes, including the disbursement of more than \$400 billion in federal funds annually to states and communities. Responding to the Census is a foundational act of endorsement in our democracy and one of the few civic duties of people living in the United States.

Census figures will anchor almost every scientific American poll and study done during the coming 10 years, as they have been for decades. The data collected and the figures compiled by the U.S. Census Bureau will be used by businesses that are seeking to locate new stores or factories; by highway and city planners who are configuring commute patterns, residential areas and zoning areas for proposed retail centers.

Across the country and, indeed, around the world, the most credible statistical information is followed by the words: "According to figures compiled by the U.S. Census Bureau."

Our credibility relies on keeping the information you provide absolutely confidential. We do not share any personally identifiable information with any other individual or agency, including the Internal Revenue Service or immigration authorities. In fact, every Census worker swears a confidentiality privacy oath that he or she will not divulge any personal information in their lifetime, or face fines of up to \$250,000 and up to five years in prison. We take the obligation seriously.

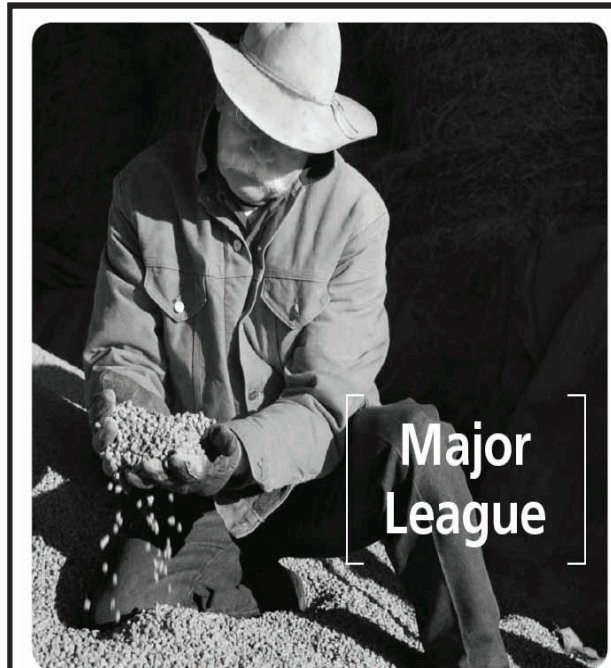

NOTICE TO THE CITIZENS OF WEINERT
 The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) has notified the City of Weinert water system that the drinking water being supplied to customers had exceeded the Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) for Nitrate. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has established the MCL for Nitrate at 10 mg/L, and has determined that it is a health concern at levels above the MCL. Analysis of drinking water in your community for Nitrate indicates a level of 23.2 mg/L.

Infants below the age of six months who drink water containing nitrate in excess of the MCL could become seriously ill and, if untreated, may die. Symptoms include shortness of breath and blue baby syndrome.

You do not need to use an alternative water supply. However, if you have health concerns, you may want to talk to your doctor to get more information about how this may affect you.

At the present time we are currently looking into ways to correct this problem. If you are pregnant or have an infant under six months included in this public water system as a customer, we have made arrangements with local grocery store in Haskell (Modern Way) so that you may get bottled water at the City of Weinert's expense.

Haskell CISD to register Head Start, Pre-K and Kindergarten

Haskell Elementary School will have registration for Head Start, Prekindergarten and Kindergarten for the 2010-11 school year on the following dates:

Thurs., April 8: Head Start registration from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the elementary library.

Thurs., April 15: Prekindergarten registration from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the elementary office.

Thurs., April 22: Kindergarten registration and screening from 9 to 10 a.m. or 1 to 2 p.m. in the elementary office.

To qualify for Head Start, a child must be 3 or 4 years old on or before Sept. 1, 2010 and meet income guidelines.

To be eligible for enrollment in Prekindergarten, a child must be 3 or 4 years old on or before Sept. 1, 2010 and must be unable to speak and

comprehend the English language; or qualify for free or reduced lunches; or be homeless; or be the child of an active duty member of the armed forces of the United States; or be the child of a member of the armed forces of the United States who was injured or killed while serving on active duty; or has ever been in foster care. However, Haskell Elementary is hoping to offer Prekindergarten for all 4 year olds. If you are interested in this program for your child, please be sure to register Thurs., April 15.

To attend Kindergarten, a child must be 5 years old on or before Sept. 1, 2010. Only students registering for Kindergarten who are not currently enrolled at Haskell Elementary need to attend registration with their parents.

PPCD (Preschool Program for Children with Disabilities) is for children

ages 3 to 5 that may be developmentally delayed in areas such as learning, speech and/or emotional skills. If your child turns 3 during the 2010-11 school year, call the elementary office at 864-2654 at that time to schedule an appointment to have your child screened.

Parents should bring their driver license and income verification (for Head Start) and their child's birth certificate, immunization record and social security card to registration.
