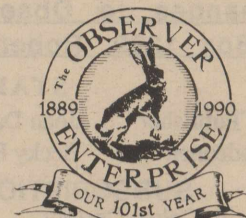

Triple digit temperature readings plague county

Cool weather with frequent showers in the spring bred optimism over Texas and sent ranchers to sales for sheep and stocker cattle to put on lush pastures and generated hope for farmers as they planted. High water, too-cool nights, and hail storms in some areas took their toll. Now June's blistering heat has wiped the smiles off most folks' faces whose livelihood depends on the weather and threatens an added blow to Texas economy. July dawned with more of the same with some areas of West Texas in the 25th day of 3-digit temperatures.

Cotton in surrounding counties is holding up better than the South Plains where a fourth of the nation's cotton is produced. Texas Ag Extension Service cotton agronomist James Supak feels that all the dry land cotton will be lost. Lubbock has recorded the driest June on record and a record number of days over 100 degrees. South Texas corn harvest, their main crop, is already at a minimum.

In Coke County and the surrounding region, hay crops are withering fast in the searing heat and much of the milo looks pretty sick. Stock water is also on the decline, since spring rains never produced runoff. Range fires are a real threat at this time, too.

Of lesser consequence are residents' yards, shrubs, and trees. Fruit trees, especially, are showing some leaf drop already.

The Extension Service advises to water in the cooler hours with deep watering and water trees out to the drip line. Avoid sprinklers near shrubs and flowers since Lake Spence water will blister or kill plants.

Medical authorities are cautioning Texans to wear thin, light-colored cotton clothing, hats, drink plenty of fluids and avoid the sun as much as possible during the late afternoon hours between 3 and 6 p.m. when temperatures have been the highest. The elderly who do not have air-conditioning should apply for assistance or stay with relatives for a few weeks as a comfort and safety measure.

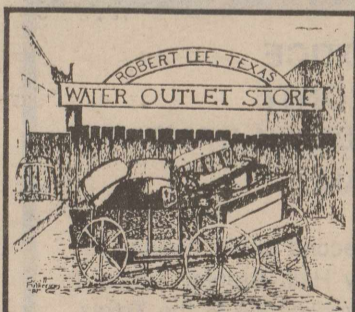
Conference topic is prickly pear

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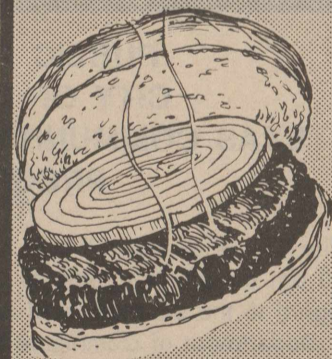

Headaches & how to relieve them

Nearly everyone has experienced a headache at one time or another. As common as they are, though, many people do not know what causes them or how to relieve them. According to the Texas Medical Association, there are two main types of headaches, tension and vascular.

Tension headaches, also called muscle contraction headaches, are caused by tension in the face, neck, and scalp muscles. But because the pain is felt in the forehead, temples, or eyesockets rather than the muscles, many people do not link the headaches to the muscle tension.

Stress is an underlying cause of tension headaches. Frowning, teeth clenching, and poor posture -- things we do under stress and often are unaware of -- are typical causes. Other factors include too little or too much sleep, and overeating or drinking.

You can relieve your tension headaches with over-the-counter pain relievers, by applying heat or ice on the back of the neck, massaging the tense muscles, and resting.

Vascular headaches are caused by narrowing and swelling blood vessels in the head. This type of headache is more commonly known as migraine.

The warning symptoms of migraine include nausea, vomiting, and disturbed vision, such as seeing spots or flashing lights, and are followed by severe headaches usually on one side of the head.

Unlike tension headaches, migraine tends to run in families. In fact, even young children can have migraine. An increase or decrease in stress level, various foods, alcohol, caffeine, and tobacco also cause these headaches in some people.

If you suffer from severe migraine, TMA suggests see your doctor. Although there is no cure for migraine, he or she may be able to prescribe medication to relieve your headaches.

The Texas Medical Association is a professional organization with more than 28,000 physician and medical student members. It is located in Austin and has 116 component county medical societies around the state.

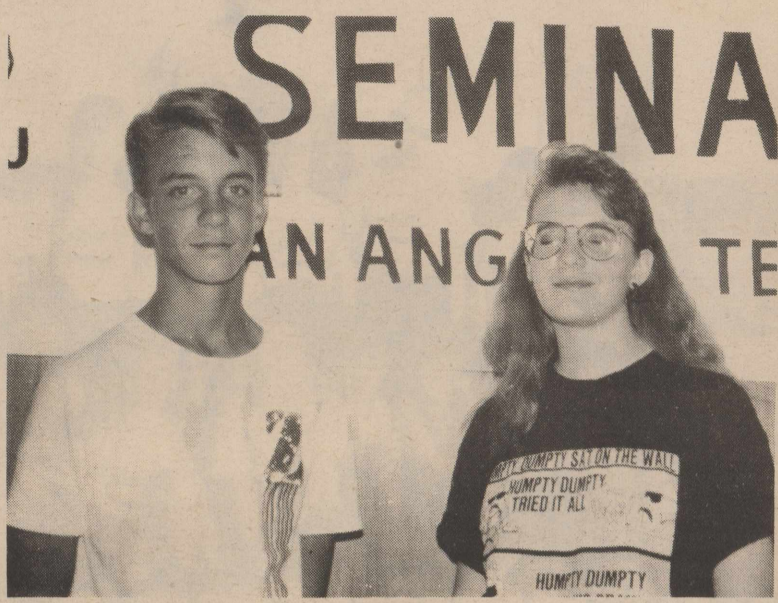
SS rep Gregg set for RL July 26th

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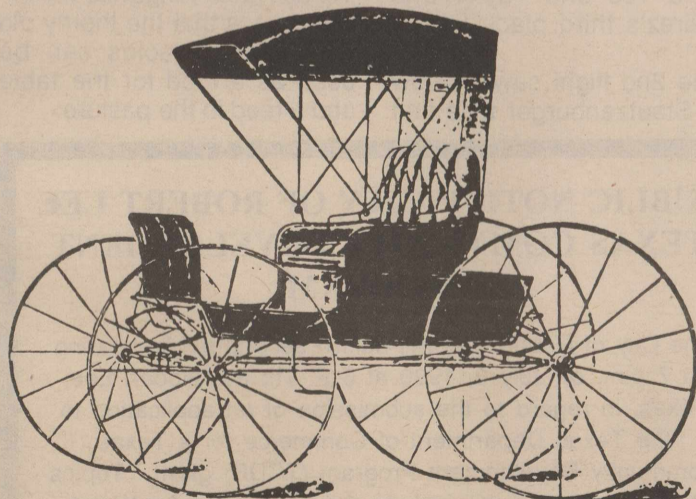

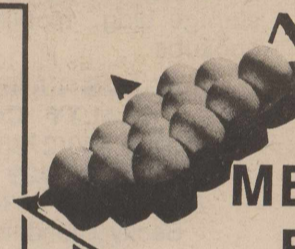

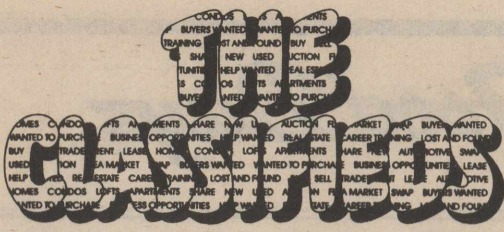

Cajun Cookin'

If you crave intense flavors, but have to watch your sodium intake, cajun seasoning mixes may be the answer. Due to the popularity of cajun cooking in restaurants, she says that commercially prepared cajun seasoning mixes have become widely available in the supermarkets. "For the person on a low-sodium diet, homemade or commercially prepared cajun seasoning mixes are a good alternative," says Dr. Dymple Cooksey, a nutritionist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. But she cautions consumers to check the ingredients labels on store-bought mixes since some manufacturers include salt in their products.
