Commissioner's Court selected the building in a special session Saturday morning following receipt of a letter from the Commodities District Division approving eli-gibility standards set up locally. At a meeting of the Court Tues-day. Buster Shelton of this city was employed as supervisor in charge of the warehouse and distribution of commodities. His salary was set at \$200 per month. Shelton was selected from a list of three applicants for the posi-

tion.

According to Judge Turnbow, the commodities will be distributed twice monthly with a tentative starting date of Sept. 10. The food will then be distributed every 15 days to avoid waste and spoilage, he said.

The food products will include, flour, dried beans, shortening, cheese, butter, dry non-fat milk, corn meal and rice. Eligibility does not require that participants be employed or a citizen of the United States. However, it will be required that the participant be a resident of Haskell County for six months and a resident of Texass for one year. Judge Turnbow

With approximately 2600 expected to participate in the pro-gram, many shelves will be re-quired to store the commodities. For that reason, Judge Turnbow asks that anyone owning shelves which might be suitable and who would like to donate or loan them to the county welfare department contact him as soon as is convenient
