

Mr. Allen, 85, died Sunday, October 14, in Shannon Medical Center in San Angelo after a long illness.

He was born in San Angelo June 4, 1905 to Hawley C. and Amelia Caraway Allen. Attending San Angelo schools, he gained his Pharmacy license and owned a retail drugstore in Robert Lee until 1948, when he joined the staff of Robert Lee State Bank. He served as president of the bank from 1957 until his retirement from that position in 1985, remaining in the capacity of Chairman of the

UW board extends terms

The Coke County Underground Water Conservation District Board of Directors met recently to manage the business affairs of the district. The board approved the minutes of the last meeting and approved the bills for payment. The Financial Statement was reviewed.

The Managers Report Was emphasis on the following: (1) Prepared and presented testimony at a hearing in Midland opposing more state control of groundwater in Texas and emphasized the need to maintain private property rights in Texas as they are at the present time; (2) the oil pit near Sanco has been filled and the lease has been cleaned up; (3) water analysis was made on 15 samples; and (4) the Texas Water Plan, operation of the district and water quality work was discussed with 28 water

well owners.


The board voted to take action to try to change the directors terms from 2 year to 4 year terms. This would cut the cost of holding directors elections in half.

An amendment was made to the 1990 budget to reflect a grant from the Texas Water Development Board to purchase water quality monitoring

The board designated the district manager as Records Management Officer and voted to retain the district records permanently.

Santa Rita Underground Water Conservation District of Reagan County was approved to be included in the Cooperative Agreement of the West Texas Association of Underground Water Conservation Districts. This makes 6 districts that are cooperating on groundwater problems in this area

Plans were made to meet again on December 3, 1990.

Bryan hosts Study Club

The '64 Study Club, Texas Federation of Women's Clubs (TFWC), Heart of Texas District, of Robert Lee met October 9 in the home of Wilson and Lucile Bryan. The program was presented by Ivan Brizulla, 16 year old exchange student from Argentina, who is attending Central High School in San Angelo. He. expects to graduate there in May of 1991.

Club President Opal Jacoby and Irene Newell went after Ivan and gave him a brief tour of the town, the school, Lake Spence, and the Bryan's back yard and greenhouse. He was very impressed with the community and expressed his desire to visit Robert Lee more extensively since he enjoys small towns more than big cities.

Ivan's mother is a lawyer and business woman, and his father is a retired admiral from Argentina's Navy, now engaged in extensive business enterprises. Ivan's mother was an exchange student; so was lvan's older sister; now Ivan is one, and he expects his youngest brother, who is eight years old, to become one, too.

Because of his keen awareness of his country's social, economic, and political affairs, Ivan gave club members interesting information concerning the culture in which he was reared. His comparison of home life with two families with whom he has lived in the US and the schools in both countries disclosed similar strengths and weaknesses though customs differ.


Whereas in his high school, there are no TV's, computers, or VCRs, all classrooms he uses now have them, with some having two TVs. His home school in a town near the size of San Angelo has several high schools but no large gyms or extensive libraries. The teachers do not give true-false or multiplechoice tests, but essay-type tests which require the entire period to complete. Ivan was surprised to find US students to be lacking in knowledge of geography, and world economic and political conditions.

Education in Argentina is free to all from grade one through college. Those expenses are paid by the government through taxes, as are all medical expenses in his country.

In spite of differences in the two educational systems, Ivan observed that many students of both cultures receive excellent educations, while some do not take their work seriously nor apply themselves and emerge into society unprepared for adult living.

Many questions were asked of the visitor which he answered with a good command of the English language and a delightful sense of humor. He seemed to feel at ease with his audience, though most of the women were grandmothers and great-grandmothers. He expressed a desire to meet more young people, and he has been invited back to Robert Lee to see ball games and OLE COKE COUNTY productions.






BRONTE SCHOOL NEWS

Horns maintain spotless record of 6-0

The Longhorns kept their record a spotless 6-0 as they defeated the Roscoe Plowboys in this year's Homecoming game.

The Horns' offense scored their season high of 42 points and the defense held the Plowboys to only 6 points. This week's captains were Justin Phillips, Brandon Marshall, Bill Windham, and Tim Sims.

The Horns received the opening kickoff but they were unable to move the ball. Darrell Lucas punted to the Plowboys' 6 yard line. The defense, led by Jason Pierce, Windham, and Marshall, held them on their own 14 yard line to force the punt. The Longhorns had good field

The stubborn Horn defense held Roscoe to 4 downs and started on their own 48 yard line. The Horn offensive line was controlling the line of scrimmage when the Horns scored on their 6th play on Windham's 17 yard run. Lucas kicked the PAT. On this Plowboy possession, Billy Magness intercepted on the Horns' 34 yard line. Three plays later, the Horns had a 55 yard touchdown called back on a clipping penalty. Bronte lost the ball on a fumble on the next play. Two plays later, Marshall recovered a fumble on the Roscoe 23 yard line. Bronte had good field position again and on the third play, Windham scored on a 8 yard run. Lucas kicked the PAT. Six minutes and sixteen seconds remained in the half. Roscoe scored their touchdown with 4:29 remaining in the half. After an exchange of fumbles, Pierce recovered the ball on the Roscoe 39 yard line. Three plays later, Marshall scored on a 27 yard run with 1:31 left in the half. Lucas kicked the PAT. Windham recovered a fumble on the Roscoe 37 yard line. With 10 seconds left in the half, Phillips connected with Lucas for 21 yards to the 18 yard line to end the high scoring first half.

In the second half, the Horns had some new faces in different positions. Phillips ended the Plowboys' first possession with an interception on the Bronte 46 yard line. Two plays later, the Horns fumbled the ball to Roscoe. The tough defense held them to a 4 & 4 on the Horns' 18 yard line when Jacob Golson recovered a fumble. Ten plays later, Bronte punted and Roscoe fumbled the punt with Pierce recovering it on the 6 yard line. Three plays later, Jamie Flores scored on a 1 yard run with 8:33 remaining in the game. Lucas kicked the PAT. Good game Longhorns.





Class

Teaching disabled youth

[Editor's Note: The following article was submitted by Dianne Holland of Bronte. The informative copy by Armando Rios, Jr. appeared in the San Angelo Standard Times October 11, 1990.]

Learning disabilities can be detected in children as young as four, and the earlier it is detected the better, said a speaker at a session sponsored by the James Phillips Williams Foundation Wednesday night.

C. Wilson Anderson Jr., of the Center for Learning Disabilities at The Menninger Clinic of Topeka, spoke to about 300 teachers and parents at the Holiday Inn.

The session focused on helping learning disabled students with school work at home.

Communication between teachers and parents and working together are very important, Anderson said.

"We have to keep communications going between home and school" he said.

An estimated 24 million Americans are illiterate. Of

that, 50% are learning disabled, according to the National Institute on Health estimates, Anderson said.

These students are at high risk, he said. According to some studies, 30% of the population in Texas cannot be gainfully employed while in neighboring Louisiana, the school dropout rate is at 50%.

"The country cannot afford to let its children go uneducated," he said.

Some advice he gave to teachers was to give only homework that reinforces material already learned.

"Students should be held responsible for only what they are capable of doing," Anderson said.

Parents should find out whether a teacher will accept quick phone calls if there is a question on homework, he said.

Parents should also realize that school can be frustrating for learning-disabled students and they tend to take out their frustrations once they get home.

Time to order seedlings

by Bruce Deere One aspect of West Texas weather that can always be counted on is the wind. Although it provides such benefits as cooling breezes and power for windmills, it can also cause a variety of problems for Coke County resi-dents. Wind erosion strips bare fields of valuable topsoil and deposits it where it is neither needed nor wanted. such as fencelines or Mama's dining room table. Cold winter winds raise utility bills and are dangerous to unprotected livestock.

Windbreaks help reduce many of the problems associated with the wind. Field windbreaks significantly reduce soil erosion. Windbreaks around a homesite help reduce dust and protect the home from cold winds. Likewise, properly placed windbreaks protect livestock in confinement or in open pastures.

In an effort to assist landowners in this area, the Coke County Soil and Water District, in cooperation with the Texas Forest Service, are providing tree and shrub species for conservation planting. First-year seedlings of evergreens (6-12 in.) and bareroot hardwoods (10-18 in.) are available at a reasonCatalpa, Cottonwood cuttings, Desert Willow, Green Ash, Honeylocust, Little Walnut, Osage Orange, Pecan, Red Oak, Russian Olive, Sandcherry, and Skunkbush Sumac.

Wildlife packets for quail and pheasant, deer, turkey, and squirrel are also available for landowners. Each packet contains 4 species and 25 seedlings of each species, totaling 100 seedlings for \$50.

All prices include sales tax. Payment in advance is due at time of ordering. Statewide interest in the program is up and the quantity of available species is down this year. Many of the more popular species are sold out within a few weeks. Interested parties should place their orders as soon as possible.

Orders can be placed at the Coke County SWCD/Soil Conservation Service office at 11 East Sixth Street. The seedlings are scheduled to be delivered to the office on February 13, 1991. To help insure successful establishment, they should be collected and planted as soon as

by Pauline C. Thyfault On my arrival home from Ft. Collins, Colorado, on October 10th, I experienced a most pleasant and unusual surprise. Concerned and eager to learn about the safety and present status of a former student, now a Marine, Cpl. Cixto Saucedo, I called at once at the door of his parents, Raul and Cecellia Saucedo, where a big yellow ribbon greeted me. "Come in", his mother said in Spanish. "Cixto is on the phone right now and will talk to you from Saudi Arabia." When it came my turn to talk, his voice sounded so clear and natural. I learned several interesting details about his life at S Jubail, five miles from the Persian Gulf and only 100 miles from Kuwait. He explained that his main duty was to drive a truck which carried men from one place to another. Then at other times he transported fuel to replenish planes at various places. He added that on occasions he had to be on alert in a fox hole enduring extreme heat, sleeping with gas masks and with his gun

always at his side. He also mentioned that liquor was prohibited but that often they were served fruit juices and a lot of water.


