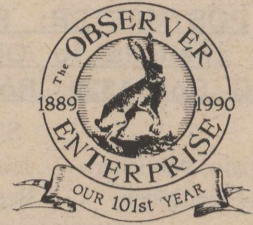

"Town Social" steps back into the 1890's

The feeling as you walked into the Bronte Community Center last Saturday night, February 16, was one of stepping back into the 1890's.

With flags guarding the entrance, the center was decorated in red, white, and blue bunting. The theme "Old Fashioned Town Social" had

been most successfully carried off by the Chamber of Commerce who sponsored the event.

As a fundraiser, the Bronte High School FHA Department prepared a spaghetti supper to begin the evening's activities. The meal was followed by various games including "Bean-O", dominoes, and cake walks which were enjoyed by all attending. The domino tournament winners included first place winners Dora Gallaway and Helen Kirkland, second place winners Garry Bivins and Ray Barnett, and third place winners Jim Lammers and Keith McCutchen.

The "Box Lunch Auction" was next on the agenda with Ed Cumbie acting as auctioneer. In a new twist on an old idea, instead of the box containing an actual lunch, it contained gift certificates for various area restaurants. Eleven boxes were auctioned off with the average box bringing \$36. High bidders were Beverly Ragsdale and Benny Corley, each purchasing boxes for \$50.

As the evening's program continued, Garry Bivins gave the invocation followed by the Pledge of Allegiance with Cub Scout Jerrod McClure presenting the Flag.

It was now time to announce the winners of the various annual awards given by the Chamber. Students of the Year honors went to Senior Eboni Taylor, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Stover Taylor, and Lee Sonnenberg, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Sonnenberg. The Sorosis Study Club was presented with the award for Civic Organization of the Year due to their continued efforts on behalf of the community and its citizens.

Bronte Elementary School Principal Robbie Sanford was the deserving winner of the Educator of the Year Award. Mr. Sanford's encouragement and support of his students and teachers was commended. He has been instrumental in moving the Bronte classes to a level of excellence.

For her work with the East Coke County Ambulance Service and other activities, Janet Hurley was named Volunteer of the Year. Small communities would be hard

Over 400 attend Bronte patriotic rally

Over 400 people converged on the Bronte Mini-Park for the Patriotic Rally held Friday afternoon, February 15. To start the afternoon, a Red, White, and Blue Parade involving Veterans, a Color Guard from the Concho Valley Vietnam Veterans of America #457, the local firetrucks, all Bronte School students and teachers, parents, and other citizens, started at the school and ended at the Mini-Park.

Once at the Mini-Park, Judge Royce Lee recognized the Veterans for their "contributions to our free society and heritage." He also mentioned how proud we are to have them as a "vital part of our effort to rally around our brave, loyal, and dedicated men and women in all the Armed Forces, but especially those in the War of Freedom, assembled in the Middle East." The crowd then joined in the Pledge of Allegiance. The Bronte Longhorn Band played the National Anthem and Phillip Bell, pastor of the United Methodist Church in Bronte and a veteran, gave the invocation.

The couple plan to be married April 20, 1991, in Robert Lee at the Robert Lee Baptist Church.



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
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

Robert Lee wins lopsided literary meet

Robert Lee School hosted a well-attended literary meet on Saturday, February 16. Thirteen high schools, in addition to the hosts, participated in the contests. The high school division was won by Robert Lee with a landslide 273 points. Other schools and their point totals were Sonora 135, Menard 124, Miles 104, Bronte 62, Panther Creek 50, Roscoe 42, Sterling City 41, Blackwell 21, Roby 19, Lohn 16, Highland 16, Water Valley 12, and Irion County 10.

The junior high division drew ten schools and Miles overcame all to score 117.5 points for first place. Robert Lee's junior high was second with a 104 point total. Other teams' point standings were Irion County 49, Veribest 48, Blackwell 46, Roscoe 34, Water Valley 25, Bronte 24, Lohn 16, Panther Creek 16, and Sterling City 15.

Gifted, Talented nominations due

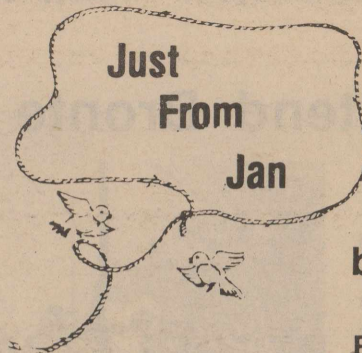

Bacteria such as salmonella cause as much as 90 percent of all food-borne illnesses in the United States. Nevertheless, more attention is focused on additives, pesticide residues, hormones and antibiotics, unfairly marking the United States food supply as unsafe.

America has the safest food supply in the world and a very effective system for monitoring safety. There are, however, some valid concerns about microbiological problems with our food supply.

Government regulation, food inspection and conscientious farming and production processes cannot control the biggest danger in food: Human error in food-handling causes up to 81 million cases of food-borne illness in the United States each year, resulting in up to \$17 billion in medical costs and lost productivity. Safety begins at home. Ironically, food-borne illness is the easiest to prevent by thoroughly cooking foods to destroy bacteria, keeping separate and refrigerating raw and cooked foods promptly.

Bacteria are everywhere in the environment-- in the air, soil, water, our own digestive tracts and in other warm-blooded animals. They can exist naturally in food or are introduced by a food handler, unclean equipment or another outside source. Bacteria thrive in foods rich in protein, especially meats, eggs and dairy products. Although animal industries fight bacteria

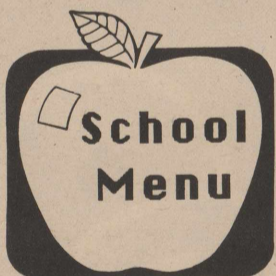
with careful processing, some still slip into the food supply. More often, bacteria contaminate a food during unsafe handling and preparation.

The easiest way to control bacteria, which thrive when left between 40 and 140 degrees Fahrenheit, is normal refrigeration and cooking. Under favorable conditions, bacteria can reproduce at a rate of one cell every 20 minutes; in eight hours one cell can become one billion cells.

The best way for food handlers to provide safe foods at home and in restaurants is to follow the FOUR C's: Clean your hands, utensils, equipment, working surfaces and foods that need to be washed. Cook foods until their temperatures reach at least 140 degrees F. Maintain foods above that temperature when serving. Chill foods immediately after purchasing and after serving. Maintain at a temperature of less than 40 degrees, freezers at 0 degrees. Keep raw foods and any equipment used to prepare raw foods away from cooked and ready-to-eat foods to avoid Cross-contamination from bacteria.

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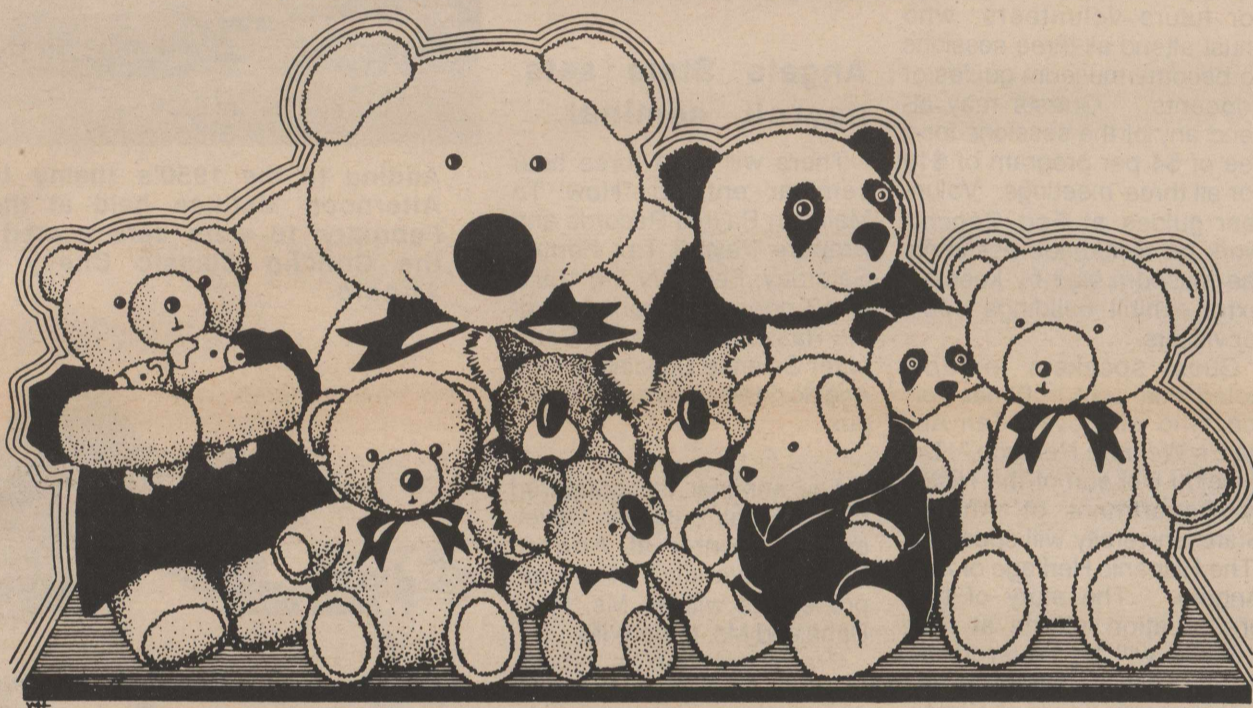

State-ranked Horns to face Miles in SA

The State-ranked Bronte Longhorns played two practice games this past week in preparation for their playoff bouts.

On February 16, the Horns ran past Lohn, 74 - 40. Bill Windham took top scoring honors with 21 points, 8 rebounds, 9 assists, and 3 steals. 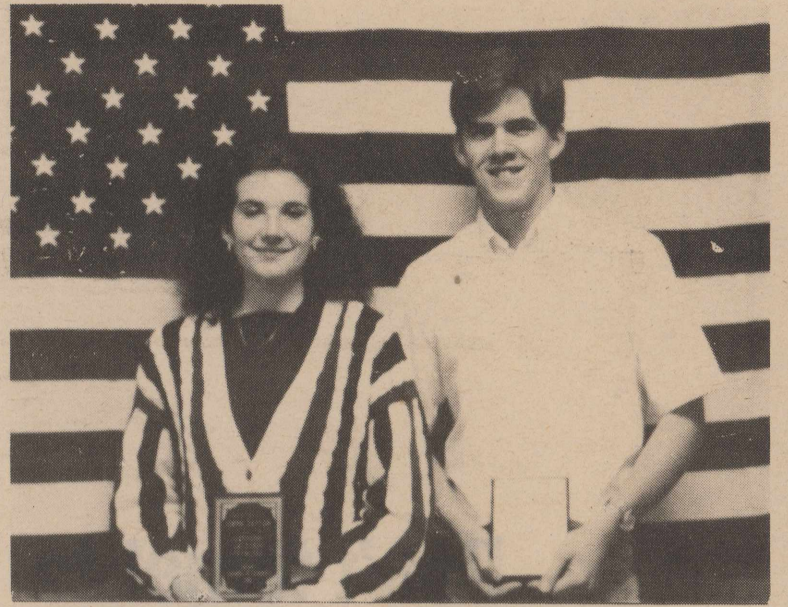

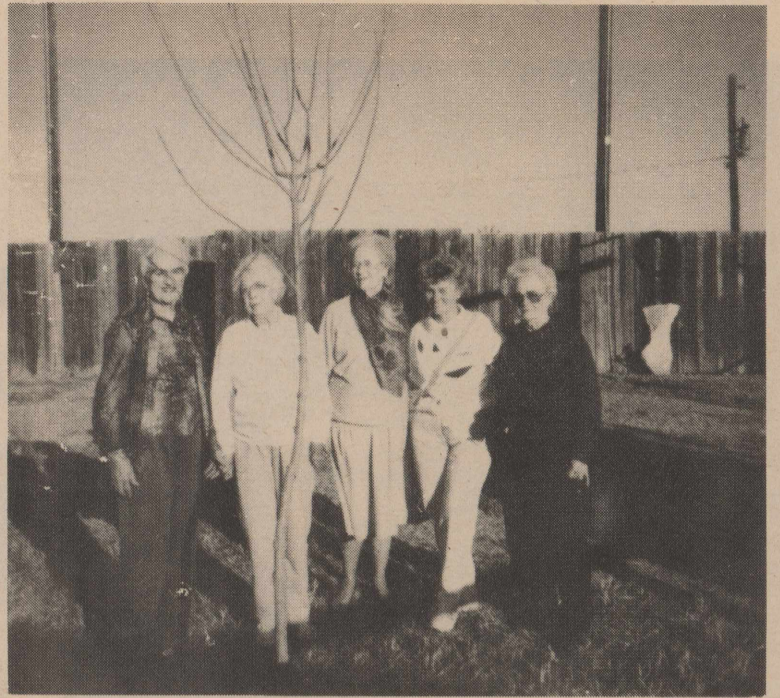


