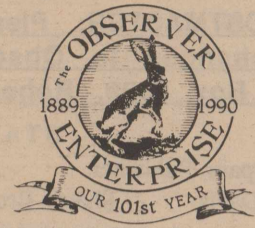

Brandy Hayes elected state FHA president

Brandy Hayes, seventeen-year-old junior at Robert Lee High School and daughter of Larry and Carolyn Hayes of Silver, returned this weekend from the Texas Association of Future Homemakers of America State Leadership Conference held in San Antonio with a very high honor.

After being voted as a State officer from Region II, Brandy represented Region II at the State Conference along with one other member from her region.

The state is made up of five

regions with two members from each region elected as a state officer. To determine what office the ten officers received, they had to choose which office they wanted to run for, and go before a nominating committee for interviews.

This year, each of ten officers ran for the office of President. After many hours of anxious waiting and wondering, the new 1991-92 State officers of the Future Homemakers of America were announced with Brandy Hayes being named as State

President for the upcoming year.

Brandy will be representing over 37,000 members of the Texas Association Fair held in Dallas in October. Brandy is the first State President of the association from Region II in over 5 years.

As a State officer, the state will sponsor Brandy to represent Texas at the National Leadership Meeting of The Future Homemakers of America held in Washington, D. C. in July.

Also, as a result of being elected to the office of President, Brandy has been invited to attend the Texas Electric Cooperatives youth tour held in Washington, D. C. in June.

Sheri Millican, Brandy's advisor, will hopefully be attending the National Leadership Conference along with Brandy to guide her in her many upcoming responsibilities.

CCSWCD honors Stowe

Royce Stowe was recently named Coke County Conservationist of the Year for 1990 by the directors of the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Royce ranches 358 acres of rolling loam country in northeast Coke County, where he runs a small herd of Brangus cattle.

When Royce bought the place in 1982, it was in sad shape. Old abandoned cropland fields were grown up in mesquite and prickly pear. Heavy mesquite and cedar had invaded the overgrazed pastures. Lack of crossfencing and adequate watering facilities prevented effective grazing management.

Royce immediately launched a program to turn things around. Under the Great Plains Conservation, he began by rootplowing and re-seeding 292 acres of heavy brush. Drought, the hard winter of '83-'84, and low fertility in old fields made grass establishment difficult, but Royce kept resting, and sometimes reseeded, treated areas until they were covered with good stands of desirable

grasses. Today an abundance of Indiangrass, Sideoats grama, Kleingrass, and King Ranch bluestem testify to the effectiveness of Royce's efforts.

To manage grazing pressure, Royce installed crossfencing to create four pastures of approximately equal carrying capacity and initiated a deferment program. A surface tank, two wells, a concrete storage tank, and a network of pipelines and troughs now provide the needed flexibility for good grazing distribution and optimum livestock production.

All work was done with the needs of wildlife firmly in mind. Prime wildlife areas were left untouched in a pattern of strips and motts. Desirable browse plants such as elbow-bush and sumacs were preserved. Grazing is managed in a manner that provides maximum food and cover for wildlife species.

Royce was honored at an area awards banquet at Angelo State University in San Angelo where he was awarded a plaque and sign by the District.

Pesticide training slated at Roscoe

Persons who will use or supervise the use of restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticides for the purpose of producing an agricultural commodity are required to obtain a license. As of January 1, 1990, the voluntary program for certification of private applicators ended, and the Texas Department of Agriculture has started a program to license private applicators for use, purchase, and direct supervision of persons applying restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticides. Additionally, amendments to the Texas Pesticide Regulations now require actual testing of private applicators.

The local training and testing will be held at the Roscoe Community Center on Monday, April 22, beginning at 9 am. There will be a break for lunch following the morning programs. Testing will be done after lunch. Those who pass the test may apply for a license with a \$50 licensing fee. This license expires in five years and 15 CEU's are required for renewal.

You may want to bring a calculator to use on the test due to some calibration questions.

The dinner and theatre performance were outstanding. The title of the presentation

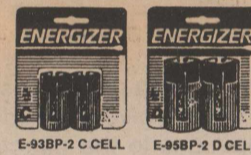
was "Daisy Pulls It Off." The occasion is an annual event presented by the school.

The Lady Steers #1 team will also advance to the regional tourney. The #2 girls team placed 4th at district. Two individual golfers also were honored at the district contest. Wool team wins at Tech

The Robert Lee FFA Wool Judging Team won the Texas Tech Wool Judging Contest on Saturday, April 13. The contest is the top FFA wool judging contest in Texas. Cathy Smith was the high individual of the contest and received a two hundred and fifty dollar scholarship for her efforts. Scott Antilley was second high individual in the contest. Nikki Tavarez and Shelley Burrows were the other team members. The team was first in Area II and first in the Concho District. FFA teams from Ira and Gail tied for second place in the contests. Both of these teams are coached by former Robert Lee graduates, Richard Long at Ira and Buddy Wallace at Gail.

The Robert Lee FFA Horse Judging Team qualified for the State FFA Horse Judging Contest by placing fifth in Area II and eleventh at Tech. Team members are Thad Metcalf, Lori Wink, Gail Wagley, and Stacy Oleksiuk. The team was first in the Concho District and will compete in the State Horse Judging Contest at Texas Tech on Saturday, April 20. Former Robert Lee graduate, Kenneth Wink, coached a State Horse qualifying team from Marathon that placed third in Area II, and Richard Long's Ira team qualified for State by placing fourth in Area II.

The Range Plant Team from Robert Lee FFA placed second at Tech. Samnorwood FFA won the contest. Robert Lee team members all paced in the top ten individuals. John Fluhmann was fourth high, Debra Drennan was fifth high, Krista Green was seventh high and Brent Jameson

was tenth high. The team was first in Area II and first in the Concho District.

The livestock judging team from Robert Lee placed tenth at Tech with approximately one hundred teams in competition. The Tech contest was won by Wall FFA, with Ira FFA placing a close second. Jeff Wilkes was nineteenth high individual in the contest. The team ranked sixth in Area II, with five teams qualifying for State. Other team members were Christie Payne, Brent McPeek, and Blake Pitcock. The team was second in the Concho District.

The Robert Lee FFA Meat Judging Team, composed of Rachel Pentecost, Eli Arellano, Mike Johnston, and Wendy McPeek, placed sixteenth at Tech. The team was ranked sixth in Area II (four teams qualified for State) and second in the Concho District.

Robert Lee FFA's Dairy Cattle Judging Team, composed of Randy Watkins, J. J. Tennison, Russ Horn, and Michael Hayes, also competed in the Tech contests but failed to make the top twenty teams. The team was second in the Concho District.

All teams were coached by their advisor, Sid Long.

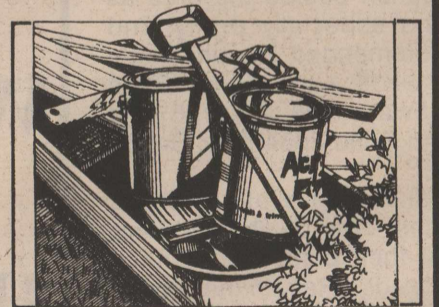

Junell discusses funding

Representative Rob Junell, 66th District, spoke to an interested group of Robert Lee and Bronte constituents last Friday evening in the Coke County courtroom.

He said his mail had run 100-1 against the lottery.

Junell also explained his stand on the education bill just passed. He voted against this measure, too, and felt most of the schools in his district would be worse off with heavy burdens placed on taxpayers. He joked that "brain surgery would be easier to explain" than the complicated education bill.

Now on the budget and appropriations committee, Junell said that preliminary study indicates that cuts across the board will be necessary including medicaid slashes, prison funding, many senior and dependent welfare programs, etc. which will suffer.

WTU taxes listed

West Texas Utilities Company's share of support to the taxing entities within the company's 52-county service area amounts to \$9,284,735 million for 1990, making the electric utility one of West Texas' largest ad valorem taxpayers, according to Mark Morrow, WTU's property tax representative.

Approximately 57% of that total went to school districts with the balance distributed among other taxing entities such as city and county governments and water, fire, hospital, drainage, and road districts.

Paul Sublett, WTU local manager in Bronte, said WTU paid \$119,802 in ad valorem taxes in Coke County. Major recipients include two school districts dividing \$55,370, and county government with received \$38,109. The cities and towns in the county received \$3,317 from taxes with the other taxing entities receiving the balance.

In addition to ad valorem taxes, WTU supports local governments by payment of gross receipts tax and sales tax where applicable.

In boy's doubles, Brian Arrott and Shayne Crumpler had an exciting 3 set match, but a tough match, they were defeated.

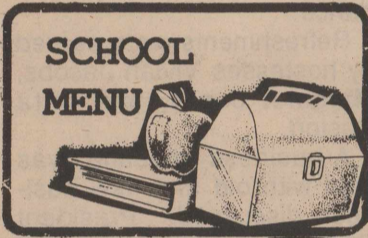
In girls' singles, Alisa Richards, the #7 seed of the

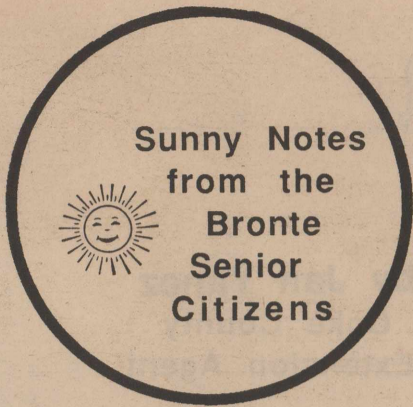

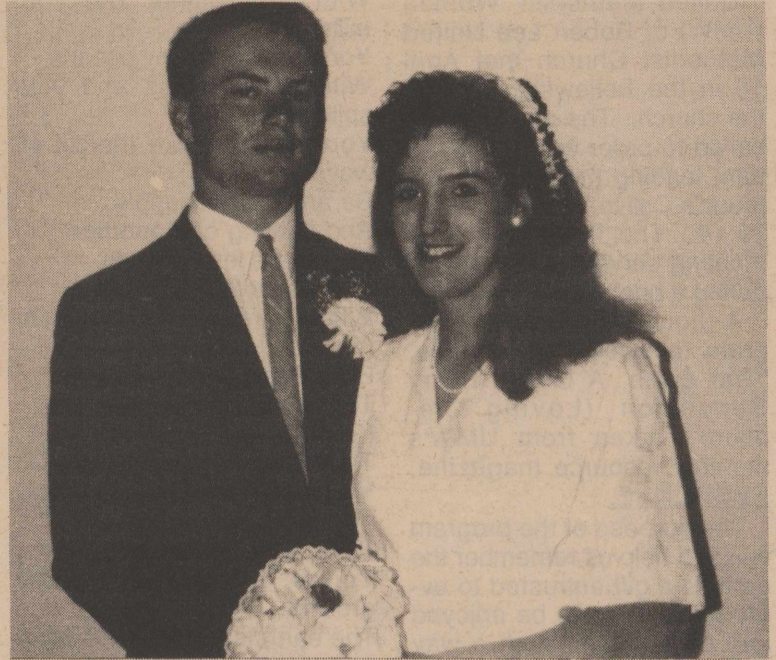

United Methodist Women (UMW) of Robert Lee United Methodist Church met April 10 in the Fellowship Hall of the church. The meeting was called to order with the president leading members in the group's Call to Worship, Psalm 19:14. The hostess for the meeting served refreshments during a brief time of visitation.

A thought provoking program followed with the title, "The Earth, A Gift to Every Generation (Loving Creation)," taken from UMW's monthly resource magazine, **RESPONSE**.

The purpose of the program was: To help us remember the earth is a gift entrusted to every generation, to be enjoyed and cared for in such a way that it continues to be a gift for those who come after us; To create awareness of the condition of the earth today; and To commit ourselves to sustain the integrity of creation.

The meeting adjourned with a prayer.

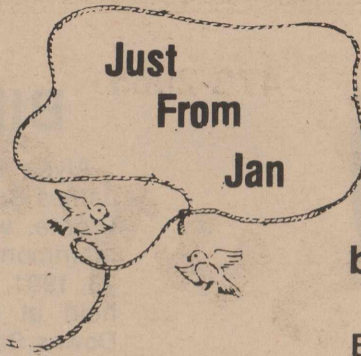

Do your children seem to "live" on candy, cookies, popsicles, sugared cereal and cola? Like many parents, you may be worried that too much sugar is leading to tooth decay and reducing the nutritional quality of your children's diets.

You may be able to do something about the problem, especially if your children are still young, but it could require changing some of your habits and attitudes as well as theirs.

Children come by their desire for sweets honestly. Studies have shown that infants are born with a preference for sweetened liquids over plain liquids. This preference will continue, especially if children have continued positive experiences with sweets.

As parents, we create many of these experiences by offering sweets to comfort or reward our child, to express affection and to celebrate special occasions. We sometimes use sweets to compensate when we are busy or tired, or to keep the children quiet. That doesn't mean we need to give up birthday cake or stop eating cookies. In fact, giving children sweets in positive

context, is not the only reason for their attraction to sugared foods. How often do children actually eat sweets is more important. This is determined mostly by the parents' own consumption of sweets, and how much television they watch.

What and how parents eat has a powerful effect on children. Children learn to be sweet-eaters from their parent just as they learn other food preferences, such as liking most meat or disliking vegetables. There is also a connection between children's sugar intake and how much television they watch. Children who watch more television tend to eat sweet foods more often because they are bombarded with commercials for highly sweetened foods, especially during Saturday morning cartoons. Because they watch at least some of the shows their children see, parents may become more familiar with the foods advertised and more receptive toward eating the foods themselves and serving them to their children.

If you really want to change your child's sweet eating habits, cut back yourself. Also, talk with them about the differences in the variety of


foods we eat for good health in "real life" and what they see in the make-believe world of television.
