grill or a Sharp stereo radio/cassette recorder.

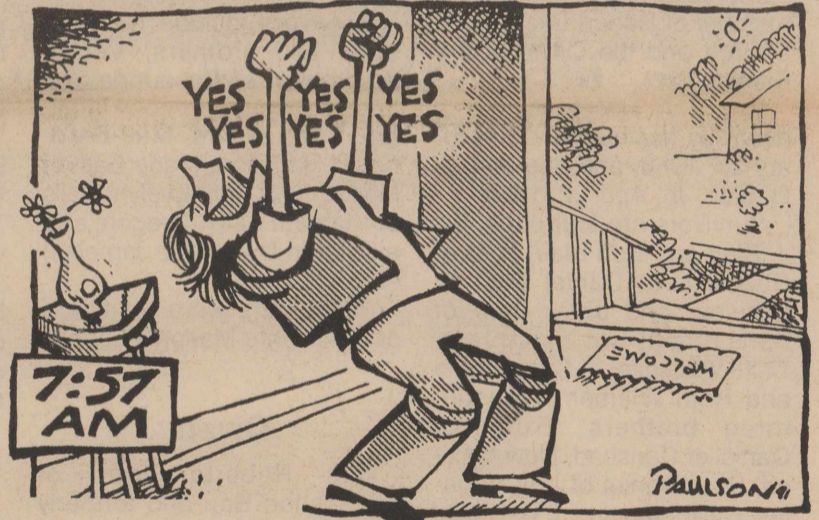

Guidelines listed for county hunters

Fall hunting will open in Coke County with the blast-off of mourning dove season Saturday, September 1. Working hunters are always happy when the opener falls on a weekend. Season dates for this year in the Central Zone are set for September 1 - October 30 with the winter season shortened slightly, January 3-12.

According to Ron George, dove program leader with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, the greatest dove population increase in the state was the Central Zone (which includes Coke County).

May surveys indicate numbers are up as much as 45%. Surveys are taken of adult birds at the beginning of the breeding season. He added the 1991 hatch appeared good with adequate rainfall and the critical weed and grass seed production vital to

doves. The Central Zone has always been affected by available surface water and changing weather patterns since doves are migratory.

The bag limit for the area is 12 mourning doves or in combination with six white-wings and two white-tips. However, it is highly unlikely Coke Countians will encounter any birds except mourning doves.

Shooting hours will again be one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

One dove regulation many hunters are not aware of is the law prohibiting shooting over baited areas. Normal farming or ranching practices which draw doves are legal, however.

Shotguns must be plugged to a 3-shot capacity for migratory birds.

August 31 is the last hunting or fishing date on current licenses. When you purchase

a 1991-1992 hunting license, pick up a copy of the new Early Season Migratory Game Bird Hunting Digest. Contact Coke County Game Warden Sparks Burdett for clarifications of regulations. If you plan to hunt in another zone, many other hunting laws apply, so educate yourself on these.

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Wool growers to vote on agreement

Coke County wool growers are voting in a referendum that began on August 19 and will end on August 30, 1991, on a proposed new agreement between the Secretary of Agriculture (Secretary) and the American Sheep Industry Association (ASI), 6911 South Yosemite Street, Englewood, Colorado 80112. The agreement provides for the withholding of a part of price support payments to producers on shorn wool and unshorn lambs marketed during the years 1991 through 1995 marketing years. The payment deductions are authorized by section 708 of the National Wool Act of 1954, as amended, and will be used by the ASI to finance advertising and promotion programs for wool and lamb, similar to those carried out since 1956.

Except for an increase in withholding rates, the new agreement is similar to the last one. By approving this agreement, producers will authorize payment deductions of up to 7¢ per pound of shorn wool and at a comparable rate (up to 35¢ per hundredweight) of unshorn lambs.

The agreement will become effective only if approved by a majority of the total number of producers voting, or a majority of the total volume of production represented in the referendum. If the agreement is not approved by producers, no deductions will be withheld from payments on 1991 marketings. In that event, the ASI's programs will be continued only as long as the present reserve fund permits, or until such time as some other agreement may be approved by producers.

Wool and lamb promotion expenditures in the year ending September 30, 1990, were about \$6.4 million and the budget for the current year is \$6.9 million. Deductions from payments for the 1989 marketing year totaled about \$5.9 million. ASI is maintaining its promotion and other activities with these funds.

Anyone who has owned sheep (6 months old or older) in the United States for at least 30 consecutive days during 1990 may vote. Votes may be cast by individuals, corporations, partnerships, or legal entities, and qualified cooperative associations may vote for all of their eligible member-producers, who shall not then otherwise vote in the referendum.

The Coke County ASCS office has mailed ballots to all known wool and unshorn lamb producers. If for any reason any eligible producer has not received a ballot, please contact the Coke County ASCS office and a ballot will be furnished. Please remember that the date for voting is August 19 through August 30, 1991.

Leg. passes support bill

The 70th Legislature passed House Bill 1154 establishing the In-Home & Family Support Program based on philosophies that uphold the value of the family as well as the human dignity, pride, and independence of the individual. The program recognizes the family as the primary support for many persons with disabilities and is designed to assist in providing for the purchase of supported living services and/or goods to individuals or their families.

The purchased items must be specifically linked to the individual's disability and support the recipient in their own home or assist the family in maintaining the person in the family home. Supported services may include:

- purchase/lease of special equipment
- architectural modification of a home
- medical, surgical, therapeutic, diagnostic, and other health services
- family counseling/training on care of the person
- training to live in an independent living situation
- attendant care, home health aide, homemaker and chore services
- room/board during evaluation and treatment
- respite care and transportation for the person with a mental disability

This program is open to all residents of the state of Texas and the counties served by MHMR Services for the Concho Valley including Tom Green, Sterling, Coke, Concho, Irion, Reagan, and Crockett. Eligibility requires that the individual have a diagnosis of mental illness, mental retardation, a child between the ages of 0-4 with a developmental delay, or autism, and the amount of support will be determined on an individual basis. RL football to be tested Friday night

Terry Page, longtime member of the Big Lake athletic department, has joined the Robert Lee High School coaching staff. He will assume the duties of John Trice who resigned to accept a principal's position. Page, who coached in the Houston area last year, will serve as the girls' basketball coach, the boys' and girls' golf coach, and assist with the girls' track program. He will also have scouting responsibilities for the football program.

The football coaching staff includes Athletic Director and Head Coach Ed Poehls, Bobby Bolding, Lane Jackson, and Sid McCown.

In a general commentary Tuesday night, Poehls said that the Steer roster is made up of 26 boys. The majority of them are young; only three seniors are on the squad after the graduation of 10 from the team last spring.

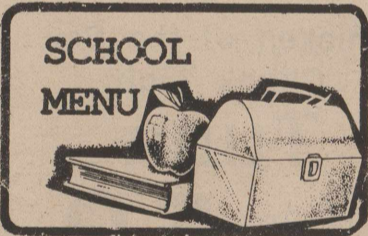

Stone defines COADA

Dolores Stone, Director of the Sweetwater Council on Alcohol and Drug Abuse since November 1, 1990, has encountered a number of people who do not know the services the council offers. They think we are affiliated with Alcoholics Anonymous (AA). While we do refer to AA, the council is in no way connected to AA," she said.

The Sweetwater COADA is a non-profit organization that has been in existence for 18 years. Tom Watson, who died the last of September 1990, founded the council and worked for the council until his death.

The council's main purpose is to help people who are having problems with alcohol and drugs, and their families. The council is funded by the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse (TCADA), The United Way, the cities of Sweetwater and Winters, and the counties of Nolan, Fisher, Coke, and Runnels.

Two grants are received from TCADA. The newest grant provides: Intake Assessments Evaluations Referral Placement Education Follow-up Counseling.

At this time, the council has offices in each of our counties: Nolan, 8-5 pm, Monday-Friday, 119 East 3rd, Suite 302, Sweetwater, Texas 79556; Fisher, 1-5 pm, Tuesday, Courthouse, Roby, Texas; Mitchell, 1-5 pm Wednesday, MHMR, 136 E.

3rd, Colorado City, Texas 79512; Runnels, 1-5 pm, Wednesday, 1204 Hutchings, Ballinger, Texas; Runnels, 1-5 pm, Thursday, MHMR, 110 S. Main, Winters, Texas; and Coke, 1-5 pm, Friday, Coke County Courthouse, Robert Lee, Texas 76945.

There is a 24 Hour Hotline service. The number for this service after office hours for emergencies is 915/235-1341. Volunteers are trained to take these calls. Confidentiality is stressed. All of the services are free.

The Youth Prevention Intervention grant funds services to the youth, ages K-18, who are in high risk populations. These include: education; alternatives such as leathercraft; and information presentations to PTA, students, civic organizations, etc.

Mrs. Stone advised, "I am a Certified Alcohol and Drug Abuse Counselor, with seven years working in this field. The rest of the staff are working on their certification.

"I hope this gives everyone a better idea of what the council's services are.
