Emil Becker will be the evangelist with Reggie Bowman as music director. Roy Epperson is pastor.

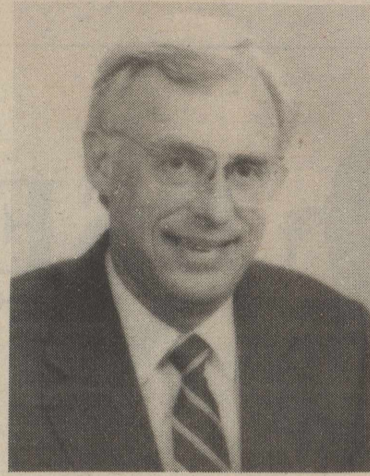

Emil pastored the First Baptist Church, Stephenville, Texas for thirty years and seven months, and has been on mission preaching tours and visited mission fields in several countries.

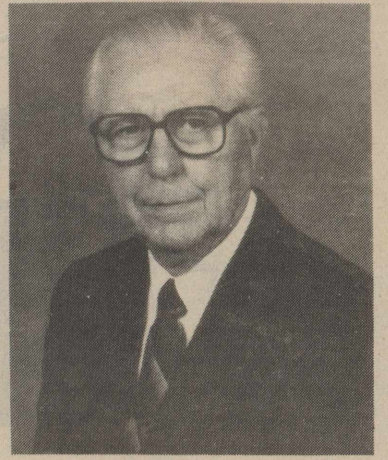

Paul operates about 4 sections in western Coke County. The ranch has been in the family since 1950, and operated by Paul since 1963. Lambs from his high-quality commercial sheep herd are in great demand for breeding stock. He has a standing order from one buyer for all the buck lambs he can produce, and most ewe lambs are sold for breeding also. In addition to his sheep, Paul adds balance to his program with a herd of Brangus cattle.

Paul has a strong background in conservation. His father, W.E. Burns, helped organize the district and was a director for many years. Paul served as director until 1991, when demands of ranching, business, and his duties as a newly-elected county commissioner forced him to resign.

Paul knows his range and its capabilities, and grazes in a way to preserve the better grasses. He uses light-to-moderate stocking and a decision-deferred grazing system based on the condition of

his rangeland and livestock, his lambing program, and current conservation aims.

Historically, the biggest obstacle to effective grazing management on the ranch was water availability. From his one good well, Paul piped water to a central pumping unit and then laid a network of over 5 miles of line to distribute the water. With a dependable water supply assured, Paul then installed miles of fence, doubling his number of pastures and improving grazing management efficiency.

Paul pursues an aggressive brush control program. He has rootplowed and seeded nearly 900 acres of rangeland, and conducts an ongoing maintenance program. The continued vigor of his plant community years after seeding testifies to his good management.

Paul also realizes the importance of wildlife to the operation. Brush management is always carried out with regard to wildlife habitat and forage needs. Good grazing management and proper harvesting also help ensure a thriving wildlife population.

Paul has shown what can be done with judicious use of available technology and thoughtful management. The Coke County district is pleased to be able to recognize him for his outstanding achievements and the high standards he has set for others to follow.

Paul was honored at the annual Area Awards Banquet at Angelo State University in San Angelo where he was awarded a plaque and sign by the District. Coke County was well represented, with thirty-three people from the county and the Burns family attending the awards ceremony.

Williams receives scholarship

Steve Williams of Bronte, a sixth-quarter Texas State Technical College student, recently received a \$500 scholarship from the Texas Turf Grass Association for his work in the Turf Grass Management Technology program.

Williams is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E.G. Collins of Bronte. He and his wife Betsy, have a son, Travis. Williams is a 1970 graduate of Bronte High School.

Williams is a member of the Texas Turfgrass Association and the Golf Course Superintendents of America. He has received scholarships from both organizations.

Texas State Technical College at Waco is part of the only state-supported technical college system in Texas. With more than 40 instructional programs in emerging technologies, TSTC is preparing graduates through a new world education.

Rabies caution advised

Evret C. Newman, DVM was in Robert Lee on Monday to visit with county officials concerning the present rabies outbreak in surrounding counties. A regional veterinarian with the Texas Department of Health, Newman oversees Public Health Region 3, the western counties of the state which extends to include McCulloch and Mason Counties to the east. Dr. Newman is from El Paso.

According to his records, the region has already confirmed 52 rabies cases when the total for the entire year of 1991 was 85. Biggest year for rabid animals in recent years was 1988 with 91 cases. Skunks have accounted for half of the 52 current count, another 10 for fox, with the other incidents split between domestic and farm animals and various wild animals and birds.

Dr. Newman advises doctoring sick animals wearing heavy rubber gloves and being watchful of any unusual behavior in wild or domestic animals. Other than uncharacteristic behavior changes, he says people should be aware of unexplained illness or paralysis, especially in the hind quarters.

Although Coke County has only reported 1 confirmed case, ten are reported in Tom Green, ten in Sutton, and 14 in Kimble County and the disease could spread quickly. The Texas Department of Health representative says the most important step one can take if he or she suspects contact with a rabid animal is to report it to someone - a doctor, veterinarian, extension agent, or call the Texas Department of Health for more information and instruction.

Bronte Journalism students fared well at the District Literary Meet in Snyder last Friday. Three of them will advance to Regional.

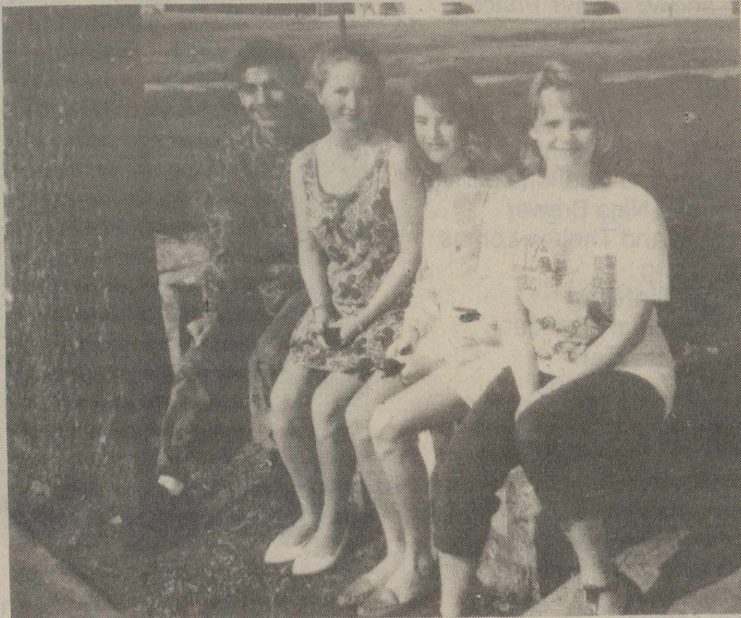
Senior Shay Burwick took first in Newswriting, while Brandi Thomas placed 6th.

contest with the highest percentage of baked goods and they had their party on Monday. Just goes to show what can happen when we have a goal before us.

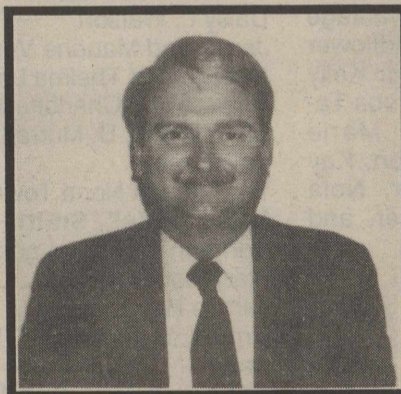

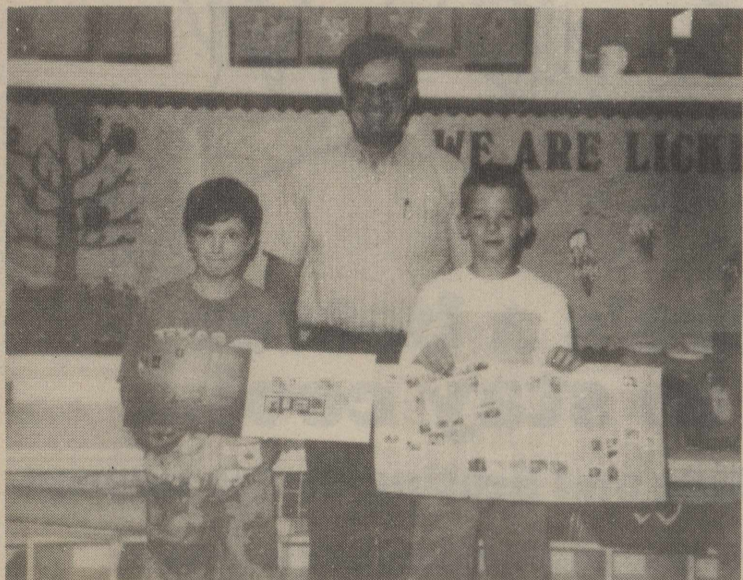

Since 1989 he has been a Foreign Mission Board volunteer media specialist for the Baptist Convention of Panama. He is a member of Iglesia Bautista Siloe (Siloam Baptist Church) in LaChorrera, Panama.

Born in Waco, Texas, Morris is the son of the Rev. and Mrs. Harry Keith Morris of Mount Vernon, Washington. His parents are Southern Baptist Home Mission Board missionaries in Washington. While growing up he also lived in Bronte, Notrees, Leslie and Fort Worth, Texas. He considers Houston, Texas, his hometown and South Main Baptist Church there his home church. Wedgwood Baptist Church in Fort Worth also was influential in his Christian growth.

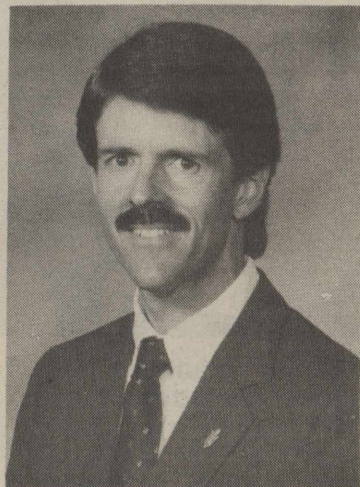
He received the bachelor of arts degree from Baylor University in Waco and the master of arts in communication degree from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth.
