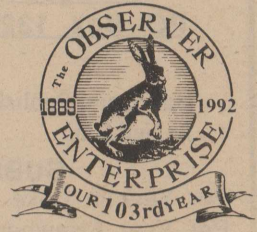

County rodeo activities set this weekend

The Coke County Rodeo is scheduled to begin its annual performances Friday and Saturday, July 17 and 18. Grand entry will begin at 7:45 pm each night. Gate admission is \$3 for adults, \$1 for children 5 to 12 years of age, and children under 5 get in free.

This year's event promises to hold many exciting and surprising performances from contestants that are coming from all over the state of Texas, as well as some of our own local county talent. In

addition, there will be a children's boot scramble. Categories of ages 6 & Under, and 6 - 10 will have a chance to scramble for prizes. Local county businesses even have a chance to be represented during the rodeo. This year's performance will have a Businessmen's Steer Saddling. Local businessmen will be sending out three-men teams to mug, saddle, and ride a steer for the fastest time of two rodeo performances. Local businesses that currently

A "Hooked on Fashion" theme highlighted the annual District 7 4-H Fashion Show, July 7th. More than 100 4-H youths from Extension's west-central district modeled at the affair held at the Texas Agricultural Research and Extension Center at San Angelo. West Texas Utilities has sponsored the event for more than 37 years.

Four 4-H members from Coke County competed in the event.

To compete at the district level, each of the contestants had to win their division at the county show.

Senior, Junior, and Intermediate divisions were split into two categories, Daywear and Sportswear.

The first and second place winner in each garment category received rosettes provided by West Texas Utilities. Cotton garment winners were presented cash awards provided by the Rolling Plains Cotton Compress of Sweetwater. Wool and mohair winners received cash awards provided by the First State Bank of Paint Rock.

Entering the event from Coke County were: Dixie Simpson and Melanie Johnson in the Daywear Division, and Gina Torres in the Sportswear Division. All participants received ribbons.

Winning the Intermediate Daywear Division was Kanan Millican of Robert Lee. Kanan also won the cotton award.

Local boys seriously injured in accident

Two local boys were seriously injured in an accident in Bronte involving their bicycles and a pickup at 10 pm on Sunday evening, July 12.

According to Department of Public Safety Trooper Roy Blair, who investigated the accident, Robert Minjarez, 12, and Justino De La Serda, 11, both on bicycles, were struck by a pickup driven by Wilton Robertson of Sterling City. Trooper Blair stated the boys were riding north on North Jefferson and did not yield right-of-way to Robertson traveling west on Texas 158.

One victim was transported to Concho Valley Regional Hospital in San Angelo by the East Coke County Ambulance Service, while the other boy was taken to the same hospital by the Blackwell Fire Department ambulance.

Assisting in the investigation were Coke County Sheriff's Deputies Wayne McCutchen and Jeff Barnes.

Robert Minjarez is the son of Rosa Minjarez and grandson of Mr. & Mrs. Manuel Sanchez, all of Bronte. Justino De La Serda is the son of Rachel Eubanks of Bronte. His grandparents are Mr. & Mrs. Justino Montez, also of Bronte.

Relatives said Tuesday that both boys have serious facial injuries, broken bones, and abrasions. Trooper Blair also reported he spoke with a nursing supervisor in the intensive care unit at 9:30 am Tuesday, and she stated that although one had been to surgery, with perhaps more planned, hospital personnel are optimistic for their recovery.

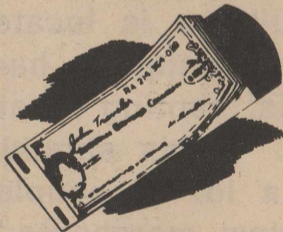

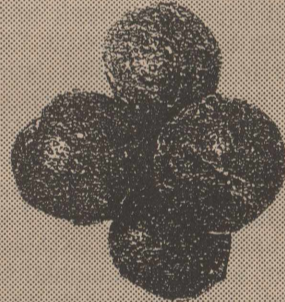

Bivins returns from stay in Spain

Christy Bivins has returned from a seven week trip to Spain where she was part of a group of Texas A&M students studying Spanish at the University of Spain at Salamanca. The students visited the Royal Palace and the Prado Museum in Madrid. They were especially impressed with Greco's painting of the crucifixion. In Grenada the students toured the beautiful Alhambra. The palace built by the Moors who controlled Spain from the 800's to 1492, when they were finally pushed back into Africa by the armies of Ferdinand and Isabella. The students also visited Toledo and Portugal during their school term.

Christy lived with a Spanish family in Salamanca. The family spoke no English, but tried to make the students comfortable by often cooking American style dishes. Fruit was readily available, but Cokes were \$3.00 each, and bottled water was \$7.00. Because sandwiches were \$7.00, Christy's Spanish housemother liked to help her students by sending large lunches with them whenever they traveled.

After the end of the school term, Christy and several other students caught a train to Nice and Cannes on the French Riviera. The beautiful beaches there are overlooked by hills filled with villas owned by wealthy Europeans. The people were very friendly to Americans except for the Gypsies who were very aggressive in their efforts to steal anything of value. Gypsy women would even toss a baby at the students, hoping

they would drop their purses and packages. The other Gypsies would snatch them up and run.

The students then rode a train to Rome. Many of the trains and hotels were double-booked. The girls ended up staying in a pension with some students from California. It was not as clean as most Americans expect, and each person had to furnish his own towel, but it was a new experience. The girls went to the Vatican and saw the Pope. They were impressed by the paintings on the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel. The coliseum was very impressive. The shops in Rome were wonderful, but the prices were so high that most of the students could not buy anything.

A special meeting was held at 2:00 pm, celebrating the 90th birthday of the church. Refreshments were served after the meeting.

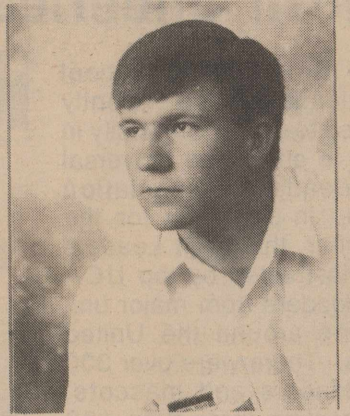

Venice was the most impressive city Christy visited. Instead of streets, the city has canals. Instead of catching a taxi, the students caught a gondola to cross the town. They were so fascinated that they almost missed the last train to Paris.

The train went through Switzerland and the Alps on the way to Paris. It traveled very fast and went through many tunnels in the mountains. In Paris, the students used the metro to reach Notre Dame Cathedral and other famous attractions. By this time they were so hungry for American food that their favorite place was the Hard Rock Cafe with its hamburgers and nachos. Paris was very impressive, but the girls were limited in their time to see everything. The city was especially beautiful at night as they stood on the top of the Eiffel Tower. At \$75.00 per person, they decided not to eat at the restaurant on the top.

Christy and her friends felt like everyone should get the opportunity to visit Europe. They thought the smaller cities were better to see because it was easier to learn more about the culture in them. The prices are usually not as high, and the people are friendlier. Learning a foreign language was easier when they heard nothing but that language. Getting to visit the nation and learn its culture made the language study more enjoyable.

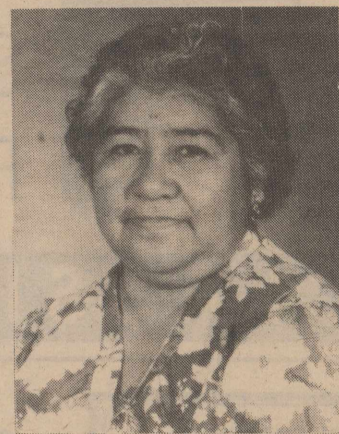

Cystic Fibrosis Update

Trouble breathing is a primary problem for about fifty thousand Americans with cystic fibrosis. The disease fills the lungs with thick mucus, and it's been treated mainly with antibiotics and by pounding on patients' chests to loosen the mucus. There's hope for something much better.

Tests are being conducted on an aerosol spray made from genetically engineered proteins that helps clear the lungs of cystic fibrosis patients. A study, in New England Journal of Medicine (3-19), showed significant improvement in lung function with no apparent side effects from the new spray. The researcher who directed the study, Dr. Ronald Crystal, of the National Heart Lung and Blood Institute, says it's not a cure, but there is no question it works.

The new medicine, called Dnase, is still undergoing testing on cystic fibrosis patients, but its maker plans to apply for permission to make it widely available early next year.

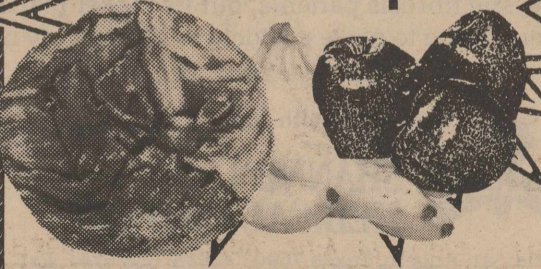
