Extravaganza hosts over 600 during Labor Day

The third annual Labor Day Extravaganza hosted over 600 this year at the City Park in Robert Lee. Two new additions to the annual event may have helped the attendance some this year.

The Rabbit Twister Cookoff was a big success. Portable kitchens of all types were viewed with great interest by visitors. The aroma of homemade chili and barbecue also helped to attract hungry passers-by.

Chili cooks from Big Spring, Midland, San Angelo and Robert Lee competed for CASI points. CASI points are accumulated throughout the year, in order for cooks to attend the annual competition in Terlingua. Winners in the CASI cookoff were Bobby Abbott, first place, second place went to Sue Washburn, and Sherry Maus took third. All three winners were from San Angelo. In the Chili Showmanship category Rick Rickter of Christoval was the first place winner. Gary Ranson of San Angelo, took second place, with third going to Wendland Manufacturing also from San Angelo.

Barbecue and bean cooks also attracted their fair share of attention. Brisket and pork ribs sizzled on grills, while hungry spectators viewed the cooks and the cooking process in the makeshift kitchens.

Joe Kessler of Midland won first place in the Brisket Cookoff and then took second place in the pork rib category. Mickey Crenshaw also placed in both categories taking second in the Brisket Cookoff and third in the Pork Rib Cookoff. Mickey is from Robert Lee. Dwayne Ogden of San Angelo was the big winner in the Pork Rib Cookoff. Carl Wyrick took third in the brisket category.

Beans are a natural with barbecue and chili, so naturally there were some world class bean chefs wielding their culinary talents. Barbara Conaway and Sue Washburn of San Angelo took first and second place honors. Clark Tinkler of Robert Lee was the third place winner.

Cooks from all over West Texas were represented in

the list of winners in the Open Category. Sherry Maus of San Angelo was the top winner, Carl Wyrick of Big Spring took second place and third went to Joe Kessler of Midland.

The Old Fiddlers contest was a new and welcome addition to the regular festivities. The event was not limited to "old" fiddlers only. Eleven contestants of all age groups were entered in the contest. Local musician Troy Jordan was named Grand Champion, but the real winner was the crowd that gathered to listen to the great music.

The Miss WCCCD and Little Miss WCCCD winners were also crowned at the Extravaganza. Jamie Luna, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Junior Luna of Robert Lee was crowned as Miss WCCCD. Little Miss WCCCD is Cassidy Wink, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Wink of Robert Lee. The girls will represent the WCCCD in various community events throughout the coming year.

The Beach Volleyball Tournament had twelve teams entered in both the six man and two man tournaments. Saucedo's 6 Man team from Robert Lee was the champ in the 6-Man category and the two man team of Jose Saucedo and Danny Carper were the winners in that category.

San Angelo contestants again made an impact in the Washer Pitching with the Doubles being won by Hal and Darla Churchill and the Singles title going to Jimmy Don.

The two big winners in the Year's supply of Coke products were Debbie Carper and Eva Torres.

The Extravaganza was an enjoyable day that ended around midnight with the annual dance. Prairie Fire provided the music for the dance.

Lots of hard work by community volunteers goes into planning the annual event and then seeing that those plans go off smoothly. The day was an enjoyable experience for young and old alike and the hard work done by these volunteers does not go unappreciated. Thanks guys.

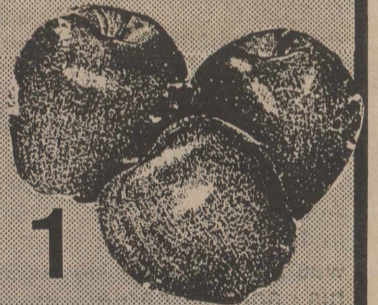

Extension Homemakers

Are you interested in strengthening and improving the quality of your home and family life? If so, the extension homemaker club is for you! The extension homemakers clubs are community groups of homemakers who work with the county Extension agent to plan and carry out educational programs in home economics.

Extension homemakers clubs participate in services that improve family life and community resources as well as personal leadership development of club members. Extension homemakers clubs provide means for members to acquire information and develop skills for making their homes, community and county better places to live.

Membership is open to all homemakers of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin. For more information regarding extension homemakers club contact the County Extension Office located in the county courthouse.

Healthy after school snacks

With the start of school, children across the country will be coming home each afternoon anticipating after-school snacks.

"Brownies, chocolate chip cookies and candy bars all contribute to a child's high fat diet," said Tracy Norman, R.D., patient dietitian at Methodist Hospital.

Bite by bite, such unhealthy snacks add up. In a recent study of 12,000 children, 20 percent had cholesterol levels over 200, the warning level for heart disease in adults.

Norman recommends parents try the following healthy after-school snacks for their children:

- * cut up veggies with yogurt dip
- * fresh fruit salad
- * whole grain crackers with low-fat spreads
- * cookies, such as fig bars, animal crackers and ginger snaps, which are relatively low in fat
- * popcorn made in hot-air popper or with vegetable oil

"Many children are getting more fat in their diets than they need," said Norman. "Although a certain amount of fat is essential in a diet, (and is especially important for children under 2) the key is to make better, low-fat choices, and to include your child in the excitement of selecting healthier foods."

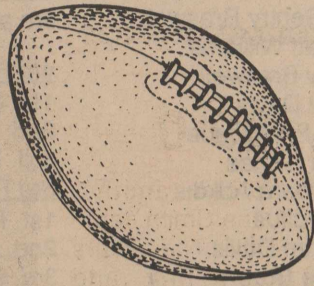

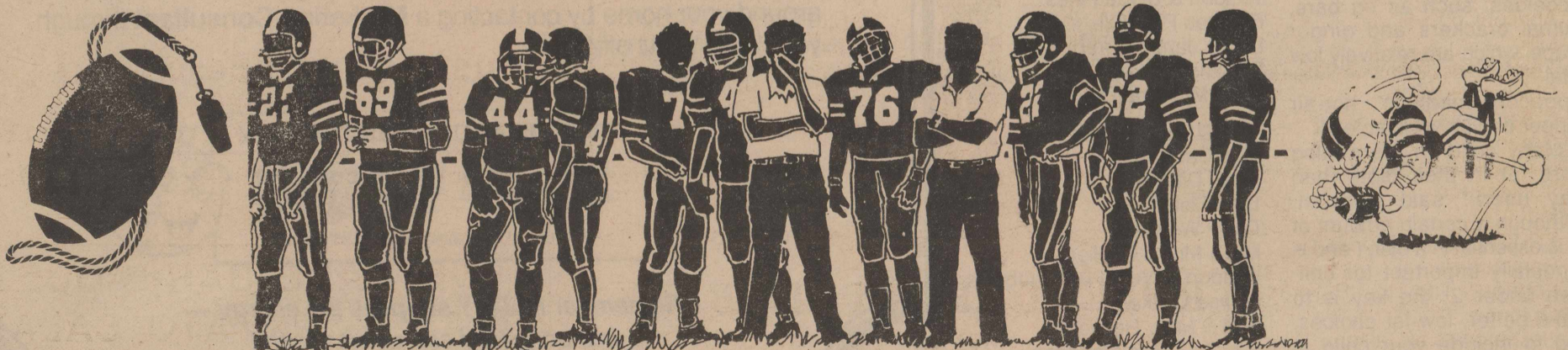

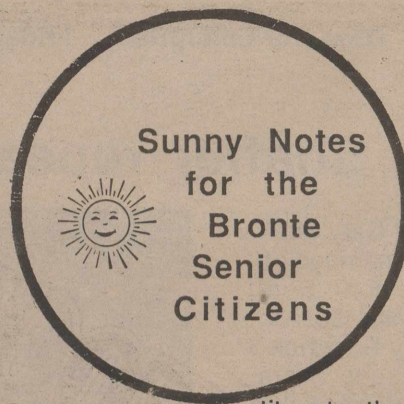

We want action to separate (decouple) the Social Security earnings test issue from the Older Americans Act. Unless the Senate receives a strong message from the Aging Network and from older con-

stituents, the Act may not be reauthorized this year. Wednesday, September 9, 1992, was National Older Americans Act Senate Call in Day. Many of our elderly in Bronte were given this information. This request came from the National Association of the Agency on Aging. The Bronte Senior Center has the address of those who you need to contact if you would like to write or call about the Senate bill s. 3008.

Hot Days & Nights

Hot weather may mean outdoor fun, but two experts at The University Hospital in Boston urge caution. Kyle McInnis, director of the Nutrition Exercise Program, says over-exercising during hot weather can overwork the body's temperature control system, causing dehydration, heat exhaustion and even heat stroke.

He says decreasing duration and intensity of workouts, wearing loose clothing, and drinking plenty of liquids before, during and after workouts will help regulate your body temperature. Daytime heat may be easier to deal with than trying to sleep during hot summer nights.

Sanford Auerbach, director of the Sleep Disorders Center at The University Hospital, says temperatures over 75 degrees can effect normal stages of sleep, shorten sleep time and make a person more irritable, less efficient and less able to cope with everyday stresses. Auerbach suggests a cold shower before bed and, if an air conditioner is not available, sleeping in front of a fan to help maintain a comfortable body temperature.

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (SB 1) the tax rate for last year provides \$4,888 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (SB351) that same rate now provides \$5,144 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$.82011 for county education districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The board of trustees of the Robert Lee Independent School District hereby gives notice that it is considering the adoption of a tax rate of \$.26369/\$100 that will provide \$5,458 per student in state and local revenues.

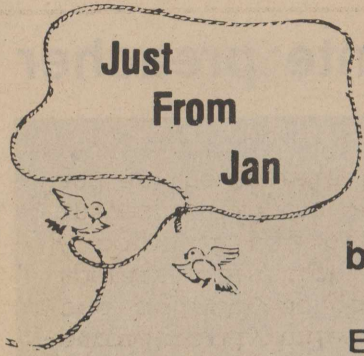

The facts about weight loss

Being obese can have serious health consequences. These include an increased risk of heart disease, stroke, high blood pressure, diabetes, gallstones, and some forms of cancer. Losing weight can help reduce these risks but choosing the right weight reduction plan can be tricky.

Here are some points to keep in mind as you search for the right program for you:

* Claims that you can lose weight effortlessly are false. The only proven way to lose weight is either to reduce the number of calories you eat or to increase the number you burn off through exercise. Experts recommend a combination of both.

* Very low calorie diets do have risks and should be pursued only under medical supervision. Unsupervised very low-calorie diets can deprive you of important nutrients and are potentially dangerous.

* Fad diets rarely have any permanent effect. Sudden and radical changes in your eating patterns are difficult to sustain over time. In addition, radical dieting often sends dieters into a cycle of quick weight loss, followed by a rebound weight gain once nor-

mal eating resumes. Subsequently, reducing becomes even more difficult when the next diet is attempted.

*To lose weight safely and keep it off requires long-term changes in daily eating and exercise habits. Many experts recommend a goal of losing about one pound per week. A modest reduction of 500 calories per day will achieve this goal, since the total reduction of 3,500 calories is required to lose one pound of fat. An important way to lower your calorie intake is to learn and practice healthy eating habits.

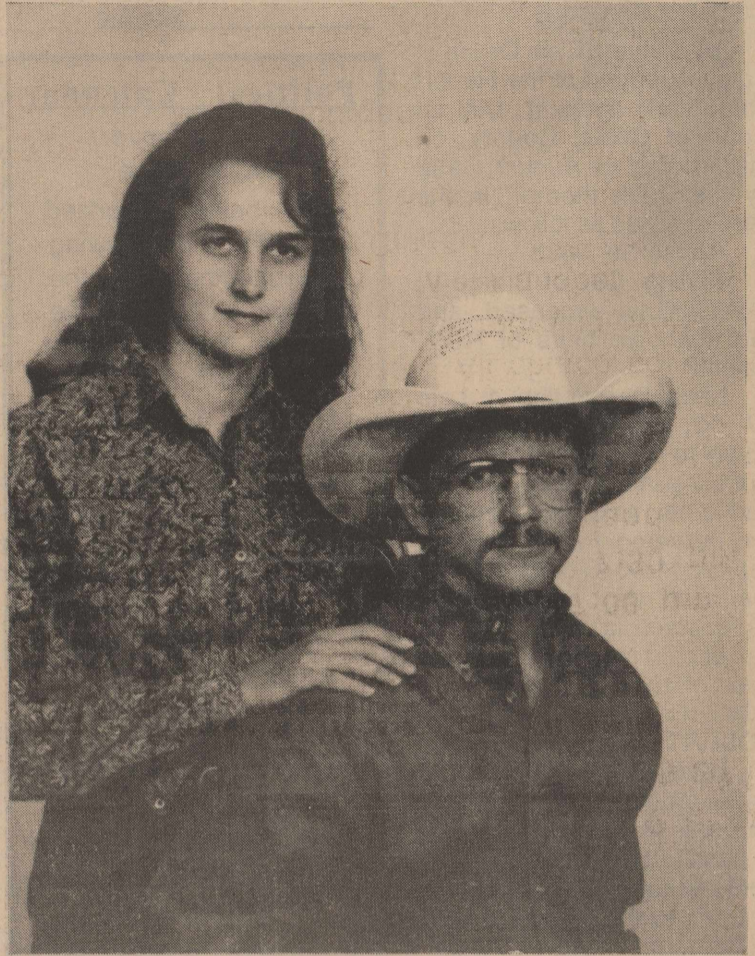
