Moving within the county can affect your right to vote if the changes are not made on your voter registration records. All name changes, address changes, or corrections should be made before the deadline to simplify the voting process and assure your right to vote in the November election.

Archery season opens throughout state

One of the fastest growing hunting sports - archery - can be enjoyed by enthusiasts this month. Archery season for deer and turkey (or other game animals if in the open season) opened on Thursday, Oct. 1, and will run through Sunday, Nov. 1.

Legal hunting equipment may be used during the

archery only season, but crossbows are illegal except for handicapped hunters who must have a physician's statement. Most other regulations for the general hunting season also apply - hunting hours, tagging, etc. An archery hunter may have in his vehicle or camp a lawful firearm for use in hunting

species other than deer or turkey but not in his possession. For example, javelina general season is open Oct. 1 through Feb. 28, with 2 per season, in Coke County. The county has no closed season or bag limit for squirrels. These might be hunted on the hunter's place or lease with a gun during archery season.

Archers contend the sport is much more challenging than the gun season. More patience is required, little movement or noise, some camo is necessary, and game must be much closer.

In addition to the Texas hunting license, the archery-only hunter must have a \$7 archery stamp affixed to the license and signed across the face of the stamp.

Every hunter, before taking to the field, should pick up a copy of the 1992-93 Texas Hunting Guide, available free wherever sporting goods are sold. Possibly seasoned hunters will note regulations or hints they were unaware of.

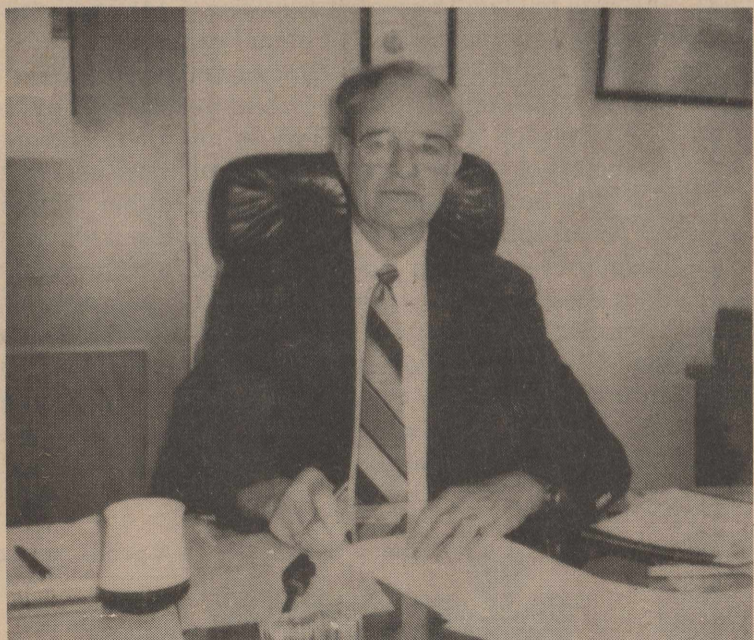
Fire Prevention Week

Proclamation by the County Judge of Coke County to all whom these presents shall come: I Royce Lee, County Judge of Coke County, do hereby declare the week of October 4-10, 1992 as FIRE PREVENTION WEEK in Coke County for the following reasons: Whereas, Fire Prevention Week commemorates the great Chicago Fire of 1871 which 250 persons, injured countless numbers, left 100,000 homeless, and destroyed more than 17,400 buildings, and whereas, approximately 80% of all US fire deaths occur in the home; and Whereas having a smoke detector cuts by nearly 50% your risk of dying in a home fire by providing early warning, giving extra time for escape, however only working smoke detectors can protect us. Therefore, smoke detectors should be checked regularly and batteries changed at least annually, and

Whereas, the fire service of Coke County is dedicated to

the safety of life and property from the devastating effects of fire; and are joined by other concerned citizens of Coke County as well as businesses, schools, service clubs, and other organizations in their safety efforts; and Whereas, the local efforts of the fire service are supported by the activities of organizations such as The National Fire Protection Association, The United States Fire Administration, The Consumer Product Safety Commission, The International Association of Fire Chiefs, The International Association of Fire Fighters, The National Volunteer Fire Council, and the Fire Marshal Association of North America; Therefore I call upon the people of Coke County to participate in fire prevention activities at home, work and school and heed the message "Test Your Detector - It's Sound Advice!" as the 1992 Fire Prevention Week theme.

Detection clinic slated

Breast cancer cannot be prevented, but early detection can save many lives. Breast cancer will strike one in nine American Women. The American Cancer Society predicts that about 44,000 women will die of breast cancer this year. Experts estimate that if every woman had regular mammograms according to guidelines established by the American Cancer Society, nearly a third of the women who die of breast cancer would survive. The guidelines are:

- A) Begin mammography by age 40
- B) Age 40-49 mammogram every 1-2 years
- C) Over age 50 annual mammogram
- D) Monthly breast self-examination

HEALTH NOTES

Body Shapes

The shape of a woman's body has been previously linked to the risk of heart disease. Now a study published in the *New England Journal of Medicine* (5-14), shows shape is also one factor linked to breast cancer.

Researchers, led by Dr. Thomas Sellers, at the University of Minnesota School of Public Health, acknowledge that although a family history is one of the strongest predictors of whether a woman will get breast cancer, that risk may be increased or decreased by other factors.

For instance, women with fewer children whose first pregnancy was at an older age tended to be more at risk than those with more children and a first pregnancy at a younger age. Obesity is linked to the risk of breast cancer, but Dr. Sellers says women who carried their excess weight around their waist - the so-called apple shape - seemed to be more at risk than women with a pear shape, whose excess weight was around their hips or thighs.

A pot luck meal will be shared about 6 pm. The family extends a welcome to all friends to come and share the day with us.

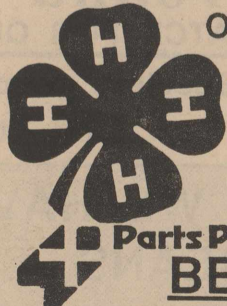

The Steers received the kick, went right to work and made two quick first downs,

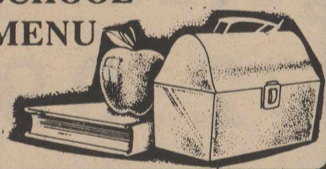
FFA News

Horns improve with runaway victory

With a runaway victory over Irion Co. Friday night, Bronte improved their record which now stands solid at 3 and 1.

Bronte's determination was obvious from the first seconds of the game, and Rudy Sanchez's kickoff was proof, as the ball sailed an impressive 60 yards to land on the goal line. 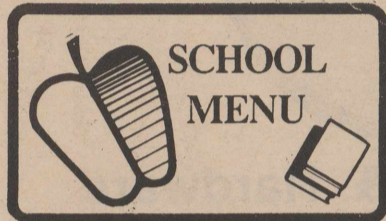

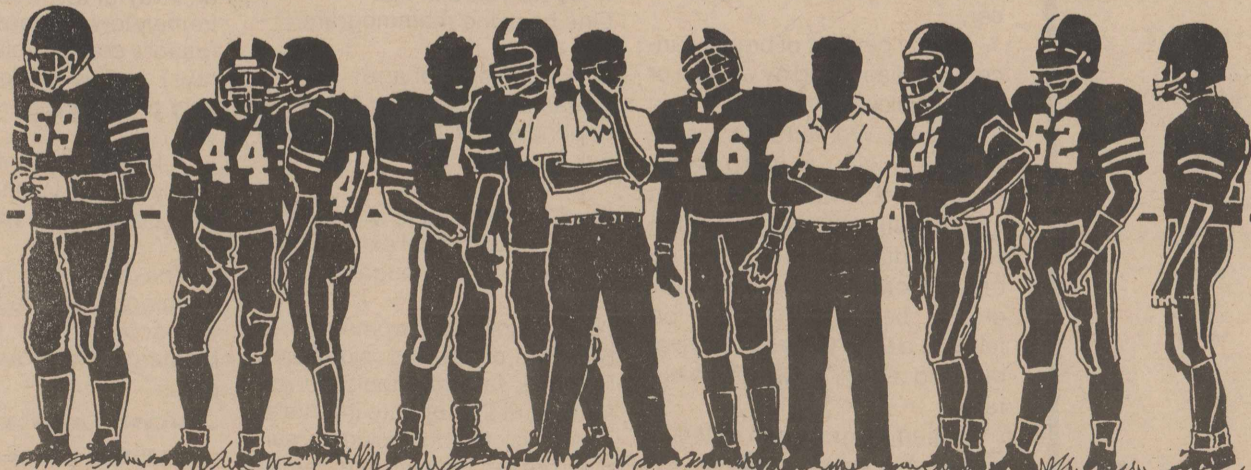

Family needs program given to RLUMW

United Methodist Women of Robert Lee had an informative program on Sept. 23, at Fellowship Hall of their church. Led by Lucile Bryan, the subject was Shelter for Children and Family Needs. The study was aimed at researching local available help for children and their families. The ten members attending, and the new member, Frances Lindsey, were amazed at how much the research disclosed, and they asked the reporter to share with readers.

School Superintendent William Hood verified that some problems among school children are so obvious that teachers become aware of need to investigate. Reporting such need to authorities is the first step in solving problems such as homeless, hunger, abuse of many kinds, neglect, clothing, and health. Hood explained that the school can help families in financial stress by considering applications for free, or reduced-price lunches.

Texas has a law against refusing or failing to report cases of child abuse. There is a free number through which the Texas Department of Human Resources may be called to report knowledge of, or suspicion of child abuse, and the caller remains anonymous: 1-800-252-5400.

Reports of children's needs should be given to Coke County's Child Welfare Board, which is composed of 9 members, 4 from Bronte and 5 from Robert Lee. At this writing, only Cindy Fleming and Leta Alridge are on the local board, with 3 other names pending approval by the county commissioners. A report to any board member results in a contact with Child Protective Services with area headquarters in Ballinger. A representative from that office must investigate, and proper action can be taken.

Information from the county judge's office disclosed that persons who are in danger of falling or becoming suddenly so ill that they cannot call for help, may wear a necklace obtained through that office. By pressing a button on the device, a phone call goes to West Coke County Nursing Home and help will be sent immediately. This Lifeline system can be had for permanent or temporary use for \$15 per month. A person wanting free service must prove indigent need.

Shamrock Clinic personnel explained that Medicaid cares mostly for children from low income families. Application is made through Human Resources of San Angelo by filling out forms to prove there is no income. State funds pay if the family is approved. Medicaid pays for all the medical needs of all the children in the family. A doctor's prescription is required, but there is no limit to the number of prescriptions filled per month.

For adult indigent care, application is made through West Coke County Hospital District. The administrator determines eligibility. Patients

receive free doctor's care and medicine, or the hospital pays. It must come through the local doctor and nursing home.

Robert Lee's Senior Citizens, under Kelly Millican's direction, have many helpful plans that benefit older adults. Meals on Wheels are available to all over age 65, delivered from San Angelo three times per week, and frozen meals twice a week for a small price.

Commodities for low income families are delivered once a month.

Applications can be made for food stamps and Medicaid at the Senior Citizens building or by calling 915/655-0576.

Telephone owners who qualify can get assistance with basic residential rates. A weatherization program provided by the Community Action Council of Tom Green County can be a help to qualifying families. (Call 915/653-2411) Electric and gas bills are considered, also.

W. I. C. program provides a speaker monthly to help women wishing to learn more of nutrition and child care in the home.

Rural transportation is sponsored by Concho Valley Council of Governments, Texas Dept. of Transportation, and Coke County, state and federal agencies. The van, named Thunderbird, is located at the courthouse, is driven by Kelly Millican, and is for public use, not senior citizens only. Anyone is eligible to ride for a small fee. Trips to the doctor, or to shopping areas, restaurants, picnics, etc., can be arranged.

Through agencies located

in San Angelo and Abilene, Concepts of Care and Home Health provide care to senior citizens in need of light housework and cooking. Contact Senior Citizens Center.

Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) provides volunteer opportunities for retired persons to participate more fully in their community through volunteer services. Those with proper training can help with income taxes or Medicare/Medicaid problems, provide transportation to doctor, commodities or meals, and/or help serve meals at the center. Telephone reassurance and visitation is a much needed service.

Bronte Senior Citizens have all the same helps available there through the direction of Mary Percifull.

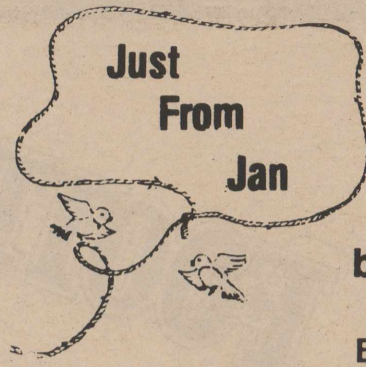
Other valuable assistance to both adults and children is the E. M. S. and ambulance service, the flashing porchlight to assist ambulance drivers locate addresses at night and the "911" service that will soon be in use.

Children should be taught to use the telephone for emergencies, and numbers should be plainly listed in the phone book so that they may call for help as needed when at home or with grandparents.

In order to protect children from many dangers, people who see evidence of needs of any kind must be willing to report to the proper authorities.

One of the most rewarding things an individual can do for tomorrow's leaders is to serve as a 4-H adult volunteer today.

The time, travel and support volunteers contribute is valued at \$1 billion annually.

"The 4-H program provides many opportunities for growth and stimulation for adults and helps them attain enjoyment and self-fulfillment," says Yanez. "So help prepare the young people in our communities for tomorrow by joining the ranks of 4-H volunteers."

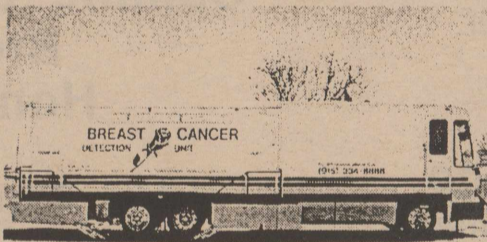

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

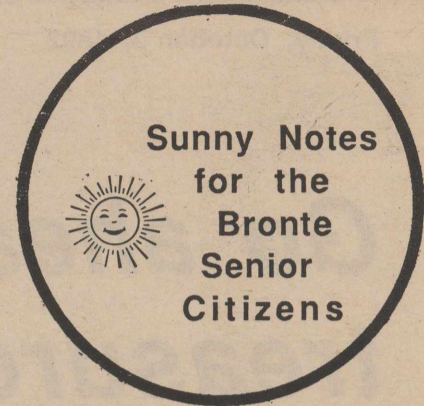

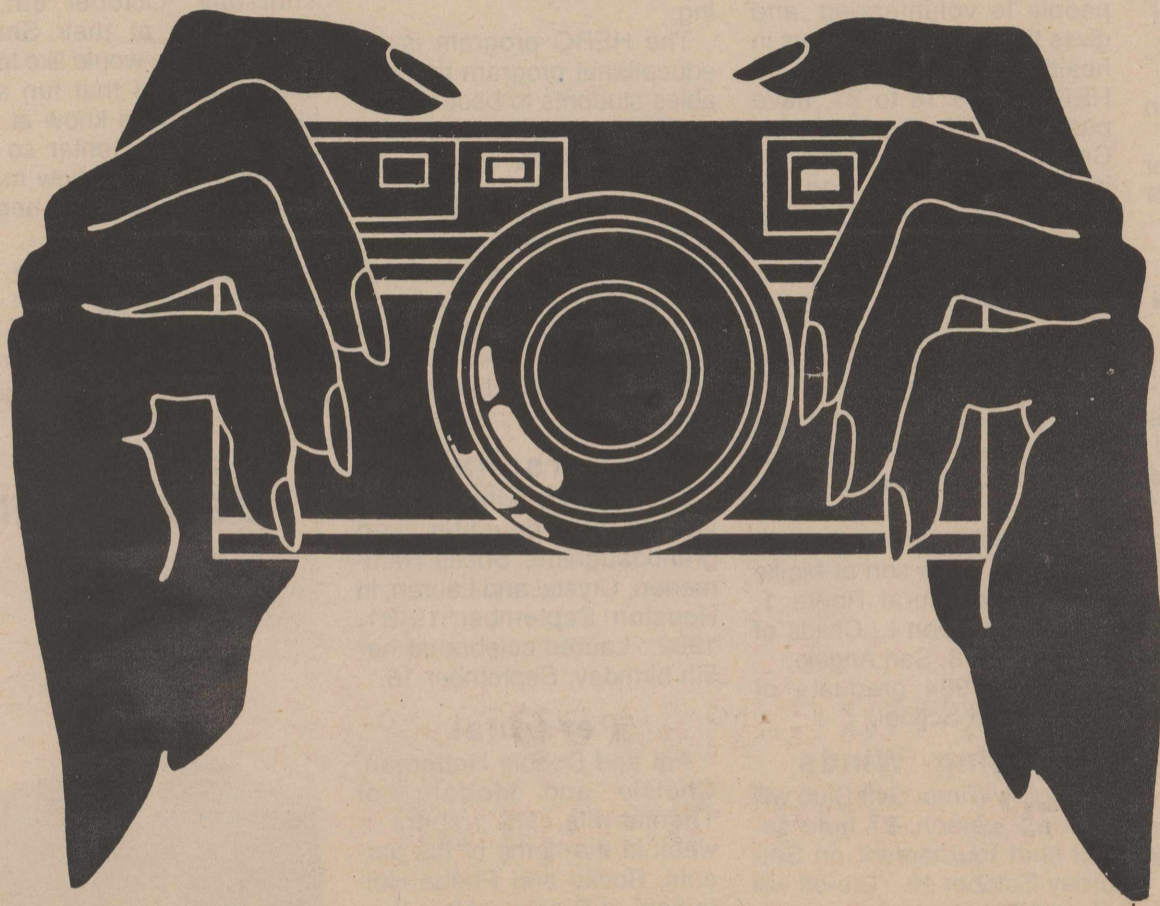
