Winters man found dead

A Winters resident, Ralph Hightower, was found dead on Monday, March 8, on a ranch approximately seven miles northeast of Bronte, on the Coke County/Runnels County line. Mr. Hightower, 67, apparently died of a single gunshot wound to the chest. Chief Deputy Jeff Barnes with the Coke County Sheriff's Department investigated the incident, assisted by the Runnels County Sheriff's office.

Mr. Hightower was said to be looking after the ranch, a part of the original Tad Richards estate. His body was discovered by his elderly brother, Sloan Hightower, who was visiting from Roswell, N. M. and authorities were notified.

An autopsy was ordered by Peace Justice Gary Shaffer and Deputy Barnes accompanied the body to San Antonio. At presstime the autopsy report had not been received and the final ruling on the death is pending.

Funeral services for Mr. Hightower were held on Wednesday, March 10, at the Winters Funeral Home Chapel, followed by burial in Lakeview Cemetery in Winters.

business personal property to complete, sign, and submit rendition forms to the Coke County Appraisal District is March 31, 1993.

A rendition is a document on which a property owner lists taxable property. The owner can also estimate the property's value on the form. It should be filed at the Appraisal District office at 710 Austin St. in Robert Lee. Property owners who ask in writing for an extension for a good cause, before the deadline, have 30 extra days to file the rendition.

Property owners who own or manage income-producing tangible personal property must file renditions. Examples of such property are business inventory, office furniture and fixtures, and business vehicles. Livestock, farm machinery, and personal vehicles are now tax exempt.

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
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Harwell honored on eightieth birthday

Coke County Courthouse News

In the afternoon of March 10, 1993, at exactly 3:40 pm, there was no, absolutely none, water running into the sump from the floor and/or any floor drain. This condition had been observed for approximately one week prior to the date of March 10, 1993. Therefore the pumps were stopped and the switch pulled on both water well pumps. Purpose was to observe how long it would take for the water to show up in the floor drains or other areas in the basement or if it would ever show up or start flowing.

Well, it simply didn't take very long. When Robert Sanders went to the basement on the morning of March 11, 1993 at 7:30 am, sure enough, the water was flowing into the sump from the floor drain and areas of the floor were wet that had been dry. On March 11, 1993, the pumps were started again.

The bottom line and positive fact is that the wells and pumps are directly responsible for the partial* drying up of the basement water.

*Partial drying up is explained thusly:

The stairwell on the outside of the building on the west side of the courthouse still has a small flow (seep) and the doorway into the basement at the threshold has a seep.

The #3 well, prior to cut-off on March 10, 1993, had begun to cut off automatically, indicating a lack of water to require constant pumping.

"Another pumping location may be necessary to completely stop and continually control the water flow out of and from the basement.

I think it could be accomplished through the drain in the stairwell with a hand auger and the setting of perforated pipe and installation of another pump," said County Judge Royce Lee.



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

SHANNON HEALTH NOTES

SECONDHAND SMOKE

Through voluntary means or by legislation, many places of work have restricted or banned smoking. A new study published in the *Journal of the American Medical Association* (8-11), provides evidence that nonsmokers are not adequately protected from environmental tobacco smoke, or ETS, unless smoking is completely banned in the workplace.

Researchers at the University of California, San Diego, led by Dr. Rob Borland, surveyed more than seven thousand nonsmoking people who worked indoors. Nonsmokers, where there was only a workarea ban, were nearly three times more likely to be exposed to environmental tobacco smoke than those working in a smoke-free workplace. Nonsmokers who worked where there was no restriction on smoking had five and a half times the exposure to ETS.

SS Reminder

"If you worked and received Social Security benefits during 1992, you have until April 15, 1993, to report the amount of your 1992 earnings to the Social Security Administration," said Franklin H. Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo. "Anyone whose earnings exceeded the annual earnings limits must file a report. The earnings limits for 1992 were \$10,200 for beneficiaries aged 65-69 and \$7,440 for those under age 65."

Social Security will compare the amount of earnings on your 1992 report with the estimate you provided when you applied for benefits or when you filed last year's earnings report. "Benefits paid in 1992 were based on that estimate," Upp explained. "If you earned less than you estimated, you may be due additional money; if you made more than you estimated for 1992, you may have to repay some benefits."

People who turned 70 in 1992 and earned over the annual limit will also need to report their earnings to Social Security though special rules

may apply.

"Filing your Federal income tax return does not take the place of filing your earnings report with Social Security," Upp emphasized. "And, if you request a filing extension for your Federal income tax return, you do not automatically get an extension on the filing date for your Social Security earnings report. You must request each extension

separately."
People who earlier reported they expected to earn more than the 1992 limits were automatically sent a reporting form in late February. Those who didn't get the form should call 1-800-772-1213 business days between 7:00 am and 7:00 pm to file their report.





Help Children Shop Wisely

When shopping with your child, you have a great opportunity to develop their skill in finding the best buy for the money. Choose an item that is something they recognize, but not something they are trying to buy, such as milk or bread. Ask them to tell you which brand, or which size container is the best buy? They may have learned some buying skills at school. Let them show you what they know. Ask them to share how they made their choice.

Take a few minutes to show them the unit price label on the shelf. This helps them spot quickly which one cost the least per ounce or pound. Then ask them how much they think the family needs. Would one size be better than another for your family? Would one type be better for the use intended? Is there some other reason why the lowest price may not be the best buy? Share how sometimes our personal preference for a taste or texture of a food influences our choice about which one is the best buy. Some people prefer whole grain bread over enriched white bread and are willing to pay more for it.

Explain how the giant, economy size may not be the best buy if you need only half as much. Help them see that products that look alike may have different purposes, such as skim, low-fat and homogenized milk, show how other products that may look entirely different can be a better buy, such as non-fat dry milk for cooking or, canned rather than fresh tomatoes for soups and sauces. If you are shopping for clothing, let them compare the cost of brand name items with cost of similar items having a store or generic brand. Let them figure out whether it is more important to them to have more of the items (jeans, shirts, shoes) at a lower price. Which is more important to them, and what trade off are they willing to make to get what they want?

Next, choose an item on your list and give them the responsibility for finding the best buy. Build their confidence by showing them how much they saved the family by making the best buy.

Learning to use time and knowledge to compare prices and products develops youth's resourcefulness.

Section 1 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to redistribute among other school districts ad valorem taxes levied and collected by a school district. The amendment would also allow the legislature to create county education districts with the taxable property of existing school districts in one or more counties combined. County education districts may levy, collect, and distribute ad valorem taxes as authorized by general law. The legislature would be allowed to set the rate of the ad valorem tax to be imposed in a school district or county education district or it may authorize the board of trustees of each school district or county education district to set the rate, provided that the rate of county education district ad valorem taxes may not exceed \$1.00 per \$100 valuation of taxable property, unless a higher rate is approved by the voters of the district. The amendment also provides that the amount of ad valorem taxes redistributed among school districts by the legislature and effectively redistributed within a county through county education districts may not exceed 2.75 percent of the sum of the state revenue appropriated for public schools and the revenue from local ad valorem taxes levied and collected for public schools. The term "state revenue" does not include revenue from ad valorem taxes, revenue for the provision of free textbooks, or contributions to a retirement system. Finally, the amendment provides that it does not affect the distribution of the available school fund under article VII, section 5, of the Texas Constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing limited redistribution of ad valorem taxes for schools, authorizing the legislature or local districts to set a minimum tax rate in county education districts, and placing a cap on the ad valorem tax levied by county education districts.'

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Section 2 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that, except for state educational mandates imposed in compliance with the Texas Constitution or federal law, or unless enacted by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members elected to each house of the legislature, a school district may not be required to comply with an obligation requiring expenditure of school district funds unless the obligation is fully funded. The amendment also requires the legislature to provide by law a procedure for determining whether an obligation is fully funded. In the absence of such a procedure, and at the request of a school district's board of trustees, the comptroller of public accounts shall determine whether or not an obligation is fully funded. This amendment applies only to state educational mandates enacted after December 31,

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting a school district from the obligation to comply with unfunded state educational mandates.

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes an amendment to article VII, section 5(b), of the constitution, which currently authorizes the legislature to provide for using the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts and certain education-related revenue bonds issued by the state. The amendment would repeal the provision authorizing

the use of the permanent school fund to guarantee state revenue bonds, but would permit the legislature to provide by law for the issuance of general obligation bonds or revenue bonds of the state for the purpose of making loans to, or purchasing bonds of, school districts for the purpose of acquisition, construction, or improvement of instructional facilities, including all furnishings. The amendment also provides that the state, pursuant to general law, may forgive the payment of principal and interest on all or part of a loan made to a school district under the amendment to partially finance an instructional facility. The cap of \$750 million on the amount of bonds that could be issued under article VII, section 5(b), as amended, would be retained. The amendment would repeal the current provision of the constitution permitting the legislature to authorize bonds in excess of \$750 million by two-thirds record vote of both houses of the legislature. While any of the general obligation bonds issued under the amendment or any of the interest on those bonds is outstanding and unpaid, there would be appropriated out of the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, the amount sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that matured or became due that fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of \$750 million in state general obligation or revenue bonds to assist school districts in partially financing facilities, authorizing the state to forgive payments of loans made to a school district for partially financing facilities, and repealing the authorization for \$750 million in state revenue bonds guaranteed by the permanent school fund."
