Rendition Deadline
The deadline for owners of business personal property to complete, sign, and submit rendition forms to the Coke County Appraisal District is March 31, 1993.
A rendition is a document on which a property owner lists taxable property. The owner can also estimate the property's value on the form. It should be filed at the Appraisal District office at 710 Austin St. in Robert Lee. Property owners who ask in writing for an extension for a good cause, before the deadline, have 30 extra days to file the rendition.
Property owners who own or manage income-producing tangible personal property must file renditions. Examples of such property are business inventory, office furniture and fixtures, and business vehicles. Livestock, farm machinery, and personal vehicles are now tax exempt.

Well, it simply didn't take very long. When Roben Sanders went to the basement on the morning of March 11, 1993 at 7:30 am, sure enough, the water was flowing into the sump from the floor drain and areas of the floor were wet that had been dry. On March 11, 1993, the pumps were started again.

The stairwell on the outside of the building on the west side of the courthouse still has a small flow (seep) and the doorway into the basement at the threshold has a seep.
The \#3 well, prior to cut-of on March 10, 1993, had begun to cut off automatically indicating a lack of water to require constant pumping.
"Another pumping location may be necessary to completely stop and continually control the water flow out o and from the basement.
I think it could be accom plished through the drain in the stairwell with a hand auger and the setting of perforated pipe and installation of another pump," said County Judge Royce Lee.

## SECONDHAND SMOKE

Through voluntary means or by legislation, many places of work have restricted or banned smoking. A new study published in the Journal of the American Medical Association (8-11), provides evidence that nonsmokers are not adequately protected from environmental tobacco smoke, or ETS, unless smoking is completely banned in the workplace. Researchers at the University of California, San Diego, led by Dr. Rob Borland, surveyed more than seven thousand nonsmoking people who worked indoors. Nonsmokers, where there was only a workarea ban, were nearly three times more likely to be exposed to environmental tobacco smoke than those working in a smoke-free workplace. Nonsmokers who worked where there was no restriction on smoking had five and a half times the exposure to ETS.

Security though special rules may apply.
"Filing your Federal income tax return does not take the place of filing your earnings report with Social Security," Upp emphasized. "And, if you request a filing extension you request a miling extension
for your Federal income tax return, you do not automatically get an extension on the filing date for your Social Security earnings report. You must request each extension separately."
People who earlier reported they expected to earn more than the 1992 limits were automatically sent a reporting form in late February. Those who didn't get the form should call 1-800-772-1213 business days between 7:00 am and 7:00 pm to file their report.
