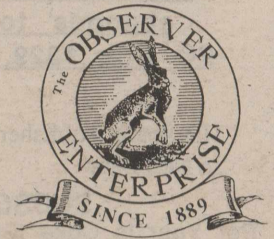

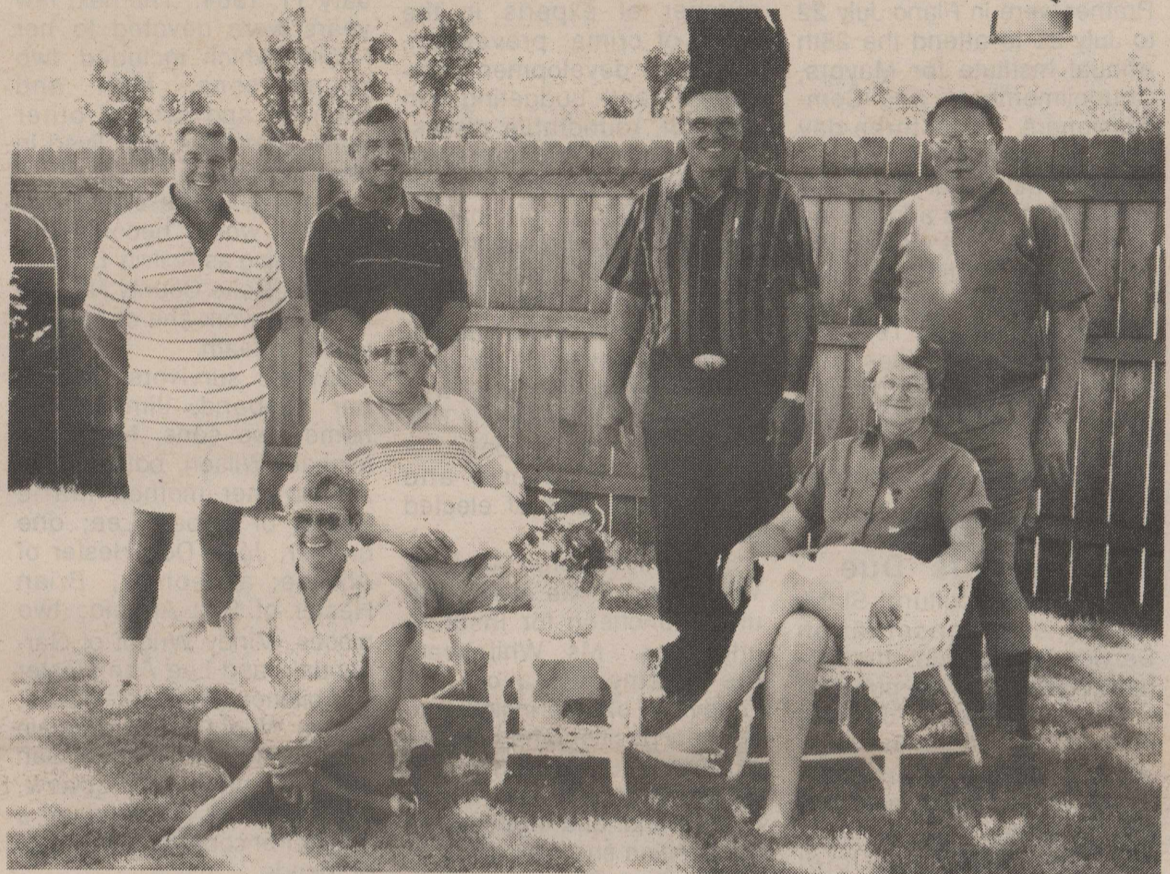

In addition, the Institute offered a chance to visit with elected officials from across Texas to learn how other cities are coping with the challenges facing municipal government today.

Wool, Mohair Comments Due

USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service invites wool and mohair growers and the public to submit comments on the methods for calculating price support for wool on unshorn lambs (pulled wool) and mohair for 1993.

County ASCS official Dwayne Vincent said the written remarks must be received in Washington, D. C. on or before August 13, to be considered.

In accordance with the National Wool Act of 1954, pulled wool must be supported at a level in relationship to the support price for shorn wool, that will maintain normal marketing practices for pulled wool. He explained that pulled wool is the wool removed from the pelt of a slaughtered sheep. In the past, this provision has been implemented through payments based on the hundred weight of live, unshorn lambs marketed.

"Mohair must be supported at about the same percentages of parity as shorn wool, plus or minus 15%," the ASCS official said. The shorn wool support price is based on a formula prescribed in the National Wool Act. Based on current USDA data, the 1993 shorn wool support price will be \$2.04 per pound (grease basis).

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SHANNON HEALTH NOTES

Folic Acid

It has long been thought that the nutritional ingredient folic acid might be important in preventing certain birth defects. Several recent studies shed new light on the beneficial role of this vitamin in diets of women of child bearing age. The most recent study, from Hungary, was reported in the *New England Journal of Medicine* (12-24). It showed that a group of women who, prior to pregnancy, started taking a multivitamin containing folic acid had significantly fewer babies with congenital malformations and none with neural-tube defects, such as spina bifida, compared to a group of women who took only a trace-element supplement.

Accompanying the study was an editorial by Dr. Irwin Rosenberg, from the Human Nutrition Center on Aging at Tufts University. He says the study establishes nutritional needs at a new moment in the life cycle, that being just after conception, and he called the Hungarian study a landmark in preventing birth defects.

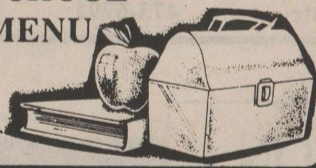

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Exercising in Hot Weather

When the weather becomes hot and humid, it is important to adjust your exercise routine to avoid health risks.

According to Ray Irvin, director of the Methodist Lifestyle Centre, "The best time to exercise is in the early morning or late evening when it is cooler." Wearing loose clothing while exercising also will help by allowing body heat to escape.

The most important thing to remember while exercising in hot weather is to drink plenty of fluids. Drinking the right kinds of fluids is also essential. Water is the best fluid to drink while exercising. Soft drinks and fruit juices contain 10 to 12% sugar and can cause cramps, stomach upset and diarrhea if not diluted first. "Fluid replacement drinks," such as Gatorade, are good for hot weather exercising. You can make your own by diluting fruit juice to half strength with water and adding one teaspoon of salt per gallon.

Following are some guidelines for drinking fluids during hot weather exercising:

- *Drink fluids before, during and after exercising.
- *Drink 2.5 cups of water up to one hour before exercising.
- *Drink 1.5 cups of water 15 minutes before exercising.
- *Drink 2 cups of water for every pound lost to sweat after exercising.
- *Drink cooler fluids that are 40 to 50 degrees.
- *Do not drink fluids that contain more than 10% sugar.
- *You can drink "fluid replacement drinks" while exercising.
- "Remember that thirst is not a good indicator of how much

fluid your body needs," said Irvin. "It is important to drink while exercising in hot weather even if you are not thirsty."

Family Land Heritage Program apps available

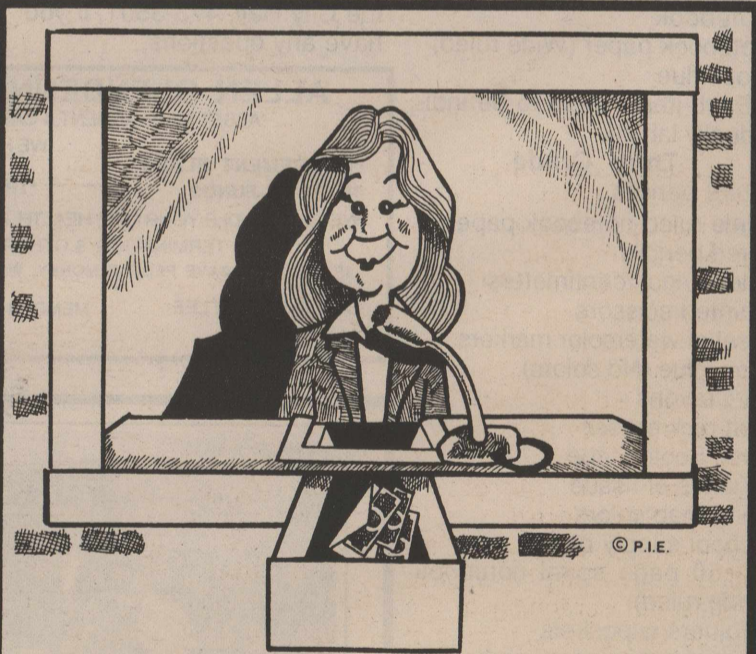
The deadline is approaching to submit applications for the Texas Department of Agriculture's Family Land Heritage Program. The ceremony early in 1994 will mark the 20th anniversary of the program, which recognizes farms and ranches that have been in continuous production by the same family for at least 100 years.

The deadline for applications has been extended to August 21, according to Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry. "We don't want any qualified applicants to miss out on the opportunity to be recognized in this program because they missed the deadline, so we encourage people to get their applications in as soon as possible."

In recognition of the anniversary year of the program, all 2,749 previous honorees will be invited to the ceremony in Austin. Other programs highlighting Texas history and agriculture will occur in conjunction with the ceremony.

Applications for the program are available through county judges and historical societies, as well as the department. In order for a farm or ranch to qualify for the program, it must be a minimum of 10 acres and take in receipts of at least \$250 a year.

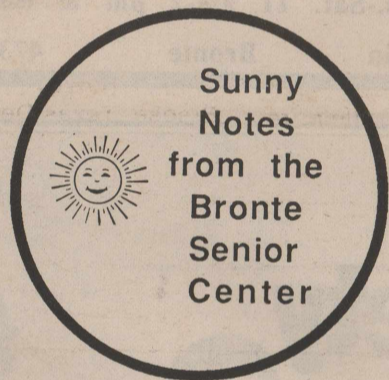

WTU selected for wind-power project

West Texas Utilities Company announced recently that the Renewable Energy project it is hosting will also participate in a nationwide program. The local utility's parent, Central and South West Corporation, is one of three electric utilities selected by the U.S. Department of Energy and the Electric Power Research Institute to participate in a nationwide wind-power testing program.

During the next five years, the \$40 million program will evaluate advanced wind-turbine technology that is expected to make wind power competitive with electricity generated from fossil fuels.

Central and South West will receive a \$2 million grant toward construction of a wind farm near Fort Davis, Texas in the WTU service area. EPRI will provide an additional \$3 million of funding through a dollar-for-dollar cost-sharing program. The grant will allow expansion of the project to 6 megawatts from an originally planned 2-megawatt facility costing \$3 million. Six megawatts of electricity can serve approximately 2,000 homes.

Central and South West began its Fort Davis project in 1992 to investigate the viability of wind power and other renewable energy resources throughout its 152,000-square mile service territory.

E. R. Brooks, chairman, president, and chief executive officer of Central and South West, said the CSW system expects to invest \$10 million by 1997 to study how renewable energy technologies could benefit the customers of its four electric utility companies.

"Research and technological advances could help make wind and solar power affordable alternatives for our customers early in the 21st century," Brooks said. "We're committed to being good stewards of our environment, and we're proud that EPRI

and the DOE endorse our efforts."

Brooks pointed out that research studies indicate wind power in Texas alone could supply approximately 10 percent of the electrical needs of the United States. He said the CSW project will help determine how much of this resource can be practically used as well as the environmental effects of renewable technologies.

A primary goal of both DOE and EPRI is wind-power research to lower the cost of wind power from the current 7 to 9 cents a kilowatt-hour to 4 cents a kilowatt-hour by the end of the decade.

The new wind turbines to be tested in the DOE/EPRI program incorporate many improvements, including more efficient blades, lighter materials, streamlined designs, and fewer parts for reduced weight and cost.

The other two utilities selected for the program are Green Mountain Power Corporation in Vermont and Central Maine Power Company. The selections were based on

the companies' progress in wind power development. Other factors included geographic diversity and weather conditions. EPRI and DOE plan to select two or more projects for funding in the second phase of the program, beginning in 1994. Twenty-one utilities have expressed interest in the second phase.

Central and South West Corporation, a Dallas-based utility holding company, owns West Texas Utilities Company and three other electric utilities. These subsidiaries provide electric service to 1.6 million customers in Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, and Arkansas. Central and South West also owns Transok, Inc., an Oklahoma intrastate natural gas pipeline subsidiary, and four other subsidiaries.

The Electric Power Research Institute, headquartered in Palo Alto, CA, is the research arm of the electric utility industry. EPRI manages the technical research and development programs for the industry to improve power production, distribution, and use.

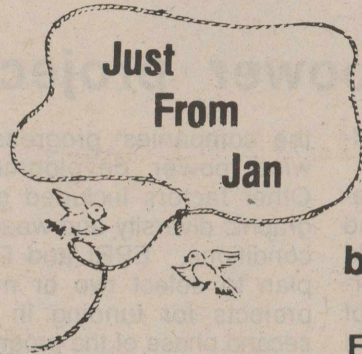

Food for Thaw-ght

When the last days of summer have faded away and fall weather is knocking on your door, you will want to dig into the frozen produce and other goodies in your freezer. It is important to remember that proper thawing is essential to maintaining the taste and texture of frozen foods. It affects the juiciness of meats, the texture and flavor of vegetables and fruits, and the moisture level of baked goods.

When thawing fruits and vegetables the following is recommended:

*Thaw frozen fruits and vegetables in the refrigerator overnight, sealed in a freezer bag.

*Frozen items can be thawed more quickly by immersing the sealed freezer bags into cold water, changing water frequently until food is thawed.

*Thawed fruits and vegetables that have been at room temperature for under 2 hours can be refrozen.

When thawing meats the following is recommended:

*Defrost meats in a sealed freezer bag in refrigerator or cold water. Never leave thawed food at room temperature or warmer as bacteria multiply.

*Thawed meats and poultry kept in refrigerator should be used within 2-3 days. Thawed seafood kept in the refrigerator should be used within 1-2 days.

*Thick meat cuts should be thawed before cooking to retain juiciness. Items like chops, patties and steaks which will be prepared by flouring or breading should be

When thawing baked goods the following is recommended:

*Thaw breads, desserts and baked goods at room temperatures in sealed freezer bag or original wrapping to avoid moisture loss.

*Thaw breaded foods in refrigerator overnight, with freezer bags opened or removed to avoid moisture buildup.

*Defrost uncooked dough in the refrigerator so that thawing is even and dough remains cold.

Once frozen food is thawed, it is susceptible, as is all food, to bacteria and spoilage. When you have defrosted food for use, keep in mind the following:

*Thawed frozen food is more susceptible than fresh food. Remove only the amount needed from the freezer bag, remove air, reseal and return remaining food to the freezer.

*Never thaw foods at or above room temperature; food spoilage bacteria multiply most rapidly at temperatures between 45 degrees F and 140 degrees F.

Disaster regs announced

The local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office announced the following information this week.

Legislation is pending that will allow for a 1993 disaster on all crops and vegetables. Listed below are provisions we have received in the office.

1. Benefits for 1993 crops that were totally lost. If you harvested part of your wheat crop we CANNOT take applications on the part lost. You must have had a total loss. (That may change and if it does we will let you know.)

2. Applications must be filed by August 1. Call and make an appointment as soon as possible. We believe that date will be extended but don't delay, call today.

3. The level of loss is 35% for producers with crop insurance and 40% for producers without crop insurance. This is like it has been during the last 2 disaster programs.

4. The payment rate continues to be 65% of the applicable basic payment rate for the crop.

5. At this time all we can do is take your application. We don't know when we will be authorized to make payments or how much they will be.

Let's just get the application filed.

6. If you had crop insurance be sure to bring your proof-of-loss sheet. We've got to have that to file your application.

7. If the crop is still in the field, cotton or grain sorghum, we will take application on those crops at a later date.

8. Also, under this pending legislation is quality adjustments for 1990, 91, 92, and 93. We do not know which crops this will apply to. If you harvested part or all of a crop you may want to bring in your weight tickets. We can, at least, file then with your application.

Note: Please make an appointment as soon as possible.

1994 Farm Program Notes

1. About all we know for sure is that there will be no setaside for wheat, oats, and barley. This is the same as last year.

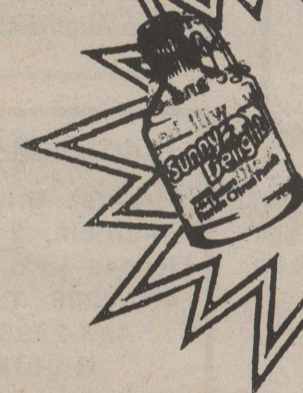

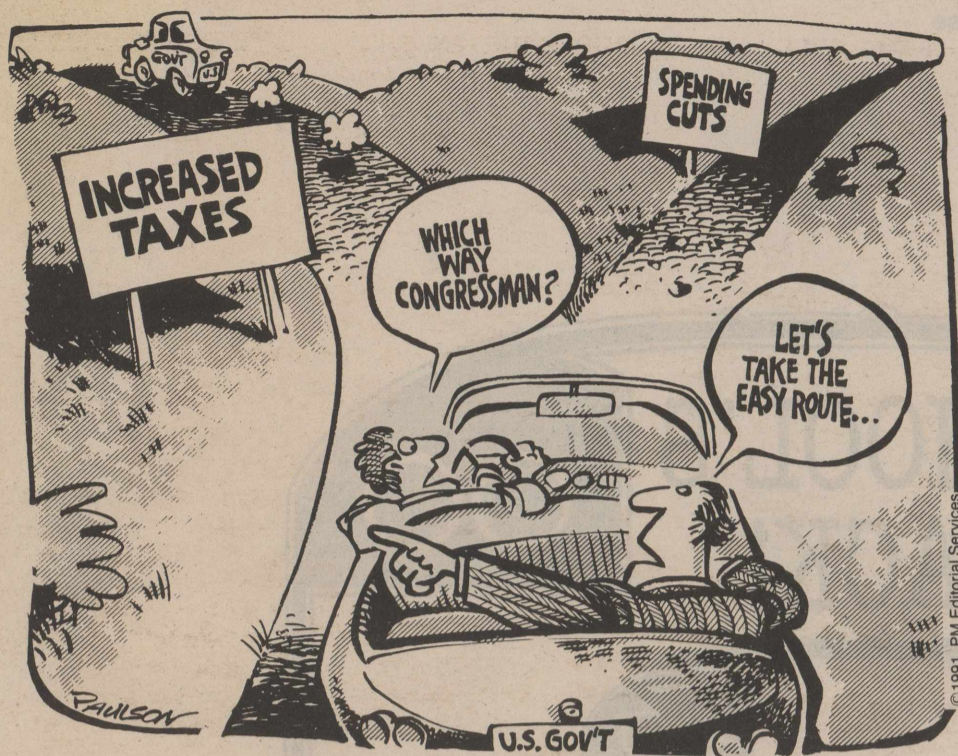

Curing Lice

A common problem among children is head lice, which can be spread unknowingly. "Although many people mistakenly associate head lice with unhygienic conditions among the poor, in reality they are seen in all social classes," said Charlotte Wheeler, R. N., C. I. C., infection control nurse at Methodist Hospital.

Kinds of Lice

There are many kinds of lice, but each kind feeds on a single kind of host. Human lice can establish and maintain themselves only on humans. There are three different kinds of human lice, but the most common is the head louse, *Pediculus humanus capitus*.

How Lice are Acquired

Lice are acquired through close, personal contact. They also can be acquired through sharing personal articles, such as hair accessories, hat, headband, and curlers. Lice do not survive for 48 hours away from the human body because they have to feed every three to six hours.

Symptoms

Head lice leave red spots that cause severe itching, which is the first major symptom. Most infestations are confined to the scalp hair, although sometimes the lice may be in the eyebrows and eyelashes. The lice are large enough to be seen, as are the nit (eggs) which appear as tiny whit sacs firmly glued to a hair shaft.

Best Cure

The lice are easily cured with a special shampoo which should be applied as directed. A second application may be needed in about 10 days to destroy the remaining lice. The nits should be combed out with a metal or fine-toothed comb. Bed clothing, caps, combs, brushes and other items should be washed in hot soapy water.

An encore presentation of Rehab's television special, "How Far Is Tomorrow?" also is slated to air on San Angelo's KLST-TV from 11:30 to 12:30 pm on Sunday (August 15). Featuring original script and songs by Denton writer Donna Trammell, the production focuses on the development of West Texas and ultimately WTRC.

The Rehab Center opened in temporary quarters in Abilene in 1953 and moved two years later into its first permanent building which today serves as the corporate offices. A second facility opened in San Angelo in 1977 following a merger of WTRC and the West Texas Therapy Center. San Angelo's present facility opened its doors in 1982.

For forty years, West Texas Rehab has provided out-patient treatment services to individuals without regard for age, race, origin or financial circumstances. The only time patients are charged is when special equipment such as braces or hearing aids are secured for the patient to own. Admission is by referral from a physician or approved agency such as a school, hospital or nursing home.

More than 175 trained, licensed professionals deliver quality care in physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech pathology, audiology, orthotics, industrial rehabilitation and support services to approximately 13,500 patients annually.

"Our anniversary theme, 'Legacy of Love' truly expresses what the Center, its mission and its supporters have in common...a 40 year commitment of providing help and hope for the disabled of all ages," Snowden said.
