HHS Science Department A Lasting and Growing Memorial

Thanks are due to each and every one who has had a part in the growth of the Haskell High School Science Department in the last year. Yet, it is in our power, as citizens to give additional support to this department and provide our youth in Haskell opportunities equal to those in any other community in our State.

Advantages in home and background will always vary from a distinct disadvantage to the spoiling abundance. As a Christian principle, it is only fair that each youth should have a chance to pursue, in his own school, knowledge. And this to the satisfaction of growing desire and will to learn. Those inspired to apply themselves in higher education must find their elementary school education a stable and qualified one on which to build.

There will always be those who lack either the desire or the opportunity to go further than a high school education. It is especially important that they take advantage of the variety and quality of courses offered. These high school years of learning will, in most cases, end their role as scholars. As they go to take their places in farm, business and home, their growth as citizens can only flourish into the channels in which their interests have been stirred and the spark of further knowledge lighted.

Men and women have gone from our county in the past to become citizens of admirable quality—such as missionaries, educators, medical specialists, varying types of business tycoons. It is also a blessing that young people still return here to add to their work, their knowledge, their lives, and their children to the community's growth.

Only as the young individual grows, each in his or her own varying type and degree of talent, and within the opportunities of a school equal to that of other schools in the state, can our community grow and hope to have future generations return and call Haskell their home.

No greater memorial would be desired by the late Dr. Ernest M. Kimbrough than to know that we here used his memory to bring about building for knowledge for the future, for your children, his, and mine.

The Miller Creek Project

Announcement last week that a part of the surveying work on the proposed Miller Creek Reservoir project had been completed comes as good news to those interested in Haskell's future water supply.

Considerable survey work remains to be done, including core testing of the reservoir site, before engineers can prepare accurate estimates as to the yield and cost of the project. However, a timetable projected by S. W. Freese, Fort Worth engineer, indicates that all data and information should be ready for presentation to the people in Haskell and other interested towns by the first of the year.

A decision then will be up to the citizens and homeowners in the seven towns comprising the North Central Water Authority, as to whether the Miller Creek Reservoir will become a reality as a municipal water source for the area it is designed to serve.

It might be well to point out here that the final decisions on the project will rest in the hands of homeowners and taxpayers in the towns involved, voting in separate elections.

Provision of an adequate supply of water for Haskell has become an absolute need in the past few years. Fortunately, the City Council has realized the fact that our underground sources of water are being rapidly depleted, and has lent all assistance possible to exploring the possibility of developing adequate surface supplies.

With our neighboring towns facing the same water shortage problems, uniting of the various towns in the proposed water district, which already has been given Legislative sanction, will provide a more economical solution than could be accomplished by each town trying to solve its municipal water problem independently.

Viewpoint of Others

Taken from the Wichita Falls Times: While most persons find it hard not to sympathize with persons on a fixed salary, proponents of economy in government should, perhaps, take a look at the status of county finances.

Close on the heels of a substantial raise given to elected county officials, the report that the county is overspending its budget is in turn followed by a salary increase request by other county employees.

Nobody seems to be worried about where the extra money is going to come from for payment of this increased salary load. At least, nobody except the taxpayers.

Perhaps it would be rude to remind county officials that individuals who spend more money than they make soon find themselves in a spot from which it is hard to extricate themselves.

Also considered rude probably would be the statement that when elected officials hold a job long enough to feel they are entitled to a raise, the time has come for a re-evaluation of our system and, specifically, the recent change that causes them to be elected for four-year terms.

People, Places, and Things

This fellow Gordon Woods, Stamford football coach, is a man to our liking. Naturally, we admire him for his ability to take a bunch of good West Texas boys and develop a state champion football team.

But what we like most about Gordon Woods is his straightforward approach to the heart of any subject he discusses. And we believe that everyone who heard his talk at Rotary Club Thursday will agree that he takes a direct route in expressing his opinions.

For instance, when he mentioned the problem of alcoholism, Gordon Woods had no hesitancy in making his point clear with his blistering denunciation of Stamford's king-pin bootlegger whom he identified by name. The Cadillac-driving liquor vendor has been caught several times, in Haskell as well as Stamford. Punishment in each instance has been the equivalent of a slap on the wrist. "We talk about juvenile delinquency, when we'd better be concerned about adult delinquency," the football coach admonished. We got the idea Gordon meant what he said.

Major part of his talk was on football, which he termed "Democracy in action." He described boys who play football today as good, sound, solid Christian kids. Lacking those traits, they don't the moral fiber of to keep plugging when the going gets rough.

When you hear Gordon Woods talking football you realize his deepest interest is not the game itself, but in the boys who play it. They you understand why he is one of Texas' top-ranking coaches in high school football.

A suggestion: Why couldn't some civic organization sponsor a Town Hall Meeting on one of these slack summer afternoons? Arrange 10 or 15-minute talks by men like Gordon Woods and others from neighboring towns in a frank discussion of community needs and citizenship responsibilities. We have an idea our neighbors, not only Stamford, but in Weiner, Rule, and Rochester, could offer some concrete suggestions for improvement. Might step on our toes. Maybe that needs to be done.

Haskell Firemen Attend Training School at A&M

Two members of the Haskell Fire Department, Floyd (Satch) Lusk, city fireman, and James H. (Sonny) Reynolds, attended the Texas Firemen's Training School on the campus of Texas A&M last week.

Lusk enrolled in the Fire Marshals' course, while Reynolds took the advanced course for firemen.

A total of 1,200 students attended the school. They represented fire departments and safety divisions of cities, industries and military camps located throughout Texas and 20 other states.

The school is sponsored by the State Firemen's and Fire Marshals' Association and is conducted by the Engineering Extension Service of the Texas A&M College System.

In addition to the regular fire-fighting courses, special features of this year's school included training in radiation and radiological monitoring, rescue operations, and field demonstrations of the latest methods of fire control.

Basic courses in firefighting were given men attending the school for the first time, and advanced courses were conducted for experienced firefighters. Special courses were given for fire marshals, fire officers, fire department instructors, and military and industrial firemen.

One of Haskell's Oldest Houses Razed Last Week

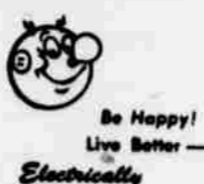
An early day Haskell residence, built about 70 years ago in what is now the 300 block on South Avenue F, was razed last week to make way for a new house to be built on the site.

According to Albert English, one of Haskell's senior citizens, the five-room house was built by the late Seet Cummings, early rancher who later moved to Southwest Texas. Mr. English believes the house was erected in 1887 or 1888, to make it one of the oldest structures in town. Another old-time house, known as the Granmother Posey home still remains in that area. It is located in the northwest part of the same block.

Workmen razing the old Cummings house found a rusted toy cap pistol, a replica of the six-shooter of the Old West. Mr. English thinks it might have belonged to one of the Cummings youngsters.

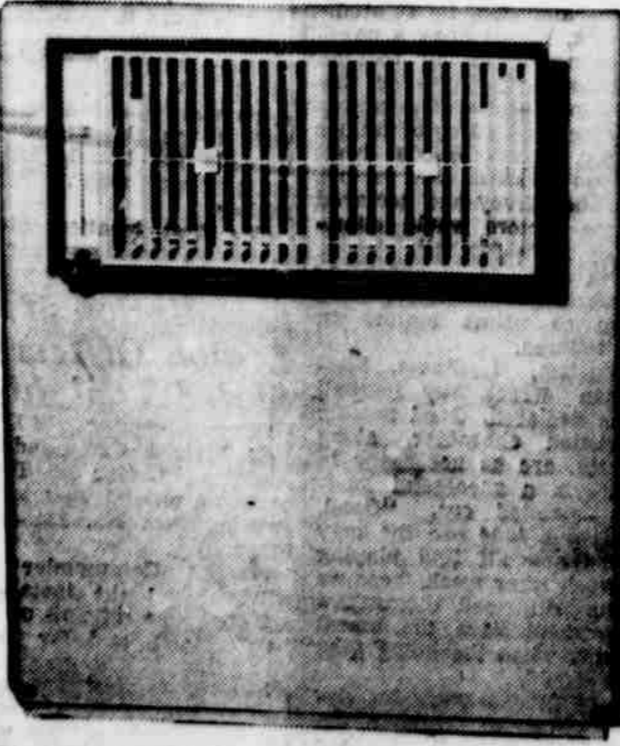
