Robert Lee, Texas, is the County Seat of Coke County. Robert Lee School began in 1891 held in a back room of a two story building at Hayrick. The school was later moved to Robert Lee.

Currently Robert Lee ISD is one of the largest employers in Robert Lee. Enrollment on the one and only school campus in town is 365 students in all classes Kindergarten through 12th grade.

The system is excellent because of good administration, teachers, and obedient students wanting to learn. The unique situation here is the eight sets of twins attending school, with a set graduating May 1993 and another set of preschoolers. (Total = 10 sets of twins).

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

*Youth development. The main goal of 4-H is youth development. The development of a 4-H boy or girl is more important than the development of a winning project.

*Dignity and value of work. By glorifying and glamorizing good work habits and the results of productive effort, the 4-H program helps instill constructive values and sound attitudes in the minds of young people.

Longhorns roll over Irion Co. Hornets

by Stover Taylor The Bronte Longhorns traveled to Mertzon Friday night to take on the Irion County Hornets. One of the few bright spots of the night for the Hornets was the crowning of the Homecoming Queen during the pregame ceremony. The maroon and white offensive machine scored 8 touchdowns of which two were called back. When the final buzzer had sounded the Longhorns had rolled up 359 yards rushing on 63 carries and 138 yards passing for a total of 497 yards for the night. The Longhorn defense was stingy about giving up real estate allowing 57 yards rushing on 19 carries and 84 yards passing. The

Hornets completed only 8 of 28 attempts. Leading the ground game was Gary Bilbrey with 218 yards on 32 carries and three touchdowns. Jacob Goalson has 73 yards on 10 carries and Jason Cooper had 53 carries on 10 carries and one touchdown. Cody Holland and Brent Taylor had one touchdown each. Rudy Sanchez kicked a 12 yard field goal, the first one of the season for the Longhorns. Jacob Goalson and Brent Taylor had touchdowns called back. The offensive line which consists of Jason Wilson, Jay Parker, Raymond Fuentes, Delvin Pierce, David Cason, Edwin Thomas and Todd Harrell did an outstanding job opening holes for the running backs.

In the 1st quarter the Hornets took the opening kick-off, unable to move the ball the Hornets punted to Brian Hall, the punt returner for the Longhorns. On the punt return effort, Brian suffered a broken arm. Brian is an exellent utility player, able to play several positions. We will miss his leadership on the field and we wish him a speedy recovery. The Longhorns took the ball on their own 30 yard line and eight plays later Gary Bilbrey scored on a nine yard run. On this drive Kale Beck caught a 27 yard pass. Bilbrey had 30 yards rushing and Cooper had 13 yards. The extra point attempt failed. The first quarter score was 7-0.

In the 2nd quarter the Longhorns marched 55 yards on 11 plays where Bilbrey took it in from 8 yards out. The two point conversion failed. The Hornets scored when one of the Longhorn defenders fell down. The touchdown came on a 24 yard pass play. The Longhorns took the kick-off and scored 8 plays later on a Brent Taylor one yard run. The 2-point conversion was good. The first half score was 20-7.

In the 3rd quarter the Longhorns took the opening kick-off and drove 65 yards in 8 plays when Gary Bilbrey scored his 3rd touchdown of the evening. The extra point was good. The Longhorns were penalized 35 yards on the next Hornet drive to aid their cause and they scored their second touchdown of the night. Jason Cooper blocked the extra point at-

tempt. On the next Longhorn possession a perfectly executed screen pass from Brent Taylor to Jason Cooper resulted in a 60 yard touchdown. The extra point attempt was good.

In the 4th quarter new faces appeared in the line-up. Cody Holland scored on a two yard run and Rudy Sanchez kicked his first field goal of the season. Jacob Goalson had a touchdown called back. The Hornets were not able to move the ball and the final score was 43 to 13.

The defensive line which consists of Rudy Sanchez, David Cason, Todd Harrell, Jacob Goalson, Jason Cooper, Darrell Sharpe, Cory Robinson, Kale Beck, Jason Wilson, Jay Parker and Brent Taylor did an outstanding job of shutting down the Hornets. These guys have only given up 20 points in four ballgames. The Menard Yellowjackets are coming to Bronte next Friday.

Br. School News

On Saturday, October 16, 1993, at 9:00 am, the new Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Program (PSAT/NMSQT) will be administered for the first time in high schools across the country. Like the old test, the new PSAT/NMSQT continues to measure verbal and mathematical reasoning abilities important to do college

The 1993 PSAT/NMSQT allows students to experience the changes to the new SAT which is referred to as SATI: Verbal and Math Reasoning Tests. The content of the new test reflects all the revisions to the SAT, including an overall effort to make the test questions more like classroom work. Tests are different - not harder.

All juniors have received their PSAT/NMSQT Bulletin which gives the students and parents information concerning the test. Parents will receive a letter highly recommending the students sign up and take the test. They will sign up in the office at the high school and pay their fees of \$7.50 to Bronte High School by Friday, October 8.

-Counselor's Comments-

by Vicky McCutchen Many parents who have children approaching their junior and senior years in high school begin to think about the postsecondary years. The fact is, students should begin to explore occupations and careers during their eighth grade year so that they will have some idea of what field they may want to major in for college during their junior and senior years. Many schools will administer an interest/aptitude inventory to help begin their exploration. These can be administered in 2 1/2 to 3 hours. The students will receive a copy of their results, the career area they are interested in, and what area they may be successful in. This is only for exploration because students will more than likely change throughout their high school years. The purpose is to get students to thinking and acting on future plans.

During the sophomore year in high school students need to sign up to take the PLAN, which is a pre-test for ACT (American College Testing program - college entrance exam). The purposes of this test are: 1.) to provide students with practice for college testing; 2.) career planning (an interest inventory is provided); and 3.) provide students with information that will be a good predictor of future success in high school and college. During the junior year in high school students should sign up at their school to take the PSAT/NMSQT. This is the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test and has four basic purposes: 1.) provides practice for SAT (college entrance exam); 2.) helps students to find out about developed reasoning abilities; 3.) gives students an opportunity to qualify for national scholarships; and 4.) to obtain information from col-

The key to success on college entrance exams and scholarship opportunities are the four years in high school. These four years are designed to prepare students for college, and by taking the more challenging courses in high school, students will be more likely to succeed in college and on college entrance exams. Colleges require certain scores on ACT or SAT according to the students class rank in high school.

Diabetes Update

For decades people with diabetes became blind from diabetic retinopathy. Not only is treatment available for this leading cause of blindness, a recent analysis shows current treatments are even more effective in preventing blindness than previously thought. A commentary in the Journal of the American Medical Association by Dr. Frederick Ferris, of the National Eye Institute, notes that without treatment, more than fifty percent of patients with proliferative diabetic retinopathy were legally blind in five years. With treatment, less than five percent were legally blind in five years, and only one percent had severe vision loss. Dr. Ferris says results of several studies demonstrate the marked reduction in blindness from using current treatments for diabetic retinopathy. He notes that a number of programs have been developed to ensure that all people with diabetes are examined for diabetic retinopathy and assure adequate treatment for all who need it. With that. Dr. Ferris says, it is a tragedy that people may still suffer preventable blindness.





Judge proclaims Fire Prevention Week

County Judge Royce Lee has proclaimed the week of October 3-9, 1993 as FIRE PREVENTION WEEK in Coke County.

The Coke County Farm Bureau, in conjunction with all fire departments in the country are working together to emphasize fire prevention and protection throughout the county.

Fire Prevention Week is always Sunday-Saturday period in which falls October 9, date of the Great Chicago Fire of 1871. The Chicago disaster killed 250 people and destroyed more than 17,400 buildings.

In this proclamation, Judge Lee has called upon the citizens of Coke County to participate in Fire Prevention Week activities such as locating and eliminating fire hazards; developing a home escape plan; and as a 1993 theme suggests --- "Get Out, Stay Out! Your Fire Safe Response".

Robert M. Brown, President of Coke County Farm Bureau said, "Fire is both friend and foe. We can't live without it, but its destructive power is a threat we must control." Protect yourself by keeping fire a

*Regularly inspect your house and out-buildings for fire hazards. Check the electrical system, electrical appliances and equipment, fuel storage, heaters and heating systems. Make needed repairs or replacements without delay. Don't overload circuits or bypass fuses/breakers.

*Remove trash, stacks of paper and other unneeded combustibles that could feed

*Read and follow instructions with portable heaters. Place them where they won't ignite combustibles or be tipped over. Never use gasoline in a kerosene heater, and make certain gasoline and kerosene containers are clearly marked to avoid a mixup. Never use a kerosene or gas-fired heater in a closed area - have ample ventilation. Be certain you use the correct grade of fuel for your portable heating equipment.

*Check your heating system prior to the heating season. Install and use wood-burning stoves as directed in the manuals or other literature. Screen fireplaces. Keep chimneys and flues free of obstructions and creosote

*Keep matches and lighters out of children's reach.

*Consider installing a sprinkler system in all new construction.

Health News

Margarine

Once again the facts on margarine have changed. The U. S. Food and Drug Administration recently released a report which did not flatter margarine. The report stated that the trans-fatty acids in margarine are similar to the saturated fats in butter in raising total blood cholesterol levels and, in some cases, lowering blood levels of HDL, or "the good cholesterol". What Are Trans-fatty Acids?

According to Kelli Cochran, R. D., dietician at Methodist Hospital, trans-fatty acids are the result of "hydrogenation," which is the process of adding hydrogen molecules to a liquid fat to make it semi-solid and spreadable.

Hydrogenation is used in packaged cookies, crackers and snacks to help make them

crispier. Hydrogenation also is used to prevent a bad smell and taste that some cooking oils give off.

Tips to Cut Down on Fat

"Even though we receive updated information each day, the one message that has remained constant is that you should restrict fat in your diet," Cochran said.

Here are some helpful hints:
*Whether you use butter or
margarine, use as little as
possible.


*Choose a soft tub margarine instead of a stick margarine.

*Try using olive oil instead of butter or margarine as a spread for butter.

*Look for low-fat or no-fat cookies and crackers.

*Watch for the works "hydrogenated" and "partially-hydrogenated" on food labels.





Teach Latchkey Kids **About Food Safety**

Millions of youngsters who will be on their own at home after school this year could benefit from a few food safety rules to prevent foodborne ill-

Children usually prepare their own snacks when they return from school. Parents can help prevent foodborne illness by reviewing the following list with children.

*Deposit books and book bags somewhere besides the kitchen. They can harbor many harmful germs.

*Throw away any left-over perishable foods brought home from a carried lunch. An exception to this might be unopened cans of foods that are self stable and do not require refrigeration, such as canned fruits and canned

*Always wash hands before touching food.

*Use only clean utensils.

*Keep cold foods refrigerated. Always put milk, meat, cheese, etc. back in the refrigerator immediately and be sure that refrigerator door is closed tightly. Take out only what you plan to eat and refrigerate leftovers from any cans that you open.

*Do not eat any food that looks or smells "funny".

*If you are going to allow children to use a microwave, or any appliance for that matter, teach them to use it safely. Teach them to always use potholders and warn them

Calling Procedure

Beginning October 15, 1993, all long-distance telephone calls placed within the "817" area code should be dialed 1+817+ the number, or 0+817+the number, even though the long-distance call is placed within the 817 area. Calls made without using the 817 area code will still be placed correctly until January 19, 1994, when all long-distance calls within the 817 area code must include "817" However, callers are encouraged to begin dialing 817 beginning October 15, 1993.

In the past, customers who called long distance within the 512 area code didn't have to dial 817. But with the increased demand for more telephone numbers due to cellular phones, computer modems, facsimile machines and data transmission lines, telephone companies were close to running out of available telephone numbers in the 817 area code.

By dialing the area code for all long-distance calls, it allows telephone companies to assign a series of phone numbers that telephone equipment previously recognized as area codes. These new phone numbers will have prefixes (the first three numbers of the seven-digit phone number) that, previously, telephone companies could not use because the equipment didn't recognize

The new prefixes will have a "0" or "1" as the middle num-

This dialing change may affect programmed features such as Speed Calling or Call Forwarding, and some telecommunications equipment such as coin-operated phones and PABXs may need to be reprogrammed.



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
