Gaines could renew suit against officials

Two Texas Tech athletic officials may face individual lawsuits if former Tech defensive tackle Stephen Gaines can prove a legitimate cause of action within 20 days.

Gaines, who played for the Red Raiders in the 1990, 1992 and 1993 seasons, filed a federal lawsuit in February against the university, football coach Spike Dykes, assistant coach Rhudy Maskew and former

Gaines' lawsuit against Tech was dismissed Monday by U.S. District Judge Stanley A. Fitzwater, who ruled that the university is immune from the lawsuit under the 11th Amendment, which protects states from being sued unless the state willingly waives its rights or Congress voids the state's immunity.

Tech is considered an arm of the state because it is a publicly funded institution and therefore is protected under the 11th Amendment immunity clause, said Tech Legal Counsel and Vice Chancellor Pat Campbell.

Fitzwater also ruled that the lawsuit against Dykes, Maskew and Reeger failed to show a legitimate cause of action. Gaines filed his lawsuit under the Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations Act, which requires the plaintiff to prove damage to business or property.

According to Fitzwater's ruling, personal injury and loss of educational opportunities are not compensable under the RICO Act.

Gaines has 20 days to amend his complaint — if the revised complaint is deemed legitimate, Dykes, Maskew and Reeger would face individual lawsuits.

Dykes, Maskew and Reeger could not be reached for comment Thursday. However, Campbell expressed doubt that the complaint could be adequately amended.

"I don't think he's ever had a legitimate lawsuit," Campbell said. "The law has been clear since he filed the lawsuit that it wasn't a meritorious lawsuit."

In his complaint, Gaines accused the university of violating 10 NCAA bylaws, improperly using university

funds, failing to enforce class attendance policies and misdiagnosing a knee injury that eventually caused Gaines to lose a professional football contract.

"Stephen was induced to attend Texas Tech at the age of 17 by Spike Dykes and other coaches and was promised that he would be given a good education and an opportunity to play in the NFL," Christopher Kalis, the Dallas attorney representing Gaines, said in a

Family sues Tech, LISD for pool-related death

Texas Tech Student Recreation Center officials would not comment on a suit filed May 16 in the 72nd District Court involving a May 22, 1995, near drowning in the aquatic center swimming pool.

Joe MacLean, director of the Student Recreation Center, said he could not comment on the situation because the case is pending.

The suit was filed by John Williams Sr., pastor of Wesley Memorial Church, who alleges that Tech and the Lubbock Independent School District were negligent when his son, John Williams Jr., nearly drowned in the aquatic center pool at the Alderson Junior High All-School spring party, sponsored by the AJH student council. Williams

Jr. later died from complications.

Williams Sr. said he believes his son, a special education student, had no business swimming in the pool, much less jumping off the diving board into the deep end of the pool.

Williams Sr. said he did not sign a permission slip for his son to attend the event or to swim. Although the death was listed as an accident on the autopsy report, Williams Sr. said he believes foul play was involved by the staff present at the time of the incident.

"You have to rely on witnesses to consider it an accident," Williams Sr. said.

Richard Azbill, chief forensic supervisor at University Medical Center, said a Justice of the Peace must determine if the death

SPOTLIGHT on Capitol

Austin (AP) — After a career spanning four decades in which he forged a reputation as the most powerful person in Texas politics, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock said Thursday he won't run for re-election.

Instead, the veteran Democrat said, he wants to focus on his family and friends.

The announcement — made before an overflow crowd behind the Senate chamber where he has presided since 1991 — marks the beginning of the end of a political journey that Bullock began 40 years ago with a two-year term in the state House.

In that time, Bullock made his mark on major state policy from managing water resources to funding education to preserving Texas history.

He is legendary for his personal exploits, ability to work his will in politics and government and his love for his home state of Texas.

previous interview with The University Daily. "They couldn't do that, and that is fraud."

According to Fitzwater's ruling, Gaines must reimburse Tech, Dykes, Maskew and Reeger for all taxable court costs they incurred. Tech had

not received any reimbursement as of Thursday afternoon, Campbell

The Dallas-based Vinson & Elkins law firm, from which Tech hired legal representation for the case, notified university officials of Fitzwater's decision Tuesday.

"Of course we were pleased there's always a concern that it would go to court," said Tech Athletic Director Gerald Myers. "We had no idea when the decision would be made, so we were surprised when we found out, but I wasn't necessarily surprised about the outcome."

Gaines probably has the option of appealing Fitzwater's decision regarding Tech's immunity, Campbell said.

Kalis and Gaines were not available for comment Thursday evening.

Reeger resignation still stands

Although allegations against Ronn Reeger concerning former Texas Tech football player Stephen Gaines were dropped Wednesday, his resignation from the athletic department still stands.

Reeger, former athletic events manager, left Tech to pursue a private business in Lubbock, said Sports Information Director Richard Kilwien. May 30 was Reeger's last day of employment at Tech.

Gaines accused Reeger of giving him answers to a final examination in Bible 1133 (Old Testament Survey), a correspondence course at Southeastern College of the Assemblies of God in Lakeland, Fla., and arranging Gaines' class loads.

At that time, Reeger was serving as interim academic services director in the athletic department.

Kilwien said athletic officials are not rushing to find a replace-

ment for Reeger. "It is summer, and there's not a whole lot going now," Kilwien said.

Reeger The athletic department is looking within their office first to find qualified people. said Associate Athletic Director Ron Damron.

However, Reeger's resignation was not related to the re-organization efforts being made by the department, nor was it suggested he leave Tech, Damron said.

"It was purely his own decision as far as I know," he said.

Reeger did not return telephone calls from The University Daily.

"I don't think he wants to talk to anyone right now," said Cathy Reeger, Ronn Reeger's wife.

The NCAA would not comment on Reeger's resignation or the investigation into Tech's football and basketball programs.

IRS punished by court for conduct

DENVER (AP) — In hindsight, insulting the IRS agent during an audit was probably not a good idea.

But Carole Ward let it fly with this gem: "Honey, from what I can see of your accounting skills, the country would be better served if you were dishing up chicken-fried steak on some interstate in West Texas, with all the clunky jewelry and big hair."

A short time later, federal agents raided her son's business and then released confidential information about her taxes to the media in what Ward called "character assassination."

This week, a federal judge reprimanded the IRS for its actions and awarded the woman about \$325,000 in damages and attorney's fees.

"By this award, this court gives notice to the IRS that reprehensible abuse of authority by one of its employees cannot and will not be tolerated," U.S. District Judge

William Downes said after the non-jury trial. "Part of that responsibility requires that you accept criticism, however inaccurate and/ or unjustified, in silence."


Ward, 49, said she is not proud of what she said to auditor Paula Dzierzanowski during the 1993 audit. The meeting was one of several regarding income taxes owed by the children's clothing stores owned by her son, Tristan, then 20.

Two weeks later, IRS agents seized and padlocked the stores with a so-called jeopardy assessment demanding \$325,000 in back taxes from Ward. Such an order is considered extreme and is normally used when the IRS fears it is in danger of never collecting the taxes, said Ward's attorney, William C. Waller.

Ward's family depended on the stores as their sole source of income, and the seizure put them in desperate straits. She said her family even lost their electricity because they were unable to pay their bills.

Why the IRS targeted Ward rather than her son is unclear, said another of her attorneys, Dennis Mark.

"They took the position that Carol Ward owned the stores," Mark said.


