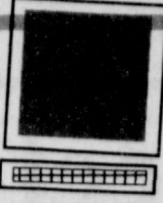
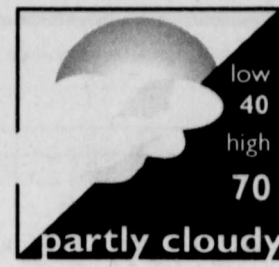

Tech's fund raising similar to others

Texas Tech is just now beginning to measure up to the capital campaigns of Texas A&M University and the University of Texas.

A&M raised \$637 million during their 1990 to 1996 Capturing the Spirit Capital Campaign, and UT began their first comprehensive campaign in 1997 and already has raised about \$180 million. Tech, in its pursuit of \$300 million, has reached more than half at about \$168 million.

Pat Clubb, associate vice president for development at the University of Texas,

said UT has set an unofficial goal of collecting \$1 billion during a course of seven years.

The campaign will stress major areas for the enhancement of faculty, students, programatics and buildings, Clubb said. Tech also plans to allocate \$100 million for faculty enhancement, \$100 million for student enhancement, \$80 million capital funds and \$20 million for annual funding.

A&M allocated \$112 million for student support, \$46 million for faculty support, \$271 million for program support, \$118 million for research enhancements, \$58 million of gifts-in-kind of personal property and \$32 million for building

projects.

Clubb said UT's campaign is in its silent phase, but already has received a lot of support.

"Our major donors come from our alumni base, but we do have several large donations given by individuals," Clubb said.

UT's whole campaign is run out of their campus office with regional campaign and college officers traveling to seek donors.

Clubb did not have a total of professionals working on the campaign, but she said there are about 100 employees, both staffers and employees.

Tech's Horizon Capital Campaign em-

ploy about 55 to 60 people. About 25 are professional staff.

Rhonda Johnson, vice chancellor for institutional development, recently said there were only three workers in the development offices when she came.

"All I've been doing is hiring staff and getting things together," she said. "The infrastructure wasn't here. It's like starting up a business."

No one will be out of a job when the campaign is over, she said. Staff people were hired through advertisements in various publications, and many will go on to other campaigns, but development officers will stay.

Council approves program details

Students entering Texas Tech's new joint MD/MBA degree program will have to take the MCAT and meet the medical school's admission requirements, according to the graduate council at its Thursday meeting.

Until now, all students entering any graduate program, including MBA students, had to take the GRE and will involve 10 to 20 students.

Grant Savage, associate professor of management and director of the Ph.D. and MBA program in health organization management, said the program will be under way this summer

demical medical community is that they had lost a lot of autonomy — that they are at the mercy of the purchasers of care rather being able to control quality,” he said.

There are 15 to 20 other universities around the country with joint MD/MBA degree programs that take five to six years to complete and only have five or six students, Savage said.

“We are the second university in the U.S. to launch, basically a con-

current four-year degree making it possibly for them to take two degrees and complete them in four years and one summer,” he said.

Don Rude, a professor of English at Tech and a member of the graduate council, said other univer-

sities offer medical programs jointly with other fields such as engineering and law.

“I think we should adopt this proposal, because it would attract a higher caliber of student to the medical school,” he said. “This is the wave of the future. It's a cutting-edge program.”

Other items on the council's agenda included a criteria change for membership to philosophy graduate faculty, which was approved.

Texas Democratic Party chairman undecided on run

HOUSTON (AP) — A top state Democratic Party official says Chairman Bill White is undecided on whether to continue in the job after his current two-year term expires in June.

Jorge Ramirez, the party's executive director, said Thursday that White is weighing his party leadership role against the demands of his family and business.

“He's looking for the best way to continue to be involved in public service,” Ramirez said. “I think it's both his family life and how best to continue to be effective and involved in public service.”

White could not be reached for comment by *The Associated Press* Thursday. *The Houston Chronicle* quoted Democratic sources as saying White might announce his resignation as early as the April 25 meeting of the State Democratic Executive Committee meeting.

The SDEC could then elect a state party chairman to serve until the state convention in June.



Several party leaders say White is being urged to stay on unless a consensus can be reached on who would replace him.

“To change now would not be good for the party,” Democratic national committeeman Ed Miller of Texas said. “If there is not a consensus ... the last thing we need is dissension at the convention over his replacement.”

Several other party leaders also said they hope White doesn't quit before his term is complete.

“I really would like to see him stay out his term,” said Billie Carr, a Democratic national committeewoman. “It would hurt to see him leave in an election year.”

Nancy Brannon, the party's vice chairman for finance, and Walter Hinojosa, the secretary for the state Democratic Party, also said they hope White can be persuaded not to quit early.

U.S. House approves funds for Tech road

■ School gains millions for boulevard

The U.S. House approved \$9.6 million in federal highway funds for the new Texas Tech University Boulevard Wednesday.

The proposed boulevard will reroute Indiana Avenue through the western part of campus.

The funding was part of \$26 million U.S. Rep. Larry Combest, R-Lubbock, requested for the Lubbock area. The remaining \$16.4 million will go to Lubbock's East-West Freeway project.

The new Texas Tech University Boulevard will divert traffic from the center areas of campus and allow quicker ac-

cess to the loop and University Medical Center's emergency room, said John Opperman, Tech's vice chancellor for administration and finance.

Keith Williams, Combest's press secretary, said Tech officials made an excellent pitch for the funding and proved they had a well-thought-out plan.

Texas residents will be closer to their fair share of federal highway dollars if the new construction projects in the transportation bill pass through the conference committee. Right now, 76 cents of every dollar Texans spend on gasoline tax is spent on Texas roads. These new projects, along with others throughout the state, will bring that number up to 90 cents.

Washington D.C. will get back \$3.15

for every tax dollar, while Alaska will get more than \$2.

While cases can be made for states with traffic problems or lack of good highways to receive more funding, Texas is looking for more equity in the funding process, Williams said.

The bill, which contains a total of \$437.6 million for highway projects nationwide, passed the Senate earlier this month. The Senate's version does not contain the Lubbock projects, but Williams said he expects them to be added in the conference committee.

The president must sign the bill before the government's authority to spend highway funds runs out May 1, unless Congress grants an extension.

Starr under growing pressure to wrap investigation up

WASHINGTON (AP) — Under growing pressure after the Paula Jones ruling, Whitewater prosecutor Kenneth Starr said Thursday the refusal of some grand jury witnesses to cooperate is delaying completion of his criminal investigation of the Clintons.

He also said the judge's decision throwing

out Jones' lawsuit does not weaken his investigation.

“In that civil case, you cannot defile the temple of justice ... through ... subornation of perjury, intimidation of witnesses and obstruction of justice,” Starr told reporters. He added that he hopes no such criminal acts were com-

mitted, but said he will continue to gather the facts.

“It will do nothing to Ken Starr,” Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott of Mississippi said of the Jones case dismissal. “This won't affect his case. I think there has been pressure on him to get to a conclusion.”

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Religious sect looks to relocate

OLCOTT, N.Y. (AP) — The leader of a Taiwanese religious sect looking to relocate his church along the shores of one of the Great Lakes has been scouting out waterside communities along Lake Ontario.

Teacher Chen Hon-Ming, who caused a national stir when he predicted God would appear on a Texas cable television station last week, said God smiled on him and eight followers upon their arrival in the lakeside hamlet of Olcott Wednesday.

After dancing on a bluff overlooking the lake, a thin white cloak of fog that had rolled in began to lift.

The group believes God has arrived and is using the Great Lakes as a repository, or classroom, for souls.

"This is the inauguration of the training of people's souls on the American continent so that they can adapt themselves to the future of life in God's eternal kingdom," Teacher Chen told The Buffalo News.

He said the world is on the verge of a nuclear holocaust that will begin

when China and other Asian nations go to war.

For those who do not mend their ways, there will be chilling consequences, he said.

"The souls of evildoers will be transported to the North Pole following the Great Tribulation next year," he said.

The group looked at two houses for sale and asked area residents how much property was selling for Wednesday around Olcott, about 32 miles north of Buffalo.

Dressed all in white and wearing cowboy hats, the Taiwanese men drew curious stares from residents of this community best known for its annual Polar Bear swim.

Some wondered aloud whether they were witnessing an April Fools' Day prank.

"I think they're crazy," Emily Neidlinger told the Niagara Gazette.

"Yeah, I believe in God, but I just don't believe he's going to come to Olcott."

Rose Ann Thomas, manager of communications at Texas A&M Foundation, said there were about 24 professional staff during their campaign.

A&M operated from their university with college officers and had two regional offices, one in Houston and the other in Dallas, she said.

Tech's campaign consists of a campaign office, regional campaign offices, central development and senior development offices. The campaign also consists of a National Campaign Cabinet and a

steering committee, which are honorary positions.

Regional campaign offices are in Austin, Dallas and Fort Worth, East Texas, Houston and West Texas. Senior development officers have been dispersed throughout each college and school within Tech. The Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center and libraries also are represented. Tech's capital campaign extends to other university facilities in Amarillo and El Paso.

Each university's campaign has taken in the same type of gifts and donations, such as cash, real estate, gifts-in-kind, life insurance, bequests and trusts.

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IBM donates supercomputer

Texas Tech received a grant from IBM Thursday that will allow use of a new supercomputer and accompanying software.

The new IBM RS/600 SP Supercomputer, valued at \$484,373, was donated under provisions of an IBM Shared University Research Grant.

In addition, Tech's membership in the IBM Higher Education Software Consortium gives it the right to use associated software valued at more than \$730,000.

This grant is provided to IBM as part of the Software Engineering Research, Training and Education Center at Tech.

Bill Marcy, acting chairman for the computer science department, said standard personal computers use a serial computing system, which takes a problem and divides it into sequentially-solved chunks. The supercomputer uses a parallel system, in which the chunks of a problem are solved simultaneously.

Marcy said an equation that would take a regular Pentium computer 1,000 years to solve would take an IBM RS/6000 SP Supercomputer one second.

Kelly Hand, senior client representative for IBM West Texas, said the grant was given to facilitate high performance in parallel-computing.

Hand said the partnership with Tech was a tradition.

"We have partnered with Texas Tech University for many, many years and this is just a continuation of our partnership activities with Texas Tech," he said.

Marcy said the computer is a landmark for the university.

"This is an absolute first for Texas Tech University. It is the first super computer that Texas Tech has ever had available," he said.

"This is the best super computer in the world."

been proposed jointly by the College of Engineering and the College of Business Administration.

The super computer grant's approval passed partly because of an additional partnership with Phillips Petroleum that will provide a high-performance, AIX parallel-computing environment to the College of Engineering and the College of Business

Administration.

Engineering students will conduct research in parallel-computing applications, such as advanced three-dimensional reservoir modeling and visualization.

Business students will conduct research in high-performance parallel databases and enterprise engineering applications.

New website enhances job hunt for teachers

Students looking for teaching jobs after graduation now have a new resource for the job hunt: Teachers@work.

Teachers@work is an Internet website devoted to matching applicants for teaching jobs with openings suited for them.

When applicants go to the website, located at <http://www.teachersatwork.com>, they answer a detailed questionnaire. The website then takes applicants' answers and creates a resume which can be printed out.

The service is completely free for job applicants. Schools and school districts can post job listings online, and they can search the resumes for specific criteria. For instance, if a junior high school is looking for a biology teacher who also can coach track, they could search the database for a resume with those qualifications.

The service is free for schools for the first six months. After that, schools or school districts must pay a fee of \$100-\$300 to continue using the service.

Millionaire's daughter sentenced for murder

NEW YORK (AP) — The baby-faced teen-age daughter of a millionaire was sentenced to up to 10 years in prison Thursday for the stabbing death of a drinking buddy in Central Park.

Daphne Abdela, 15, pleaded guilty to manslaughter in the death of 44-year-old Michael McMorrow, a real estate salesman who was drinking in

the park with Abdela and her 15-year-old boyfriend, Christopher Vasquez.

Vasquez is awaiting trial on murder charges.

McMorrow's body was dumped in a lake in the park last May. His head was nearly severed, his belly was gashed open and his hands were all but chopped off to make it difficult to identify him by fingerprints.

Senators not above discrimination

To the Editor: March 27, this newspaper featured the upheld GLBSA (Gay/Lesbian/Bi-Sexual Students Association) funding as its foremost front-page news story. For this choice in coverage of the issues at hand, I applaud the staff that puts together this paper.

However, in regards to the senators and other persons responsible, whatever position they may hold in the Student Senate, as named; Matt Schaefer and Matt Foster, I must address their legislative attitudes and behaviors as directed toward the GLBSA.

Perhaps students and student senators here at Texas Tech have come to the conclusion that organizations such as GLBSA are unfit for campus funding. Perhaps these same students believe such an organization represents something terrible and morally aberrant. Perhaps these same students would not find themselves interested in becoming members of such a student organization. Is this the issue here? Absolutely not.

The issue is not whether a few, or even more than a few, student senators deem such an organization as one that they might likely consider joining now or in the future. The issue is one of a few student senators deciding on behalf of all students at this university that GLBSA will not receive adequate funding for its proposed student enrichment events on the basis of a moral stigmatism.

I do not recall signing anything stating the GLBSA should not receive funding. I do not recall anyone asking me for my opinion, or my vote on

the matter. There are perhaps reasons for this, too. One of which might include that such a methodical attempt to discriminate against a group of students on this or any other campus under the protection of laws and the Constitution of these United States would be considered in direct violation of their civil rights. For that matter, my civil rights, given that we all share the same rights equality even in the late 1990s, and such actions would clearly be noticed as a federal offense. And yet, these same few student senators instead have taken similar effective actions upon themselves towards the discrimination of Tech's GLBSA student organization without even so much as asking me for my opinion of their desire to do so. I find their actions intolerable, and I recommend that each one of these student senators responsible for the promotion of this discrimination have their names posted to a list that is addressed to the Dean of Students, whom I expect will consider expulsion as one of several disciplinary options to render against those student senators.

Discrimination itself is a form of harassment. Harassment, in any form, has absolutely no place upon the campus of this institution where I send my money every semester. Harassment in any form will not be tolerated in a civil society in which I am a citizen. The only thing that matters here is that you learn something that will help you to succeed in life and in the workplace.

Student organizations, all of them, have some integral components which support these goals. The number and diversity you will find upon inspection of every student organization here at Tech reflects the numbers and diversity found within the student body itself.

No one organization could ever reflect or represent the needs of the vast numbers and diversity found within the student body at Tech. It is for this reason that student organizations must strive to meet the needs of those members which they do attract. And every student organization has earned certain entitlements.

Discrimination against any one student organization threatens the security to those same entitlements granted to all other student organizations.

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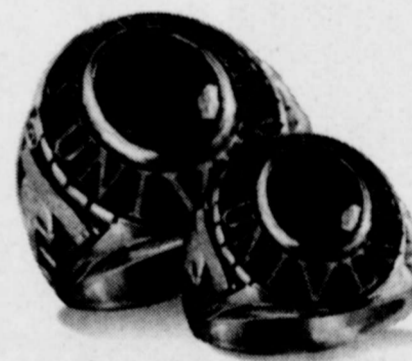

Oscars to get a permanent home on Hollywood Boulevard

LOS ANGELES (AP)—After 70 years of wandering between hotels, theaters and auditoriums, the Oscars are finally getting a permanent home.

The Motion Picture Academy and the city announced plans Thursday for a \$350 million complex in Hollywood. It will include a 3,300-seat theater that will be the site of the annual Academy Awards show starting in 2001.

"This is a historic day, the beginning of a new era in Hollywood history," said Robert Rehme, president of the academy.

The project will be on Hollywood Boulevard next to Mann's Chinese Theatre — formerly known as Grauman's Chinese Theatre, the place where stars have put their hands and feet in the wet concrete outside. Besides the theater, the project will include a ballroom, multiplex cinemas, restaurants and stores.

The academy invested no money in the new theater. The complex will be owned by the city, and the theater will be leased to the academy. A parking garage now stands on the site.

The project's planners hope to revitalize Hollywood, which has long been a seedy part of Los Angeles, full of cut-rate shops, empty stores, fast-food stands, runaways, hookers and drug dealers.

Most of the entertainment industry long ago moved to other parts of the city, and for decades tourists visiting the boulevard have been disappointed.

The first Oscars were presented at the Hollywood Roosevelt Hotel in 1929.

Over the years, the awards have been given out at such sites as the Ambassador and Biltmore hotels, Grauman's and the Santa Monica Civic Auditorium.

Saldivar was jealous and only looking for more money, so she had to kill the promising Tejano singer who soon would cross over into pop music.

Selena serves as a role model for a very broad group of people. She was very talented with a dynamic stage presence, but above all else she had a

sweet personality.

I will never pretend I listened to much of Selena's music. I never really heard much of her music before she died, and even if I did I probably did not know it was her.

After her death, Selena's music, her image and her life story was thrown in everyone's faces. Shrines were made, thousands of fans gathered to mourn her death and many people still consider her a legend.

The devotion of Selena's fans often is compared to the fanatical following of Elvis. But Selena's father recently said in an interview that it is different. He said that people remember Elvis for his music, but they remember Selena for her personality.

The almost unbelievable frenzy that fans have for Selena is astonishing.

There soon will be a museum opened in her honor, she has her own dolls that sell for \$20 up to \$60. There are T-shirts, keychains, caps, posters and mugs with Selena's face or her bold signature flashed across them. There also will be phone cards with her image on them to be sold at convenience stores soon. There is, of course, the movie and CDs, which grossed \$57 million in the United States.

For a long time, I was just like most people. I groaned every time I heard anything about Selena. I always thought enough was enough. But now I wonder — how could someone who has touched so many lives and serves as a role model for so many young people be all that bad?

Only McCullar and Alexander were not already listed as starters.

The majority of attention will be aimed toward quarterbacks Rob Peters and Matt Tittle. The two are considered the leading candidates to replace the departed Zebbie Lethridge

as the starting signal-caller. Peters is considered the frontrunner, while Tittle appears to have an advantage for the backup position over redshirt freshman Jamaal Crisp because of his familiarity with the offense.

"It's been good competition this spring," offensive coordinator Rick Dykes said. "The guys have shown some promise. We'll be looking forward to how they perform Saturday."

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Red Raider tennis hits the road

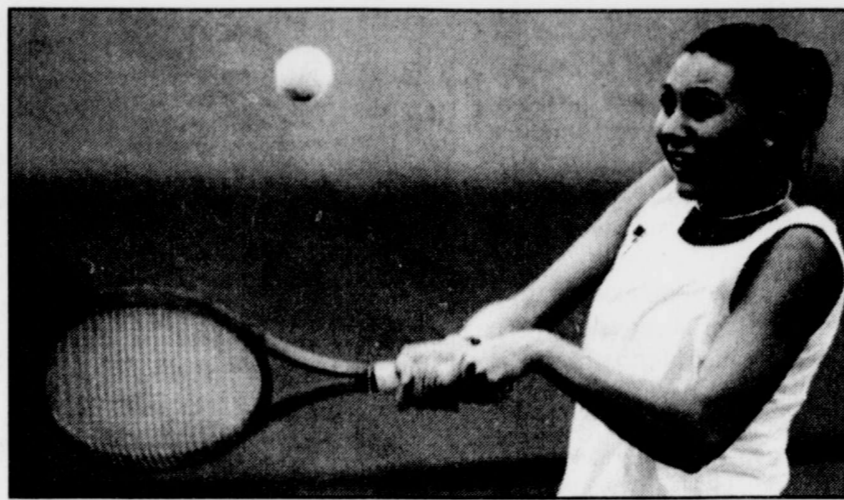

"The loss to SMU was very upsetting to the team," Dailey said of the 5-4 loss to the Mustangs. "It was probably our worst loss of the year because we lost to a team that was inferior to us."

"We are struggling a bit, but the team is learning as we go."

After opening the season 6-1 overall, Tech has dropped six of eight matches. One factor contributing to the inconsistent play has been the high number of injuries sustained by Tech, the nation's No. 66-ranked team.

The announcement followed nearly a month of controversy surrounding the Longhorn basketball program. University officials have been conducting an investigation over the past two weeks into the release of basketball player Luke Axtell's academic progress report to a radio station.

"Coaching has a rhythm to it and we seemed to lose ours," said a high-ranking UT source, speaking on the condition of anonymity. "I think Tom and the university are doing the right thing. It will be a new start for the program, and I'm sure Tom will land on his feet very quickly."

UT's vice provost and counsel to the president, Patricia Ohlendorf, conducted the investigation. She said the university would take "appropriate disciplinary action" against assistant coach Eddie Oran, who acknowledged faxing Axtell's grades to the radio station.

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Red Raiders ready to tame Tigers in Big 12 series

The Texas Tech baseball team is poised to vault back into the hunt for the Big 12 championship this weekend.

The Red Raiders play a three-game set against the Missouri Tigers beginning at 7 p.m. today at Dan Law Field in Lubbock. The games Saturday and Sunday will both start at 2 p.m.

The No. 20 Red Raiders (23-11 overall, 6-5 Big 12) likely will throw pitcher Shane Wright tonight. Wright is 6-1 this season with a team-best 2.71 ERA.

Saturday and Sunday, the Red Raiders probably will throw Monty Ward and Jesse Cornejo.

The series is important for Tech because the Tigers are one of four Big 12 teams with a better conference record. Missouri (19-6 overall, 4-2 Big 12) is in third place, a half game above the fifth-place Red Raiders.

"It's a chance for us to make up ground," Tech second baseman Kevin Jordan said. "It's getting to the home stretch of conference play. So these games are big."

Jordan is the Red Raiders' hottest hitter coming into April.

He is coming off his best game, going 4-for-5 with a home run and seven RBI's in Tuesday's 17-2 win over College of the Southwest. In March, Jordan raised his average from .222 to .348.

Red Raider coach Larry Hays moved him into the clean-up spot in the batting order. His eight home runs in the month gave him a team-high 10 for the season.

"I felt like I was hitting it well the whole time," Jordan said. "But lately, they have just been finding some holes. It feels good to have some success."

Hays appears finally to have settled on his defensive alignments. Senior Keith Ginter looks to have

found a home at third base after being a designated hitter and second baseman earlier this year. Tech previously used a rotation of Jason Huth, Brennan Burns and Jordan at third.

Burns, who has a 19-game hitting streak, is now the designated hitter in the three hole.

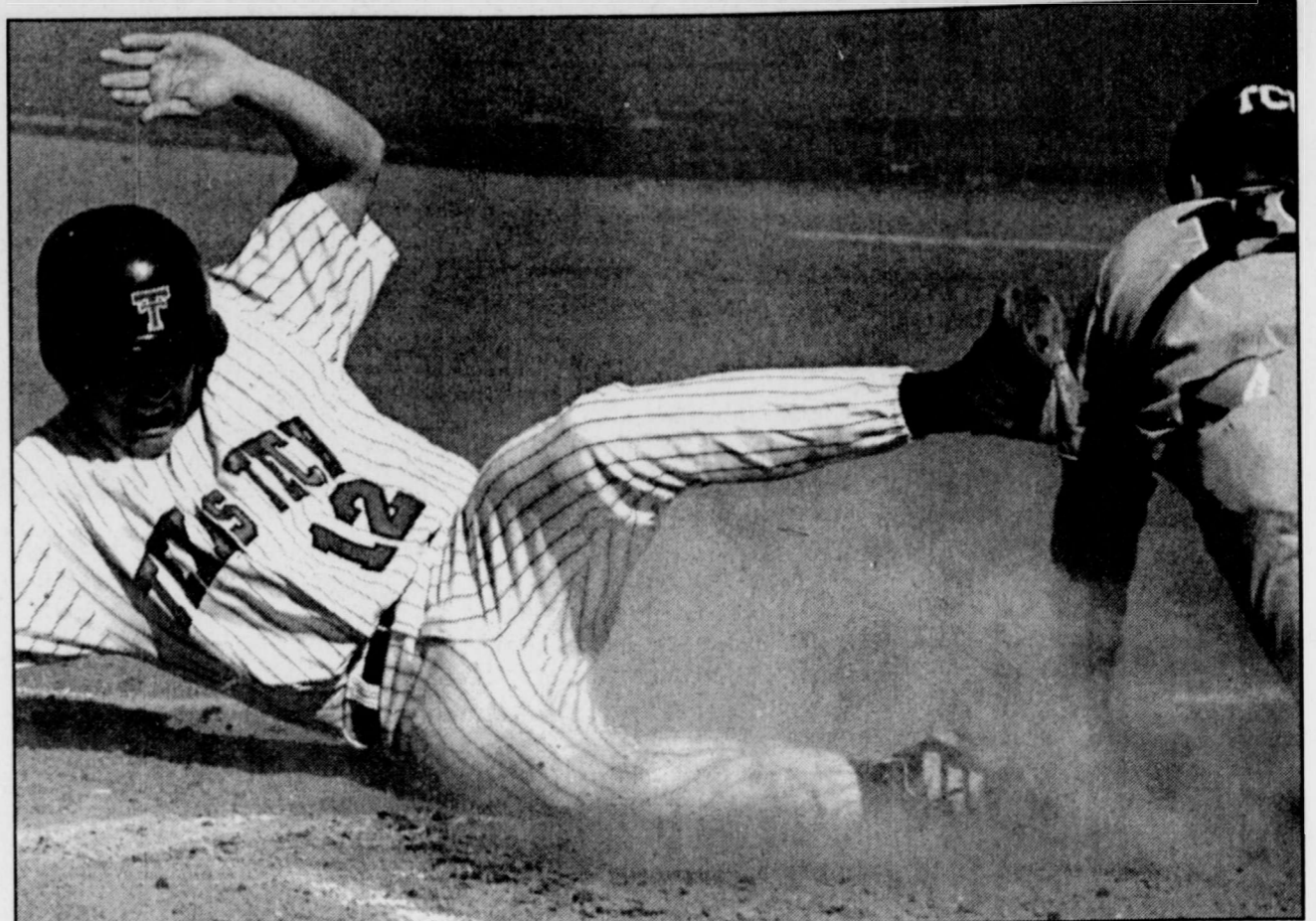
Huth looks to be the most comfortable Tech player at shortstop. Tuesday, he committed his first error in 75 fielding attempts, more than 18 games at shortstop.

"We have some guys that have stepped up and played well," Hays said. "Jason (Huth) has given us some stability in the middle of our defense. That has helped quite a bit."

For the Red Raiders, this three-game series with Missouri is crucial because their next nine conference games are on the road against Kansas, Iowa State and Nebraska. However, those three teams are a combined 5-12 in Big 12 play.

"We have a chance to make a move forward here in the next several weeks," Hays said. "I think everyone is still going to lose some games. So, we are not out of the race for first by any means."

The Red Raiders are three games behind Baylor in first place. Tech also trails Texas A&M by two games for second place. Both the Aggies and Bears took 2-of-3 against Tech ear-

lier this season. Tech's biggest concern will be in middle relief. After losing Steve Watkins (2-0, 3.26 ERA) to suspension earlier this week, the Red Raid-

ers are down to just three reliable middle relievers and Brad Ralston as the closer.

In the event of a starting pitcher leaving the game early, Hays said ex-

tended relief will be a big concern. "Losing Steve hurts us," Hays said. "He was very important to us. Guys are going to need to step up and provide some big innings for us."
