### 'Give me five' indicators help to expedite stroke care

Five words-walk, talk, reach, see, feel-can help others to ascertain if a person might be having a stroke.

"This 'Give Me Five' test can aid in recognizing stroke symptoms, which can help get the person to treatment sooner and reduce the effects of the stroke," says Dr. Mark Johnson, a neurologist and stroke specialist at UT Southwestern Medical Center.

The test is:

•Walk: Is the person's balance off kilter?

•Talk: Has speech become slurred, or is the person's face drooning on one side?

•Reach: Is one side of the body weak or numb?

•See: Is vision partially or completely lost?

•Feel: Is there a severe headache?

If any of these symptoms are occurring, call 911 immediately, Dr. Johnson says. Certain drugs can limit the damage from a stroke, but only if they are administered quickly.



#### **Governor: Texas cannot** commit to funding highrisk health care pool

AUSTIN-The Patient Protection & Affordable Care Act, signed into law by President Obama on March 23, requires states to establish within 90 days "high risk pools" for people with a preexisting medical condition who have been uninsured for at least 6 months when they apply.

The pools would allow enrollees to pay standard market premium rates with their coverage not subject to any preexisting condition exclusion.

But on April 30, Gov. Rick Perry sent a letter to U.S. Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius notifying her that the state of Texas cannot commit to operating "a new temporary high-risk pool program due to the lack of program rules or reliable federal funding."

"I do not believe the aggressive implementation and the lack of assurances on financial solvency of the program are in the best interest of Texas taxpayers, families, patients or health care providers," Perry wrote.

The governor expressed concern over the absence of key contract terms and passage of federal rules and covenants to ensure financial solvency so that taxpayers and state revenue systems are held to the 32 hours of classroom

#### Texans working on big oil spill

Crews from the Texas General Land Office Oil Spill Prevention and Response Program deployed with 1,000 feet of fire boom to help corral and burn the oil slick spreading from the damaged Deepwater Horizon oil rig off the coast of Louisiana.

A damaged wellhead on the ocean floor more than a mile beneath the surface is discharging an estimated 5,000 barrels of oil each day.

The spill threatens human health, wildlife and commerce along the Gulf coast. BP Plc, manager of the leaking oil facility, said it would pay clean-up costs.

#### State defends 'under God' in pledge

Texas Solicitor General James Ho on April 27 defended the constitutionality of the Texas Pledge of Allegiance before the U.S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals.

The pledge, as amended in 2007, reads: "Honor the Texas flag; I pledge allegiance to thee, Texas, one state under God, one and indivisible."

After the Texas Legislature added the words "under God" to the Texas Pledge in 2007, a Dallas couple filed a lawsuit

arguing that the amended pledge violated the First Amendment's Establishment Clause. At trial, the Office of the Attorney General successfully argued that patriotic acknowledgments of the Almighty are consistent with the U.S. Constitution. The federal district court agreed, ruling that the revised state pledge is constitutional.

After the federal district judge issued its decision rejecting the plaintiffs' challenge in 2009, the plaintiffs appealed the adverse ruling to the Fifth Circuit.

"As the U.S. Supreme Court has repeatedly acknowledged, reciting the U.S. Pledge of Allegiance is an appropriate and constitutional way to begin each school day on the right note." Solicitor General Ho said. "The Texas Pledge of Allegiance serves precisely the same function—to give students an opportunity to engage in a patriotic acknowledgement of the religious heritage of our state and our nation."

#### **Behind-wheel training** increases

The Texas Department of Public Safety on April 28 said beginning May 1 anyone enrolling in a driver education course will be required to complete an additional 20 hours of behind the wheel instruction, including 10 hours of night-time instruction.

The training is in addition training, seven hours of behind-the-wheel training and seven hours of in-car observation/practice that already are required.

#### 'CHL' application goes online

Concealed handgun permit applicants can now complete the application form and schedule their digital fingerprint appointments online at the DPS Web site, www.txdps.state.tx.us.

The online application process debuted May 1. Supplemental materials such as citizenship documents and criminal history are still required to be mailed in.

#### Parks to launch new software

The state park system of Texas soon will launch its new business software system.

A benefit for park customers is that people making online camping reservations will no longer pay the extra \$3 fee that has been charged for booking via the Web, Texas Parks and Wildlife said April 23.

The new system, TxParks, will go live on May 12 at all 93 state park locations and the agency's Customer Service Center for centralized reservations, located in

### Census workers to begin door-to-door visits to follow up with households

Census takers across the nation have begun going door to door to follow up with households that either didn't mail back their form or didn't receive one. An estimated 48 million addresses will be visited through July 10.

"America's had a very successful first half of the 2010 Census, where more than 72 percent of the nation's households mailed back their census forms," U.S. Census Bureau Director Robert M. Groves said. "But achieving a complete and accurate census requires us to now go door to door to count all the remaining households we've not heard back from."

If a 2010 Census worker knocks on your door, here are some ways to verify that person is a legitimate census

•The census taker must present an ID badge that contains a Department of Commerce watermark and expiration date. The census taker may also be carrying a black canvass bag with a Census Bureau logo.

•The census taker will provide you with supervisor

About 635,000 2010 contact information and/or minutes to complete." the local census office phone number for verification, if asked.

> •The census taker will only ask you the questions that appear on the 2010 Census form The 2010 Census taker

> will not ask for social security number, bank account number or credit card number and will never solicit for donations or contact you by e-mail.

> In most cases, census workers will make up to six attempts at each housing unit address to count possible residents. This includes leaving notifications of the attempted visit at the house or apartment door, in addition to trying to reach the household by phone to conduct the interview or schedule an in-person interview.

> "If a census taker knocks on your door, please help by providing the basic information required for the census," Groves said. "Your answers are strictly confidential. There are just 10 questions on the form and it should only take about 10

Census takers will go to great lengths to ensure that no one is missed in the census. After exhausting their efforts to do an in-person interview with a resident of an occupied housing unit, they will seek out proxy sources—a neighbor, a rental agent, a building manager or some other knowledgeable person familiar with the housing unit-to obtain as much basic information about the occupants as they

Some households will receive a visit even though they may have mailed back their form. If the form arrived too late to be processed before nonresponse followup packets were sent to one of the 494 local census offices, the household occupants must still be interviewed when the census taker arrives. The Census Bureau is urging cooperation and patience with the census takers, as this is the best way to ensure that everyone is counted properly.

Households that didn't receive a form by mail, including those that pick up

their mail from post office boxes, will be visited by census workers as part of the follow-up plan. The Census Bureau doesn't mail forms to post office boxes because responses must be associated with a specific residence location, not the post office box location.

The part-time, temporary census workers are hired from the communities they serve to obtain the remaining census responses. Census workers are your neighbors; they are familiar with the neighborhood and are working to ensure that it is accurately and completely represented.

The Census Bureau has stringent systems in place to ensure that people can feel safe when they open their door to a census taker. All census takers undergo an FBI background check that includes both name and fingerprint checks. All have taken an oath for life to protect the information they collect and understand that they face stiff penalties, jail time or both for any disclosure of personally identifiable information.

for control of annual weeds. Annual weeds germinate from seed each year, mature in one growing season, and die in less than 12 months. Crabgrass and henbit are examples of annual weedscrabgrass being a summer annual and henbit being a winter annual.

Pre-emergent herbicides must be applied according to the expected date of emergence for each target species.

Perennial weeds live more than one year, and recover or regrow from dormant stolons, rhizomes, or tubers as well as from seed. Control of perennial weeds requires a post-emergent herbicide during its season of active growth.

Effective chemical weed control requires identification of the weeds as to their classification (grass, broad leaf, sedge, etc.), life span (annual or perennial), and season of active growth (cool season or warm season). Effective chemical control also requires accurate timing of applications, proper rate of application, and uniformity of application. Always follow label directions for a product, and observe all warnings and precautions relative to safety of the application. Herbicide labels should be carefully reviewed for additional details on specific uses of each product, soil and sunny locations.

### Rose Reve d'Or' is a fragrant favorite

CEA-Ag/NR, Haskell Co. Reve d'Or' is a useful climbing rose that has recently been endorsed as one of the Earth-Kind Roses. In spite of the French name it has its roots in Charleston, South Carolina. John Champneys was a rice planter who loved roses and crossed the southern favorite China rose, 'Old Blush' with the Musk Rose, during Shakespeare's time for its fragrance.

about 1811 was named after its breeder, 'Champneys Pink Cluster.' It was later sent by Philippe Noisette, a local florist, to his brother in France for further breeding where it was further crossed with various Tea roses that were known for their ease of growth, re-blooming characteristics and disease tolerance. A new class of Noisette Roses emerged and included such southern favorites as 'Marechal Niel' an intensely fragrant yellow climber that was grown in the base. many southern gardens.






