Six Haskell students earn State UIL medals

Haskell High School seems to be a happening place. In the midst of TAKS testing, end of course testing, and the other busyness of day to day and end of year school, state competition is at the top of the agenda.

As the baseball and softball

teams continue their march to the state title, members of the track team are preparing to compete at the State Track and Field Meet in Austin this weekend.

Haskell High students are excelling not only in athletic competitions, but in the academic realm as

well. Several prepared and competed last weekend in the State UIL Literary Meet.

In early April, Haskell High students represented their school in many different contests at the district level competition. Remarkably, twenty of those contestants qualified to move on to

regional competition held in Abilene. Individual and teams must place in the top three to qualify for the regional and state competition.

Haskell made its presence known by advancing twelve of those twenty regional qualifiers on to the state meet. They competed and

competed well, bringing home the medals to prove it. Sophomore Garrett Brueggeman won a bronze medal in mathematics. In addition to Brueggeman, freshman Maci Colley, junior Codi Foster and senior Shambrie Rodriguez combined their skills to win the calculator applications team bronze medal. Foster was third highest individual in calculator applications, earning her another third place medal.

Junior Leslie Crosson added to the medal count by placing third in headline writing, while sophomore Brady Leach made it to the finals and placed sixth in prose reading.

Congratulations to these winners, as well as to the other state qualifiers, which is an accomplishment in itself.

Since most will be returning students next year with experience under their belt, Haskell High can expect the medal count to climb.

Haskell CISD will swear in two new board trustees at the regular May school board meeting. Prior to the swearing in however, a called board meeting will be held to canvass the votes.

Joel Torres III defeated incumbent Felix Rodriguez

by a margin of 39 to 6 for single member district 1, while Tyke Meinzer won the single member district 6 place against Joey Kimbrough by a vote of 70 to 52.

Only registered voters living in each of these single member districts, were

eligible to vote, possibly accounting for the low number of votes cast in the election.

The very complicated financial structure, as well as the many government mandates and other business of a school system, require many

hours of board meetings. In addition, trustees are required to keep up to date with training through continuing education hours. Board members are not compensated, but serve because they are dedicated to the education of the children of the school district.

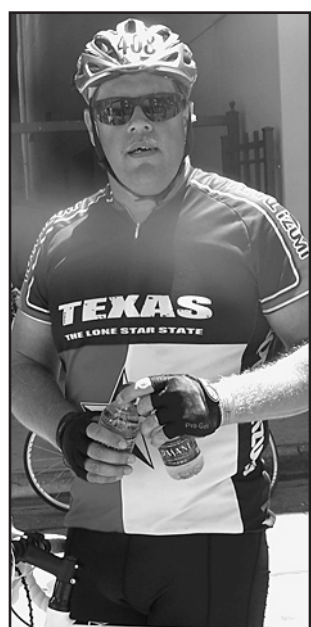
The journey began at 7 a.m. Sat. morning May 1

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Click It or Ticket campaign to emphasize use of seat belts

The Texas Department of Transportation's 9th annual Click It or Ticket spring campaign kicks off this week with a warning to drivers and passengers to fasten their safety belts or expect to get a ticket.

Transportation officials say state laws enacted in 2009 could result in more citations this year if drivers and passengers fail to heed new safety belt requirements. For the first time, all passengers in the back seat now must be buckled up, and children younger than 8 years old have to ride in a child safety seat or booster seat unless they are taller than 4 feet 9 inches. Fines range from \$25 to \$250 plus court costs.

"Whether you're the

driver or a passenger in the front or back seat, every adult and every child in the vehicle must be properly restrained," said Carol Rawson, TxDOT's Traffic Operations Division Director. "Buckling up can not only save you from getting an expensive ticket, it can also save your life."

Traffic crashes are the leading cause of death for those between four and 44 years of age. Last year in Texas, more than 3,400 people died in fatal collisions on Texas streets and highways. In 2008, half of all pickup truck drivers killed in traffic crashes were not buckled up. Wearing a safety belt increases the odds of surviving a crash by more than 50 percent, and in pickups, that number

increases to 80 percent.

Thousands of state troopers will join police officers and sheriffs' deputies statewide to step up enforcement of the state's safety belt laws between May 24 and June 6, including the Memorial Day holiday weekend.

Since the Click It or Ticket campaign began in 2002, the state's safety belt use rate has increased from 76 percent to almost 93 percent. Safety experts estimate the rise in the number of motorists who now buckle up has resulted in 2,400 fewer traffic fatalities and prevented more than 56,300 injuries.

According to the Texas Transportation Institute, motorists least likely to buckle up continue to include men, teenage boys and pickup drivers and passengers.

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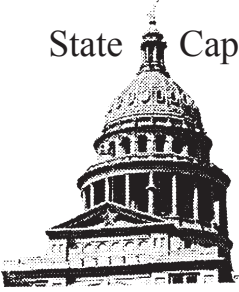

'Winning' candidate's withdrawal creates unusual election situation

AUSTIN—An unusual special election situation has produced the need for a ruling by Secretary of State Esperanza "Hope" Andrade, the state's chief elections officer.

Long-time House District 66 State Rep. Brian McCall resigned from office in late March after being named chancellor of the San Marcos-based Texas State University System. McCall's resignation created the need for a special election to fill the vacated seat.

Republican businesswoman Mabrie Jackson filed as a candidate to fill the south Collin County (Plano-area) HD 66 seat, but she withdrew on April 14, too late for Collin County to remove her name from the ballot.

Jackson's withdrawal resulted in the swearing in of her special election opponent Van Taylor.

However, despite her resignation, Jackson pulled 59 percent of the vote to Taylor's 41 percent.

Something official on the situation is expected from Secretary Andrade.

Land Office sends help to Gulf

On May 3, Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson said his office would assist in the oil spill cleanup effort on the Louisiana coast.

"This could be a serious environmental challenge for the Gulf Coast," Patterson said. The General Land Office sent wildlife rescue specialists and two trailers, one for cleaning oil-soaked wildlife, the other to shelter animals while recovering after they are cleaned.

Oil is gushing from a damaged well head a mile deep in the Gulf of Mexico about 50 miles from the Louisiana shore.

Perry names state demographer

Gov. Rick Perry on May 5 named Dr. Lloyd Potter of San Antonio state demographer.

Potter is a professor and interim chair of the Department of Demography and Organization Studies, and director of the Institute for Demographic and Socioeconomic Research at the University of Texas at San Antonio.

The State Demographer's Office distributes census information, population estimates and projections for the state, and information from federal, state and other government sources.

AG halts sale of misbranded drugs

Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott on May 6 resolved the state's legal action against

a Houston-area wholesale drug distributor that improperly purchased and distributed "misbranded" prescription drugs.

Medical Discount Pharmacy L.P., a state-licensed wholesale drug distributor that warehouses and distributes prescription drugs, under an agreed final judgment negotiated by the Texas Attorney General's Office, must adopt procedures to prevent misbranded or counterfeit pharmaceutical products from being unlawfully distributed to their Texas retail pharmacies.

Tips to help in appeal of appraisals

Most local appraisal review boards schedule property value protest hearings in May, June or July, except in certain major urban areas, where hearings occur year round.

Property owners who believe their county appraisal district has overestimated the value of their homes or businesses have a right to appeal to their local appraisal review board to reduce their property values, Texas Comptroller Susan Combs announced May 4.

Two video presentations available at the state comptroller's Website, www.window.state.tx.us, inform homeowners and small business owners about protest procedures, what to expect during a hearing and how to make an effective presentation to their appraisal review board.

Funding for school bus retrofits

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality on May 3 announced school districts may apply for funds to retrofit older school buses in order to reduce air pollution.

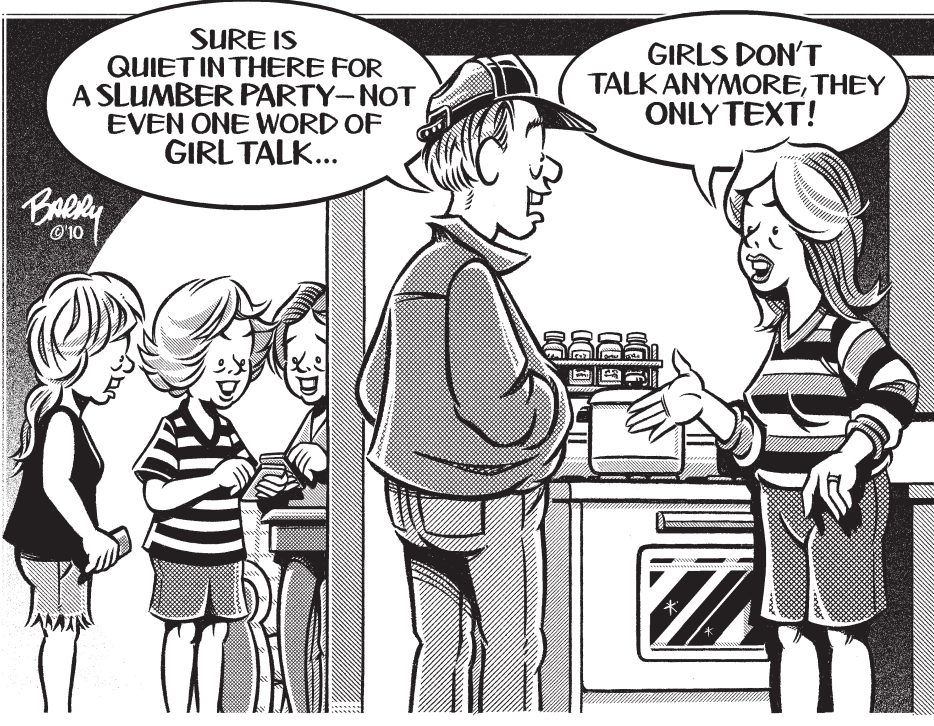
About \$1.7 million is available on a first-come, first-served basis. Application deadline is May 31. The funding comes from the federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act and is administered through the Texas Clean School Bus program which provides reimbursement to Texas school districts that install pollution-control devices on diesel school buses.

The devices reduce particulate-matter emissions that can aggravate respiratory problems, asthma, and allergies in children who ride the buses.

Supreme court justice to resign

Texas Supreme Court Justice Harriet O'Neill, who was not seeking reelection, on May 7 announced her resignation, effective June 20.

O'Neill's term would have expired at the end of the year. She was first elected to the state's highest court in 1998.

Haskell Memorial Hospital undergoes remodeling project

Things are changing at the Haskell Memorial Hospital, and in a good way.

It was on Oct. 23, 1939, that the Haskell County Hospital, as it was known then, was officially opened for business.

Constructed under President Roosevelt's Works Progress Administration, the \$100,000, thirty-five bed hospital was deemed one of the most modern and up-to-date hospitals in West Texas.

The six member board of directors, appointed by the Commissioners' Court in June of 1939, included John W. Pace, Haskell businessman; A.A. Bradford, Rule banker; John Mansell, Rochester businessman; Ernest Griffith, Weinert gin operator; Roy Weinke, Sagerton gin operator; and Frank Simmons, former Paint Creek county commissioner. Judge J.C. Davis served as chairman ex-officio. Plans called for the hospital to open in late July, however an unfortunate incident involving the WPA official

who was overseeing the project, resulted in a four month delay.

The original hospital was equipped with a laboratory and surgery unit.

The first superintendent and business manager for the new hospital was Verna Harwell, who had previously served in the same position at the Knox County Hospital. Bonnie Cathy was hired to oversee the surgery and lab

operations, while Gladys Drive was in charge of the anesthesia and x-ray departments.

Hospital operation began with a medical staff roster of thirteen physicians, surgeons and dentists from around the county. Included on staff were Dr. J.F. Cadenhead, Sr. of Weinert; Dr. Rogers, Dr. Davis, and Dr. Moch of Rule; Dr. Emory of Rochester; and Dr. D.L. Cummins, Dr. L.F.

Taylor, Dr. T.W. Williams, Dr. Gordon Phillips, Dr. Ernest M. Kimbrough, Dr. Frank C. Scott, Dr. J.D. Smith, and Dr. J.G. Vaughtner, all of Haskell.

In 1952, a nursery and mother's ward was added to the southeast part of the hospital. Then in 1972, a major upgrade was made to the hospital. Among other things, the lobby was enlarged, the nursery and

mother's rooms were moved to the northeast wing and office space was added.

More recently an educational building and a landing pad for helicopter transport was built.

In the seventy-one years since the hospital first opened its doors to serve the people of Haskell County, many things have changed. Some services, such as surgery and the delivery of babies, are no longer offered. In their place, however, other services have been added. In-patient care and emergency care are still a part of the hospital's mission, but in addition they offer swing bed, physical therapy, cardiac rehab, a wellness program, lab, x-ray, MRI and ultrasound.

The remodel project now in progress includes new paint, flooring and trim throughout the hospital, as well as refinishing and recovering the lobby furniture. Patient rooms are also being updated.

The hospital is especially pleased to be able to offer the care and comfort room for terminal patients and their families. The idea, which started with Dr.

McSmith, is being furnished by volunteers with items to give it a more "home-like" atmosphere.

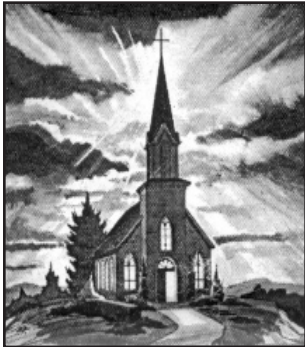
A \$50,000 grant from TDRA has been obtained and will be used to update some of the older systems in the hospital, including the phone system, fire alarm system and nurse call system.

Government regulations now require that all medical records be kept electronically, so a hospital wide computer system is also in the process of being implemented.

It's also true that through the years, some things have not changed. The hospital operation is still overseen by a very dedicated board of directors. The desire to serve the medical needs of Haskell County is still the focus of the hospital and its skilled staff.

Administrator Fran McCown says, "We want to make this a facility that our local community finds pleasant to come to as patient and as visitor, while meeting the health care needs that we can right here." An open house is being planned to showcase the updates, when renovations are complete.



The TCEQ will consider all public comments in developing a final decision on the application. The deadline to submit public comments is 15 days after newspaper notice is published. After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the TCEQ's jurisdiction to address in the permit process.

After the technical review is complete the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. If only comments are received, the response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application will then be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or who is on the mailing list for this application, unless the application is directly referred to a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING You may request a contested case hearing. The applicant or the executive director may also request that the application be directly referred to a contested case hearing after technical review of the application. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court. Unless a written request for a contested case hearing is filed within 15 days from this notice, the executive director may act on the application. **If no hearing request is received within this 15-day period, no further opportunity for hearing will be provided.** According to the Texas Clean Air Act §382.056(o) a contested case hearing may only be granted if the applicant's compliance history is in the lowest classification under applicable compliance history requirements and if the hearing request is based on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission may only grant a hearing on those issues raised during the public comment period and not withdrawn. A person who may be

affected by emissions of air contaminants from the facility is entitled to request a hearing. If requesting a contested case hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number, and fax number, if any; (2) applicant's name and permit number; (3) the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing;" (4) a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the application and air emissions from the facility in a way not common to the general public; (5) the location and distance of your property relative to the facility; and (6) a description of how you use the property which may be impacted by the facility. If the request is made by a group or association, the one or more members who have standing to request a hearing and the interests the group or association seeks to protect must also be identified. You may also submit your proposed adjustments to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns. Requests for a contested case hearing must be submitted in writing within 15 days following this notice to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below.

If any requests for a contested case hearing are timely filed, the executive director will forward the application and any requests for a contested case hearing to the Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting. Unless the application is directly

referred to a contested case hearing, the executive director will mail the response to comments along with notification of Commission meeting to everyone who submitted comments or is on the mailing list for this application. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact relating to relevant and material air quality concerns raised during the comment period. Issues such as property values noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the Commission's jurisdiction to address in this proceeding.

Pressure Sores
A pressure sore is also known as a bed sore or decubitus ulcer. This is an injury to the skin and tissues under the skin. Pressure sores are caused by unrelieved pressure from sitting or lying in the same position for a long time. The pressure on a small area of the body can squeeze shut tiny blood vessels that normally supply tissue with oxygen and nutrients. If tissue is deprived of oxygen and nutrients for too long, it begins to die and a pressure sore will form.

Pressure sores are measured in stages according to the amount of damage to the skin and underlying tissues. The stages range from 1 to 4 with 1 being the least damage and 4 being the most.

In persons with other health problems, including diabetes and peripheral vascular disease, pressure sores may be more difficult to heal due to decreased healing ability and poor blood circulation.

Pressure sores are serious and must not be ignored. With proper treatment, most pressure sores will heal.
