

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

Governor's office publishes new **Homeland Security plan**

AUSTIN-Now available for all with Internet access to read is the new "Texas Homeland Security Strategic Plan 2010-2015.

Gov. Rick Perry called his plan "a high-level road map to allow for adaptation to evolving situations in an ever-changing threat environment."

Perry said the plan builds on what the state has done over the last five years, a period during which more than \$230 million was committed to fund border security operations. Samples of the plan's stated

•Prevent terrorists and criminal enterprises from exploiting Texas' international borders.

•Increase public awareness and reporting of suspicious activities.

·Reduce vulnerability to natural and man-made disasters

·Enhance safety of schools.

•Enhance security features in state driver's licenses and identification cards to include Deepwater Horizon make it the use of biometrics.

Warden Burl Cain invited Whitmire and Patrick as guests after he watched Patrick's documentary film, "The Heart of Texas," which carries a potentially life-changing message for inmates.

Sales tax break for appliances

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs on May 14 announced the third annual Texas "Energy Star" Sales Tax Holiday to run May 29-31.

During the three-day sales tax holiday, Texas shoppers will not have to pay state and local sales tax on certain energy efficiencyrated products. "It's a great opportunity for consumers to save at the register and at home, where they'll see the benefits returned in energy

savings on their utility bills," Combs said

The tax break applies to air conditioners priced less than \$6,000, refrigerators priced less than \$2,000, ceiling fans, incandescent and fluorescent light bulbs, clothes washers, dishwashers, dehumidifiers and programmable thermostats.

The tax break also applies to installation and delivery charges for the products on the list, Combs said.

Patterson: Coast clear for now

Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson on May 13 said the Deepwater Horizon oil spill slick was about 160 miles east of the Texas coast.

"Despite some media reports, Texas is not yet affected by this spill," Patterson said. "We're watching and waiting, but it's just not time to go to general quarters. No news is good news.'

If any oil from the Deepwater Horizon makes it to the Texas coast, it will not be in the form of a thick sludge, it will be tarballs, Patterson said.

USDA to estimate 2010 ag numbers

During the upcoming June Area Survey, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) will be speaking with thousands of farmers and ranchers across Texas to gather important statistics for the official mid-year crop and livestock reports.

"The June Area Survey is one of the largest and most comprehensive surveys conducted each year by NASS," explained Doug Rundle, Director of the NASS Texas Field Office. It provides an important benchmark of planted acreage for the 2010 crops, and a look at mid-year livestock inventories including the first estimate of the 2010 calf, lamb and kid crops.

"Understanding that the information we gather is only as good as the source it comes from, we rely on the best source of informationthe producers themselves," added Rundle.

During the first two weeks of June, NASS representatives will visit randomly selected tracts of land in Texas and interview the operators of the farm and ranch land. NASS will collect information on crop acreage, grain stocks, livestock inventories, cash rents, land values, and value of sales.

The information from the June Area Survey will be used to make official crop and livestock estimates which will be released in several key mid-year reports, including: the June Hog and Pig report, the June Acreage report, the June Grain Stocks report, the July Cattle report, and the July Sheep and Goat

As with all NASS surveys, information provided by respondents is confidential by law. "NASS safeguards the confidentiality of all responses and publishes only state- and nationallevel estimates, ensuring that no individual operation or producer can be identified," stated Rundle. All reports are available on the NASS web site: www.nass.usda.gov. For more information on NASS surveys and reports, call the NASS Texas Field Office at 1-800-626-3142.





Stone retires from Cleburne ISD

People most important resource to outgoing HR director Stone By Lisa Magers/CISD **Community Services**

Randy Stone has been a teacher, coach, bus driver, milk man, principal, district administrator, and soon, he'll be a retired educator.

After 35 years of service, Cleburne ISD's executive director of human resources is retiring for a slower

"About a month ago I had an issue with my heart," Stone said. "I'm fine, but I feel it's time to cut back a little bit and not put in such long days. I sat down with my doctor, then my family, and decided it was time to

retire." "I'll continue to work. Maybe something part time, with not such strenuous hours. I enjoy working, and I enjoy people. I can't just sit around the house."

Stone's love of work and people-and a dedication to helping students be the best they can be—is reflected in his tales of a career that began in small country schools. Going into teaching was always the plan.

he played football, in 1975, Stone took his bachelor's in PE and health and a minor in English, to a classroom in Eula.

Just as he played all sports in his hometown of Haskell, he taught all subjects at Eula.

"It was a little country school outside Abilene," Stone said. "They had grades 7-12 together. I taught seventh-grade language arts and high school health. And I coached. I started the girls track team. I couldn't believe they didn't have a program. We won district that first year. It was pretty neat."

After two years at Eula, 7 p.m.: Wild Horse Prairie while his wife Janie was finishing at McMurry, the Stones had an opportunity to move closer to Haskell.

"I wanted to go back 9 p.m. to 1 a.m.: "Dance home, so we went to Paint Creek," Stone said. "There, you did a bit of everything. I taught English to the juniors and seniors who were in the same classroom. I did the yearbook. I coached basketball, and we won district my first year there."

you really did everything," he laughed. "The coaches watered the football field themselves. We got water piped in from the lake which was near the field. There was an old pump in the middle of the lake. When it would go down, we'd get in a rowboat and row out to fix it."

When he wasn't teaching or coaching or fixing the pump, Stone was driving a bus route and also delivering milk to the school's cafeteria. Stone said he was paid three or four cents for every carton delivered, which amounted to an extra \$200 he received at the end of the school year. That was a big deal in those days, he said.

"Each morning I would deliver the milk, then do my bus route, teach all day and coach all night," he said. "I was there eight years. It's incredible how good it was out there. We only had 150 kids. I left in 1987 because I had the opportunity to go to Haskell, plus I was concerned being such a small district. I worried for nothing. Paint

Creek is still going today." As a coach, Stone worked in every classification and took the 1987-88 Haskell basketball team to the state tournament

"Gov. Rick Perry was a state representative at that time," Stone said. "He presented the team with a flag that had flown over the capitol. We chose to present it to the county commissioners. It still hangs in the Haskell County Courthouse."

"My second year there we were named a After graduating from Texas Education Agency McMurry College, where Recognized Campus for our test scores," he said. > "I told the kids at Early if they got a 95 on the TAKS test in every area, I'd take a pie in the face from each of them," he said. "That was a lot of pies."

> Part of one year, Stone said, "I wore half of a moustache. I also had to shave my head. We just did crazy things like that, but the kids bought into it."

Adams fourth-grade teacher Keli Price described Stone as a campus leader somewhere."

"In those little schools who always made sure his staff had what they needed to be successful in the

classroom. "What I loved about Mr. Stone was he always had the facts and data we needed for TAKS," Price said. "He always knew right off the top of his head a particular figure or percentage we needed right then. He was always so organized."

Stone made the step from campus leader to district administrator in December 2007 when he was promoted to CISD Central Office as a curriculum coordinator.

In June 2008 he was selected to oversee the department of human resources after the retirement of Assistant Superintendent Carolyn Cody.

"The hardest thing was leaving the kids," Stone said. "You get attached to them. Even now, I'll see former students at Walmart. They still remember me, they know who I am."

As an administrator about consolidation, with it whose focus was the employees, and prospective employees of the district, Stone has relied on his skills as a people person.

Stone said his priority was to place people who would have the most impact

on the students. "It's so critical," Stone said. "We have a tremendous staff in HR. They work well with people. They are people persons, too. They are also very experienced. I can't say enough about them. They are tremendous."

Superintendent Dr. Ronny It was as principal at Beard can't say enough about Stone.

"He's the best HR director Beard said. "We hit a grand slam in choosing him to lead that department. He's outstanding. He's proactive, a hard worker and a team player."

"We're going to miss him. He's leaving some big shoes to fill."

Stone said he is proud of what the HR Department accomplished over the past two years, achievements that he said has made the district more efficient and saved taxpayers money. He noted the implementation of some major programs, a salary study, a staffing study and a policy review. There was also the Time Clock Plus for hourly employees and the coordination of the state's fingerprinting program for

Stone has things to do. He's a member of the Cleburne Lions Club, and he's also on the city's Parks and Recreation Board. He said he'll also play a little more golf.

"Thirty-five years is a great amount to put into a career," he said. "But I don't look at this as retirement. I'm just beginning a new phase in my life. I'll still be involved with people,
