The 1935 record of fires in Haskell has some striking comparisons with the previous year. Last year had 28 calls and 1935 had 17. In 1934 there were 10 hose lines strung for a total distance of 3,473 feet and in 1935 the firemen laid nine hose lines for a distance of 2,520 feet. Last year there were 46 feet of ladders used and in 1935 the total to date is 74 feet. Four tanks of chemicals were used this year compared with two last year. The truck pumped a total of 110 minutes in 1935 to date, and three hours and 20 minutes in 1934. Total value of property burned in 1934 was \$10,400 and insurance covered \$8,256 of the loss. To date this year, total value of property burned is \$6,500 and there was \$3,100 worth of insurance on the property.

30 Years Ago—Dec. 31, 1925

Cotton production in Haskell County from the 1925 crop will exceed the previous year's production by almost 4,000 bales according to the latest report on ginnings. In 1924 a total of 39,639 bales were ginned in the county, while to date 43,603 bales have been ginned. Considerable cotton remains to be gathered. The yield was about the same as last year, with the increase being attributed to the larger acreage planted in cotton this year.

Little Care Saves Most Gift Plants

Homemakers receiving plants as gifts at Christmas time can take special steps to keep those plants growing long beyond the holiday season. Gift plants are pampered and trained to reach the recipient in greenhouse perfection. The December issue of Better Homes & Gardens magazine suggests ways of keeping them that way.

Poinsettias, says the article, need little care, except daily watering. They should be kept out of drafts while blooming. The plant will bloom again next year if moved to a cool room when the flowers drop and placed outdoors in the spring and inside again in September.

Amaryllis blooms will last about a week. After the blooms are gone the plant should be moved to a sunny window and fed lightly. Begonias are usually too weak after one blooming to bloom again but the original blooms will last for weeks with plenty of water. Potted chrysanthemums require daily watering. After flowering the faded blooms should be clipped. In summer the plant can be moved outdoors and reotted in the house again in late August.
