## Midget Auto Race Meet Slated As Night Attraction July 21

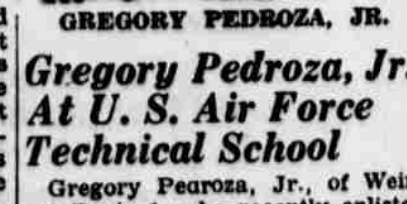

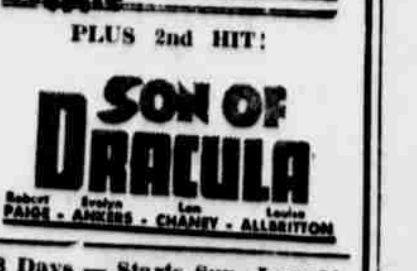
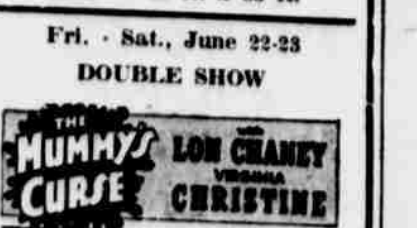

**Too Late to Classify**  
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## Writing Reveals Personality Traits, Local Grapho-Analyst Maintains

**BY CHARLENE WHITE**  
 Ever realize that you give away some of the secrets of your personality every time you so much as write a grocery list? It's true according to George Wilmot, local grapho-analyst.  
 In case you don't know what that is, (we don't either), he's a fellow who analyzes handwriting. From the little squiggles and loops, the grapho-analysts claim they can tell if you're flighty or serious; generous or a bit thrifty.  
 "The only trouble with analyzing handwriting," he said, "is that so many fortune tellers claim to read the future in it. This isn't possible. Handwriting will not forecast the future, but it can reveal the characteristics of the writer."  
 For the reason that so many fortune tellers could claim to be graphologists, the original name for the study, the legitimate analysts decided to change the name. The one decided upon was grapho-analyst. Mr. Wilmot plans to attend the annual convention of the international organization June 25-30 in Springfield, Ill. Wilmot stated that the grapho-analysts attend "from every state in the U. S., Canada, Hawaii and while as a rule the members don't travel that far, we even have some in Africa."  
 At the convention, in addition to the regular sessions, all the doctors get in closed sessions and compare notes and the teachers "tell each other their troubles."  
 Mr. Wilmot stated that much use of the handwriting study in social work. "It is said that someone with an emotional disturbance will show it first in his handwriting. That's why doctors and teachers find it so useful," he declared.  
 Wilmot, a Haskellite for the past six years, first became interested in the study as a student in Whittier College, Whittier, Calif., in 1922. Browsing around in a second hand book store one day, a book on "graphology" caught his eye. He purchased the book and so began a longtime avocation.  
 "In analyzing you consider the stroke rather than the actual writing so that it is possible to analyze in any language. Also important is whether the subjects write with a heavy or light stroke. Those who write with a heavy stroke are generally more outgoing and sensi-
