

Layoffs not probable at Tech; UT, A&M cut jobs

Despite the loss of the Excellence Fund, Chancellor Dr. David Smith said, unlike the University of Texas and Texas A&M University, Texas Tech will not be losing a large portion of its faculty in the fall.

"Although the veto of the Excellence Fund had no effect on UT or A&M campuses directly, it certainly affected other schools in their systems," Smith said. "Even if the Fund had not at Galveston took a heavy blow with costs without just eliminating facbeen vetoed, the state had already been 660 staff losses and they expect at least making changes to the budget which would affect this sort of activity."

lest Nile cases in humans not yet cause for concern

On Tuesday, the city of Lubbock officially released confirmation of three human cases of West Nile Fever within the Lubbock area. Of the three confirmed cases, is a child under the age of 16, one is over 40 and one is over 60. A fourth suspected case is a female in her early 20s.

The first confirmed discovery of West Nile Virus in mosquitoes occurred June 30. Steven Presley is a research coordinator for the Admiral Zumwalt Research Program at the nomenal...," he said. With the first human cases of West Nile surfacing, Presley said people need to identify warning signs.

"If you see sick or dead birds, that's

Presley said people can call the institute at (806) 885-4567 or the city of Lubbock's mosquito hotline at (806) 775-3110 to report dead or sick birds.

Since the inception of the hotline in late June, Health Department Director Tommy Camden said the public response has been great.

"The public has just been phethink last week we had a little over 350 calls regarding mosquito activity or reporting dead birds."

Camden said the general public does not know much about diseases vectored by mosquitoes.

In January, Tech administrators were instructed by a letter from Gov. Rick Perry that all Texas state institutions and agencies must trim 7 percent from the 2003 fiscal year general revenue budget. With the veto of the Excellence Fund a few months later, Tech has done well with the hand it has been dealt.

"Research was the main thing affected by the Excellence Fund, which is unfortunate," Smith said. "But since Tech is seeing so much student growth, it is definitely important to keep up in other areas of university development as well."


Reptile escapee now captured



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Why is rape so different?

Tomething has been bothering me ever since L.A. Laker Guard Kobe Bryant was first charged with sexual assault in Eagle County, Colo., earlier this month. For the longest time, I couldn't figure out exactly what it was that just didn't feel right. The standard answer is that a social stigma is placed on rape victims and making them reveal their identity forces them to relive the incident because it forces victims to be separated all over again. This answer, at least to from even the victims of other violent me, only spawns more questions.

I first find myself wondering who perpetuates this social stigma. Beyond that I'm curious as to why the privacy of rape and sexual assault victims seems more important than that of victims of other violent crimes.

After research and reflection, I've come to what might be called a controversial conclusion concerning the stigmatization of rape victims. I've decided that the two largest groups that contribute to a victim's problem after an incident are insensitive men and (gasp!) some of the very women's groups female victims look to for support.

That's right. I went there.

I willingly concede that a large share of the blame rests with male chauvinists. These guys are the ones who say things like, "She was asking for it with a skirt that short." This kind of insensitivity is wholly unacceptable. Idiots such as these, unfortunately, are not the only ones whose hands are dirty in this situation.

trauma sustained during rape is markedly different than that received during various other violent offenses and therefore requires wholly different consideration.

This special consideration only adds to the stigma surrounding rape crimes. They become totally isolated, like the lepers of the assailed. The interesting thing to me is that the ones who constantly press the issue are middle-aged, middle-class white women who are among the least likely to be victims of sexual assault.

The thing that bothers me about the act of withholding rape victims' names is not that it exists but that it seems to be the only crime for which such consideration is given to the victim. You could go turn on the news today and find out every gruesome detail of the death of Baylor basketball player Patrick Dennehy, but you will not find the name of Bryant's accuser.

People argue sexual assault is different from other violent crimes because it's a violation of a person's body. The idea that this is a violation is true, but how is it any more of a violation than getting stabbed 17 times by someone who is robbing you?

Maybe it's just me being some insensitive white male, but I personally see little difference between the two. 

After his arrest, Dotson told the AP he "didn't confess to anything." Since then, Dotson has not responded to a request from the AP for an interview. His attorney didn't return calls for comment Thursday.

Dotson, 21, remains jailed without bond in his home state of Maryland and awaits extradition to Texas, which could take as long as three months.

"I'm really not a bad person," he told the newspaper. "Some things happen that aren't in your control."

Dotson told the News in Thursday's editions that his life has been threatened and that he has been hearing voices that say, "We are many. We are strong. We are behind you. We support you. We are ready for war ... a spiritual war." He also confirmed that Baylor paid for him to see a Waco therapist because of his increasingly erratic behavior.
