



French hostages may soon be freed

POSSIBLE RETURN: Jordan news service reports Iraqi militants will release journalists.

PARIS (AP) - France intensified efforts Tuesday to save two journalists held hostage in Iraq, convening crisis talks in Paris and around the Arab world, as a 24-hour execution deadline set by militants neared.

French President Jacques Chirac said every effort was being made to free the journalists.

Foreign Minister Michel Barnier launched a second day of emergency diplomacy in the Middle East, pleading for crucial support from Arab governments and powerful Muslim groups that praised France for its anti-war stance on Iraq.

"Because of France's distinguished position in rejecting the Anglo-American occupation of Iraq, we appeal to the people who kidnapped the journalists to spare their lives," said the Islamic Action Front, Jordan's

HOUSTON (AP) - A 15-yearold high school football player died after he collapsed at the end of a two-hour afternoon practice session, a school district spokeswoman said.

Ivan Okafor, a member of Alief Taylor High School's junior varsity team, was walking off the field at the end of practice Monday when he complained he didn't feel well, Alief Independent School District spokeswoman Paula Smith said.

He was taken by golf cart to a field house and lost consciousness while attempts were made to cool him off with ice, Smith said in Tuesday's edition of the Houston Chronicle.

Paramedics were called to the school, and Okafor was flown to Memorial Hermann Hospital, where he died, Smith said. The exact cause of death had not been determined.

Smith said the players had just finished a light practice and were not wearing their full protective padding. Three water breaks had been scheduled, and student trainers were on hand to provide extra hydration.

Temperatures reached 95 degrees Monday, with a heat index of up to 98 degrees, according to the National Weather Service in League City.

Smith did not have any information about Okafor's medical



Football player dies after Accused kidnapper to stand trial, judge rules

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) - A judge on Tuesday found the homeless man charged with kidnapping Elizabeth Smart competent to stand trial.

The ruling came at the start of what had been expected to be a threeday hearing to gauge the mental state of Brian Mitchell, 50.

torney David Yocom said he and Mitchell's attorney, Kim Clark, had been in negotiations over waiving the hearing.

Clark said at the hearing that the defense reached a "tactical decision" after a judge ruled the competency proceedings would be open.

The defense had sought to close the hearing, arguing media reports concerning Mitchell's mental state would taint the jury pool if he were found competent.

Two court-appointed experts apparently could not agree on the issue of his competency. Both evaluators did agree he suffers from a narcissistic delusion. Mitchell, who describes himself as a prophet, had refused to cooperate.

A handcuffed Mitchell, bearded and with long gray hair, did not speak during Tuesday's hearing but nodded and if he understood what it meant.



Suicide bomber kills 10 outside train station

MOSCOW (AP) - A woman strapped with explosives blew herself up outside a busy Moscow subway station Tuesday night, killing at least 10 people and wounding more than 50 - the second terrorist attack to hit Russia in a week.

Seven days earlier, almost to Salt Lake County District At- the hour, two Russian jetliners crashed within minutes of each other in what officials say were terrorist bombings.

All 90 people aboard the aircraft were killed, and the investigation has focused on two Chechen women believed to have been passengers.

A militant Muslim Web site monitored in Cairo published a statement claiming responsibility for the bombing on behalf of the "Islambouli Brigades," a group that also claimed responsibility for the airliner crashes.

The veracity of the statements could not be confirmed immediately.

The statement said Tuesday's bombing was the group's response to Russian President Vladimir Putin, "who slaughtered Muslims time and again." 

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

Parking problems: what Tech can expect


hile students were enjoying their summer vacations, several Tech departments were playing a game of hot potato with student parking. The result is a parking lot in the middle of a field and a free parking lot turned into a pay one. Parking seemingly is business as usual.

Most students will assume Traffic and Parking's the main culprit. Really, the department probably is not the first to blame. The brunt really falls on the failures of both the contractors and Facilities Planning and Construction.

On August 19, representatives from Traffic and Parking, Facilities and Planning and Citibus met with several administrators to discuss the contingency plan for parking. At this meeting, several elements that culminated in this semester's parking problems were explained. I found out some information about the situation from Student Government officers present at the meeting.

The contractors hired to complete both the road to the satellite parking lot near University Medical Center and the Indiana rerouting project did not start in the most logical order.

They tried to begin on both projects at once, only to concentrate their efforts on the Indiana section, which actually leads nowhere. That part is not set to be finished until an overpass at the upand-coming Marsha Sharp freeway

you \$75. This came about when the Texas Department of Transportation, which purchased the area for the Marsha Sharp Freeway, allowed Traffic and Parking to use the area as a regulated parking lot.

area, where is this money coming from? Students. Those same students who were promised one large park and ride lot by UMC, not four smaller lots in which they will have to hunt for a decent parking spot.

By the spring semester, the Hastings lot will revert back to Department of Transportation control if the satellite lot is completed. Additionally, the Texas Tech Museum and Ranching Heritage lots also will return to free parking by spring. Upon that occurrence, students will be able to receive a pro-rated refund for the spring semester if they choose to seek free parking.

So, what is the real point in maintaining a parking lot that is about to be torn up? Why not just refund student money, turn the lot back into a free parking area and use the time and effort to finish the road to the satellite lot?

As a result of this incomprehensible problem, we now have a Facilities and Planning allowing contractors to pick the least important project on which to focus their efforts and a Traffic and Parking Department selling parking spaces it really does not, or at least should not, own.


Thus, the SGA has come up with a "Plan of Attack" seen posted on bulletin boards around campus. The only problem is students cannot do much about this problem. The administration failed them, plain and simple.

Basically this year is a good one to live on campus. For those who do not, the only real suggestions are to get to campus about half an hour earlier than normal, not just half an hour before class. If you are willing to get up early enough, parking looks really good at about 8 a.m.





The agreement was implemented in July. The current focus is on the need for bilingual and special education teachers because of the considerable lack of both in the state of Texas, she said.

'We can identify Spanish speaking students and encourage them to become teachers," Johnson said.

What's the 411? Find Out With Intramural Flag Football



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
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

Tech's young receivers living up to legends

While graduating from college may be one of the pinnacles of many students' lives, it is not such a great thing for the football team or its coaches when three graduated players were top wide receivers on the team.

Replacing former Red Raiders Carlos Francis, Mickey Peters and Wes Welker was the problem Texas Tech coach Mike Leach faced in the offseason. The three combined for 3,251 yards and 30 touchdowns last season and left Nehemiah Glover as the only receiver with significant starting experience.

Glover needs three touchdown receptions in his senior campaign to break Mickey Peters' school record of 22 touchdown receptions in a career. Glover, however, is not the question for Leach. The question is whether his new stable of receivers can fill the void left by 2003's three seniors.

"We're bigger than we were last year," Leach said. "That's one thing that's exciting. We have some experience coming back also. (Jarrett) Hicks and (Trey) Haverty are both experienced."

The most inexperienced position is the Z receiver slot vacated by Francis. The frontrunners for the position are redshirt freshman Joel Filani and sophomore Marquis Johnson. Filani is 6 feet 3 inches, and Johnson is 6 feet 2 inches. Those two combined with Hicks, who stands at 6 foot 4 inches, make for the tallest group of receivers Leach has had in his time at Tech.

"Size-wise, they're definitely the biggest I've ever had," he said. "I'm excited. They may go beyond just being big or prototypical. We've got several over 6-3. It's a big group, and it will be interesting to see. But our best is still Glover, and he's just 5-7."

Hicks, who caught 32 balls for 498 yards and five scores last season, said the newfound size of the receivers is a plus.

"While we have size there, we also have a good contrast with the quick, small guys," he said. "It's a pretty good mix. We're all still gelling together and learning, so we'll see how it goes."

Quarterback Sonny Cumbie has no lack of confidence in the receivers, who, much like himself, are trying to prove themselves to their doubters.

"It's very exciting for me," Cumbie said. "Those guys are all playmakers. They're anxious to get out there and prove to everyone how good we already know they are. They're gonna put up big time numbers and make big time plays this fall."

A handful of other receivers, besides for Hicks, will see more action than last season or their first collegiate game experience.

Replacing Peters will be Cody Fuller, who also plays for the Tech baseball team. Fuller had 10 catches last year for 186 yards and a score. After taking a few weeks off after baseball season and putting on some weight, Fuller believes he is ready to step into the receiver rotation.

"I came back and was ready to go," Fuller said. "I gained some weight, gained some strength, and I think that's what they wanted."

Fuller concurred with his coach and teammates about the added dimension of size to the Red Raiders' receiving corps.


"Heck yeah, I'm excited," he said. "It'll be nice to see them out there using their bodies and being physical, because that's what they've been taught to do. Now we've got people (with height) out there not just in one spot, but in two or three spots."

Filani said he is ready to replace Francis and to see his teammates do the same in respective positions.

"I'm stepping in Carlos' shoes, and I want to live up to what he accomplished and fill his shoes," he said. "We're definitely ready for the challenge. They were great receivers, but now it's our time to step up and show what we can do."

Hicks said although he had some doubts in spring practices, he now knows the word "rebuilding" does not apply to Tech's receivers. He has a new word: "reloading."

"I think we're ready," Hicks said. "We've been here all summer and have gotten a lot of good reps in, and we're ready. We have big shoes to fill with Welker, Francis and Mickey all gone. I'm not gonna say we're gonna do what they did their first year or do better, We're gonna make names for ourselves this year."

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
