Bilingual election clerks wanted: seeking registered voters in the Lub-
bock area to preside in the general election bock area to preside in the general election. Bill Kenyon, communication director for the Secretary of State, said
counties are not required to have bilingual election clerks in every precinct for the general election. "The law states that any place where there's 5 percent of Hispanic
voters, the county should make an effort to have a Spanish speaking voters, the county should nan ned to have one centrally located election person,", Kenyon said. "They need to have one centraly
clerk. One county I know is making an effort to have a Spanish speaking clerk. One county l know
person in every precinct.
person in every precinct.
According to the bilingual requirements chapter in the election code,
bilingul election materials shall be used in each election precinct the bilingual election materials shall be used in each election precinct that
is situated either wholly or partly in a county where 5 percent or more of the inhabitants are of Spanish origin or descent in accordance with the most recent official federal decennial census.
Dorothy Kennedy, elections administrator for Lubbock County, said
63 precincts out of 90 in Lubbock County will need one to 63 precincts out of 90 in Lubbock County will need one to three workers,
and 96 already have come and fled paperwork and 96 already have come and filed paperwork. "lt's not so much a direct mandate as the Department of Justice is make every reasonable attempt."
Kenyon said a law was passed last year to put states in accordance with federal laws and to allow the counties to conduct the elections. According to section 003 of the requirement, for a precinct to be exempt from the bilingual requirement, the presiding offcer or governing
body must file with the authority responsible for procuring the election body must
supplies.

Freshman Eric Salome, a restaurant, hotel and institutional management major from Waco, said he thinks the requirements are good. He said he speaks a little bit of choppy Spanish.
"Spanish is the second most spoken language in this country," he said. "I think it will help get more Hispanic votes."

Judge: School finance Senate committee votes 3 Americans sentenced plan unconstitutional against overtime law in prison abuse scandal
 KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) Three Americans - led by a former Pentagon support - were found guilty Wednesday of torturing Afghans in a private jail and were sentenced to prison.
After a $71 / 2$-hour session in a suffy Kabul courtroom, the three-judge panel soldier, Jonathan Idema, and his rightholdier, Jonan, Brent Bennett, on charges of entering Afghanistan illegally, making illegal arrests, establishing a private jail and torturing their captives. They were sentenced to 10 years. Edward Caraballo, a cameraman who said he was making a film about an eight-year term. Four young Afghan accomplices were sentenced to terms ranging from one to five years; one of them burst into tears with the verdict. Idema, who has a previous fraud
conviction, claimed to have had highlevel support from the Pentagon and Afghan officials in his group's efforts to hilitary says the men were freelancers operating outside the law and without its knowledge.
Judge Abdul Baset Bakhtyari dismissed a string of video clips showing Idema talking with Afghan leaders, purported U.S. intelligence officials and NATO troops and said they were
operating alone. khaki fatigues bearing an American flag throughout the trial, denounced the trial as a throwback to the times of the hard-line Islamic Caliban movement.
"It's the same sick Taliban judges, the same sick sense of justice," Idema said as he was led, handcuffed, out of the courtroom. "I knew that the American
government wasn't going to help me."
