New student entrance to be unveiled at Tech game

Students will meet a few new changes to policies and to the student entrances at the first Texas Tech home football game against Texas Christian University Saturday.

The stadium has added a new student entrance on the Southeast corner of the stadium to make getting students in less hassled.

"This new gate is designed solely for the use of students and should make the process of entering the stadium much more efficient," said Mitchell Moses, Student Government Association president. "The gate is designated as gate six and will be equipped with five additional entry lines as well as five more card readers for students IDs."

Many of the same regulations and guidelines still apply to the conduct of students entering and after the game as well as what is allowed into Jones

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

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

Tech students help put roofs over heads during Blitz Build

Though a construction truck ran over a paint bucket, Habitat for Humanity volunteers did not stop painting boards, laying shingles and putting up walls during the annual Habitat for Humanity Blitz Build.

Susan Parramore, a resident of Lubbock and volunteer for the project, said she loves the labor.

"I like the hard work," she said. "It's just a good feeling. I just like working with good, wonderful people and just knowing that you're helping others."

The families who will move into the houses are required to show up at the worksite and help, Parramore said.

"I like the concept of it," she said. "They don't just give it to them. It makes the person learn how to be a homeowner. Things I know now, I did not know at their age.'

Families selected as Habitat homebuyers purchase the houses with a 20year, no-profit, no-interest mortgage, according to lubbockhabitat.org.

Nick Blatt, a sophomore engineering major from Corrales, N.M., and community service chairman of the Delta Chi fraternity, said the project has kept his organization on its toes.

"They kept us pretty busy," he said. "We also helped clean up a park in the area.

In addition, Blatt said, 18 members of his organization helped raise three houses, attached paneling and installed insulation.

"Overall we put in a little over 75 hours," he said.







VIEW FROM ANOTHER UNIVERSITY Acting outside the ballot box

I want to take a few moments to talk about the implication that anything outside the framework of Democrat vs. Republican politics is somehow not "real" action, an idea common on many campuses these days. While I share the desire to see more political action on campus, I do not feel it is my place as an individual with a significant amount of privilege to define for other groups just what political action is.

We must realize what some call "mainstream politics" are simply politics that have been traditionally dominated by white, uppermiddle-class and patriarchal values. For someone to imply the work traditionally oppressed groups do is worthless because it doesn't directly address the election is both absurd and disempowering. As allies to those who are oppressed by the system that we live in, it is not our job to lead them or tell them how to best take action. It is our job to let them lead us, to lend support in whatever way we can and to work within our own communities to break down the barriers of ignorance and privilege that would lead someone to think that a campus is void

of political activism merely because there's not a Kerry-Edwards sign in every window.

I further question the logic in which Kerry is portrayed as a champion of "progressive causes." There are many good reasons why the activist groups on campus are thinking outside the ballot box and working at the grassroots level for change, not the least of which is that Kerry hardly addresses most of our grievances. If you don't see Students Against the Occupation spending all their time rooting for Kerry, maybe that's because Kerry's policies on Israel-Palestine are no better than our current president's, and he signed every free-trade agreement that campus progressive groups have opposed. Some seem to want every group on campus to drop everything and work on the election. I can't think of a single campus action group who would say that all of their demands would be met by either of the candidates being elected on Nov. 2.

This may come as a surprise, but I plan to vote for John Kerry. However, I do not think that those five minutes spent in the voting booth will in any way constitute taking "real action." Voting is something we do every few years

to make surface-level changes to our political situation. It is one tiny action that has the potential to help a little bit. In my opinion, however, grassroots action - working within communities to build mutual aid. solidarity and self-sufficiency - has the greatest potential to bring about real change. There is already a movement building on this campus and around the country to highlight this type of community action and encourage us all to "Don't Just Vote!" I may be at the polls on Nov. 2, but I will also be in the streets of Philadelphia on Nov. 3, regardless of who wins the election, to join other activists from the area in calling for some real democracy.

We're not voting for Kerry because he embodies our vision for a true democracy, we're voting for him because he's not Bush.

It is essential that we are in the streets the day after the election to let our voices be heard loud and clear that we are not happy with a system that forces us to choose between two candidates who barely address the issues that concern us most. For all of us working towards true change, towards a world based on democracy, equality and justice. whoever wins in November, la lucha sigue!

Perhaps Barbie is just a marketing tool, but for many generations she has given hope and has had a part in freedom. I can tell you without a doubt I am honored to have men and women working side by side. I give full support to be able to choose where you want to earn a living.

No person in his right mind would want a world where women were not free to decide what kind of job for which to strive. As a journalist, I am glad women are out there writing as passionately as I am. Men alone in a field is like trying to hammer a nail into a board using your forehead. As easy as knocking Barbie out of the picture seems, we cannot. She has been a spark that has helped inspire the fire. Her vast amount of career modeling has let young girls know that they can aspire to be more than the norm. Juggling multiple roles often causes anxiety for students, she said.

take a deep breath.


Moore said students should maintain as much balance as possible to curb stress. Students can do this by eating and exercising regularly and at normal times, she said.
