In the junior year in high school a student is to the point where taking the cours es in science is extremely important. Select colleges take these courses very seriously Students will need to be tak ing chemistry or physics. In the mathematics area, students will need to take solid geometry and/or trigonometry in addition to the next level throughout the senior year. Math courses are essential in any job which makes it impor tant in college and high school. The foreign language classes should be continued until three credits are earned. Students with two credits will be able to attend a select college but three years in a foreign language is recom mended.
Students are encouraged to take the PSAT, SAT, and/or the ACT during the junior year in high school. Students and their parents need to get involved in the decision-making process by attending college fairs or college night programs, visiting colleges in which the student plans to apply, and obtaining information from certain colleges by a letter of request. ## Healtl: Dept. <br> declares rabies <br> quarantine

The Texas Department of Health issued a rabies quarantine in Texas on January 13 to combat a spread of the lethal disease in wild animals and pets in certain areas of the state
TDH officials declared an Area Rabies Quarantine for all of Texas. This action prohibits the movement of the following animals within or from Texas: dogs and cats that have not been vaccinated against rabies within the past 12 months, coyotes, foxes, raccoons, skunks, bats and all hybrids (including, but not limited to, dog-coyote and dog-wolf crosses)
Dogs and cats being transported by air, automobile or any other means should be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate issued within the past 12 months. Violation of the quarantine is a Class C misdemeanor.
TDH officials said these quarantine rules supersede any permits to own, breed or sell wild or exotic animals is sued by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, U. S. Department of Agriculture or other authorizing agency.

## Fattening Of America

More than thirty percent of American adults are overweight.That is an eight percent increase in the past decade and the weighty trend continues.

Dr. Robert Kuszmarski and his colleagues from the National Center for Health Statistics reported in the Journal of the Ameircan Medical Association (7-19) that the mean body weight of adults increased by about eight pounds during the decade despite the perception that obesity is frowned on by society and despite spending more than thirty billion dollars each year on weight loss efforts.

An accompanying editorial says it has been difficult to get across to the public the seemingly simple message to eat less and exercise more. The increase in obesity is alarming because it is associated with greater risk of diabetes, hypertension, cardiovascular disease, stroke, gout, sleep apnea, osteoarthritis and some forms of cancer, as well as higher death rates.
