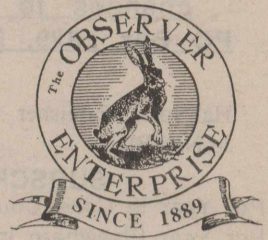

The fifty-fifth edition of the Coke County Stock Show, held last weekend at the Sterling Lindsey Memorial Exhibit Building, was a mixture of old and new. Several of this year's youth were repeat winners like James Tennison, who exhibited the champion finewool lamb, the reserve champion mediumwool lamb, and the champion Southdown lamb. James also took both the Frank Percifull Overall Showmanship award and the Ralph Walker Top Hand award.

On the other side of the coin, Ashlee Millican, showing for the first time, took both the grand and reserve grand champion lamb trophies. Also in his first year as an exhibitor,

Brandon Gibbs showed his crossbred pig to champion status in his class, and his exhibit was later selected as grand champion market hog.

The weather cooperated beautifully for this time of year, making Saturday's barbecue lunch crowd a large one, and assisting with attendance at the premium sale, which was as strong as ever.

A basic EMT class is being planned for Robert Lee in the near future. The public is invited to attend.

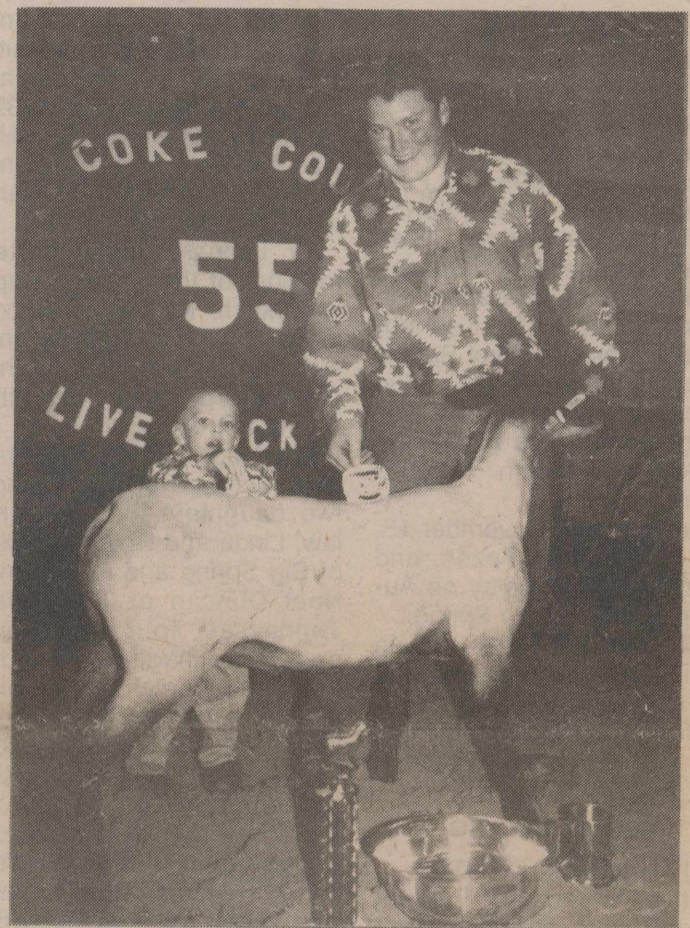

Dwain E. Leonard, 77, of Big Spring died on Monday, January 16, 1995.

Service was at 10 am Friday, January 20, 1995, at First Baptist Church in Big Spring with the Reverend Ken McMeans, pastor of College Baptist Church, officiating. He was assisted by Dr. Kenneth Partick, pastor of First Baptist Church. Interment followed in Trinity Memorial Park. Arrangements were by Nalley-Pickle and Welch Funeral Home.

He was born November 15, 1917, in Bronte, Texas, and married Jean Wooley on August 6, 1990, in Big Spring.

Mr. Leonard grew up in Bronte where his father was the only doctor. He graduated from Bronte High School, attended West Texas State at

Canyon for two years and then attended the University of Texas, graduating from the School of Pharmacy in 1939. He retired in May of 1991. He was involved in farming and ranching interests in Howard and Coke counties.

Mr. Leonard was a charter member of the College Baptist Church. He was a member of the Knights of Pythias and was very interested in the Pythias Orphanage in Weatherford.

Club members were glad to vote in a new member, Peggy Davis.

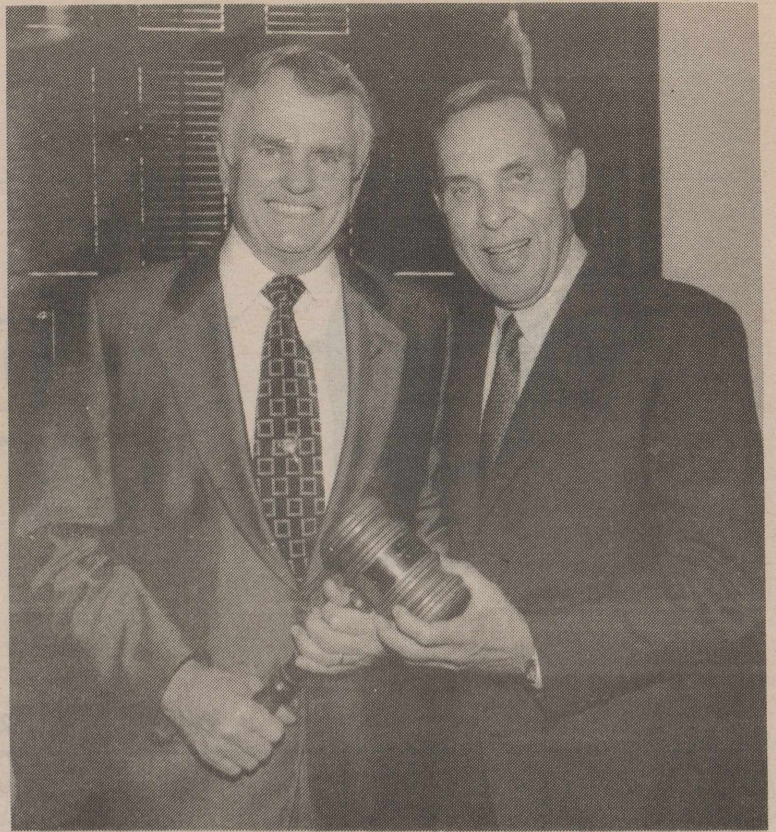

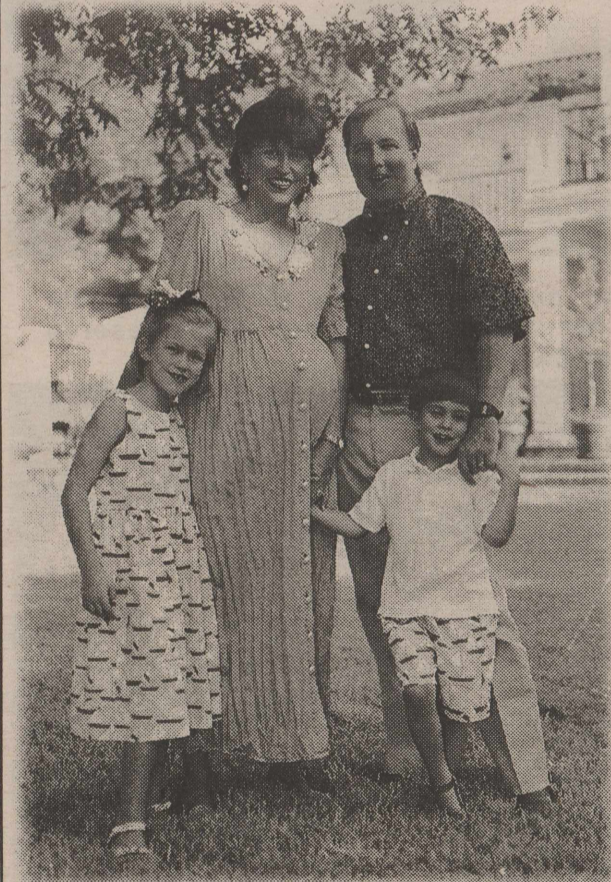
A new class is under way on Monday evenings in the school cafeteria with six new

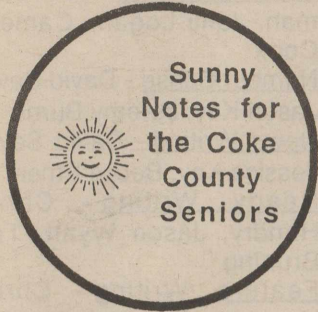

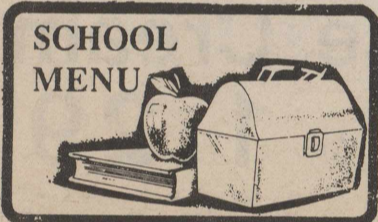
tournament

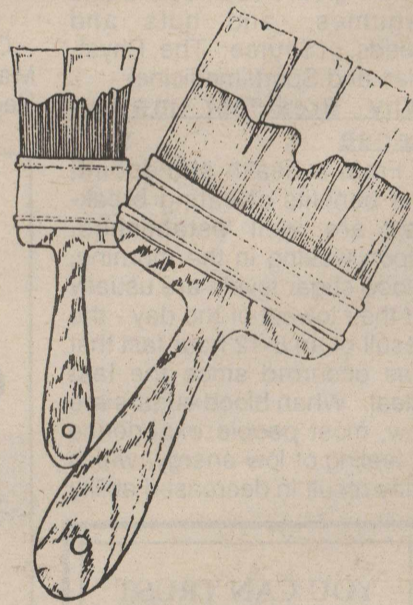

In the junior year in high school a student is to the point where taking the courses in science is extremely important. Select colleges take these courses very seriously. Students will need to be taking chemistry or physics. In the mathematics area, students will need to take solid geometry and/or trigonometry in addition to the next level throughout the senior year. Math courses are essential in any job which makes it important in college and high school. The foreign language classes should be continued until three credits are earned. Students with two credits will be able to attend a select college but three years in a foreign language is recommended.

Students are encouraged to take the PSAT, SAT, and/or the ACT during the junior year in high school. These mailings are also an indication of the kind and quality of college to which the student is likely to be accepted.

Health Dept. declares rabies quarantine

The Texas Department of Health issued a rabies quarantine in Texas on January 13 to combat a spread of the lethal disease in wild animals and pets in certain areas of the state.

TDH officials declared an Area Rabies Quarantine for all of Texas. This action prohibits the movement of the following animals within or from Texas: dogs and cats that have not been vaccinated against rabies within the past 12 months, coyotes, foxes, raccoons, skunks, bats and all hybrids (including, but not limited to, dog-coyote and dog-wolf crosses).

Dogs and cats being transported by air, automobile or any other means should be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate issued within the past 12 months. Violation of the quarantine is a Class C misdemeanor.

TDH officials said these quarantine rules supersede any permits to own, breed or sell wild or exotic animals issued by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, U. S. Department of Agriculture or other authorizing agency.

HEALTH NOTES

Fattening Of America

More than thirty percent of American adults are overweight. That is an eight percent increase in the past decade and the weighty trend continues.

Dr. Robert Kuzmarski and his colleagues from the National Center for Health Statistics reported in the *Journal of the American Medical Association* (7-19) that the mean body weight of adults increased by about eight pounds during the decade despite the perception that obesity is frowned on by society and despite spending more than thirty billion dollars each year on weight loss efforts.

An accompanying editorial says it has been difficult to get across to the public the seemingly simple message to eat less and exercise more. The increase in obesity is alarming because it is associated with greater risk of diabetes, hypertension, cardiovascular disease, stroke, gout, sleep apnea, osteoarthritis and some forms of cancer, as well as higher death rates.
