CCJJCC Meeting

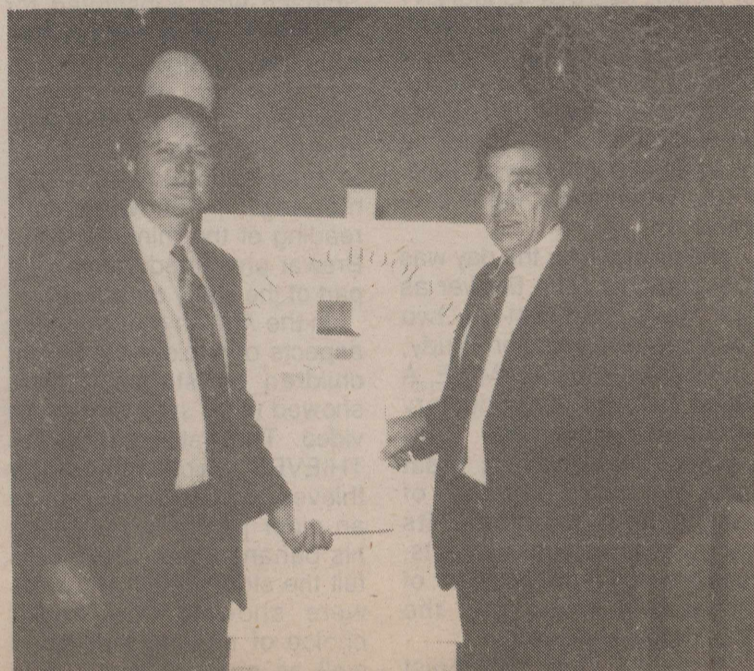

FB Membership Week set

County Judge Jackie Walker has signed a proclamation designating February 6-10 as "Farm Bureau Membership Week" in Coke County.

The week is part of a statewide observance during which county Farm Bureaus will make a special effort to enroll new members, according to Bobby Roberts of Robert Lee, president of the Coke County Farm Bureau.

Bobby Roberts is also chairman of the membership committee which is responsible for membership acquisition and maintenance.

"The Texas Farm Bureau, with more than 296,000 member families, is influential in both state and national affairs on behalf of agriculture,"

the proclamation reads.

"Farm Bureau is a grass-roots organization. Its foundation is the county unit. There are 211 organized county Farm Bureaus in the state including the Coke County Farm Bureau," the proclamation states.

Bobby Roberts said the local county Farm Bureau has 754 member families and is seeking to exceed that figure in 1995.

He said that the Farm Bureau is a general farm organization that seeks to improve income and living conditions of farm and ranch families. It represents the farmer and rancher at the local county courthouse, in Austin, and in the nation's capital, Washington, D.C.

In the African culture, many aspects of society are taught children by stories. Nina showed three such stories on video. The first was BANANA THIEVES, which showed how thieves did great injustice to an older person by stealing his banana crop. Members felt the story's main thoughts were showing the better choice of treating elders, as well as every person, with respect.

The second story, THE SPIDER AND THE ELEPHANT, showing how the ant was able to save its friend, the elephant, taught how even the small are important and valuable.

The third story, THE BOASTFUL CROCODILE, had a lesson for those who boast and consider themselves better than others.

A discussion of family life in Africa disclosed that in the past, men did very little labor such as carrying water great distances from wells to homes, hunting and carrying wood for cooking over campfires to feed the family.

With Christianity gaining so rapidly, respect and education for women is becoming more acceptable.

Nina's closing of her interesting study was quoted from her Mission literature: "The darkest thing about Africa is how little we know about it."

Graveside services were held in Fairview Cemetery in Bronte at 2:30 Friday, January 20, 1995.


Family Community Education Club

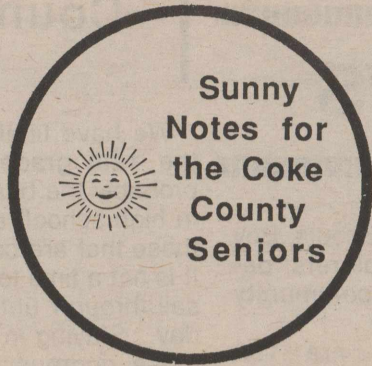

Stenholm seeks applicants

High school sophomores interested in serving as Congressional Pages for the 1995-1996 school year can now apply to Congressman Charles Stenholm's office.

Eligible students are those who reside in the 17th Congressional District, will be juniors in September 1995, and have a "B" average in four major courses, excluding electives.

"The Congressional Page program offers young people a unique opportunity to see how Congress works," said Stenholm.

The pages perform a variety of duties, including delivering correspondence or small packages to offices within the Capitol complex, answering telephones in the Members' Cloakrooms and the Page Phone Banks, and taking messages to members. The pages work on a rotation system so they all have an opportunity to experience all aspects of the job. The work does include a monthly salary, which covers basic living expenses.

School remains a part of the page's life because pages do study junior level curriculum at the U.S. Capitol Page School in the Library of Congress. Students are expected to maintain at least a "B" average while serving as a page.

Dormitories are located on the capitol grounds. Pages are supervised while in their quarters, which are guarded

by the Capitol Police, 24-hours-a-day.

Congressman Stenholm will not be the page's employer, nor will he have daily contact with the page. Pages all answer directly to the Director of Page Services.

The deadline to apply for a page position is February 14, 1995. Applications will be forwarded to a Selection Committee who will notify finalists by March 8, 1995. Interviews will be conducted in Abilene on March 18, 1995 and pages will be selected on that date.

Out-of-school Exam for TEAMS/TAAS

Registration packets are available for any individual who is no longer enrolled in school and who has not previously met minimum expectations on all sections of the TAAS test, but has met all other graduation requirements. These individuals may register to retake the necessary section(s).

All individuals who wish to take the TEAMS test must also register in advance. This includes students currently enrolled in Texas public schools as well as those who have met all other graduation requirements.

These forms are available in Mrs. McCutchen's office at Bronte High School and they must be completed and returned and received in the pre-addressed envelope no later than 5:00 pm, February 14, 1995, in Iowa City, Iowa. These forms are available at any high school campus, district central office, or education service center in the state of Texas.

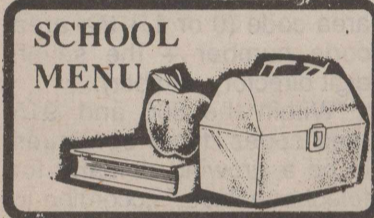

Spinal Check offered

The Legislature passed a law in 1985 that requires all sixth and ninth grade students to be screened for spinal deformities. Early detection of abnormal spinal curvature can prevent serious health problems. This is a problem that may begin during the early adolescent years (from 10-14 years of age), with an estimated 1 in 10 adolescents having some degree of abnormal curvature. Curves that are detected early may require the wearing of a brace, which is usually supervised by an orthopedic specialist. In most cases, the need for major surgery for this deformity can be eliminated through early detection.

Spinal screening for Robert Lee ISD school children has been scheduled to begin on Tuesday, February 7, 1995.

Children will be screened for two types of spinal deformities: Scoliosis and kyphosis.

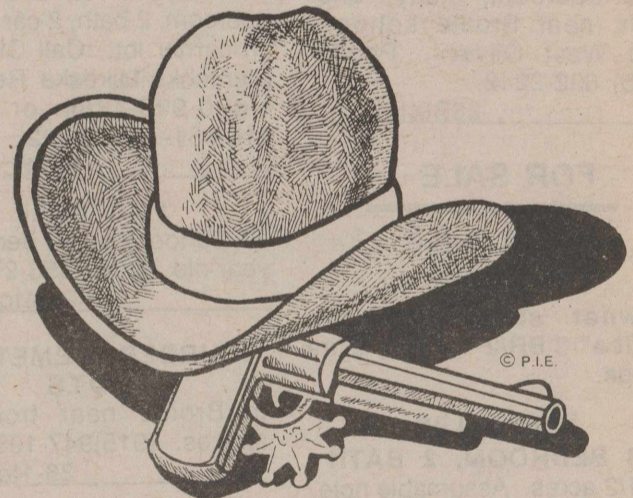



Beginning January 3, 1995, long-distance calls originating and completing in area codes 806 and 915 must include the area code (0 or 1 + the area code number + the seven digit directory number).

"Within the 806 and 915 area codes, there continues to be a growing demand for telephone lines," according to Hardy E. White, GTE's general manager - customer operations, Western division. "This expanding need from population growth, economic progress and new technology -- cellular telephones, fax machines, paging service, computer modems and others -- has required a change in dialing procedures for long-distance calls within these area codes."

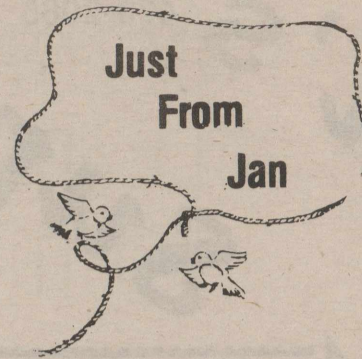

Removing mildew from clothes and other material

Mildew is caused by molds that grow on anything from which they can get nutrients. Natural fiber fabrics, leather, wood, grout and paper are common places to find mildew in homes.

Mildew can cause considerable damage by causing musty odors and discoloring or rotting. Mildew should be prevented, if possible. If mildew develops, remove it as soon as it is discovered.

If mildew is found on clothing and household fabrics, brush any surface mold off outdoors to prevent scattering spores in the house. Then wash or dry clean the item according to the label instructions.

If stains remain, treat them with perborate (all-fabric) bleach or chlorine bleach, according to the care label instructions. Even if the label says the fabric may be bleached, always test a hidden area to check for color change.

Mix one tablespoon of perborate bleach with one pint of water as hot as the fabric can stand. Sponge stain or soak item in the solution for thirty minutes. Rinse and repeat if necessary.

Dilute chlorine bleach with water as directed on the container. Never use chlorine bleach on silk or wool. Sponge stains or soak the article for 30 minutes; rinse; repeat if necessary.

Upholstered articles, mattresses and rugs should be brushed outdoors or vacuumed thoroughly to

remove as much mildew as possible. If the item is damp, use an electric heater and a fan to dry it. Sunlight and air help stop mold growth.

If mildew stains remain, sponge lightly with a thick suds and wipe with a clean damp cloth. Get as little water as possible on the fabric while doing this.

If furniture fabric cannot be cleaned with soap or detergent, wipe it with a cloth wrung out in a solution of half rubbing alcohol, half water. Always test an inconspicuous place for possible damage before treating stains.

Mildewed rugs and carpets should be shampooed and dried as quickly as possible with fans.

Leather goods can be treated with a solution of half rubbing alcohol and half water. Wipe item with a cloth dampened with the solution and air dry in a light, airy place.

Thoroughly clean mildewed wood by scrubbing it with a mild alkali such as washing soda, laundry detergent, or trisodium phosphate and chlorine bleach. Use four to six tablespoons of cleaning powder and one cup of bleach to a gallon of water. Rinse well and dry thoroughly. Wood may need to be treated with a wood preservative or painted with mildew resistant paint if mildew has damaged the surface.

Once mildew has been removed, clean and air the house, especially closets and other enclosed spaces. Treat surfaces with fungicides or chlorine or chlorine bleach to destroy mold spores.

In climates where mildew is common, treat surfaces regularly and keep everything as clean and dry as possible.

Reattaching Limbs

It may not be a pleasant thought, but would you know what to do if you lost a finger or limb? A specialist in microsurgery at Stanford University Medical Center, Dr. Vincent Hentz, says you can greatly improve chances for successful reattachment by following a few rules.

He says it is important to keep the detached part cold, but take care not to damage it further by freezing or by allowing ice to touch it directly. Wrap the severed part in a clean towel or bulky washcloth. Snuggly wrapping the injury site will usually control bleeding. Of course, it is important to get both the patient and the amputated part to medical help as soon as possible.

With care and luck, you will never need delicate microsurgery. However, if the horrible occurs these suggestions may improve chances that you can be successfully reunited with the missing part.

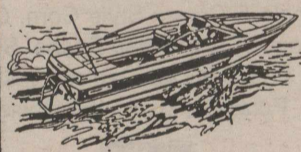

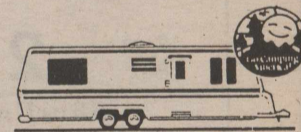

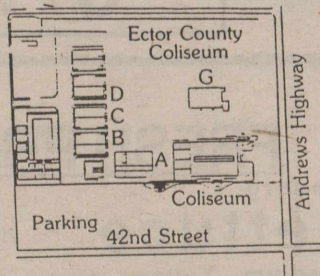
