Tax deadline near

The July 1st deadline for property taxes is fast approaching. All 1994 property taxes that remain unpaid by that date will be officially placed on the delinquent rolls.

This means that in 1 day, the penalty and interest will jump an additional 3% (bringing the P&I total to 18%), plus, an additional 15% delinquent collection fee on the total of tax plus P&I. This is a substantial jump from the amounts due if paid in June.

Notices of unpaid 1994 taxes, and information on the additional charges on taxes still due on July 1st were sent out by local tax offices in May.



Alcohol Does Not Lead To Sex

Psychologists at the State University of New York at Buffalo have debunked a theory long held by males that the fastest way to seduce a woman is to ply her with alcohol. Nearly seventeen hundred young people between thirteen and nineteen were questioned by Dr. M. Lynne Cooper and doctoral student Holly Orcutt. They found that eight percent reported having sex on the first date when neither partner drank or used drugs, but that sex on the first date was substantially more likely if the male drank and the female did not.

The researchers, who presented their findings to an American Psychological Association conference on women's health, say alcohol may act as a social lubricant for males, increasing their willingness to disclose things about themselves and decreasing their social anxiety that elicits a more positive response from the female. Not unexpectedly, alcohol or drug use by either partner was related to riskier sexual behavior.

The Bronte Family Community Education Club met May 19 and June 16 for their regular club meeting.





Gregston honored for help

Most of the time nowadays, heroes seem to be hard to find. Not so in San Angelo since May 28. That was the day a storm containing several tornadoes struck the city, causing devastating losses to a large percentage of the population, many of them uninsured, poor, and elderly. One of those heroes is a Robert Lee native and RLHS graduate, Earl Gregston (we called him Dwayne when he was growing up).

Earl has been a postal employee for 13 years in San Angelo. Eleven of those has been on the same route - between East Harris Avenue and the river. When he first began to hear the disaster reports, he recognized the streets and addresses; some of the hardest-hit areas were on his route. After 11 years, he knew most of them personal-

Since that time he has spent every waking moment, except while on the job, lending those folks a helping hand. He's hauled off debris, sawed up wood, nailed plywood and plastic over roofs and windows. He's even reached in his own pocket for food, water, ice, and miscellaneous expenses for badly needed items. Many of those he's helped saw that he was honored in a special way and he was chosen as a representative of the hundreds of volunteers who pitched in to help. He was asked to ride on a special float in last Saturday's Fiesta del Concho parade.

Earl credits his family, John and Babe Gregston of Robert Lee, for instilling in him his work ethics and an attitude to help others when you can.
