FSA seeks candidates

"Farmers and other eligible voters are asked to nominate candidates of their choice by October 30 for the county Farm Service Agency (FSA) committee election ballot," said Dwayne Vincent, County Executive Director. The FSA committee was previously known as the ASC County Committee.

The FSA county committee election will be conducted from November 24 to December 4 by mail ballot. FSA, an agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, administers farm commodity, crop insurance and conservation

Trail ride for Rehab set

The ruins of Fort Chadbourne on the historic Chadbourne Ranch in Coke County will echo with the sights and sounds of the past as an estimated 300 trail riders converge on the ranch for Trail Ride IV for Rehab September 29 through October 1. The ranch was the site of the first trail ride to benefit West Texas Rehabilitation Center in the spring of 1994.

As in the past, Trail Ride IV will provide a central campsite, a day-long ride on Saturday and a shorter ride on Sunday morning with lunch and supper on Saturday and breakfast on Sunday provided. Participation cost is a free-will donation that will go directly to benefit West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene and San Angelo.

Entertainment will be provided on Saturday evening around the campfire with riders encouraged to bring their guitars, banjos, fiddles, and harmonicas and join in the fun.

Fort Chadbourne was established in 1852 and remained in use until 1864. Shortly after the Civil War, G.G. Odom settled in the area and founded the Chadbourne Ranch at the site of the abandoned fort. The ranch is still owned by his descendants. Ruins of the fort still stand on the ranch.

Vincent reminded farmers that to be valid, petitions must be limited to one nominee each, must include written certification that the nominee is willing to serve, if elected, and must be signed by at least three eligible voters in the local administrative area. Also, the petition must be received in the FSA office by the October 30 deadline.

Eligible voters may circulate or sign nominating petitions for as many candidates as they choose. Anyone wishing to nominate a farmer for the county FSA committee election may contact the county office for details, including eligibility requirements.

Several Coke County 4-H junior livestock producers have won awards at the area fairs the past several weeks. At the Mason County Lamb Show, Ashlee Millican exhibited the first place Finewool cross lamb in the middleweight class. During the Permian Basin Fair, held in Odessa, Ashlee placed seventh in the light Finewool cross class, eighth in the heavy Finewool class and tenth in the middle Medium Wool class. Erin Millican also placed tenth in the heavyweight Finewool class.

At the Howard County Fair, held in Big Spring, Shea Kelton won Reserve Breed Champion with his All Other Breeds steer, and Casey Antilley placed fourth in the medium weight Maine-Anjou class.

Gramm aide talks politics in RL

Mr. Hans Klingler, West Texas Regional Director for Senator Phil Gramm, was present last Thursday, Sept. 7, to answer Robert Lee's questions about the standing of small towns in the national political picture.

The Legislative Update took place at Robert Lee City Hall, one of 80 sites targeted by Senator Gramm's Lubbock office as an area in need of a voice in the political arena.

Mr. Klingler expressed to those present that one goal of the senator's agenda was to help avoid shutdown in the "information pipeline" to small towns. Mr. Klingler's job is to visit with area small towns in order to take their concerns to Senator Gramm.

One major focus of the senator, claimed Klingler, is to take as much federal control out of local and county levels as is reasonably possible. This could entail putting accountability requirements on the EPA, re-evaluating federal bills imposed on local entities, and eliminating unnecessary and potentially harmful federal departments.

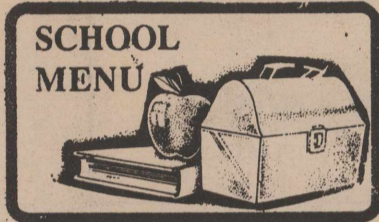
RL JV shuts out Mountaineers

Listening skills foster Parent-Child relationship

Real listening is one of the highest forms of human influence. It is a learned art, and requires an inner sensitivity that goes beyond words to the feelings and real meanings of what is said. By truly listening, we are saying to our children, "You are a person of worth; I love you, respect you and want to understand you." Unfortunately, we are often so eager to get our point across that we don't pay enough attention to what is being said. The goal of listening is simply to hear, understand and accept the other person's feelings and views. Parents need to set aside their lectures and opinions and really strive to understand from the point of view of their children. It is almost impossible to train children to speak openly, honestly, and constructively of their innermost feelings, wishes and needs unless they have acquired the faith that such expression will meet with acceptance rather than with coolness or rejection.

While striving to understand, avoid giving advice, talking about our own experiences instead of theirs, or making the child's concern seem unimportant. A common strategy is the following:

*Give children full attention. Put aside lectures, reactions, feelings, perceptions, and judgments. Eliminate distractions such as the newspaper, TV or radio. Parents must put themselves in their children's shoes and try with all their heart to see the world through his or her eyes. The attitude and spirit parents adopt is probably the most important aspect of listening. They can go through the outward motions of listening but do not hear anything unless they have the proper attitude and spirit.

*Physically, parents can show children that they have their full attention by leaning toward and looking at the child to show involvement and concern. Emotions are often communicated through the eyes, and parents can better understand their child's feelings by watching their eyes.

*Pay attention to nonverbal communication. The eyes and the upper lip give us clues as to what is happening to a person emotionally. However, the eyes can be controlled to a large extent. Because less voluntary control is possible, the upper lip is often a more reliable indicator of the emotional state of a person. A quivering lip is a

pretty good indicator that a person is upset. If the lip is straight and slightly tight, a person is probably stressed. If it is relaxed and moves easily, emotions are usually less intense.

Acknowledge the child's feelings. Sometimes we don't really want to deny our children's feelings by trying to get them to see or feel the way we do. As Haim Ginnett said, "Many people have been educated out of knowing what their feelings are." Parents need to acknowledge and respect a child's feelings and views.

For example, a child may return from school and say "The bus driver yelled at me and everybody laughed!" A parent might skirt the feeling and instead ask, "What did you do to make the bus driver so upset?" A better response might be: "That must have been embarrassing for you," or "Sounds as if that was embarrassing." After acknowledging the feeling, then the parent can help the child come up with solutions to avoid future conflicts with the bus driver.

Invite more discussion. Sometimes acknowledging a child with a simple "Oh...Mmm...I see" is enough to invite more discussion and, when coupled with a caring attitude, invites children to explore their own thoughts and feelings and possibly come up with their own solutions.

Lyme Disease demands attention

Early signs of canine Lyme disease usually include lameness or limping, typically without any visible swelling. Some animals experience fever and loss of appetite. What makes detection tricky, however, is that these early warning signs may appear anywhere from one week to six months after infection. That's why you should have your pet examined and treated as quickly as possible. Lyme disease can only be diagnosed through a blood test performed by a veterinarian and analyzed by a professional health lab.

Initially it was thought Lyme disease was transmitted only by deer ticks. We now believe many other insects, such as fleas and mosquitoes, might also transmit the disease. Some research even indicates that Lyme disease can be spread directly from dog to dog without any insect involvement. In fact, warm-blooded animals in every area of the country - including pets who stay indoors - are at risk. Lyme disease can cause paralysis, seizures, and even death.

As with any disease, the best solution is to avoid it altogether. Fortunately, a successful Lyme vaccine is now available for dogs, so the best protection is to have your dog inoculated every year. In northern Wisconsin Lyme

disease is prevalent, but thanks to the vaccine, 75 percent fewer cases have been reported. It also has been shown that the vaccine actually helps dogs in the early stages of infection.

Ask your veterinarian about other preventatives for Lyme disease, such as insecticides, repellents, and collars, especially those formulated for ticks. Some long-lasting flea and tick solutions are rapidly replacing messy, foul-smelling dips.

For the most complete protection, you should also treat your pet's surroundings with lawn and household flea and tick sprays.

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Adolescents still need after-school care

Although the number of after-school care programs in Texas is increasing, there is still a need for programs designed specifically for young

adolescents, according to a family life specialist.

"We have seen a significant increase in the growth of after-school programs, but there is still a need, particularly when you look at pre-adolescents in fifth through seventh grades," said Dr. Sarah Anderson, pro-

gram leader for family development and resource management with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"I still have concern about that young adolescent being alone, because we know from research that a lot can happen

in those three hours," she said. "Children this age need a program where they are not told everything to do. They do not like to stay at the after-school programs, because they view them as being for little kids."

The most recent census data from 1991 reported that more than 2 million children, ages 5-13, care for themselves alone at home some time of the day, while child-care experts believe that number may be three or four times higher. Other national estimates put the number at 15 million. State child-care experts believe more than a million latchkey children live in Texas.

But accurate figures are hard to obtain.

"That's because parents are reluctant to admit that their children spend time at home alone," Anderson said. "They fear being seen unfit parents. So, you get invalid statistics on latchkey children in the state."

After-school care programs have grown since 1990, said Bill Carver of the Texas Department of Human Services' licensing division. But there is no way of knowing how many such programs are available because child care centers are not required to indicate if they offer these services.

The most common type of after-school care program is located on school grounds, he said. After-school programs include those operated by:

1. Schools - offer programs and various activities after school hours. These sometimes involve a collaborative effort with groups such as parks and recreation agencies.
2. Child day care - offers services for school-age children and will send vehicles to pick them up after school.
3. Day home providers - keep young children in the home during the day and older children after school.
4. After-school home provider - only keeps older kids in their homes after school.
5. Community services - churches, civic groups and agencies such as the YMCA have programs for children after school.

Five years ago, Anderson assisted in the development of Project Home Safe, a joint effort between the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the America Association of Family and Consumer Sciences to help parents of latchkey children find alternative solutions to self care.

The national outreach project trains volunteers to work with coalitions of local leaders to assess needs, identify available resources and develop a plan of action at the local level to solve community problems of children in self care.

The project has helped in the establishment of many after-school programs throughout Texas, Anderson said. Educational manuals also help parents choose the appropriate after-school care program, tell how to set up a program and provide enough lesson plans for the entire year.

All kids are alone at some time even when a parent is out mowing the grass, Ander-

son said. These lessons give children basic safety skills such as how to answer the phone, what to do if there's a fire, what kitchen objects to avoid and other important tips. Also, they educate youth on nutritious snacks.

"Children being home alone is a problem that will never go away," she said. "In addition, programs are not yet meeting low-income parents' needs. For the working poor, it's hard."

Some parents have after-school jobs, while others just cannot afford the cost, she added. Costs can range from \$65 to \$125, depending on the care service and whether it is for nonprofit.

"Today, we are more aware of child care and dependent care but still have a way to go," Anderson said. "I feel good about the program development and those available. We have addressed the problem, but I would not want to imply that the problem has been solved."

By Order of the Court, a class action has been conditionally certified for settlement purposes. On January 9, 1996, a fairness hearing will be held at the Courthouse, United States District Court, Southern District of Alabama, 113 St. Joseph Street, Mobile, Alabama, 36602, at 9 a.m. Central Time, so the Court can determine if the class action should be finally certified and if the Woodward Settlement, as summarized in this Notice, should be approved as fair, reasonable and adequate. Although participation in this settlement is voluntary, all Woodward Settlement Class Members who do not timely exclude themselves from the lawsuit will be bound by the Woodward Settlement if it is approved.

I. DEFINITION OF CLASS

Under the Woodward Settlement, Fundal® is defined as chlordimeform or any chlordimeform-containing product, either manufactured, formulated, packaged, distributed or sold by or on behalf of NOR-AM Chemical Company ("NOR-AM") or related parties, regardless of the trade name of the product; or any metabolite of Fundal®, including the substances known as 4-COT or 5-CAT. Galecron® has the same meaning as it did in the Price v. Ciba-Geigy Corp., Civ. No. 94-0647-CB-S (S.D. Ala. 1995), Settlement ("Price Settlement"), and is thus defined as chlordimeform or any chlordimeform-containing product, either manufactured, formulated, packaged, distributed or sold by or on behalf of Ciba-Geigy Corporation or related parties, regardless of the trade name of the product; or any metabolite of Galecron®, including the substances known as 4-COT or 5-CAT.

The Woodward Settlement Class is defined as:

- (1) All persons who fall into one of the following categories, and who reside in the United States as of the date of filing of the Class Action Complaint, who have been exposed in the United States to Fundal® only, but not to Fundal® and Galecron® or to Galecron® only ("NOR-AM Exposed Persons"):
 - a. **Formulators:** An individual (whether or not employed by NOR-AM Chemical Company) who in the course of his or her employment was exposed to Fundal® while at a plant or site which was involved in mixing, blending, packaging, handling or otherwise formulating pesticides which contained, in whole or in part, Fundal®;
 - b. **Applicators:** An individual (whether or not employed by NOR-AM Chemical Company) who in the course of his or her employment, was exposed to Fundal® while involved in the application of pesticides which contained, in whole or in part, Fundal®, including, without limitation, aerial and land applicators, flagmen, mixers, blenders, loaders and other individuals who handled such pesticide prior to or during the application process; or
 - c. **Other Covered Workers:** (i) An individual employed by NOR-AM Chemical Company who, in the course of his or her employment, was exposed to Fundal®; (ii) an individual who worked at Empak, Inc. in Deer Park, Texas and/or Micro Chemical in Louisiana and who was exposed to Fundal® in the course of his or her employment; (iii) an individual who worked in a testing or research laboratory and who was exposed to Fundal® in the course of his or her employment; or
- (2) The spouses, parents, children, other relatives, or legal representatives of the NOR-AM Exposed Persons described above.
- (3) All members of the Price Settlement Class. The Price Settlement Class means all members of the settlement class certified by the court in Price v. Ciba-Geigy Corp., Civ. No. 94-0647-CB-S (S.D. Ala. 1995), excluding persons determined by the court to be opt-outs of that class. That settlement class thus includes persons residing in the United States who in the course of their employment were exposed to Galecron® or to Galecron® and Fundal® ("Ciba Exposed Persons"); and the spouses, parents, children, other relatives, or legal representatives of the Ciba Exposed Persons described above.

(Collectively "Woodward Settlement Class Members"). Note: If you are an NOR-AM Exposed Person or a Ciba Exposed Person, you are a Woodward Settlement Class Member whether or not you have been diagnosed with an illness. Spouses, parents, children, other relatives, and legal representatives are Woodward Settlement Class Members but the claims they are settling are limited to those arising from a NOR-AM Exposed Person or Ciba Exposed Person's exposure.

II. IMPORTANT MEDICAL NOTICE

To NOR-AM Exposed Persons and Ciba Exposed Persons (as defined above):

You may have an increased risk of developing bladder cancer if you had on-the-job exposure to Fundal® and/or Galecron®. Workers exposed to Fundal® and/or Galecron® should participate in a medical monitoring program because early detection of bladder cancer can result in more effective treatment.

If you had on-the-job exposure to Fundal® and/or Galecron®, it is recommended that you or your doctor call 1-800-211-6913 to learn how you can obtain further medical information or enroll in medical monitoring.

III. PROPOSED SETTLEMENT

The Woodward Settlement provides for the establishment by NOR-AM of two funds to provide medical benefits and compensation to eligible Woodward Settlement Class Members or their legal representatives. This settlement is intended, where applicable, to work as a complement to the Price Settlement.

The total package of benefits potentially available to a NOR-AM Exposed Person is the same as the total package of benefits potentially available to a Ciba Exposed Person. Thus, Woodward Settlement Class Members may be eligible for the same benefits whether they were occupationally exposed to Fundal® only, or to Fundal® and Galecron®, or to Galecron® only.

(1) The NOR-AM Medical Monitoring and Treatment Fund ("The NOR-AM MMT Fund")

If the Woodward Settlement is approved, NOR-AM will make an initial deposit of \$3,500,000 into the NOR-AM MMT Fund, and will thereafter make additional deposits on an as-needed basis. There is no limit to the amount of money NOR-AM can be required to contribute over the life of the NOR-AM MMT Fund, which will last a minimum of 20 years.

NOR-AM Exposed Persons will be entitled to participate in the NOR-AM medical monitoring and treatment program; Ciba Exposed Persons may receive medical monitoring and treatment benefits only through the Price Settlement. The NOR-AM medical monitoring and treatment program and the medical monitoring and treatment program provided through the Price Settlement are identical. The NOR-AM MMT Fund will pay for a medical monitoring program designed to detect at an early stage the form of bladder cancer alleged to be associated with exposure to Fundal®; specifically, primary urothelial carcinoma of the urinary collecting system, i.e., renal pelvis, ureter, bladder and urethra. The NOR-AM MMT Fund will also pay for all medically necessary treatment for NOR-AM Exposed Persons.

(2) The NOR-AM Disease Compensation and Administration Fund ("The NOR-AM DCA Fund")

If the Woodward Settlement is approved, NOR-AM will also make an initial deposit of \$21,000,000 into the NOR-AM DCA Fund, up to a required maximum of \$30,000,000. The NOR-AM DCA Fund will make cash payments of up to \$626,500 on behalf of a NOR-AM Exposed Person who, after exposure to Fundal® only, has developed or in the future develops the form of bladder cancer alleged to be associated with Fundal®. In addition, the NOR-AM DCA Fund will make cash supplements amounting to 40% of the amounts scheduled for and paid as compensatory payments pursuant to the Price settlement, up to \$179,000, on behalf of a Ciba Exposed Person who, after exposure to Fundal® and Galecron® or to Galecron® only, has developed or in the future develops the form of bladder cancer alleged to be associated with Fundal® and Galecron®. The NOR-AM DCA Fund will also pay for administrative costs and class counsel's and administrative class counsel's attorney fees, costs and expenses

as determined by the Court. The total attorney fee award to be requested will not exceed 20% of the benefit conferred upon the class. The benefits of the NOR-AM DCA Fund will continue as long as the NOR-AM MMT Fund continues, or until the NOR-AM DCA Fund is exhausted. If the NOR-AM DCA Fund is exhausted, NOR-AM may continue paying for compensable claims. If NOR-AM does not continue to pay for these compensable claims, Woodward Settlement Class Members will be able to opt-out of the NOR-AM DCA Fund and pursue any legal claims they may have, except for claims for medical monitoring, medical treatment, fear of illness or cancer, or increased risk of illness or cancer.

(3) **Other Conditions.** The Stipulation of Settlement presently provides for medical monitoring, treatment and compensation payments for certain medical conditions set forth in this Notice. In the event, however, that a Court-approved Epidemiology Panel determines to a reasonable medical certainty that any other medical condition is caused by Fundal® or Galecron® exposure, that condition will be deemed a compensable claim, and will be eligible for medical monitoring (if feasible), medical treatment, and cash payments.

(4) **Release.** Woodward Settlement Class Members who do not exclude themselves from the Woodward Settlement Class release all past, present and future claims (i) relating to the covered medical conditions listed above; and (ii) relating to a Woodward Settlement Class Member's exposure to Fundal® or Galecron®, including all claims alleging that any other cancers, personal injuries or risks are caused by exposure to Fundal® or Galecron®.

IV. CLASS REPRESENTATIVES AND CLASS COUNSEL

The Court has designated the following Woodward Settlement Class Members, Jack H. Woodward, Alta Woodward, Tom Lofton, Cindy Lofton and Rita Snow, as class representatives to represent all Woodward Settlement Class Members. The Court has also designated as Class Counsel the following individuals: Timothy E. Eble, S.C. Middlebrooks III, and David R. Donaldson.

V. RIGHTS AND OPTIONS OF WOODWARD SETTLEMENT CLASS MEMBERS

If you are a Woodward Settlement Class Member, you have the following options:

- (1) You may do nothing and remain a Woodward Settlement Class Member. If you choose to take no action, your interests as a member of the Woodward Settlement Class will be represented by the Class Representatives and Class Counsel at no cost to you.
- (2) You may remain a Woodward Settlement Class Member and either represent yourself or hire your own attorney to represent you at your own cost.
- (3) You may remain a Woodward Settlement Class Member and object to the settlement.
- (4) If you choose to remain a Woodward Settlement Class Member (under options 1, 2 or 3 above), you may receive the benefits afforded by this settlement within six months of the Court's Order directing this Notice.
- (5) You may request exclusion from this settlement.

Reduce risk of prostate cancer

Men who restrict fat in their diets may lower their risk for prostate cancer.

That's the indication of a six-month study to determine if limiting fat intake to 20 percent of total calories would reduce levels of prostate specific antigen, a blood marker used to indicate the risk for prostate cancer.

"In patients with really elevated PSA, we observed a 10 percent reduction," said Dr. Dov Kadmon, a urologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "We hoped this study would tell us if there was a downward trend in PSA levels associated with a lower-fat diet. We wanted to know the feasibility of conducting a larger study with a larger reduction of fat intake, perhaps as low as 10 percent."

The average PSA reduction in study subjects was one

point. "That's not a huge amount," Kadmon said, "but it was a measurable drop, and perhaps such drops in PSA levels have a cumulative effect."

Prostate cancer, the major cancer killer in men 50 and older, occurs significantly more often in black men than in white men.

"I think that in prostate cancer it makes all the sense in the world to address prevention rather than treatment and cure," Kadmon said, "because there is worldwide epidemiological evidence that extraneous factors, most likely including diet, make a difference."

Kadmon also suggested that all men 50 and older be screened annually for prostate cancer using a PSA blood test and a digital examination.

Black men and men with a family history of prostate cancer should be screened annually beginning at age 40.

Students meet to pray for school, nation

About sixty-five students and adults, including administration personnel and teachers, gathered at the Robert Lee School flag pole Tuesday, September 20, at 7:00 am.

The event was to celebrate the International Student-led Day of Prayer. The service was led by representatives of each junior high and high school class. Following the ceremony, a breakfast was served for the students at the Robert Lee Baptist Church.

Racing heartbeat may be genetic

A faulty protein may make some people's hearts race, say scientists at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

MVP's symptom's include a rapid heart beat, fatigue, lightheadedness, headache, chest pain, anxiety, and nausea. The disease is prevalent in tall, thin individuals, particularly women.

"In our studies, we were able to examine how the adrenaline system works and pinpoint certain proteins that increase heart rates," said Dr. Al Davies, an associate professor of medicine at Baylor.

Chief among them was the "G-protein" that causes MVP patients' hearts to overreact to their own adrenaline and adrenaline-like hormones.

Davies says that a patient with MVP dysautonomia might have 110 heart beats per minute, compared to 70 beats per minute in an otherwise healthy individual.

"The symptoms we observed clearly suggest an abnormality of the make-up of the adrenaline system," said Davies. "We wanted to have a better understanding of how this system works and offer more effective treatment."

Current therapy involves minimizing stressful situations that may trigger the excess adrenaline action, moderate exercise, and salt tablets combined with a hormone to decrease adrenaline flow to the bloodstream. In severe cases, a beta-blocker is also prescribed.

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 50 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that the legislature by general law may authorize the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue general obligation bonds of the state in an amount not exceeding \$300 million to finance educational loans to students. The maximum interest rate to be borne by the bonds must be set by law. The legislature may provide for the investment of bond proceeds and may establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of \$300 million in general obligation bonds to finance education loans to students."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation the property of an organization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas if the property is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organization as defined by general law. The Comptroller's Property Tax Division has identified the Grand Lodge of Texas, also known as the Masonic Lodges, as the primary organization which would qualify for this tax exemption.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation property of an organization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas that is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organization."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 51 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides that the farm and ranch finance program fund shall be administered by the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority and not by the Veterans' Land Board, as provided by current law. In addition, the proposed amendment provides that the proceeds of \$200 million of the \$500 million in bonds authorized by the Texas Constitution for the farm and ranch finance program fund may be diverted to the agricultural fund and the rural micro-enterprise development fund, also authorized by the Texas Constitution, to be used for agricultural and rural economic development programs.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing the use of existing bond authority of the farm and ranch finance program to include financial assistance for the expansion, development, and diversification of production, processing, marketing, and export of Texas agricultural products."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 46 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow an encumbrance to be fixed on homestead property for an owelty of partition. In divorce and probate situations, a piece of property may be owned jointly by two

or more people, and each person owns an undivided interest in the property, as opposed to a specific portion of the property. If one owner wishes to purchase the other person's interest in the property and wishes to obtain a loan to finance the purchase, the lending institution requires all interests in the property to be used as security for the loan; this is called an owelty of partition. Senate Joint Resolution 46 would allow the lending institution to foreclose on the homestead property for an owelty of partition if the purchaser defaulted on the loan. In addition, the proposed amendment would allow the refinancing of a lien against a homestead. Finally, the proposed amendment would allow a purchaser or lender to rely on an affidavit that states that the property to be conveyed or encumbered is not the homestead of the affiant.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting an encumbrance to be fixed on homestead property for an owelty of partition, including a debt of a spouse resulting from a division or award of a homestead in a divorce proceeding, and for the refinancing of a lien against a homestead, including a federal tax lien resulting from the tax debt of the owner."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase by \$500 million the constitutional authorization of the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell general obligation bonds of the state to provide housing financing to Texas veterans. The proceeds from the bonds authorized by this amendment shall be used to augment the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund II to be administered and invested as provided by law. The bonds authorized by this amendment shall be incontestable after execution by the Veterans' Land Board, approval by the attorney general, and delivery to the purchaser.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to increase by \$500 million the amount of general obligation bonds that may be issued to augment the veterans' housing assistance fund II."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 64 proposes a constitutional amendment which would extend the tax exemption under article VIII, section 1-b(b) of the Texas Constitution for the residence homestead of a person age 65 or older to the surviving spouse of a person who received the exemption. The surviving spouse must be age 55 or older when the deceased spouse died, and the property must be the residence homestead of the surviving spouse when the deceased spouse died and remain the surviving spouse's residence homestead. A surviving spouse who already receives an exemption under this section of the Texas Constitution is not entitled to an additional exemption under the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting from ad valorem taxation the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of an elderly person."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would reduce the amount of general obligation bonds authorized for the superconducting super collider fund from \$500 million to \$250 million.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment reducing the amount of general obligation bonds authorized for undertakings related to the superconducting super collider research facility from \$500 million to \$250 million."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 80 proposes a constitutional amendment abolishing the office of constable in Mills, Reagan, and Roberts counties. In Mills County, the office of constable is abolished, and the powers, duties, and records of the office are transferred to the sheriff. In Reagan and Roberts counties, the office of constable is abolished and the powers, duties, and records of the office are transferred to the sheriff only if a majority of voters in each of the respective counties favors the proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the abolition of the office of constable in Mills, Reagan, and Roberts counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow investment of money from the Texas growth fund in a business without the business's disclosure of its investments in or with South Africa or Namibia. Currently, such investments are prohibited by article XVI, section 70(r) of the Texas Constitution, which would be repealed.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing investment of money from the Texas growth fund in a business without the business's disclosure of its investments in or with South Africa or Namibia."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the constitutional office of state treasurer effective September 1, 1996. The transfer of specific constitutional powers and duties to the comptroller of public accounts takes effect on that date. The statutory powers and duties and the property and other obligations of the state treasurer are transferred to officers and agencies of state government as the legislature provides by general law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment abolishing the office of state treasurer."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 72 proposes a constitutional amendment requiring that land devoted to wildlife management be taxed on the basis of its productive capacity. The proposed amendment also adds a temporary provision to the Texas Constitution validating the changes to the law made by Chapter 560, Acts of the 72nd Legislature, Regular Session, 1991, which amended the Tax Code to allow land used for wildlife management to be appraised as agricultural land. The temporary provision also provides that a property owner is not authorized to claim a refund of taxes paid unless the tax payment was challenged before the effective date of the proposed amendment. The temporary provision expires on January 1, 1998.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow open-space land used for wildlife management to qualify for tax appraisal in the same manner as open-space agricultural land, subject to eligibility limitations provided by the legislature."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 31 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that the legislature may exempt from ad valorem taxation income-producing personal property and mineral interests that have a taxable value which is insufficient to recover the costs of administering the tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation personal property and mineral interests having a value insufficient to recover the administrative costs of collecting the taxes."

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution No. 35 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the governing body of a political subdivision to exempt from ad valorem taxation boats and other equipment used primarily in the commercial taking or production of fish, shrimp, shellfish, and other marine life.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the governing body of a political subdivision to exempt from ad valorem taxation boats and other equipment used primarily in the commercial taking or production of fish, shrimp, shellfish, and other marine life."

PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 68 proposes a constitutional amendment that allows the legislature to raise the current ad valorem tax exemption for disabled veterans and their surviving spouses and minor children. The tax exemptions would be raised based on a veteran's disability rating as follows:

Disability	Maximum Tax Exemption
10%-30%	\$ 5,000
30%-50%	\$ 7,500
50%-70%	\$10,000
More than 70%	\$12,000
Age 65 and 10% or higher	\$12,000
Loss or loss of use of limb	\$12,000
Blindness or paraplegia	\$12,000

The spouse and children of any veteran who dies while on active duty may be granted an exemption of up to \$5,000. The amounts of the exemptions provided for in this proposed amendment may be repealed by the legislature by general law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to raising the limits of the exemption from ad valorem taxation of property owned by disabled veterans or by the surviving spouses or surviving minor children of disabled veterans."

ORDINANCE #292 AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE #3

THE AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE #3 IS AS FOLLOWS:

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the City Council of the City of Bronte, Texas, as follows, to-wit:

1. **Jurisdiction:** The Corporation Court shall have exclusive original jurisdiction within the territorial limits of the municipal in all criminal cases that:

a. Arise under the ordinances of the municipality.

b. Are punishable by a fine not to exceed (1) \$2000.00 in cases arising under municipal ordinances that govern fire, safety, zoning, or public health and sanitation, including the dumping of refuse, or (2) \$500.00 in all other cases.

2. **Concurrent Jurisdiction:** The Corporation Court has concurrent jurisdiction with the Justice Court of the precinct in which the municipality is located and all criminal cases arising under state law that:

a. Arise within the territorial limits of the municipality.

b. Are punishable by fine not to exceed \$200.00.

The Corporation Court has jurisdiction in the forfeiture and final judgment of all bail bonds and personal bonds taken in all criminal cases of which the court has jurisdiction.

3. **Judge:** The Corporation Court shall be presided over by the "Judge of the Municipal Court" who shall be appointed for a term of one year.

4. **Rules of Procedure:** The authority and the procedure of the Municipal Court of the City of Bronte shall be governed by Chapter 45, Texas Criminal Procedure Code and Rules as amended by Article 45.01 through 45.54 and any additional articles as may be enacted.

Asian ambrosia beetle spreading through state

Entomologists across the state are keeping a wary eye out for the Asian ambrosia beetle, which has already created problems in several nurseries in southeast and northeast Texas.

Four counties - Brazoria, Burleson, Grimes, and Van Zandt - have been added to the list of infested counties this year. Hunt County was added late in 1994. This brings to 41 the total number of counties where the ambrosia beetle has been found since specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service first began monitoring its movement across the state in 1994, said Bill Ree, Extension entomologist.

The pest attacks numerous

woody plants, and its damage may be identified by the toothpick-like spines which protrude 1 1/2 inches from the host plant. These spines are the "sawdust" left after the female beetle bores into the host to make brood galleries, or nurseries.

The ambrosia beetle bores horizontally into the tree, not vertically like most wood pests. That eventually causes more damage to the different sections or layers, of the branch, notes the Texas A&M University-based entomologist.

The pest has been found in Shumard oak, burr oak, chinquapin, red bud, Chinese pistachio, Mexican plum, golden raintree, and Bradford pear in Texas nurseries. It also may attack pecan trees.
