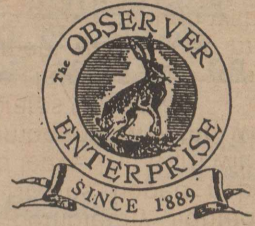

Preparations for the 56th Coke County Junior Livestock Show are getting underway. This year's show will begin next weekend with the Market Lambs beginning at 5:30 pm on Friday, January 29, followed by Meat Goats, both of which will be judged by Jerry Swift, County Extension Agent from Eldorado. Be-

ginning at 8:30 am on Saturday, January 20 will be the Market Swine show judged by Keith Rowan of Knox City, followed by the Market Steer show getting underway at 11:00 am judged by Billy Reagor, County Extension Agent from Ozona. This year's show should afford some outstanding competi-

tion in all classes with the quality of animals being as high as any previous show.

As always, the barbecue prepared by Waylon Drennan, Gaylon Pitcock, Roy Tinkler and company will begin at 12:00 noon on Saturday. The awards presentation and Premium Sale will begin at 2:00 pm on Saturday. 6000 see Barn Lights

Bryan's Barn, a mile west of Robert Lee on Messbox Creek, was a busy place from December 3, 1995, through December 31. Every night from 6:00 to 10:00 pm, the doors were open to visitors wishing to see an abundance of Christmas lights. Most of the six acres glowed with a variety of nativity scenes, Santa's elves and other helpers, angels, stars, Mr. and Mrs. Santa sitting in the front porch swing and on a mower and its trailer, and trees along the creek bank glimmering with many colors and designs, much of which was reflected in the water of the creek, which also held several lighted figures floating and reflecting.

Among the favorites were Santa fishing with his lighted pole and line as he sat on the west creek bank; a realistic nativity scene that seemed to be in a grotto; fences topped with lights all running in the same direction; entrance roads completely lined with lights; the 16 tall pine trees leading into the barn area strewn with clear lights and

blue bases; and an 8-foot live trap standing on end filled with lights and creating a beautiful spot. The trap lights had been donated by two very young barn fans who returned many nights to enjoy showing "our lights" to other visitors and to feel the accomplishment of having created such a big, beautiful spot for all to enjoy. (That's Christmas!)

The heart of the whole project was depicted in the sign which read "LIGHT OF THE WORLD". The silhouette of The Holy Family in front of the sign completely lighted it. The Bryans hoped nobody would leave The Barn without remembering why the world celebrates Christmas.

The family's one disappointment was that so many people drove through without coming into the barn. Inside was a fairland of toys, many collections of family keepsakes gathered over a period of years displayed on shelves which hung on walls and posts, and a 10' x 16' table

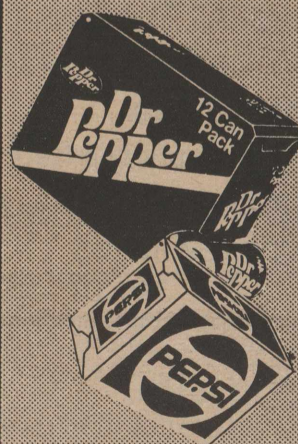


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BRONTE SCHOOL NEWS

The Bronte Longhorns have spent the past several weeks honing their basketball skills before the district race starts. Following are the results of the last several weeks play and individual stats for the players.

The Horns faced off against the Menard Yellowjackets and walked off with a big 71-44 win. Gary Walker was high point man with 22 points in the contest. Keith Treadaway scored 15 for the Horns and had 8 rebounds and 6 steals. 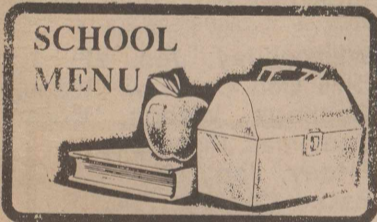



completely full of animated dolls, mobiles, and musical devices. Every table held some active toys, and a long bench held toys to be played with by visiting toddlers and older children.

The Bryan family members especially enjoyed visiting with those who came in, registered, and stayed to explore the "stuff" on the many shelves and the Christmas tree. Several friends brought unique decorations that will become permanent fixtures.

Wilson, the patriarch of the family and the one who had done much of the work of putting up the lights and decorations, enjoyed seeing old and new friends, but his greatest joy was showing children the amusing toys he kept on the table by his rocking chair. Some children remember him each year because "He plays with me." Lucile, the matriarch, Thelma Jo Hinnard, daughter, Cookie Burns, granddaughter, and Molly Burns, great-granddaughter, especially enjoyed conversing with visitors, trying to miss no one. Richard, a son, specialized in patrolling the toy table and keeping everything running correctly, while his wife, Tillie, carefully directed visitors to "be sure and register." Terry Frank Bryan, a son, was unable to participate because of illness.

Numerous friends assisted in putting up lights and other decorations. Several took turns helping for a full evening to direct visitors, registering everyone, and answering questions.

The most often asked questions are: Why do you do this? How many lights do you have? How long does it take to put them up? Do you leave them up all year? When do you start? What does it do to your electric bill?

Stock answers are: Because it's Christmas! A BUNCH! A long time; mostly on weekends from early October to December 3 and as long as blank spots are found that need filling. No; they come down. Since most of the lights are small and stay on only four hours per night, it is not prohibitive -- and worth every cent!

From the registration books, Lucile has compiled the following information: In 1994, almost 6,000 names were recorded. The youngest visitor discovered was a baby 2 weeks old, but her mother failed to indicate that information, and her name was not recognized later. (If someone can provide that information, Bryans will be glad. There may be oldsters missed, also.)

The Bryan family appreciates all of those who helped in any way to make December of '95 the success that it was community-wide. Many travelers came to Robert Lee and drove extensively over town, declaring it to be one of the best lighted communities they visited. Scores of people over large parts of the world know where Robert Lee is and that it is beautifully lighted at Christmas. It is a little town with a big heart, and of the many who came to view, visit, or to "eat out at one of those good restaurants," many will come back again and again.

The unanimous opinion of EVERY PERSON who saw the lights at The Barn and expressed opinions was, "This is the best display I have ever seen." It is easy to see that the trees, fences, reflecting creek, extensive area, and unusual homemade articles and designs are largely responsible, as well as a number of dedicated family members and faithful friends willing to do the work of "putting up and taking down." The community is behind it all.

When former visitors tell others about it, they not only say, "You've got to see . . .," they say, "You've got to see Bryan's Barn at Robert Lee!"
