Longhorns make "All West-Texas"

As the 1995 football season ended, sports writers began voting for their choices of all-around athletes for hand-picked "perfect" teams. Three Bronte Longhorns found their names on the roster for the Standard-Times All-West Texas Football Team in Class 1A.

Keith Treadaway, a junior, was chosen as an end, carrying 93 times, scoring 5 touchdowns while gaining 763 yards. In addition to those stats, he gained 404 yards on 24 grabs, including 5 touchdowns.

Senior Cory Robinson, defensive back for the Longhorns was credited with 5 interceptions and 5 fumble recoveries, aiding Bronte to a regional playoff slot.

Defensive lineman Darrell Sharp, a senior at BHS, was a work horse for the team, making 102 tackles and recovering 3 fumbles.

More '95 Steer Football Honors...

Robert Lee placed two Steers on the Standard-Times All-West Texas Football Team in Class 1A. Making the squad which was posted in late December, were running back Adam Morgan, and defensive back Eric Hood. Both athletes are seniors at RLHS.

Morgan scored 11 touchdowns for the Steers, averaged 7 yards per carry, and led the team in rushing with 990 yards, despite missing some games with a broken foot.

Nineteen career interceptions were credited to Hood, including the five he grabbed in '95, in addition to his 52 tackles. Hood was also named an honorable mention on the Associated Press Sports Editors' All-State Team. Perhaps Hood's most prestigious recognition came when he was placed on the Standard-Times All-West Texas Super Team since that mythical squad is made up of players from classes 1A through 5A.

Severe thunderstorm and tornado warnings will be most effective for your county if the National Weather Service can include actual sightings from trained and reliable spotters.


The bridegroom attended Odessa High School and is also a student at Hardin-Simmons. He is employed by Embassy Suites in Abilene.

Senior Candidates may file for TSHL

Texans 60 years of age or older have an opportunity to become a representative from this region to the Texas Silver-Haired Legislature (TSHL). Candidacy filing officially began Jan. 2 for the locally-elected, all-senior advocacy group which works with the Texas Legislature and other

state officials to develop laws addressing major issues that affect older Texans.

The TSHL's 116 unpaid members meet every two years in Austin to deliberate upon and suggest appropriate legislative action. Each member is responsible for staying in touch with key issues in his or her multi-county "district" and bringing those concerns to the attention of both the TSHL as a whole and lawmakers.

Registered Texas voters who are 60 years of age or older may file as candidates through February 29, 1996. Terms run for two years. TSHL members must pay all of their own expenses. Elections for the Texas Silver-Haired Legislature will be held May 28, 1996.




Lady Steers win road game



USDA issues sheep referendum procedures

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced procedures for a referendum on a proposed Sheep and Wool Promotion, Research, Education and Information Order. The referendum will be conducted February 1, 1996.

USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, an agency in the marketing and regulatory programs mission area, has oversight responsibility for federal research and promotion programs. AMS administrator Lon Hatamiya said all producers, feeders and importers who certify they were engaged in the production, feeding or importation of sheep or sheep products (except importers of raw wool only) between January 1 and December 31, 1994, are eligible to vote.

Voters may register and vote in person or request absentee ballots at the Coke County office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Absentee ballots must be requested from the county Extension office serving the county of voter residence, for individuals, or the county where the business headquarters is located, for corporations. Absentee ballot requests, filed in person or by mail, may be

made between January 16 and January 26, 1996. Absentee ballots must be received in county Extension offices by close of business February 2.

The Farm Service Agency, formerly the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, will count ballots, determine eligibility of voters and tabulate results.

For the order to go into effect, the proposal must be approved either by a simple majority of voters or by voters who account for two-thirds of the sheep and wool production represented in the referendum.

If approved, the program would be funded by mandatory assessments. Domestic producers and feeders would be assessed 1 cent per pound on sales of live sheep and 2 cents per pound on sales of greasy wool. Importers would be assessed 1 cent per pound or the equivalent on imported degreased wool and wool products.

Details of the voting procedures are published in the December 15 Federal Register. Copies of the final referendum rules, the proposed order and additional information will be available at Coke County office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.



Poison Center warns against diet dangers

If your New Year's resolution includes losing weight, the West Texas Regional Poison Center warns you to exercise caution. There are many dangers associated with over-the-counter appetite suppressants and herbal diet products. These substances often cause anxiety, headaches, insomnia, vomiting, seizures, destruction of the liver, scarring of the stomach and a variety of other symptoms.

Many diet aids have been shown to have appetite suppressant properties in animals, but have proven questionable in humans. Still other aids are diuretics or water pills, which cause fluid to be lost from the body in the form of increased urination, thereby making the user lose water weight and nothing more.

Another potentially dangerous practice among dieters is to supplement their daily intake with megadoses of vitamins to make up for what is nutritionally lacking during their weight loss regimen.

People who expect a quick tax refund may be disappointed. The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) will be delaying returns that have Social Security numbers that do not match IRS records. These include the Social Security numbers of dependents as well as filers. You should

check your Social Security number now on the W-2 you will receive in January against your Social Security card and be sure to have your Social Security card handy when you complete your tax return. If you have misplaced your Social Security card, call Social Security for a duplicate before the tax processing crunch begins. The number is 1-800-772-1213.
