## to recycle

 Thanks to the efforts of former Robert Lee mayor and current city councilman John Conley, the Concho Valley Council of Governments Trashaway, Robert Lee FFA, Cindy Bessent, and curren mayor Kelly Nichols, Robert Lee now has a means for recycling at two locations in town.On Friday, May 17, Mayo Kelly Nichols snipped the red ribbon connecting three o the bright blue recycling bins which are now accessible to residents of Robert Lee These bins are located be hind the school on a concrete slab poured by Robert Lee FFA students. Elementary FFA students. Elementary teacher Cindy Bessent was also responsible for getting the bins at the school. In addition, two other bins are located at the post office, to make disposal of recyclable goods even more conve nient.

The cooperative effort to obtain the recycling bins also involved the CVCOG, who granted $\$ 5,500$ to the city and Trashaway Service of San Angelo, who will service the bins on a regular basis. "And all of the funds generated from the recycling will be donated back to the Robert Lee school," Nichols commented.
Prior to the ribbon-cutting, a slide show on recycling was presented to kindergarten prough sixth-grade students hrough sixth-grade students by Trashaway recycling man ager Reid Donaldson. Don aldson stressed, "Anything we can put in the blue con tainers, We don't have andfill."
Fifth grade student Amber Robinson has already taken recycling to heart. She saves empty Gatorade bottles and refills them with liquids she likes to drink. She also fills empty milk cartons with KoolAid "And I use cardboard Aid. And lus eardoard my dog eats the plastic my dog eats the plastic wastebasket," she said

## Texas DPS update

Traffic deaths increased by 1 percent in Texas in 1995 compared with the year before, but the number of fatalities per 100 million miles driven dropped to the lowest level in the state's history, Department of Public Safety statistics show.
"What this record-low death rate of 1.7 means is that the chance of being killed in a traffic accident in Texas was the lowest it has ever been, said DPS Director Col. James
R. Wilson. "We are con cerned that the actual number of deaths was up slightly, bu considering our large popula tion, rapid growth and the amount of driving we do in Texas, the situation certainly could have been much worse."
Statistics compiled by the DPS show 3,172 persons died in traffic crashes in 1995 up 1 percent from 1994, when 3,142 fatalities were reported.
"Another encouraging sign we see is that alcohol- and drug-related traffic fatalities were down in 1995," Wilson said. "Accidents involving intoxicated drivers were down 2.7 percent."

Still, intoxicated drivers accounted for 1,138 deaths 35.9 percent of all fatalities.
"Though the speed limit on some Texas highways insome Texas highways in8 last year, it is too early to tell 8 last year, it is too early to tell
what effect this will have on what effect this will have on traffic safety in the state," Wil son said. "Even so, motorists need to keep in mind that exceeding the speed limit is dangerous."
Traffic fatality reports for 1995 showed a slight increase in the number of motorcycle fatalities (from 126 in 1994 to 129 in 1995) and a 7.7 percent increase in pedestrian traffic deaths, from 428 to 461.
No traffic fatalities were reported in Texas on Feb. 28, 1995, the only day during the year when no traffic deaths occurred. Twice during 1995 single accidents claimed six or single accide

Uness there is a tremendous oad of casebearer eggs pre sent on the nutlets, it is suggested to not spray for control of the casebearers. A light in restation of casebearers can actually assist in thinning the pecan load resulting in larger more completely filled out nuts this fall. Also, any insecticide application for casebearer control will in all probability result in a much larger in festation of yellow aphids which cause the honeydew to fall from the trees. Yellow aphids are generally a much larger pest problem for our area than the casebearer.

## CRMWD begins water release <br> from Ivie

On Friday, May 3, 1996, the Colorado River Municipal Wa ter District began releasing water from Lake Ivie. "This water from Lake lvie. "This release is expected to continue through mid-June until the level of the lake reaches elevation 1543. The lake leve will drop about six feet," said CRMWD General Manager John Grant. This release is being made as a part of the District's efforts to improve water quality in its reservoirs, and notification by the Lower Colorado River Authority, located in Austin, to release water under the terms of a 1985 agreement between the District and LCRA. CRMWD is equired to release water stored in Lake lvie above elevation 1543 mean sea level if he combined capacities of Lakes Buchanan and Travis are less than 95 percent and LCRA calls for the water to be released. According to CRA, the current combined proximately 73 percent proximately 73 percent. "Even though the capacity in 93 percent to 73 percent after the release, we will still have enough water to meet the needs of our municipal cusomers," Grant said.
On April 18, 1996, the District began a transfer of 50,000 acre feet of water from Lake Spence to Lake Ivie as another step to improve water quality in Spence. The poor quality of water is a direct result of spills of extremely highchloride water from Natural Dam Lake, which occurred in the late 1980s. This transfer will reduce the contents of Spence by one-third from 150,000 acre-feet to 100,000 acre-feet and should be completed by mid-June. "We took advantage of the available capacity we had in Lake Ivie and blended the maximum amount from Spence we could and still keep the quality in Ivie within acceptable limits," said Grant. The transfer will result in blending ten parts of Ivie water with one part of Spence water. "The longterm benefits will far outweigh the short-term negatives," Grant said. In the short term, the level of Spence will drop about nine feet to elevation 1855, and the chlorides will rise in Ivie, "although we don't believe that you will be able to taste the difference," Grant said. "When we do get inflow into Spence, the quality will start improving much sooner because we have removed a third of our problem. We're also getting to the time of year
when we expect runoff into our lakes," he said. "We are doing what we can to improve quality," said Grant, "but we still need the rain."
District personnel have been monitoring the Spence water as it moves down to and through Lake Ivie. "Although some dilution has occurred the Spence water has stayed together as it moves into the Ivie Reservoir. We originally lvie Reservoir. We originally thought the dilution would has," Grant said. As this water has," Grant said. As this water makes its way to the dam the District will continue to monitor the quality on a daily basis. If necessary, the District is plan ning to release water from higher elevations in the lake to control the blend of water being released.
CRMWD and LCRA have begun working together to gather additional data as water from Spence moves through Lake Ivie. "We have a shor window of opportunity, and with both organizations work ing together, more informa tion will be obtained. This information will be very useful in predicting how water of differ predicting will flow throug " qualis " Grant said Lake Ivie," Grant said "Improving the quality of wate in Spence will not only benef our customers, but also those who take water from the river below our Lakes," Grant said.
There has already been a great deal of concern from water users along the Colorado River below Lake lvie regarding the overall quality of water being released from lvie wacerbe it is different than because 1 is dire most water users downiver are used to; however, the iv no different than the quality the District delivers to the District delivers to Odessa, Big Spring, Midland and Stanton for municipal use," Grant said.

## New vaccine encouraging <br> to ranchers

in a summer of worry, cattle ranchers are getting good news. A newly approved brucellosis vaccine, RB-51, can cut producers' concerns about vaccinated cows getting false-positive results on brucellosis tests.
"This could be the best news of summer," said Dr. Terry Beals, executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the state's regulatory agency for livestock health.
"In field trials, female cattle vaccinated with RB-51 had no false-positive test results at the sale barns, or in the laboratory," he said. "Even though Texas has only 32 cattle herds quarantined due to brucellosis infection, calfhood vaccination still plays a protective role in areas where we're working to clean up infection."
Heifers can be vaccinated against brucellosis, a bacterial disease that can affect them as adults, resulting in weak calves, abortions, or reduced milk production. Some infected cattle show no symptoms. For years, the weapon against infection was Strain 19, a vaccine that can cause false readings on blood tests. "Producers and regulator staff struggled routinely with cows that had been Strain 19. The animals were blood-tested or milked blood-tested or in the effort to repeatedly in the effort to
make a correct diagnosis," make a correct diagnosis,"
said Dr. Beals. "Typically, these vaccinated animals weren't infected. The Strain 19 caused false-positive test results."
"RB-51 vaccine protects without the risk of false-positive tests," he said. "Ideally veterinarians should give RB 51 vaccine to heifers when they are four to eight months old. Animals develop maxi mum immunity to brucellosis bacteria if they're protected before puberty, when thei natural resistance is high TAHC regulations allow heifers as old as 10 months to

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Avoiding the "Vacation Virus" AHH, VACATION! The last place you want to be is sprawled across a hotel bed, your complexion a greenish pale, your only companion a pail.
Unfortunately, travel, particularly foreign travel, may present certain health hazards, such as motion sickness, stomach cramps or fatigue.
If bedrest isn't the kind of rest you had planned for your vacation, Tobias Samo, MD, an infectious disease specialist at The Methodist Hospital in Houston, offers these tips to help you stay helathy as you see the world:

* Beware of Montezuma's Revenge, in reality a virus or bacteria that's not confined to Mexico. It can strike you in places the angry Aztec never even heard of: Nepal, Fiji, anywhere. So, don't drink the water (unless it's been thoroughly boiled) or suck the ice cubes. Stick to bottled water, particularly the bubbly kind. Also, refrain from buying street vendors' edible wares. Dairy products -- including ice cream -- are potentially dangerous, as are any fresh fruits or vegetables for which you don't peel the skin yourself. Thoroughly cooked and promptly served meals are your safest bet. And skip salads on return flights; most airline meals originate in the country of departure.
As a preventive measure, take two chewable PeptoBismol tablets four times daily - before meals and at bedtime - if OK'd by your physician. If More from Popto Bismol to swich Irom Peplo Bistrit to Imodium AD and an antibiotic prescribed by your doctor. Then wait, usually only 12 hours to three days.

Travelers using public modes of transportation should watch out for cold and flu viruses. Crowded airplanes buses, and trains are deal places to pick up bugs, dear places to pick up bugs, especially on unfamiliar terrain where you're not immune to the various viruses going around.
To prevent colds, which are spread through physical contact, Samo suggests washing your hands often. Influenza, which is airborne, is a little harder to avoid. Ask your doctor if you should get a flu shot before bonvoyage-ing.

* Put a Boy Scout to shame with your preparations. Pack antacids and Pepto-Bismol; Neosporin or another antiobiotic ointment; Band-Aids; your preferred painkillers (acetaminophen, aspirin or ibuprofen); calamine lotion for itching; Dramamine for motion sickness; Benadryl to control allergic reactions (don't forget prescription medications you may take occasionally for surprise reactions); and sunscreen of SPF 15 or higher.
Bring enough of your regular prescription medications to last twice as long as your trip, says Samo, packing half in one bag and half in another; if one piece of luggage is lost, stolen or misrouted, you'll still have the proper dosage for the duration of your travels. Keep all medications, not just prescriptions, in their original bottles so customs won't nab them. Samo also recom-
mends carrying copies of your tainous areas at least 8,000 prescriptions and a list of your feet above sea-level, such as drug allergies and medica- in the Andes. Samo suggests tions.

When the climbing gets high, even the experienced can get altitude sickness. Expect shortness of breath and a headache when you reach oxygen-light, moun-

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get to a lower altitude and seek a doctor's care. If you're prone to altitude sickness your doctor may prescribe Kiamox as a preventive.

* To avoid insect bites use a topical repellent that's 25 to 35 percent DEET, or N, N-Di-ethyl-metatoluamide, the most effective solution for keeping six- and eight-legged creatures at bay.

Also, try not to wear brigh clothing and jewelry, and don't use colognes or scented hair sprays, deodorants or soaps, all of which attract in sects.

* See a physician as far in advance of your trip as possi ble, as certain preventive treatments require months to become effective.
