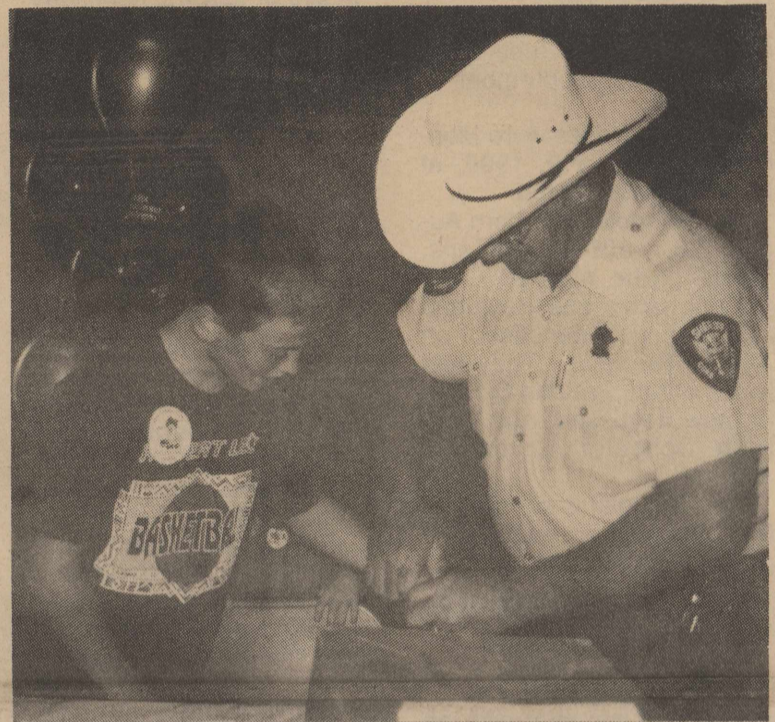
Br. homecoming approaching

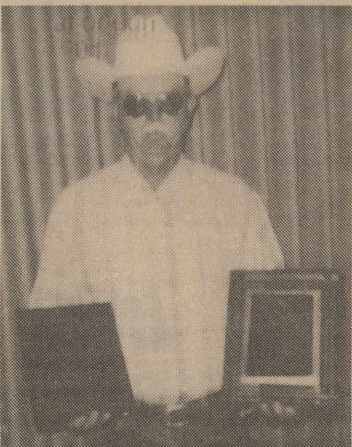

He served as District 7 TCAAA director from 1990-1992 and is presently serving on the State Horse Committee, 1994-1998, and the TCAAA Animal Industries Committee, 1991-1998.

He received his B.S. degree in Animal Science from Texas A&M University.

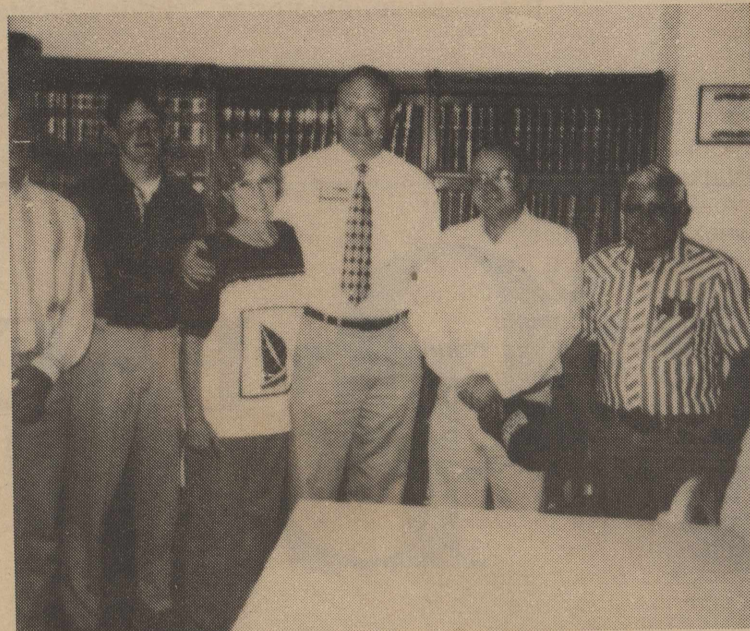

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Judge signs proclamation

Coke County Judge Jackie Walker recently signed a proclamation declaring the week of September 15-21 as Farm and Ranch Safety and Health Week in Coke County. The proclamation read: *Proclamation by the County Judge of Coke County To All To Whom These Presents Shall Come:*

I, Jackie Walker, County Judge of Coke County, do hereby declare the week of September 15-21, 1996, as Farm and Ranch Safety and Health Week in Coke County, for the following reasons:

Whereas, this being the 53rd Anniversary of the Observance of Farm and Ranch Safety and Health, emphasis is placed on better technology, safe work practices and education as a means to a safer agricultural community and

Whereas, the 1996 theme "FOCUS ON THE FUTURE: PRACTICE SAFETY AND HEALTH", calls attention to the fact that each year hundreds of people are killed and thousands are injured in farm-related accidents in the United States. Approximately 150,000 to 200,000 of the injuries occur in workers under age 21. In 1995, there were 418 tractor-related deaths on farms nationwide, and whereas the number one killer of farmers 65 years of age and over is tractor overturns. The average age for a child to drive a tractor on the road is 12 years. Appropriate protective measures should be taken when any farm task involves children; therefore, Texas farmers and ranchers are encouraged to recognize hazards and observe safe work practices and to protect young people by teaching them to work safely.

The Texas Safety Association, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and the Texas Department of Agriculture join the National Safety Council and other organizations in working toward a safer farm and ranch community.

Therefore, I urge our farmers and ranchers to continue improving the working environment for all concerns.

The Bronte Longhorns opened their 1996 season last Friday night by blasting the Eden Bulldogs 40-6. The Horns, with the help of two Eden fumbles, scored 4 times in the 1st quarter to quickly put the game out of reach. The Longhorns outgained the "Dogs" with 345 total yards to their 117.

Keith Treadaway, with a total of 174 rushing yards on the night, scored three 1st quarter TDs, and Kale Beck, with 71 yards rushing on just 12 carries, had one touchdown and two PATs to round out the 1st quarter scoring for the host team. Two more TDs in the second half, one by

Treadaway and the other by Michael Sallee, who had 74 yards rushing on 13 carries, rounded out the scoring for the Horns. The aforementioned names could not have done what they did without outstanding blocking from the guys up front led by Scott Thompson, Shea Kelton, Drew Peterson, Trey Holland, Dustin Johnson & Company.

On the other side of the ball, the Horns had an outstanding defensive effort holding the Bulldog offense to 80 yards rushing on 35 attempts and only two completed passes in 11 attempts. Standout defensive efforts were turned

in by Scott Thompson, who had ten tackles, Scott Graves with six tackles, David Wilson from his outside linebacker position, and Drew Peterson from his defensive tackle position.

The next game for the Longhorns will be Thursday, September 12, against the Abilene Cooper Sophomores. The game begins at 8:00 pm.

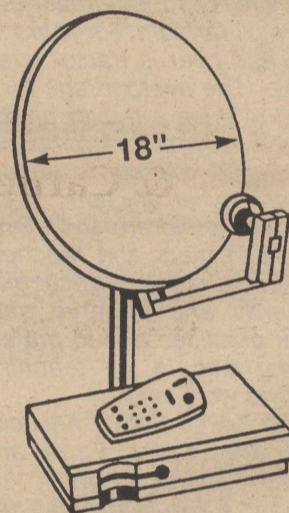

The next regular board meeting will be September 17, 1996 at 6:30 pm in the High School Library.



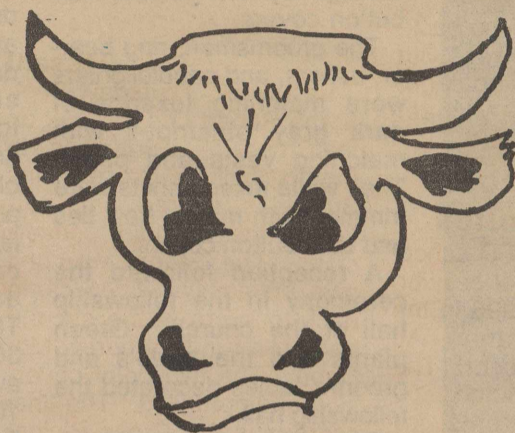

Serving in the houseparty were Dana Robinson, Cynthia Robinson, Fayne Thorn, Reggie McCorkle, and Ruthie Acree.

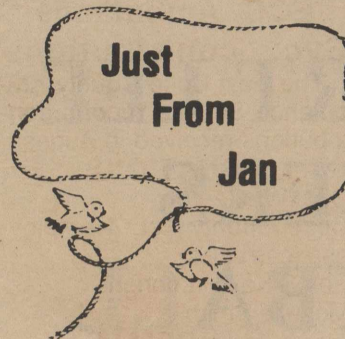

Eating nutritionally

Research indicates that we should be consuming a diet high in complex carbohydrate foods such as whole grain breads and cereals, pastas and grains. Fruits and vegetables are also excellent sources of complex carbohydrates, vitamins, minerals and are low in calories and fat. The daily diet should contain 6-11 servings of grain-based foods, 2-4 servings of fruit and 3-5 servings of vegetables. This will provide approximately 50-60% of the total calories from carbohydrates each day. These foods are excellent sources of fiber. The diet should provide 25-30 grams of fiber daily. The average American consumes 10 grams per day. We tend to limit the intake of these foods, particularly breads and pastas, because we feel that they are high in calories. The excess calories from these foods are found in the things we add to them - high fat sauces, butter, margarine and large amounts of fat when the foods are fried. Total fat and cholesterol in the diet are of interest and concern for many of us. No more than 30% of the calories in the daily diet should come from fat. Emphasis should be placed on reducing the saturated fat level in the diet.

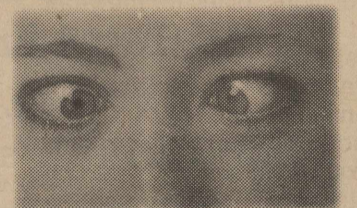
Sources of saturated fat include high fat meats, whole milk dairy products, butter, solid shortening, lard and coconut and palm kernel oil. Daily cholesterol intake should not exceed 300 mg. Protein intake should not exceed 20% of your total calories. Emphasis should be placed on selecting lower fat protein sources such as lean meats, skinned poultry, fish, and low fat cheeses. Don't forget to include some meals made up of plant protein. Entrees made of dried beans and peas make excellent low fat, high fiber additions to the weekly menu. Many Americans consume diets that are high in sodium content. Some hidden sources of sodium in the diet include highly processed foods, some snack foods, pickles and many fast foods. Recommendations for sodium intake are for approximately 2000-3000 mg. per day. Remember that adequate fluid intake is an all important part of the diet. The daily intake should be at least 2 quarts. During exercise or when involved in strenuous outdoor activity, fluid intake should be approximately 1 cup every 15 minutes. Fluid selections for hydration should not contain caffeine, alcohol, or high levels of sugar.

Designed primarily for under-privileged children of numerous ethnic backgrounds, funds are minimal. One way that authorities have found help has been through cashing in Campbell's soup label coupons. Families over large areas have sent them in to the extent that the school was able to buy a bus, lumber for building classrooms, typewriters, etc.

The meeting adjourned with members of the local units hoping to be able to contribute to the school as part of their mission projects.

Her brother, Lance Millican, exhibited the second place medium Finewool Cross.

September 6-7 during the Howard County Fair steer show, Shea Kelton showed the first place light Limousin, first place heavy Limousin, and Champion Limousin. In the senior showmanship, Shea was also crowned champion.

"Moderate" flu season predicted

Experts are predicting a moderate 1996-97 influenza season, but people most at risk for life-threatening flu complications should still get vaccinated - and the sooner

the better.

"The elderly and people with chronic underlying health problems should get vaccinated every flu season," said Dr. W. Paul Glezen, epidemiologist at the Influenza Research Center at Houston's Baylor College of Medicine.

Influenza B will be the dominant strain this season, Glezen said, but there could also be an appearance by A/Wuhan (H3N2), a new variant.

Glezen advises people in the high-risk groups to get inoculated as soon as the vaccine becomes available, usually in early autumn.

In North America, flu season usually begins in earnest after Thanksgiving, but, as happened in 1991, it came earlier.

"If it hits early, the elderly and people with chronic underlying health problems need to be protected," Glezen said.

Every year thousands of people, most of them elderly, die from pneumonia resulting from influenza, he said, and many, perhaps most, of the deaths could have been prevented by vaccination.

Among the people at high risk for possibly deadly flu complications: people with heart disease; lung disease, including asthma and chronic bronchitis; diabetes, chronic kidney disease; chronic anemia, including sickle-cell disease; and immune-system disorders.

Influenza usually strikes suddenly and produces fever, generalized muscle pain, severe weakness and fatigue, a sore throat and a dry, hacking cough.

To reduce fever and pain, adults may take aspirin or aspirin substitutes; children

should take acetaminophen, if needed, said Glezen, a pediatrician. All flu victims should get plenty of bed rest and liquids.

The vaccine is about 85 percent effective in helping people avoid influenza, he said.

Some people worry that they will get the flu from the vaccine, but that is not possible, Glezen said, because the vaccine is made from killed virus.

The vaccine has been shown to significantly lower the risk of hospitalization for influenza and pneumonia in people 65 and older.

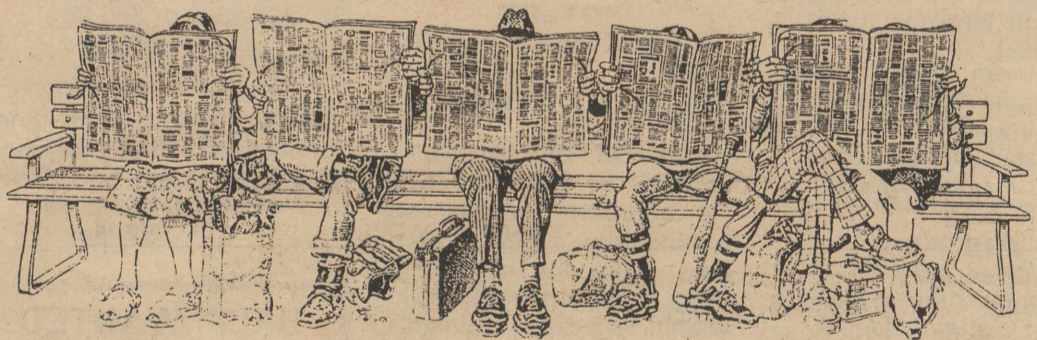

On the way to Lexington, she went to the fossil beds on the Ohio River between Indiana and Louisville.

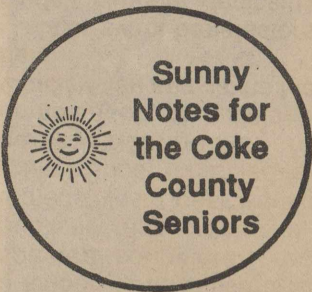
On Monday, September 2, at Lexington, Kentucky, she went to Kentucky Horse Park and took a driving tour of horse farms near Lexington.

Major event benefactors include Columbia Medical Center, Norwest Bank, Trashaway Services and an anonymous

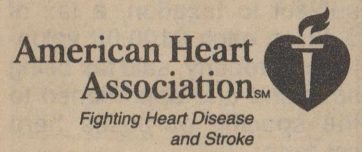
