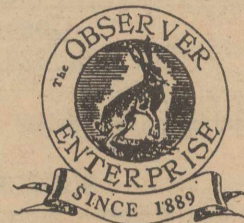

Commissioner's Court recent actions detailed

The following actions were taken at the recent Commissioner's Court meeting:

- The general fund budget and Road and Bridge fund were amended for the 1996 year.

- Dr. Peck of the Bronte Clinic agreed to serve as County Health Officer for the next two years and was appointed by the Court.

- Bond Petition was discussed, but no decision was made.

- A report was given on the ADA grant work. The Bronte Senior Center and the Bronte Recreation Hall are getting close to completion. The Robert Lee Centers are being worked on now. The courthouse should be started this week. The library equipment will be delivered this week.

- A request was presented from the Appraisal District to move to the courthouse. Different options of floor space were presented. The Court would like for the Appraisal Board or a committee from the board to visit with the Court the first Monday of October for further discussion.

- A request from Mr. Schroeder III to waive penalty and interest was denied.

- A request for the collection of taxes for the city of Robert Lee was approved.

- The tax roll was approved as presented, pending any

changes through certification of changes.

- The county appointed the sheriff as Safety Officer.

- The trapper's report was approved.

- Payroll periods were discussed and paydays will be changed from the first and fifteenth to the fifteenth and end of the month.

HSU coeds in good academic standing, are chosen on the basis of appearance, horsemanship, and general enthusiasm.

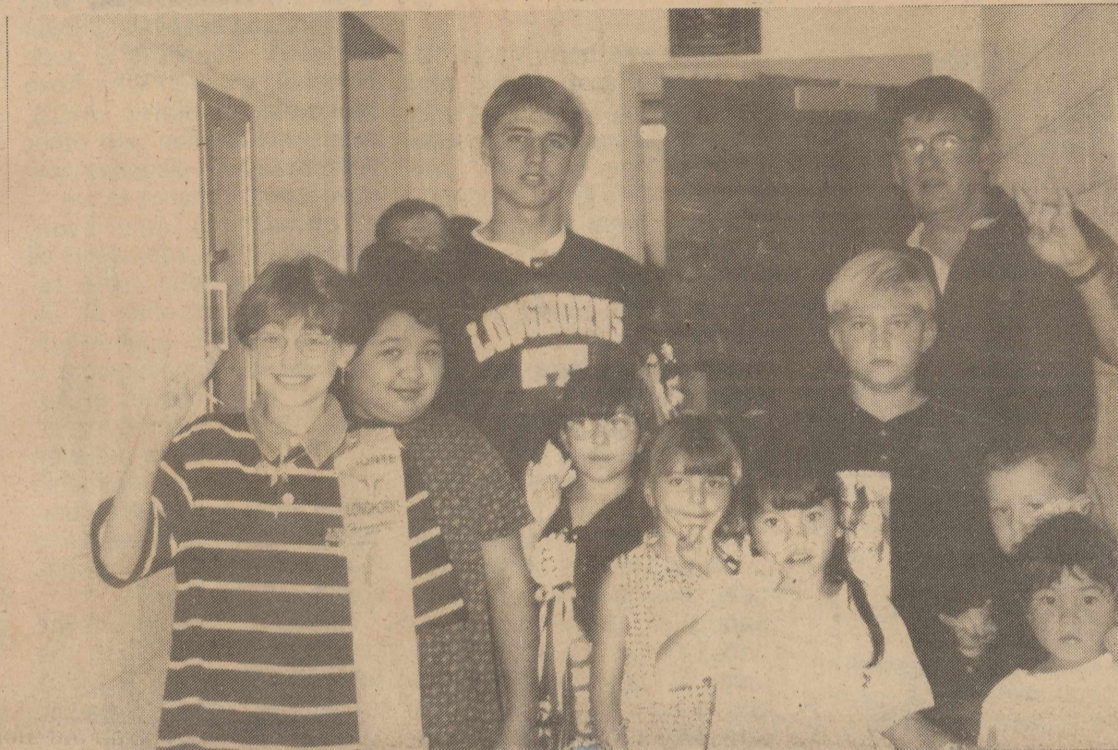
The Six White Horses and the girl riders bear the six flags that have flown over Texas and appear often with the world famous Cowboy Band.

Steers stack up one more victory in win over Garden City, 26-8

The Steers kept the fans on the edge of their seats last Friday night as they turned the ball over five times, contrary to their normal playing style. The Steers made this game a very big challenge, but they overcame and won by a score of 26-8. The Steer defense played an excellent game, stopping the Bearcats with two goal line stands.

As for the offense - well, 391 yards rushing speaks for itself. Included in that rushing record was one TD drive of 95 yards and one of 99 yards with not one pass thrown. It can't get any better than that.

1st Quarter

Garden City kicked off to the Steers, but after a good return, the Kats stripped the ball and got their second Steer fumble. The Steers stopped the Kats at the Steer 10 yard line and took over on downs. A third Steer fumble on first down gave the Kats the ball at the Steer 6 yard line. The Steer "D" stopped the Kats cold, and the Steers took over at their own 5 yard line. Ninety-five yards and seven first downs later, the Steers extended their lead. Eli Boxell carried for the last 11 yards. Longoria kicked the extra point for the Steers.

4th Quarter

The Steers lost their fourth fumble of the night as this quarter began. The Kats had the ball at the Steer 26 yard line. The Kats moved the ball down to the Steer one yard line where the Steer "D" stopped them and took over on downs. With the ball at the Steer one yard line, the Steers went to work. Ninety-nine yards and six first downs later, the Steers scored for the last time of the night. Boxell scored from two yards out. The kick failed and the Steers won 26 to 8. Good job, Steers!

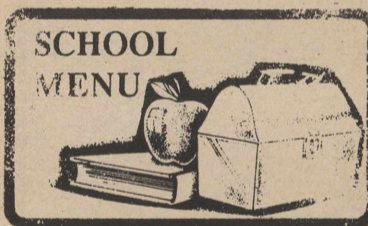

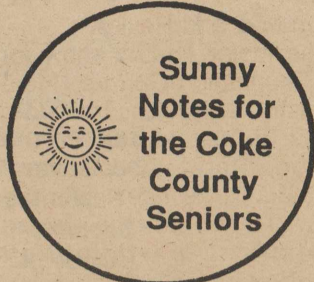

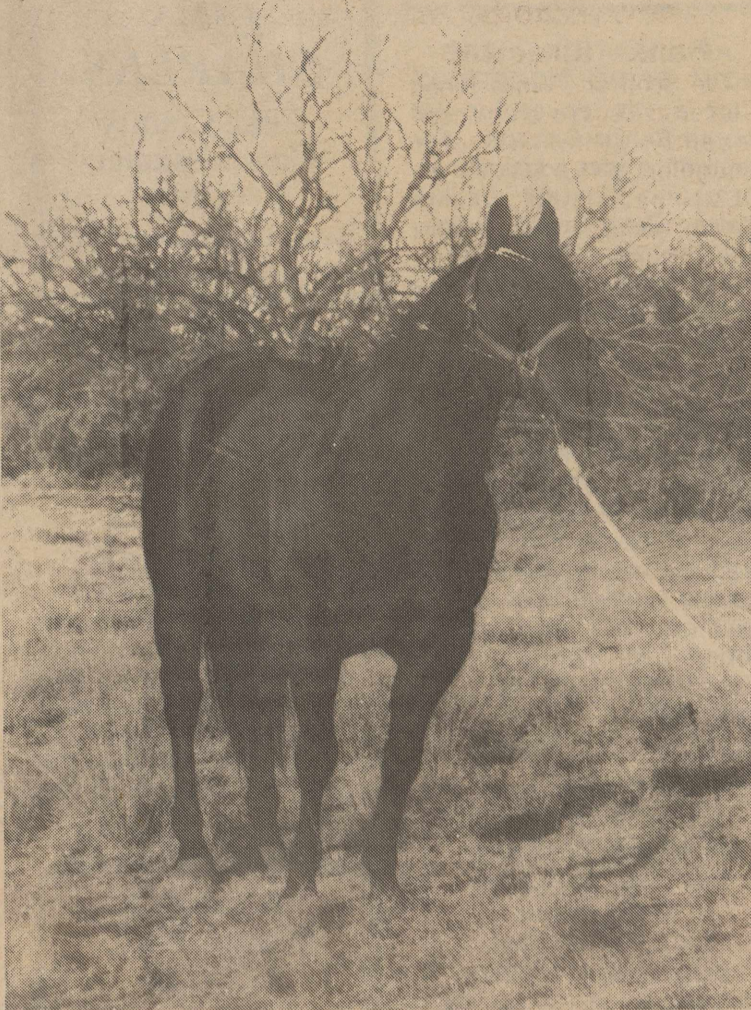

The major annual show for the Foundation Quarter Horse Registry, entrants came from most of the states in the United States and several Canadian provinces. As the "new trend" in the horse industry, participation quadrupled from last year's show with class sizes averaging between twenty and thirty entrants per class.

McCutchen Quarter Horses were well represented at this year's show. Their stallion, "Old Dominion," came home with three firsts, two seconds, one third, and one fifth place.

He participated in the halter class, heeling, cutting, youth handy ranch horse, youth barrels, youth grab bag race, and ranch cutting.

Among his other wins, Morgan, age 11, showed him to first place wins in both the youth handy ranch horse class and the youth grab bag race. Ashley, age 9, placed third in youth barrels while riding "Dominion."

The McCutchens also took a Foundation mare and her colt to the show where they participated in the mare and foal class. The mare, Quenos Beauty, and her foal by Old Dominion, O.D.'s Poco Queno, placed second in this class.

All in all, it was a very successful trip for the McCutchen family at their first national show.

The cost to build the first Coke County courthouse was \$27,000.

EIA testing mandatory in 1997

Effective January 1, 1997, all equine, regardless of origin, entering any show, fair and exhibition must have a negative test for EIA conducted within the previous 12 months.

According to the Texas Animal Health Commission, "show, fair or exhibition" refers to any gathering of horses, regardless of the nature of the event or activity.

Horses are also required to have had a negative EIA test within the past 12 months if they undergo any change of ownership.

The Coggins test (or AGID test) and the CELISA test are among those tests approved by the TAHC. In setting such regulations, TAHC has placed the responsibility on the horseowner to have a negative EIA test within 12 months of any 1997 show or activity. Horse owners should keep the documentation with them as they attend various equine events. The TAHC can show up at any activity and require some or all owners to produce the appropriate work.

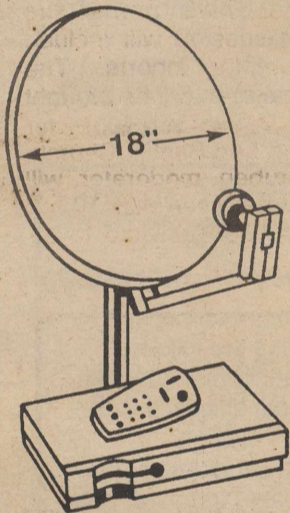

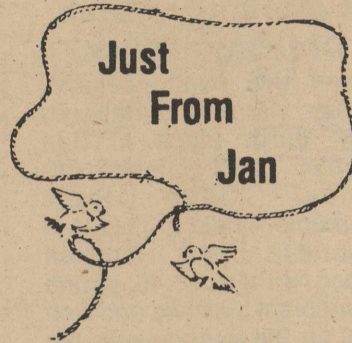

Washday 101: Laundry Basics for the College Bound

When it comes to teaching college-bound students and first-time apartment dwellers how to do their own laundry, it's back to basics. Although new developments in washers, dryers and laundry products offer easy-to-achieve cleaning, basic laundry procedures still need to be followed.

Step one is to read and follow garment care label instructions. The next step is to sort the laundry. Separate whites from colors and light colors from dark. Separate sturdy cottons from delicate and permanent press items. Separate lint-givers, such as sweatshirts, from lint-grabbers, such as corduroy and permanent press items. Finally, separate heavily soiled items from lightly soiled ones.

As the clothes are separated into loads, empty pockets and shake out cuffs. Close zippers and hooks. Repair any holes or tears so they don't grow in the wash. Pretreat stains, collars and cuffs.

The type of soil can influence the choice of detergent. Granular detergents work well

on mud and clay soils. Liquid detergents work effectively to remove greasy, oily stains and can easily be used to pretreat stains. Always add the detergent first, then the water, to ensure that the detergent is completely dissolved. Add the clothes last.

Bleach helps to remove stains and improve cleaning power. Follow garment care instructions and bleach label directions for proper use. If there is any doubt, test the garment for colorfastness in an inconspicuous area.

Fabric softener reduces static cling, minimizes wrinkling, and softens clothes. Rinse-added softener goes into the final rinse. Dryer-added softener sheets go in the dryer at the beginning of the cycle.

Water temperature is an important factor in cleaning performance. For best results, use warm water (90 - 110 degrees F) for most loads, use hot water (130 degrees F and above) for whites and heavily soiled items, and cold water (80 degrees F or colder) for lightly soiled or brightly colored items.

Avoid overloading. The wash may get finished faster, but it won't be nearly as clean. For best results, items must circulate freely.

Generally, items that are being washed together can be dried together. Shake the damp items to loosen them before putting them in the dryer. Set controls for "regular" if most of the load is made up of all-cotton fabrics, or "permanent press" if the load contains man-made fibers or permanent press fabrics. To avoid unnecessary wrinkling, remove items from the dryer as soon as it shuts off. Be sure to clean the lint filter after each use.
