Hutchison discusses issues during visit

United States Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison was in Bronte Tuesday afternoon at City Hall to visit with constituents during a whirlwind visit to our part of the state.

The Senator arrived on time to address the fifteen people present. She was introduced by Martin Lee, Mayor of Bronte. In his comments, he pointed out that she is the first woman to serve as a United States Senator from Texas. He also mentioned that her great-grandfather was among those who signed the Texas Declaration of Independence and that Senator Hutchison was a major force in stopping the push for a state income tax.

Senator Hutchison's first comments to the group stressed her goal to try to cut taxes as much as possible for the working middle class. She mentioned that most people pay out 40% of their income in taxes and that that is just too much. A few of the projects she is working on and has worked on are: doing away with the penalty many people have to pay when they marry and it pushes them into a higher tax bracket; a retirement system for full time homemakers; and eliminating capital gains taxes when a citizen sells their home.

An overhaul of the current tax code is also scheduled. She agrees that the current taxing system is entirely too complicated. The legislators

are looking at two different systems for possible implementation around the year 2000 - a consumption tax on all purchases or a flat tax. These would replace the present Internal Revenue Service code. She also said that she and others are trying to bring common sense into legislation such as the Endangered Species Act.

Following these comments, Senator Hutchison asked the listeners if they had any questions or concerns in which she might be able to help. One of the questions asked of the Senator had to do with legislation over credit unions. She replied that the credit union members needed to remain within a narrow common bond. When asked if the majority of U.S. citizens wanted to change the current income tax system, she advised that from what she's heard, the answer is a resounding "Yes".

She went on to explain after questions regarding a consumption tax that it is similar to a sales tax and citizens would not be taxed on savings or earnings. One listener questioned whether the legislators should be putting tax reform at the top of their agenda over the problems of fraud and waste in government programs. Senator Hutchison replied that they are always concerned with waste, etc., in government programs. She stressed that she is a "smaller government, lower taxes person." The Senate, according to Senator Hutchison, has tried to force change in government agencies and make government smaller and more efficient by reducing funding to numerous government agencies and programs. However, change is slow because President Clinton is often opposed to their proposed measures.

Following a comment on safety in schools, Senator Hutchison mentioned that she is whole-heartedly in favor of control for local schools resting in the hands of local government. She also mentioned, following a related question, that she is concerned about over-consolidation in the banking industry and is behind the new trend of smaller banks opening throughout the state.



Both the physical and mailing addresses need to be checked carefully, as well as precinct number and correct spelling of the voter's name and birthdate.

If corrections are needed, the corrected information can be entered on the back of the certficate. The voter must then sign the back of the card and return it to the Coke County Tax Office, P.O. Box 169, Robert Lee, Texas, 76945, or drop it by the tax office in the courthouse.

Please call the tax office if you do not receive a new certificate, if you have questions, or if you need information on how to register to vote. The number is 453-2614.

A Foreign Body in the Eye

Eye injuries must be taken seriously. If there is any question, a visit to the physician is indicated.

A foreign body must be removed to avoid the threat of infection and loss of sight in that eye. Be particularly careful if the foreign body was caused by the striking of metal on metal; this can cause a small metal particle to strike the eye with great force and penetrate the eyeball.

Under a few circumstances, you may treat at home. If the foreign body is minor, such as sand, and did not strike the eye with great velocity, it may feel like it is still in the eye even when it is not. Small round particles like sand barely stick behind the upper lid for long.

If it feels like a foreign body is present but is not, then the cornea has been scraped or cut. A minor corneal injury will usually heal quickly without problems; a major one requires medical attention.

Even if you think the injury is minor, run through the decision chart daily. If any symptoms at all are present after 48 hours and are not clearly resolving, see the physician. Minor problems will heal within 48 hours - the eye repairs injury quickly.

Next week, we will discuss treatment.



By The Box: Choose Age-Appropriate Toys For Children

As the holidays approach, a child development specialist at Texas A&M University asks shoppers to buy age-appropriate toys for children.

Parents should consider whether the toy is potentially dangerous to their child, or any child for that matter.

Parents should ask, "Would my child use this toy safely? Would another child pick this up and potentially harm themselves and my child with it?"

Parents also need to consider where children are developmentally Parents should ask whether their children are emotionally and cognitively able to play with a particular toy.

It is so typical for a parent to say, "My child is above their age, my child is smarter than his age." That's great -- but the truth is most kids are at their expected age level. Advice to consumers is to follow the age range on the toy box.

Most kids are right in their range and those are generous age ranges on those toys. The manufacturer certainly wants to sell every toy they can, and they're going to give the earliest date they can possibly give and the latest

When age ranges are ignored, consequences can be serious. The thing we hear about most often are the small parts of a toy that get into a child's mouth who is at the stage where they taste everything and the child swallows the toy and the child chokes.

According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), almost two dozen children suffered toyrelated deaths, and 150,000 children were treated in emergency rooms for toy-related injuries in 1995.

A clinical psychologist says experiencing continual defeat at the hands of a toy can be

harmful for children who are beginning to develop a self concept. You don't want to keep a child from learning from defeat, but if they experience repeated defeat, it is typical for them to say, "I don't like it anyway." Or they may internalize it, "What's the matter with me that I can't do it? I'm not as good as someone else.

Parents also need to make sure toys are in line with what they teach their children about morals. There's been a movement in our country not to ever give boys guns or girls guns. But if a child wants to play with a gun, they'll pull out their index finger and shoot. I think we have to go back and take a look at the meaning behind that toy. If parents are not teaching something that they believe in, then they need to think twice before giving that toy.

The same is true concerning gender roles. Research has show that it is not harmful to give boys dolls and girls trucks and planes, but what is appropriate for a child must be determined by his/her parent.

Theoretically, toys have no gender but our gender roles shape the way we play with toys. So we as parents know what we think is appropriate, right, good. We put values on toys and then we select them.
