## Holiday fireworks tips offered

Bud Thompson, Robert Lee City Fire Marshal, would like to remind all residents that fireworks within the city limits can be cited.
Leave fireworks to the professionals. If you do set them off on your own, follow these important safety tips.

- Never allow children to play with or ignite fireworks. . - Read and follow all warnings and instructions.
- Be sure other people are out of range before lighting fireworks.
- Only light fireworks on a smooth flat surface, away from structures, dry leaves and flammable materials.
- Never try to relight fireworks that have not fully functioned.

Keep a bucket of water handy, in case of a malfunction or fire
Fireworks are dangerous and can cause serious burns and eye injuries. Each year over 8,000 people are injured from fireworks. Example, a 7 year old boy lost half his left hand, including his fingers when he lit a M-80 he found hidden in a family bedroom. Example, an 8 year old girl received second and third degree burns to her leg when a sparkler she was holding ignited her dress. Sparks burn at such high temperatures it only takes one spark to set clothing on fire

The summer fire season is here. With the recent rain, the grass is tall and with dry summer temperatures it will be dry. Fire hazard will be high again this year.
Fire prevention is everyone's responsibility. We must all do our part in practicing fire safety. Never leave a fire
unattended. Douse your campfire with water. Do no toss cigarettes from the care or drive on a flat tire, as striking the pavement makes sparks.
Remember, no fireworks are to be lit within the city limits of Robert Lee or downtown in the business area of Bronte
We want everyone, especially the children, to enjoy fireworks, safely.

Managing for high
quality hay
Hay is the most common source of stored feed used by producers and surveys have shown that $86 \%$ of the harvested hay is used on the producer's own farm; therefore producers should be concerned with producing high quality hay. With the recent rains we have received we should be in for an excellent hay producing year, that is if it is handled and har vested correctly. Otherwise we will produce a bunch of we will produce a bunch of
nothing. Forage quality can vary greatly and it should be remembered that high quality or very low quality hay can be produced from the same forage species, depending on how it is handled

Factors that determine hay quality include stage of maturity at harvest, soil fertility, nutritional status of the plant available moisture, season of the year, ratio of leaves to stems, stem size, amount of weeds, harvesting and storage. Most of these we don have a lot to do with but if for have a lot tond and grow age is handled and grown properly, we can harvest excellent quality hay.

About $70 \%$ of the quality of hay is determined by stage of maturity at harvest. As a plant matures towards heading, flowering and seed formation, the growth pattern changes from leaf production to hard stem formation. The digestible portion of the plant

tissue decreases rapidly with each stage. A $1 \%$ increase in digestibility of a warm season forage results in a 5\% increase in animal performance.
Immature plant cells have a thin cell wall and are succulent with soft flexible tissue that is high in water and water soluble nutrients. Immature leafy forage plants contain easily digestible nutrients while old, mature stems and leaves contain complex nutrients and mature indigestible fiber. As plants begin to form seed cells mature and a secondary cell wall composed of cellu lose and lignin begins to de velop to add rigidity to the plant. Lignin is indigestible and compared to wood fibers
Since leaves are more digestible than stems and contain most of the nutrients, the higher the leaf content, the higher the quality. Additionally, seed heads are usually produced on the end of the stems which are devoid of
