Holiday fireworks tips offered

Bud Thompson, Robert Lee City Fire Marshal, would like to remind all residents that fireworks within the city limits can be cited.

Leave fireworks to the professionals. If you do set them off on your own, follow these important safety tips.

 Never allow children to play with or ignite fireworks.

• Read and follow all warnings and instructions.

• Be sure other people are out of range before lighting fireworks.

• Only light fireworks on a smooth flat surface, away from structures, dry leaves and flammable materials.

• Never try to relight fireworks that have not fully functioned.

• Keep a bucket of water handy, in case of a malfunction or fire.

Fireworks are dangerous and can cause serious burns and eye injuries. Each year over 8,000 people are injured from fireworks. Example, a 7 year old boy lost half his left hand, including his fingers when he lit a M-80 he found hidden in a family bedroom. Example, an 8 year old girl received second and third degree burns to her leg when a sparkler she was holding ignited her dress. Sparks burn at such high temperatures it only takes one spark to set clothing on fire.

The summer fire season is here. With the recent rain, the grass is tall and with dry summer temperatures it will be dry. Fire hazard will be high again this year. unattended. Douse your campfire with water. Do not toss cigarettes from the care, or drive on a flat tire, as the rim striking the pavement makes sparks.

Remember, no fireworks are to be lit within the city limits of Robert Lee or downtown in the business area of Bronte.

We want everyone, especially the children, to enjoy fireworks, safely.


Bill Fletcher was elected as president of the Sparks reunion.

Burleson resident shines at TWU

Amanda Forman, 20, has been named to the Academic Honor List for the Spring 1999 semester at Texas Wesleyan University. Forman, daughter of James and Laura Forman of Burleson and granddaughter of Mrs. Robert Forman of Bronte, Texas, has certainly made her family proud. Currently a junior psychology major at Wesleyan and a 1997 graduate of Burleson High School, Forman has displayed remarkable consistency throughout her enrollment at Wesleyan. She has been named to the Academic Honor List for every semester for the two years that she has been enrolled, even while playing softball and tennis. Her GPA of 4.0 in her major has made her a member of Psi Chi, an honor society for psychology majors. and her overall GPA of 3.9 has enabled her to become a member of Alpha Chi, a national scholarship for juniors and seniors maintaining an overall GPA of 3.75 and above. Forman's consistency has paid off. She has co-authored a paper with Wesleyan psychology professor Dr. Laura Schneider, and the pair will present their data at an international conference for the Association for the Advancement of Applied Sports Psychology that will be held in September in Canada. Their research dealt with the intrinsic and extrinsic motivational factors of the sports motivation skill of student athletes. Schneider and Forman plan to expand their research in the upcoming year to include a comparison of student-athletes attending area universities.

TxDOT honors Truck Roadeo winners

The San Angelo District of the Texas Department of Transportation recently honored Truck Roadeo winners at the annual spring safety banquet.

Coke County Maintenance Section's Ricky Ross was announced as the First Place Truck Roadeo competitor for the entire district, representing 298 employees in 15 counties. Ross will advance to the State Truck Roadeo competition in November in Austin. He won this title by advancing to the district driveoff as a "wild card" winner from the preliminary maintenance section competition. The top driver from each section, plus the top two scorers from the field of competitors who did not win their sectional titles, also advanced to the district level competition at the San Angelo District Complex.

Another Coke County employee was also recognized at the annual banquet. Edmund Probst competed at the district competition by placing first at the Coke County Maintenance Section competition.

Assistant Maintenance Supervisor Douglas Roberts was recognized at the banquet for placing second at the State competition last fall and for serving as a judge for this year's Truck Roadeo. Roberts placed tenth at the national finals in Ohio in early May.

During the spring Truck Roadeo, the events tested the skills that these employees use daily in helping to maintain the state highways. Each competitor drove through a standardized obstacle course-arena marked by orange cones in a seventon dump truck to demonstrate their driving abilities.




This summer's reading program has the outstanding participation of almost fifty readers. The library is a really exciting place to be as any parent who brings a carload of young readers can relate.


matically eligible to compete for a \$1,000 scholarship from the \$50,000 to be awarded this year.


