Archery season opens Saturday

The norther that arrived Tuesday evening put a nip in the air and upped the anticipation of the fall hunting season. One of the fastest-growing hunts will open this weekend. Archery season begins Saturday, Oct. 2, and will run through the 31st.

Bag limits for both deer and turkey are included as totals for all seasons combined-four deer, no more than two bucks and turkey limits are no more than four per license year. Javelina season also opens in Coke County Saturday, and closes Feb. 27; two per season

Legal shooting hours are the same for all game birds and animals-1/2 hour before sunrise to 1/2 hour after sunset, except migratory birds (dove, ducks, geese, etc.)

Archery equipment should be reviewed by hunters by looking over the subject on page 63 of the free TPW Outdoor Annual booklet. The archery stamp (fee \$7) is required during this season. Many bow hunters are choosing to use their bows during the fall gun season as more of a challenge. Gunners cannot use weapons except during the gun season but archers may use their equipment throughout legal seasons.

Dove hunters may hunt through Oct. 17 in our Central Zone. There have been some surprising results for some during September. Good shooting was spotty

Hunter education course to be held

A hunter education course will be held in Robert Lee Saturday, October 9th, and Saturday, October 16th from 8:30 a.m. until 12 noon each day to certify in the training. Mrs. Dianne Simpson will teach the course in the commissioners' courtroom at the courthouse.

Every hunter (including out-of-state hunters) born on or after September 2, 1971, must successfully complete a hunter education training

If you were born on or after September 2, 1971, and you are:

*age 17 and over, you must successfully complete a hunter education course.

*age 12 through 16, you must successfully complete a hunter education course or be accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older.

*under 12 years of age, you must be accompanied by a person 17 years of age or older licensed to hunt in Texas.

Minimum age of certification is 12 years.

Proof of certification is required to be on your person while hunting; it is not required to purchase a license.

Registration for the course needs to be done before Oct. 9th with Linda Eaton at the 4-H office in the courthouse. Each student must provide their social security # plus address and phone number, parent's signature and a registration fee of \$10.00.

Fort Chadbourne Foundation announces grant



Fort Chadbourne is a National historic Site and a stop on the Texas Forts Trail. It is a frontier fort established in 1852. The fort is on private property owned by Garland and Lana Richards 11 miles North of Bronte, Texas on U.S. Hwy. 277.

The Richards established a non-profit charitable foundation to protect and revitalize the fort. In addition to constructing a museum/visitors center, the foundation plans to stabilize the existing ruins, restore portions of the fort and offer the fort as an educational resource.

Speed zones to be lowered in city

The City of Robert Lee will be seeing changes in the speed limits on State Highway 208 within the city limits in the immediate future. The City Council and the Texas Department of Transportation have agreed to lower the speed limits, and new signs will be posted soon.

The legal speed will be reduced to 40 m.p.h. between the intersection of RM 1904 to Austin Street and 30 m.p.h. between Austin Street and 9th Street.

The City Council will consider reducing the speed limit in the school zone on Highway 208 at the council meeting on October 11th. The Council has requested 20 m.p.h.; however, Texas Department of Transportation has a limit of 15 m.p.h. under the posted limit. This will enable the City to set the limit at 25 m.p.h. when flashing.

Real heroes deserve being remembered

The name of Frank Tubb is among the 29 names on the Angelo State University memorial to alumni killed in World War II.

Ava Lou Davis said it meant so much, finding that people cared about her brother and his comrades 54 years after their deaths off the coast of

Frank Tubb, her brother, was a graduate of Robert Lee High School, where he played football and excelled in track. He later attended San Angelo College, and, when World War Il broke out, he joined the Army Air Corps and was assigned to the 345th Bomber Group.

March 15, 1945, found him serving as tail gunner and radio operator for Bold Venture, a B-25 flying over the South China Sea near Hong Kong.

To make a long story short, the plane crashed on the side of a mountain just off the coast. The crew, including Frank, died.

Ava and her family didn't find out what happened to Frank's remains until four years later when he and two crewmates were placed in a group burial in Fort Smith National Cemetery in Arkansas. His parents, Mary and Arthur Tubb, and other family members attended the ceremony.

The story doesn't end

Charles Gilmore, Bold Venture's co-pilot, wasn't aboard the plane the day it crashed. He was back at the base, in the sick bay.

Gilmore now lives in a suburb of Denver. Not long ago, he was contacted over the Internet by Ian Quinn, an airline pilot based in Hong Kong. Quinn, a member of the Hong Kong Historical Aircraft Association, regularly flies over the area where Bold Venture went down.

Quinn was writing a book that included information on the 345th Bomber Group. He knew the story of Bold Venture, but wasn't sure of the exact crash location. Gilmore sent him a photo of the site.

Using the photo as a guide,

Quinn flew over the area in a helicopter and found the spot where Bold Venture went down. He found fragments of the plane still at the location.

On March 15 of this year, exactly 54 years after the crash, Quinn placed a wreath on the site in memory of the crew of Bold Venture.

"I was touched that, after all these 54 years, this man cared enough to put a wreath on the spot," Ava said.

"My mother kept saying there was no cross to mark their grave," Ava said. "She didn't know if they had been buried or left on the side of the mountain. My parents would be proud to know that 54 years later, some caring person placed a wreath where their son died."

"After all these years, someone still remembers. Someone cares. And that they will be edible. means so much.'

(Editor's note: This article concerning a native Robert Lee serviceman who was killed during World War II appeared in a San Angelo Standard Times article honoring veterans on Memorial Day.)

[Editor's Note: The following letter is one that Frank wrote to his mother and family less than two weeks before his death. This was some of the last correspondence his family received from the WWII aviator.] Dearest Mother and All:

Doing quite a bit of flying lately, so that's the only reason for your lack of letters. I'm trying to get settled, and accustomed to these ways of living. I don't know if my correspondence will improve or not, though, 'cause I think we are going to become more busy each week.

I now have four missions, thirty-five hours, and sixteen points! Coming along awfully slow it seems to me, but remember, I've only been around about fourteen days.

Some Filipinos just came by with two chickens, so Hank Worley gave him a blanket for them, so-o-o, guess we will have fried chicken for supper. A guy certainly learns to use his ingenuity when he's out like this. We have a small gas burner which puts out a pretty fair flame. We bought some onions from the natives, and procured some potatoes from the mess hall, so we should have quite a feast, huh?

We have us a Filipino boy who comes around twice a week to pick up our laundry, so we have clean clothes every day! Beats doing it ourselves, like we did... New Guinea...

Well, I'm signing off now, gotta' make an attempt at dressing those chicks. I know I can't do as good a job as my Pop, or Mammy, but perhaps

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
