Christmas Season set to open

Christmas season will begin appropriately in Robert Lee with the opening of Bryans' Barn on Saturday, December 1. What began years ago as a small family and friends lighted display has mushroomed into an enlarged barn, surrounding acreage, and crosses Messbox Creek in a take-yourbreath-away lighted fairyland. Visitors will come from everywhere, some several times, during the holiday season. The Bryans will keep the wonderful display open to the public the entire month of December.

On Monday, Dec. 3, the annual Christmas Open House will be held. Most Robert Lee businesses will serve refreshments; many will have special sales and displays of merchandise. Later in the afternoon at 3:30, the Ministerial Alliance will sponsor a Christmas Parade beginning at the school parking lot and ending at the courthouse.

Coke County Pageant Association meeting





Coke County Jail to be renovated

Preserving the Coke County Jail (circa 1907) in Robert Lee is the reason for a joint venture of the Coke County Historical Commission and the Downtown Association to begin raising funds to preserve the jail.

On the evening of Saturday, December 8, from 6-9 pm, volunteers will man a coke booth on 7th Street by the Bryan's Mini Park gazebo. Hot cocoa, spiced tea and cokes will be sold to visitors on their way to Bryan's Barn. Volunteers are making cookies to give free to those who purchase a drink.

Also, the jail will be decorated for Christmas, and a sign will be placed so that folks can drive by to see the historic structure. Some stores are considering remaining open the evening of December 8.

The groups will gladly welcome interested citizens who want to help. There is a need for volunteers to man the drink booth, decorate the jail, make cookies and cocoa and tea mix, and give moral support to the effort. An all-out effort is being made to hold a successful fund raiser preceding making application to the Texas Historical Commission for inclusion in their Visionaries in Preservation Program. Judge Walker attends seminar

Coke County Judge Jackie Walker attended the Texas Association of Counties Judicial Institute November 13 through 16. The institute is co-sponsored by the Texas Association of Counties and Texas Tech University. This program satisfies the statutory annual education requirement for Constitutional County Judges. In addition to the judicial hours, Administration Education was added this year. Judge Walker serves on the administrative committee.

The Judicial program this year increased judges knowledge of: changes in probate law, judicial ethics, rules of evidence, hearsay, objections expert testimony, jury misconduct, reasonable doubt, dealing with Pro se defendants, magistrates' warnings, and crime victims' compensation procedures.

The Administrative session dealt with open meetings agendas, agenda postings and emergency postings, county budget cycle, salary grievance process, and a roundtable discussion of county administrative questions with Penny Redington, with the firm of Bickerstaff, Heath, Smiley, Pollan, Kever, and McDaniel. Chief Rick Drennan reported there is a new supply of the 911 reflector signs and will continue to make them as long as there is a request for them. The 911 signs are a big help in locating residence in the dark, for the Sheriff's department as well as the EMS and fire department.

Dispatcher Bud Thompson reported his findings, on cost of beepers versus radios and the repair cost. This was tabled until more information was received from other companies.

When the temperature drops or the weather is bad, the meetings will be held in City Hall at 7 pm.

The new pumper truck will be taken to Big Spring for a factory recall on the 20th.

The RLVFD need volunteers who are available during the daytime hours. With a current membership of 23 persons, only a handfull is available weekdays. Fire protection is a serious situation and should be of concern to everyone in the city and surrounding areas in receiving protection from qualified vol-

All firemen who attend 40% of these drills and 25% of the fires, receives the minimum off their water bills from the city, as well as retirement and on the job injury insurance. This is received after the probationary period.

Anyone interested in becoming a member of the Robert Lee Volunteer Fire Department should fill out a form located at City Hall for retirement and insurance purposes. For further information, contact Chief Rick Drennan, Fire Marshall Bud Thompson, or City Secretary Kaye Torres, or any fireman.
The department meets the

first and third Monday of each month. The second Monday of each month is for training classes to become a certified fireman.

Cadets, 16-18 years of age, with parent consent, will receive fire and rescue training.


Lady Steers varsity basketball results



> Statistics about breast cancer

Breast cancer is the most common cancer among women, except for nonmelanoma skin cancers. It is estimated that in 2001 about 192,200 new cases of invasive breast cancer (Stages I to IV) will be diagnosed among women in the United States. Ductal carcinoma in situ (DCIS) accounts for about 39,900 new cases each year. DCIS (Stage 0) is noninvasive and is the earliest form of breast cancer. Breast cancer also occurs in men. An estimated 1,500 cases will be diagnosed in men.

The breast cancer incidence rate, a measure of the number of new breast cancers per 100,000 women, increased by about 4% per year during the 1980s. During the 1990s, the incidence leveled off to 110.6 cases per 100,000 women.

In 2001, about 40,200 women and 400 men will die from breast cancer in the United States.

Fall ideal for planting trees & shrubs

Finally, fall is here. The weather is becoming slightly cooler, and gardeners are slowly migrating back outdoors after record-breaking heat this summer. Now is a perfect time to add a new tree

or a grouping of shrubs to the landscape. Or perhaps you have an area in the landscape that needs "remodeling" or rejuvenating. The fall may be the best season to plant, surpassing even the spring.

Many people prefer January through March for planting, but the fall months of September through December have distinct advantages. Fall planting follows the heat of summer, and precedes a cool winter season. Trees and shrubs planted use this to good advantage. Plant roots grow anytime the soil temperature is 40 degrees or higher, which may occur all winter in Texas. During the winter months, the root systems of the fall-planted specimens develop and become established. When spring arrives, this expanded root system can support and take advantage of the full surge of spring growth.

Fall planting is the optimum time to plant balled and burlapped trees and shrubs. Balled and burlapped plants have ample time to recover from transplanting and proliferate roots before spring growth begins. Remember however, all bare root plants, including roses and pecan and fruit trees should be planted in late winter when they are completely dormant.

When buying plants for your landscape, be sure to get healthy, well-grown plants. Always buy from a reputable dealer. Those in the plant selling business year-round depend on repeat customers, and only by selling customers quality plants can there be assurance of future business. Beware of plant bargains. They can easily turn out to be real headaches. A bargain is

no good if it dies. The price tag, especially the cheapest one, is not the best guide to quality.

All plants have growing requirements. Think about the plant's needs before you invest. Is it adapted to your area's soil? Will it grow in sun or shade? Does it need a wet or dry location? Is it cold hardy? Some nurseries have this type of information on tags beside the plant. If not, ask a nursery professional or your Texas Cooperative Extension Agent.

'Plan before you plant' is always a good rule of thumb. Whether you are planting a single plant or an entire landscape, plan first, then plant. Good planning is a worthwhile investment of time that will pay off in greater enjoyment of attractive and useful home grounds, and in increasing the value of your home. It's much easier to move plants on paper than to dig them after planting in the wrong place. A plan saves many planting mistakes.

Every plant in the landscape should serve a purpose. Ask yourself if you want a plant for screening, for privacy, or for shade. How large will it be five years from now? Plants, like people, grow up. Remember, that a small one-gallon size plant will look entirely different after a few years of growth in your landscape.

Plant properly for success. Here are a few guidelines on getting the job done right.

1. Dig a hole large enough in diameter so that the root system has at least six inches of clearance on all sides. The root ball should rest on a solid soil foundation, so don't dig the hole much deeper than the ball.

2. Plant the tree or shrub slightly above the level of the surrounding soil, to allow for settling and increased soil drainage.

3. Carefully place the tree or shrub in the hole. Handle the plant by the root ball, not by the trunk. A broken ball of earth can mean a dead plant. Always remove any container before you plant.

4. Backfill the hole, using only the native soil removed from the hole; do not use soil amendments when planting large shrubs and trees. Fill the hole, and firm the soil

around the plant. Water thoroughly to settle the soil around the roots and to eliminate any air pockets.

5. Do not fertilize your tree or shrub after planting. Wait until early in the spring to do this, and even then go lightly. Heavy applications of fertilizer may burn and injure the root system, and could possibly kill the plant.

6. Watering has been and remains paramount in transplanting. At the time of transplanting, soak the root ball and surrounding soil. A thorough watering every 7 to 10 days dramatically increases the success ratio. More frequent watering may encourage root rot. Remember, more trees and shrubs fail from over watering than from under watering.

7. Before calling it a day, add 4 to 6 inches of mulch around the base of newly planted trees and shrubs. This helps to keep down weeds and conserve soil moisture. Use pine bark, compost, grass clippings, or leaves.


