Disko presents carved jail replica

The Coke County Historical Commission met at 5:00, Thursday, February 14 at the Old Jail for the presentation by Mr. Ted Disko of a carved replica of the jail. occasion was attended by twenty-four commission members and others to express appreciation to Mr. Disko for his donation.

Mr. Disko read about the jail restoration plans and the need to raise money for the project. He has donated his sculpture to be used as a fund raiser. The Coke County Historical Commission will hold a raffle at a later date. Meanwhile, the replica will be on display at several spots around town. Currently the replica is at the Coke County Library. It will be moved to Robert Lee City Hall, the Courthouse, and other locations for viewing.

The group attending the presentation heard Lana Richards, President of the Coke County Historical Commission, discuss the rejection by the Texas Historical Com-

mission of the application for the Visionaries program. The Texas Historical Commission stated that the Coke County project was "too small" to be considered. Mrs. Richards said that she felt the project could certainly be done on a local scale with enthusiastic support from residents of Coke County who are interested in preserving the past.

Plans being considered are to contact Texas Tech and arrange for a student architect to take the jail as a project to determine what was needed and the cost of renovation. Fund raisers, grant requests and donations are all possibiliproject.

A work day will be scheduled to empty the jail of the collection. A safe, secure place for the collection will be determined. Coke County Historical Commission members are needed for the following: (1) Help determine the five-year restoration plan. (2) Help with fund raisers. (3) Serve on fact-finding committees. (4) Help set goals, evaluate progress, and re-plan when necessary. (5) Help maintain the jail once renovated. (6) Share the desire to DO SOMETHING to stop the decay and decline of buildings that are important to the community. (7) Help spread for the preservation enthusiasm for this project.

Letter to the Editor How did Silver get its name?

As you know, Janice Fowler and I have been asking the question how Silver got its name. Some possible explanations have been given by different people. Johnson tells of a story that a group of soldiers escorting a shipment of silver were attacked by Indians in that area and they buried the silver. He also mentioned an Indian head carving on one of the peaks that is suppose to be Yellow Wolf. He has promised to show it to me some day.

My brother Bob said the town was named after Silver Peak, and the historical markers indicate such, but that does not explain the "Silver". Janice and I talked to the postmaster and his wife but they did not know. I was sure that my book Roadside History of Texas by Leon C. Metz would have Silver in it. NO! But it says Tennyson "took its name in 1840 from Alfred Lord Tennyson the English poet." Doesn't say why. The book also mentions Mt. Margaret as a memorial to a young girl killed by Indians and buried there.

Bronte started as a branch of the Chisholm Trail in 1887 and was named for Charlotte Bronte, an English writer. But nothing about Silver.

Now also understand that perhaps the sandstone in the Silver area might glitter when the sun is just right and that might be the source of the name. I brought a hunk in and showed it to Beth Prather and suggested that was the source of the name before I heard that.

Now I understand Mr. Allen Bloodworth is writing down all he knows about the name. And Beth Prather has some story involving several early settlers by name that I could

A quick and healthy breakfast

Teens caught in the morning rush who stop for a quick bowl of cereal help their bodies and the family budget.

"There are food choices that are convenient and taste good that can be part of a healthy diet," said Dr. Theresa Nicklas, professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Ready-to-eat cereals provide a good choice for teens in a

Nicklas, a researcher at the USDA/ARS Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor, led a study of 550 ninthgrade students and the breakfasts they ate. The purpose of the study was to compare the nutritional value and cost of three groups of breakfast foods--fast foods, ready-toeat cereals and all other choices.

"The results indicate that adolescents who consume a cereal breakfast obtain more vitamins and minerals for their dollar than those making other breakfast choices," she said. "Although breakfast cereals are perceived as being expensive, they remain a good morning-meal buy from a nutrition standpoint.

The study determined the average cost of a fast food meal was \$2.38, compared to 78 cents for a serving of ce-

The cereal breakfast had significantly lower amounts of fat and cholesterol and higher amounts of carbohydrates, fiber and protein, compared to the other breakfast choices. Teens consuming a cereal breakfast also received a better boost in vitamins and min-

"The average cost of the cereal breakfast was lower than the other breakfast choices, and overall, the cereal breakfast was more nutrient-dense, in terms of vitamins and minerals," she said.

Consumer food choices are influenced by taste, nutrition, cost and convenience, so determining food efficiency--nutrients consumed per dollar-provides information helpful to families making food selection decisions.

'The choices are there," Nicklas said. "Easy doesn't have to be a substitute for healthy or cost a lot."

It might be the prescription of the future: Take two aspirin and get a pet immediately.

Numerous studies have the presence of animals - can have medical benefits that are beyond dispute. range from lowering blood pressure to lessening anxiety and depression and even to faster healing times after

Fido is no placebo - he can literally be man's best friend when people are ailing.

"We have known for many years that the company of a pet can be of benefit in a variety of ways, but exactly why this is, no one seems to have the answer," says Dr. Bonnie Beaver, who specializes in animal behavior and humananimal relationships at Texas A&M University's College of Veterinary Medicine.

"For example, the long-term survival rates of heart attack victims who had a pet have been shown to be significantly longer than for those who did not. There is also data showing that widows who have cats are better off medically during the first year, which is a critical stress time, than widows who do not."

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

But Alex's health hasn't always been this good. At times, asthma has caused the lining of his air passages to swell, making it hard for him to breathe and worrying his parents. Alex's mother, Kim Nugent-Anderson, said, "When your child is not able to breathe, he gets a little panicked. And that's a very scary feeling for a parent.

Alex is among thousands of Americans who have asthma the most common chronic illness for children in Texas. Asthma is a serious, chronic lung disease characterized by wheezing, shortness of breath, chest tightness and coughing. Infections, allergies and environmental factors, including indoor and outdoor pollutants, can trigger the disease, according to the Texas Department of Health (TDH).

Asthma is diagnosed through a combination of studying the patient's medical history, a physical exam and

If you don't have asthma, you probably know someone who does. Asthma is the leading chronic disease in children and the number one reason that children are hospitalized. Youngsters with asthma miss twice as many school days as do their friends without asthma. And deaths due to asthma in the older populations more than doubled during the 1990s.

The number of people with asthma increased by 75 percent from 1980 to 1994 among all race, sex and age groups and in every part of the nation. The most rapid increase was for children from birth to age 4 - a 160 percent jump. It's for these reasons that TDH officials have called together asthma experts to find new ways to combat asthma.

TDH and the American Lung Association of Texas have brought together health experts to form the Asthma Coalition of Texas (ACT). ACT is working with TDH and the Texas Education Agency to develop uniform permission for asthma medications in schools and is developing a Web site for asthma information. ACT is finalizing a state asthma action plan that would include developing and sup-



USDA rural housing loans

USDA Rural Development Guaranteed Rural Housing Loans for Single Family Dwellings offer hope for those who want to own a home, but have not managed to save for a down payment. program is the best option for eligible low and moderateincome applicants to move into a home without a down payment. In many cases, most of the closing costs associated with purchasing the house can be financed into the loan up to the appraised value of the property. Loans can be made to purchase new or existing homes that meet Agency requirements.

In addition to allowing a Maximum Loan to Value ratio of 100%, another very attractive feature of this loan program is that the borrower is not required to pay mortgage insurance. Other zero down programs charge an up-front mortgage insurance premium that is due at closing, with

monthly mortgage insurance for the remaining term of the loan. In comparison, the Guaranteed Rural Housing Program offers significant savings to borrowers by only charging a two percent (2%) guarantee fee that is due at closing, and no monthly mortgage insurance. Typical savings for a family can range between \$30.00 and \$60.00 per month. A loan comparison calculator is available on the website www.rurdev.usda.gov/tx/loan comp.htm.

USDA Rural Development housing programs target communities with populations of 10,000 or less and locations not closely associated with urban areas. Under certain circumstances loans can be made in towns and cities between 10,000 and 25,000 in population. Many areas are eligible - never assume your area is not eligible. Eligible areas are illustrated on maps available on the Texas USDA Rural Development website at www.rurdev.usda.gov/tx/eligible.htm.

The program is designed to provide credit for people in rural areas who are unable to afford a conventional loan. In order to obtain a loan, applicants must be without ownership of safe and sanitary housing and meet the following criteria:

Have an adjusted annual household income that does not exceed the applicable moderate income for the family size and the county where the property being financed is located. A family of four with a household income of \$60,400 meets the income guidelines in most areas of the state. The income limits are higher in some areas.

*Have adequate and dependably available income that is sufficient to pay for the cost of home ownership and existing long term debt obli-The maximum gations. housing expense (PITI) ratio and total debt (TD) ratio typically cannot exceed 29% and 41% respectively. In some cases, PITI ratios in the mid to high 30s and TD ratios in the mid to high 40s may be acceptable if legitimate compensating factors exist. Generally, the stronger the compensating factors, the more flexibility there will be on the debt ratio exceptions.

*Have an acceptable credit history that demonstrates an applicant's willingness and ability to repay the mortgage loan being requested. The buyers' credit history does not have to be perfect. Lenders may consider extenuating circumstances and grant exceptions when evaluating an applicant's credit history.

Private lenders, such as mortgage companies and commercial banks make USDA Rural Development Guaranteed Loans. The loans have a 30-year term and a fixed interest rate. Unlike other zero down loan programs, the Guaranteed Rural Housing Program does not have loan limits. The maximum loan is determined by the applicant's income and repayment ability. The unique features of these loans may allow the buyer to qualify for more home than they may think. Social Security news

As regular as clockwork, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) reminds us to pay our taxes by sending us a Form 1040 soon after the first of the year. If you're due a refund, you also want to make sure you receive it promptly. You can avoid delays by verifying that all names and Social Security numbers are recorded correctly on your tax return.

When processing tax returns, IRS checks all names and Social Security numbers for accuracy. In the past, IRS matched the names and numbers of taxpayers and their spouses. Now, the names and numbers of all dependents, including newborns, listed on the tax return are checked.

When IRS discovers an incorrect Social Security number on your tax return, the agency will send you a letter explaining the discrepancy. You must fix the problem by giving IRS the correct Social Security number before you can get a tax refund. If you don't already have a number or if you need one for a dependent, call or visit a Social Security office.

In addition, check the Social Security number on your W-2 statement and pay stubs to make sure it matches the one on your Social Security card. If it doesn't, tell your employer immediately.


